Mercury Falls To 10 Below On Saturday

A snow storm that began Tuesday night and ended Friday night covered Hansford County with over five inches of snow and sent temperatures plunging to below zero marks.

The official low temperature for Spearman Saturday morning was 10 degrees below zero, according to the official weather observer, Mrs. Pat Cates.

Mrs. Cates said the temperature was still registering two below zero at 9:15 a.m. Saturday.

The fine, dry snow carried below normal amounts of moisture. Officially the moisture content of the snow was only .32 of an inch.

Very little wind accompanied the storm and the snow did not drift nor blow off the fields.

Travel was hazardous, but no accidents were reported in the Spearman area. A Gruver school bus went off the road Wednesday morning and turned on its side. Driver Bill Gilliland was the only person in the bus and he was not injured.

A large number of college students did not get home for the midterm break or were delayed until Saturday when the weather cleared. Many Texas Tech students have to be back to register Monday so many of them stayed in Lubbock.

The storm and bad roads forced the cancellation of many activities Thursday and Friday.

Spearman schools were closed Friday and the basketball games with Tyrone were cancelled Friday night.

Two events were cancelled Thursday night. The annual Chamber of Commerce banquet was postponed when the speaker was airbound.

He notified the Chamber that he could not land in Amarillo to keep his speaking engagement here. He flew from Dallas and was taken on to Colorado Springs. He finally got into Amarillo at 8 p.m. Thursday.

The area Baptist Brotherhood meeting at the First Baptist Church was also cancelled Thursday night.

PESO Gives Schools Help On Federal Aid

A new program of education is being introduced into the Spearman Public Schools this second semester. A similar program is being introduced into schools throughout the Panhandle.

The program is a developmental reading center for both the elementary and high school students. Two teachers have been added to the faculty to conduct these centers.

Programs of like nature are being installed in schools in Hansford, Hutchinson, Carson, Armstrong, Sherman, Moore and parts of Dallam counties.

The programs are financed by federal funds given to the schools under the Title I Public Law 891-10 concerning financial assistance to local schools. The funds can be used only for programs and courses not already taught or carried on in the school.

In the Spearman schools, Mrs. L. L. Laws will conduct the developmental reading center for grades one through eight. Mrs. Cecil Crawford will conduct the center for the four high school grades. It will be a one-half credit course.

These courses are designed to assist students in improving their reading abilities.

Since reading is a basic tool of learning, Supt. Bill Reeves said it is vital that all students be competent readers.

Besides the two teachers in the local system, the school will have the services of a specialist in reading and special tools to assist students.

The specialists and special equipment are made available to the local school through PESO. The Panhandle Educational Services Organization is an organization of Panhandle schools to utilize the federal funds to the fullest.

PESO is the brainchild of Dr. Emmett Smith of West Texas State University. Smith devised the idea of pooling federal funds and administrative

ideas. Dr. Reeves said the administrative problem is one of the major problems of using the federal funds. Every program in a school must be approved before it can be installed.

After the PESO idea was presented to area schools, it was accepted and the organization was established.

Trees Available For Windbreaks For Landowners

COLLEGE STATION, Texas farmers and ranchers can get low cost tree and shrub planting stock to set out as windbreaks, according to Bill Smith, Extension forester, Texas A&M University.

Seventeen species of trees and shrubs are available from the Texas Forest Service at a delivered cost of \$1.50 a hundred, plus sales tax. The plants will be shipped to landowners beginning in mid-February.

Application forms for ordering the trees are available from offices of local county agents.

The trees and shrubs can be used for windbreak, soil stabilization, or Christmas tree plantings, but can't be used or re-sold for shade or ornamental purposes. Orders for the trees must be in multiples of 50, and orders for less than 100 plants cannot be accepted.

Some of the planting stock available includes black walnut, catalpa, mulberry, bois d' arc, loblolly pine, red cedar, sycamore and euonymus.

Seedling orders will be packed in moss and moisture proof paper and shipped prepaid direct to the purchaser, said Smith.

In addition to the windbreak application form, a guide sheet for setting the stock out is available at the county agent's office.

FARM BUREAU SPEAKER - Walter Meyer of the Farm Bureau Marketing Division spoke to Hansford and Ochiltree county officials Thursday night concerning market developments and Bill Wedemeyer, farm program specialist, was also a guest speaker at the meeting. Bad weather caused many farmers not to be able to attend.

FB Experts Discuss Marketing, Farm Law

Market development and the farm program were discussed by two representatives of the Texas Farm Bureau with a group of farmers in the Farm Bureau building here Friday night.

Walter Meyer of the Farm Bureau Marketing division talked about work being done by his division. He told the group that Farm Bureau is working to develop more markets for crops.

He said more foreign markets are being developed for milo and beef. Both of the locally produced products are finding acceptance in foreign markets.

Farm Bureau is working on a plan that will move a large quantity of fresh beef into the European market.

Meyer said wheat and milo are moving out of the elevators into foreign markets.

World-wide wheat production set a new record for production this year, yet consumption exceeded production. He said this is making surpluses a thing of the past.

Farm Bureau is also working on some marketing associations for different farm crops to help farm income, Meyer said.

Bill Wedemeyer, the state Farm Bureau specialist on the farm program and policy development for the state organization talked about the farm program.

Wedemeyer said there was nothing to indicate that farm controls will be dropped in future years. It is Wedemeyer's opinion that more items will be brought under government control.

He said the government's efforts to divert more money and land in livestock is just an effort to expand production until the livestock industry gets into market trouble and then turns to the government for assistance and controls.

Wedemeyer pointed out that in the latest agriculture law there is a provision for establishing a parity income for the family farm. He said this is much different to parity prices.

Parity income would be established for the entire production of a farm. The amount of income that would be parity would be set by government officials.

Wedemeyer said for this to work it would require that all production on the farm be controlled.

He foresaw national quotas of production with penalties for under production as well as over production.

The speaker said it was an established trend that all government programs forced market prices down by dumping on

the market, then making up the difference to the government set parity price through payments of some type.

The meeting was scheduled for several county officials, but because of bad weather only Hansford and Ochiltree County farmers were able to attend.

entire PESO organization. These are divided into units. The schools in Hansford, Hutchison, Carson, Armstrong, Sherman, Moore and Dallam are in a unit with headquarters in Borger.

The Borger unit decided upon the developmental reading centers and presented the program through PESO for approval. The program received quick approval.

Robert Holman of Midland was employed as unit coordinator. He is a graduate of Oklahoma University, has experience in teaching and administration. He also developed programs for reading instruction in several schools.

He is under the direct administration of the unit directors. Dr. Reeves is one of the directors.

Holman has been conducting a workshop for center teachers this past week. Mrs. Laws, Mrs. Crawford and Elementary Principal Allen Alford attended the school.

Dr. Reeves said PESO is the first cooperative program under the federal program. It is being watched by schools all over the nation who are wrestling with the federal program.

Besides the help Holman gives the teachers, the schools will also benefit from equipment like an eye camera and other equipment that a single school could not afford.

Dr. Reeves said larger schools have been able to formulate plans under the program. Some have hired an administrator just to administer the program. However, small schools must have help.

It is expected that when the PESO program has time to prove its worth in administering the federal program, it will be copied by other schools and areas. Several other areas are already seeking information about the organization.

Federal funds are distributed to the schools on the basis of the number of children from families with an income of less than \$2,000 per year. This is based on the 1960 census. The funds can be used in a needed program for all children.

On this formula, Spearman is receiving \$13,000. Through the PESO program the school has been able to quickly establish a useful program and get it in operation.

Dr. Reeves said the entire area is indebted to Dr. Smith and Kenneth Laycock of West Texas State University for getting the PESO program established and for helping schools get their programs started.
