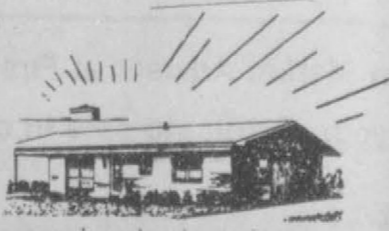

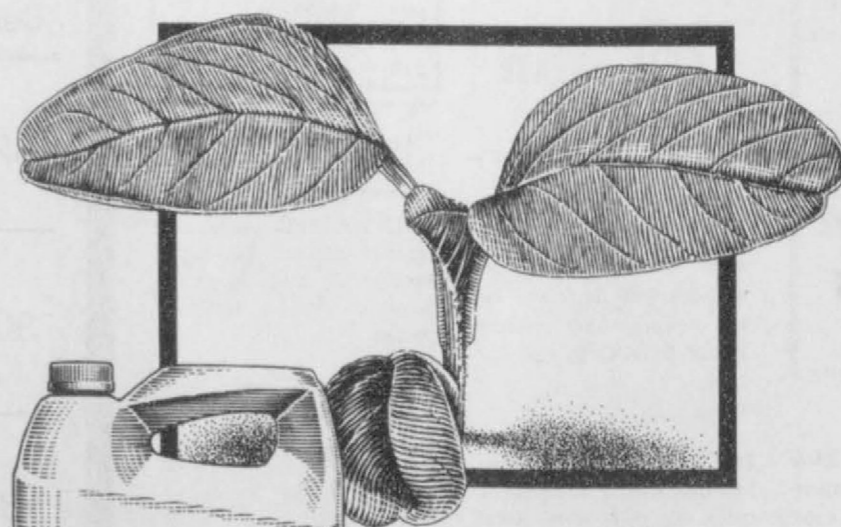

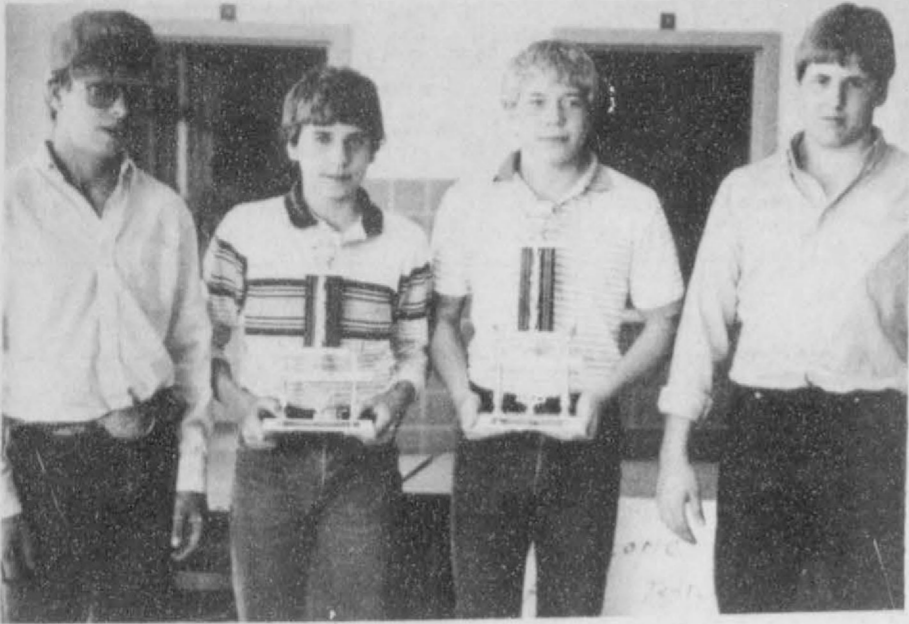

## Halifax Resolutions Day

The first American colony to make a formal declaration in favor of separation from Great Britain was North Carolina—on April 12, 1776.

North Carolina's resolution was highly influential in bringing about the American Declaration of Independence at the Continental Congress three months later, on July 4, 1776.

North Carolina had acted to organize a militia and create a provincial council, and committees of safety had been set up in the various districts when a British force under Sir Henry Clinton went south to subdue the colony early in 1776.

The British called on loyalists in North Carolina (they were considerable in number) to gather and support the British Army, and a loyalist Army was

When it moved to meet the advancing British forces, however, it was intercepted by a patriot force under the command of Colonel Richard Caswell at Moore's Creek Bridge, on February 27, and the loyalists were badly beaten, losing 700 prisoners and valuable military supplies.

Thus encouraged, delegates elected to a provincial Congress, which met at Halifax in April, were ready to make a formal declaration. A resolution proclaiming independence was unanimously adopted on the 12th.

This anniversary, vitally influential in American history, is often overlooked. April 12 is a legal holiday in North Carolina.

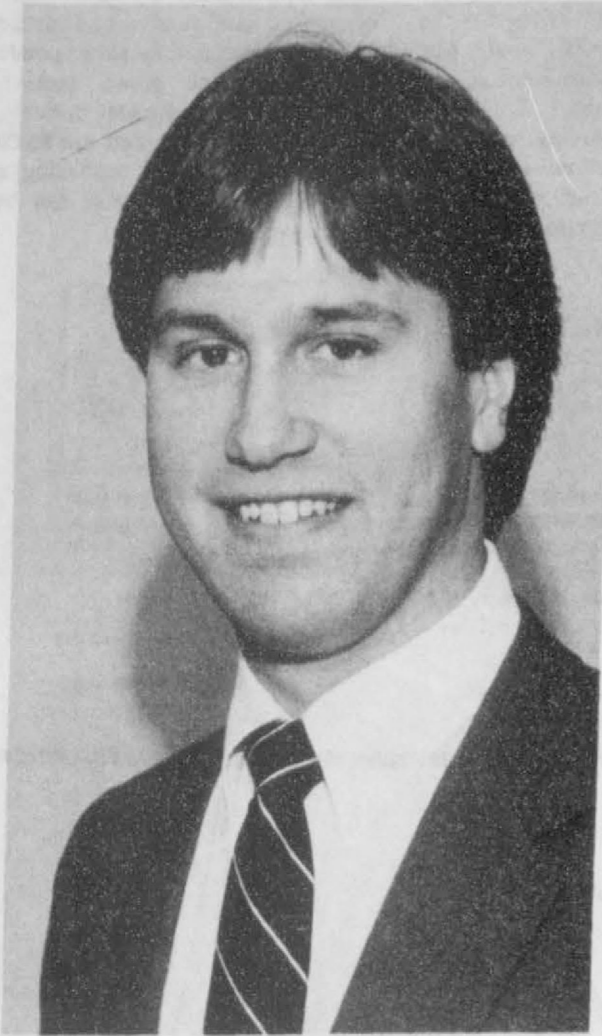

EATING OUT

VISITORS to Washington--and this is the big season--are sometimes invited by their congressman or senator to lunch.

THE prestige place to eat, though the food isn't all that good, is either the Senate or House dining rooms. The food and atmosphere in the Senate dining room is better, though there's little difference in menus.

THE congressional office buildings, of which there are now six, each have a cafeteria, and many members prefer to eat here and take guests here. But these restaurants aren't in the historic Capitol Building itself--which visitors like to see.

IT'S probably a mistake to order any salad in these crowded, rushed Capitol restaurants. The special of the day is the best bet, usually, and a safer bet is a hamburger or a club sandwich.

IN the Senate dining room one still cannot order beer or wine. On the House side, where different rules prevail, the diner can order either.

ONE reason tourists enjoy these Capitol dining rooms is that one always sees other congressmen or senators there. They are both small and one can see and meet the famous members of Congress.

MEMBERS hate become accustomed to coming by other members' tables and speaking to guests--which if the member is rather famous earns a bit. The usual method is for a host senator to motion to his colleague and say he has important constituents he would like him to meet.

SO there's a nice social element in the Capitol dining rooms.

Try one of these glazes for your ham. Remember while baking your ham put the glaze on every 10 minutes during the last 30 minutes of roasting.

**Honey-Orange Glaze:** Mix 1/2 cup honey with 1 cup packed brown sugar and 1/2 cup orange juice. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

**Marmalade Glaze:** Mix 1 cup honey with 1/2 cup orange marmalade and dash Tabasco. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.

**Cranberry Glaze:** Mix 1/2 cup light corn syrup with a cup whole or jellied cranberry sauce. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

If you wish to hay wheat cover on ACR you must submit a request to the COC, in writing, and pay a field visit fee.

\*Farm yields will be determined by type (Irr-dry) of ACR (set aside) designated.

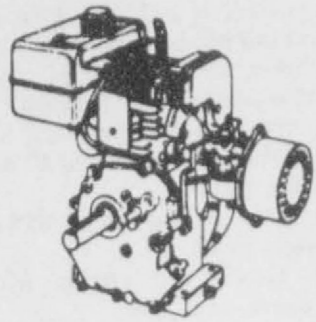
