City Trims Budget \$50,000 For 1964

Spearman's City budget has been trimmed by \$51,872 for the 1964 fiscal year. The reduced budget was approved night by the City Monday Council.

This coming fiscal year the city will spend \$354,775 as compared to \$406,647 this year.

City Manager Ken Conrey, who prepared the budget, said the reductions in the capital outlay and operating expenses will make the saving. Capital was reduced by \$62,500 and operating expenses by \$27, 805.

The total reduction of \$91,327 is offset by a temporary increase in the debt ser-

ruin this area for practice. At the north end of the field the heavy congestion of pedestrian traffic makes in unsafe to have cars parking in that small area.

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

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
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THE MORSE CODE

It is designed to help the employees, parents and itizens of the community to inderstand better the responsioilities, obligations, duties nd relationships of all concerned in the operation of the chool. Many policies were aken from actions of the Board Trustees as recorded in the ninutes of the few past years. policies of other chools were studied to deternine good regulations and ractices.

An achievement awards proram as recommended by the dministration was adopted by he board. This system is basd on the idea of giving recogition to those who excel in all ther fields of endeavor outide of athletics. An award of chievement will be presented each student having earned 00 points during a current ear. Points will be given for adership such as holding stuent council and class office, heerleaders, activities on the chool paper and annual; schoarship; literary events, library assistants and office staff, rompt and regular attend-

Near the end of the school year an "Award Night: will be held at which time all awards will be presented and recognition given to outstanding students. To qualify for these awards a student must carry at least four academic subjects and meet the approval of the award council as to behavior, class work, attendance and general conduct toward the school at all times.

Three jackets of achievement will be awarded during the 4 year high school period under the award system. If a student receives a jacket for participation in athletic events then he will not be entitled to a jacket for achievement, but may receive a trophy of achievement.




