



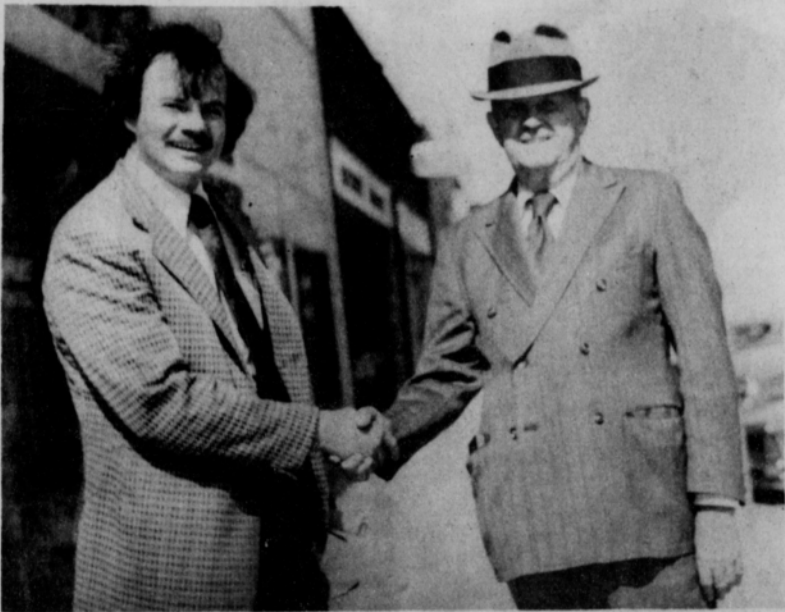

Longtime Attorney To Retire

In an exclusive interview with T.D. "Touchdown" Sansing this morning I struck solid gold! Sansing is retiring from his law practice after 39 years and plans to travel extensively throughout the country with his wife. The Spearman Reporter caught him before he leaves for a lot of fishing in Colorado and New Mexico to tell us a little about his life.

T. D. Sansing was born in Henderson County, Texas in a log cabin. He attended high school at Athens, Texas where he acquired his first job as a peanut and popcorn man in a street market, making 10 cents an hour. While going to Athens High School, he participated on the track team for two years. He was district champion in the mile and two mile events and went to the state meet both years. In his second state meet, he placed second out of a field of 61.

Mr. Sansing's dad died when he was eleven years old and he worked his way through college, attending law school in Austin, Texas at the University of Texas, where he lettered as a freshman in track, running in the mile and the two mile. At that time, Jim Reese held the track record for the mile run: 4:16. T. D. Sansing ran very close to his classmate's time in the 4:20's. Mr. Sansing was also a member of the Cross Country Squad.

Mr. Sansing practiced law in Linden, Texas for eight years and also ran the General Merchandise Store there for two years. At that time a man could buy a suit for \$12 or a pair of work shoes for \$1.40. A 48-pound sack of flour was 60 cents, salt pork cost 6 cents a pound. Bacon was twelve to fifteen cents a pound, steak was two pounds for a quarter and a dozen eggs were 6 cents. Remembering those days must make today's inflation seem insurmountable.

Mr. Sansing's full life to date included teaching school for one year at Salina, where, besides teaching Social Science and Science, he was the literary coach. From Salina he went to Edgewood, Texas for two years where he also taught Social Science and Science and doubled as both the literary and athletic coach in 1927. One year there he coached his team to the county and district cham-

ionship. In Mesquite, Texas he taught public speaking and served as the high school principal for one year while also holding down the athletic and literary coaching responsibilities. Mr. Sansing went to Phar-San Juan-Alamo for two years where he taught Social Sciences, public speaking, and commercial law. While there, he served as the High School Baseball Coach and the Junior High Football Coach.

He moved to Spearman from Linden, Texas and has practiced law here for 39 years. T. D. operated a farm in Hansford County for 28 years and was a member of the building committee for the new Methodist Church where he is presently a member. He is a former member of the Lions and belongs to the Chamber of Commerce besides having long been a member in good standing of the Northeast Panhandle Bar Association. Among some of his other accomplishments, having served as county attorney for nineteen years stands out. He was County Attorney from 1938 until 1950. When Jimmy Linn retired Sansing took over as County Attorney once again for six and a half years; prosecuting misdemeanors and assisting the DA with felonies.

Mr. and Mrs. Sansing have three daughters. Caroline resides in Houston where her husband teaches school. Tynell Jordan and her husband David also live in Houston. David is the District Landman for Atlantic-Richfield. They have two boys and two girls. Martha Ann Coursey lives in Monahan and has three boys. Her husband Perry is the Tennis Coach there.

Looking back on his life here in Spearman, Mr. Sansing noticed some changes. One year as a county attorney he filed eleven complaints. He said in his last year in that position he would file as many in one week. He also was the only attorney in Hansford County for twelve years and reflected that now Hansford County has nine attorneys. He said that the first big change in this area was in 1954 with the discovery and development of oil and gas. In the late 50's and early 60's irrigation development furthered the economic progress in this area. He also mentioned that many new homes have recently

been built and are being built. These were reflections from a man that was paid 10 cents an hour on his first job, worked his way through college and law school many days earning no more than "four bits", and now stands looking out his office window watching a new home being built and probably wondering who will carry on. We congratulate an individual who has certainly had an accomplished, full life with many years left to enjoy a well-deserved rest.

T. D. Sansing wants the people of Spearman and Hansford County to know that he sincerely appreciates the legal business they have given over the years. He said, "The Spearman people and the County have been good to me!"

In the drawing held at the conclusion of the meeting, Marvin Groves won the new perculator, J. B. Buchanan won \$25.00 prize, Mrs. Alma Ricketts won \$50.00 prize, and Wayman Edwards won the \$100.00 first prize.

Grand Jury Convenes

The Hansford County Grand Jury convened at 10:00 o'clock Monday, March 21st. On the top of their list was the consideration of the men arrested for the grain thefts. R. L. McFarlin said that the Department was pleased when they got their indictments against Teddy James Teakell of Buffalo, Texas and Buddy Lynn James of Chickashaw, Oklahoma, for Theft of Grain.

Also indicted by the Grand Jury Monday was Terry Cook, for Burglary; Joe Gutierrez, for Aggravated Assault; Juan Alberto Renteria, for Theft by Exercising Control; Dwayne Flowers of Perry, Oklahoma, for Theft over \$200; Annie Ruth Blanton, Obtaining a Controlled Substance by Fraud; Terry Templeton, for Aggravated As-

sault; and for Burglary, the three persons involved in the roof top break-in of the Gruver Drug Store....Charles Romines, Geoffrey Crawford, and Dean Smith, all from Pampa.

Sheriff McFarlin also said that two arrests were made shortly before noon, Thursday, March 24, for possession of Marijuana over four ounces, a felony. Arrested were Johnny Lee Merrell, 23 years old and his wife, Cynthia, 19 years old, who reside at 511 W. Third, Spearman.

In custody at Lawton, Oklahoma is Frank Harrison, III, who was arrested on a fugitive warrant issued by the Hansford County Sheriff's Department. Harrison was charged with Removal of Mortgaged Property which involved some cattle from Hansford County.

Absentee Voting Light In Upcoming Elections

Absentee balloting in the upcoming April 2 city and school elections will end at the close of business on March 29. If you want to vote absentee in either the city or school elections, you must do so in the next few days.

A check with city hall shows that 3 persons had cast absentee ballots in the city election, and the school business office there had been no absentee voting in the school trustee election.

There are four candidates in the city election who are vying for three council places. They are incumbents Gene Cudd and James R. (Jim) Nicholson, Verlin Behne and Frances Loftin. Four men have placed their name on the ballot for the school trustee election. They are R. C. Porter, Clark Mires, Paul Hazelwood, incumbents; and Jim Davis.

Three trustees will be for a regular three-year term and one will be for a one year term. Porter, Mires, and Hazelwood have filed for the three-year terms and Jim Davis filed for the one-year term.

Polls for both city and school elections will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. on April 2 at the Spearman High School.

The grazing date for wheat for Hansford County has been extended from April 1 to April 11, according to Elzey Vanderburg, of the ACSC office.

Vanderburg stated that farmers should use their own judgement as to whether or not to graze their wheat for the extra ten days.

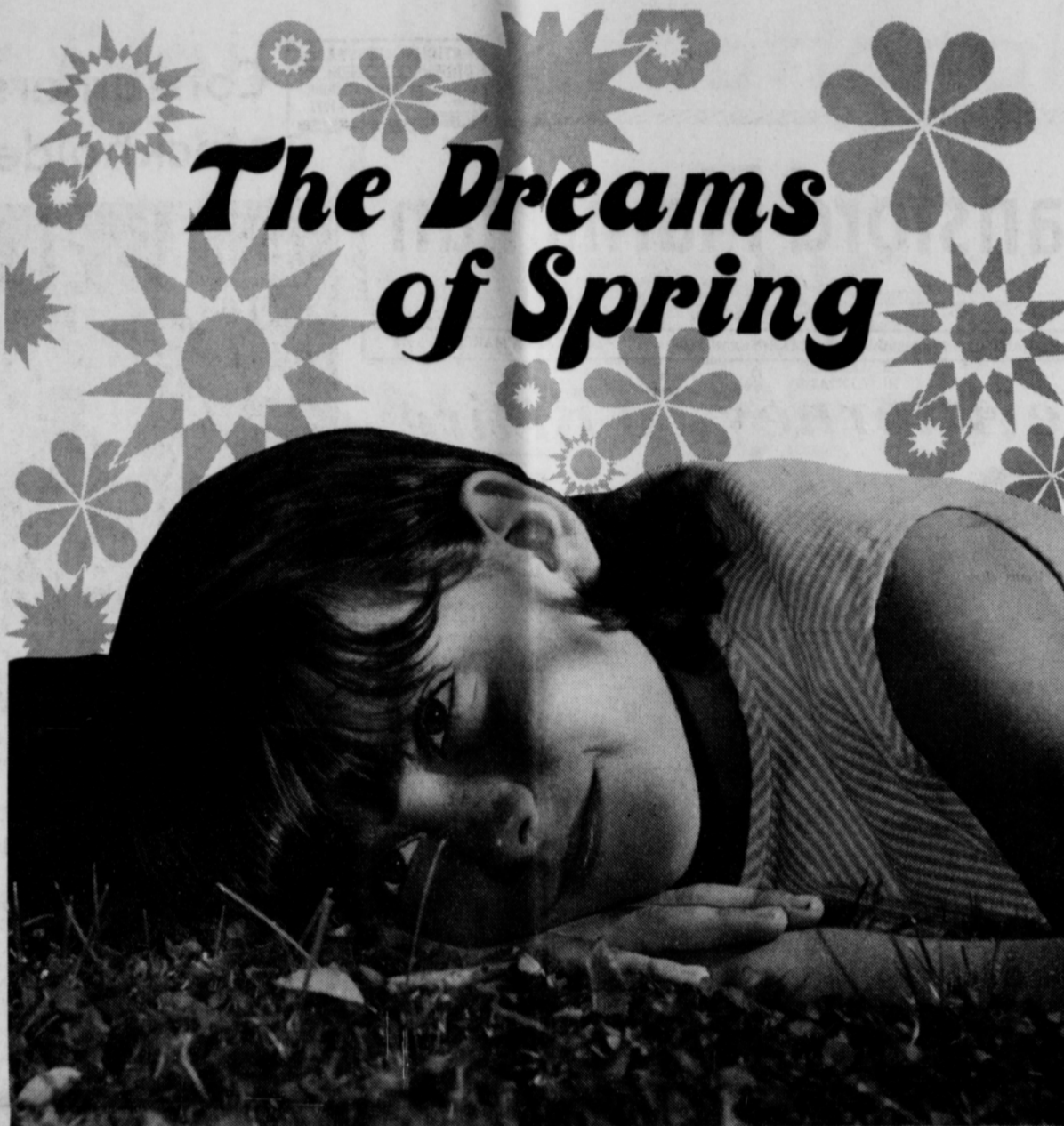
Miss Paula Buschman lives in Stinnett, Texas. She served as Dean of Girls in the Apostolic Faith Bible College the past year.



LEGAL NOTICE

ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE CITY OF SPEARMAN, TEXAS

An ordinance establishing zoning regulations and creating zoning or use districts in accordance with a comprehensive plan; regulating the height of buildings, size of yards and density of population; adopting a zoning map showing the location and boundaries of the various districts and use areas; setting forth regulations governing buildings and uses within such areas, defining terms; providing for enforcement and penalties for violations, for appeals and exceptions, for future changes and amendments; requiring building permits and certificates of occupancy; authorizing revocation of building permits; defining and authorizing non-conforming uses; creating a board of adjustment and providing for its powers, procedure, etc; providing a savings clause and repealing conflicting ordinances; providing minimum housing requirements; defining architectural control, nuisances and temporary structures.
 Section 803.1 Violations and Penalties, Fines
 A violation of this Ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by fine. Any person, firm or corporation who violates or refuses to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each offense. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.
 This Ordinance will go into effect April 1, 1977.

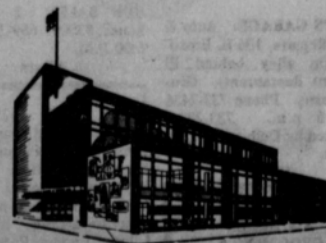

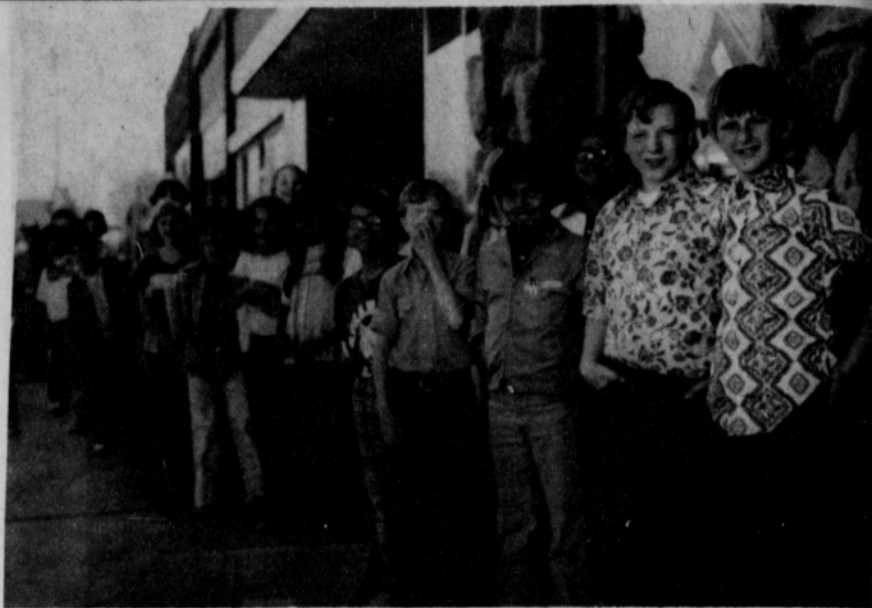

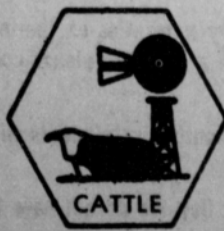

In singles, Olen Wilson of Perryton dominated Jimmy Vernon of Spearman 6-1, 7-4.

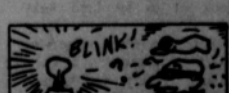
