Absolutely not!!! It teaches our boys and girls responsibility, citizenship, and care for livestock. It also helps them prepare for the future.



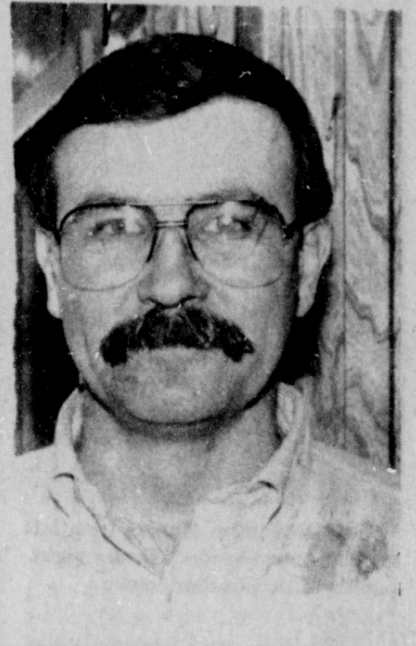
**Terry Delozier**

## Severe Weather Awareness Week

Governor William P. Clements, Jr., has proclaimed the week of March 1-7, 1987 as Severe Weather Awareness Week in Texas. In light of this proclamation, we would like to remind you of some of the safety precautions and procedures you can use to lower the risk of loss of life, personal injury, and property damage that can result from tornadic weather.

In general, tornadoes develop from severe thunderstorms. Usually, the weather is hot, humid and unsettled. Most strike between 3 and 7 p.m. during April, May, and June, however, a tornado can strike at any time and in any month with little or no warning. Although tornadoes usually move from the Southwest to the Northeast, they can move in any direction and suddenly change course. Wind speeds can range from 100 to 300 mph and a tornado can travel at speeds of over 70 mph.

Although there is no way to stop a tornado, there are some simple steps you can take to improve your chances of survival. You should know the closest location to shelter should you be advised to take shelter immediately; keep emergency supplies on hand such as a battery powered radio, flashlight, extra batteries, food, water, and blankets or sleeping bags.

If you are away from home or have no time to reach a designated shelter, you can protect yourself by going to a low interior space, such as a hallway or restroom, or find a low spot in the ground such as a ditch. Avoid seeking shelter near trees, powerlines and telephone poles, and always protect your head from injury while the tornado is near.

After a tornado, check for injured or missing people and remember not to move anyone who has been injured. Check for gas leaks, but don't use electrical equipment or telephones. If you find a gas leak, leave the area immediately.

Remember that severe weather watch means that the weather conditions have the potential to become serious. Severe weather warning means that severe weather is imminent and you should plan on seeking shelter. If you notice dark, heavy storm clouds, hail and/or heavy rain, thunder and lightning, tune in to your local radio and T.V. stations to be informed as to the latest weather developments.

**FARM STORAGE-selection-** Farmers who store grain may want to take some time during the "off season" to evaluate their drying operation, including fan selection, says an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Storage fan selection should be based on air flow rate and the quantity of grain to be dried. The air flow rate should be sufficient to remove moisture quickly enough from grain to prevent quality deterioration. The "trick" is to select a fan that will provide the required quantity of air at the top foot of the grain mass, the point farthest from the equipment.
