Hi wind struck the Hansford County area late Thursday evening, and by Friday morning, clouds and light snow, with 85 mile per hour winds hammerd the area.

Several plate glass windows in the Spearman area were blown out; already the town was suffering severe glass loss from high winds, and vandalism from the past week. High lines, and other damage was inflicted from the winds. Dust cause poor visibility in the area also.

The electric companies were doing marvelous work, along with the phone companies, to even keep service to their cust mers during the high winds, and heavy dust of Friday. Several schools, including the Morse schools were closed early on Friday.


