Chamber industrial committee meets with Texas Industrial Commission!

Testimony In Powell Trial

Testimony has been completed in the trial of Patrick Otis Powell, 39, of Fort Worth in 84th Judicial District Court in Spearman for the murder of Jose Leon Gutierrez.

The jury of four men and eight women Saturday heard closing arguments before receiving the charge from District Judge Richard Countiss and beginning their deliberations.

Powell originally pleaded guilty to the death of 55-year old Gutierrez, but requested his punishment be decided by a jury.

Powell entered a plea of not guilty late Wednesday afternoon, Oct. 5, before Judge Richard Countiss.

Assistant District Attorney Linda Walden opened the state's case with testimony by Hansford County Sheriff R. L. McFarlin Wednesday afternoon.

He is the first of some 10 to 15 witnesses expected to be presented for the state during the trial.

Gutierrez, father of 13 children, was shot in the heart, mouth and left leg with a .22 caliber rifle and his body was discovered in the seat of a car bound for the scrap crusher in the Spearman landfill. Authorities said he apparently had been shot some time the previous day in Spearman.

Powell's brother, Frank Harris Powell, 41, also of Fort Worth, also had been charged with the death of Gutierrez but later was nobilled by the Grand Jury.

The Powell brothers were arrested at the landfill after an employee there, reportedly held hostage, made his escape and tipped off the sheriff's department.

The second witness presented by the state was Deputy Sheriff Dennis Quimby who was followed on the stand by Dr. Jose A. Diaz-Esquivel of Amarillo who performed the autopsy and other pathological work.

Testimony by Quimby was interspersed among testimony Thursday by other state witnesses. The final witnesses of the day included two employees of the Department of Public Safety in Austin who attested to laboratory work done there on the automatic-type rifle, ballistics testing and other forensic work.

Opening witness Friday morning was Quimby who was outlining detailed work connected with the investigation after the discovery of Gutierrez' body, including descriptions of the landfill area traversed in taking the body to the scrap crusher pit as well as the trailer where the body was found.

The Spearman Chamber of Commerce industrial committee met with the Texas Industrial Commission, Wednesday afternoon in the beautiful B&B Farm Industries friendship room in Spearman.

Many members of the local Chamber were on hand for the occasion. The Texas Industrial Commission program is an industrial sales team, and training seminar team, sent out by the state.

The meeting was opened at 1 p.m., with L.E. Thomas, Chairman of the Industrial committee for Spearman introducing the guests and the program. Homer Tucker, senior community development consultant for the Texas Industrial Commission was in charge of the seminar.

Wayne T. Franke, assistant government affairs manager of General Telephone discussed the utilities that will be needed when a new industrial area is opened at the new airport in the near future. One of the highlights of the meeting, was a discussion by Mayor Ralph Blodgett on the new airport for Spearman. It was learned that Blodgett is going to trade 136 acres of land that the industrial board has purchased for the airport, for another 136 acres adjoining the area, and this will be ample land for the construction of the new 4800 ft. runway.

Blodgett stated that if the trade goes through, there will be no need for any more money to purchase land for the airport, and that the industrial sites will be located on the West side of the new airport. A drawing of the proposed new system is in this paper.

In discussing utility needs for the new industrial area, water quality, source of supply and amount of water, distribution system, pressure, and the city's future plans will be important subjects to know, in case a new industry wants to move to Spearman. Also, sewage, treatment, etc. must be known. It might be added, that much praise and thanks must go to the past city commissions who were instrumental in getting the new sewage plant, new water lines, gas, and other utilities for the City of Spearman. Special thanks to the men who served on the commission, under Mayor Hackley, Mayor Palmer, and Mayor Blodgett who had "foresight" enough to keep our city growing! Another thing that new manufacturing plants might want to know, is who is the supplier of utilities in this area; it was learned that because of location of the new sights, just north of the present airport, most utilities are readily available. Electricity can be supplied by Community Public Service, and General Telephone will supply the phone needed.

One of the most important discussions of the day, was industrial sites, already available in Spearman! This is very

important, as many manufacturing plants want to locate in an existing building. Other items of value to a business that might want to locate in Spearman, include: aerial photos, and the general outlook of the community! Does your community have some Little League Parks? How about your school system? What about band, football, basketball? Hospitals, number of doctors and nurses in your community! What type of teachers do you have in your school system? Also, it was learned at the seminar that a 10 minute slide presentation of the community might be very valuable. James Cunningham, of the local school system, had a scrap book on hand to show the group attending the meeting Thursday. The book has pictures of the many fine buildings and homes in Spearman, and was very informative.

Also important to the area, and especially any new manufacturer that might want to locate here, is what type of hiways, bus service, truck lines, and air service can we furnish out of Spearman. Also, it was learned that a big advantage to a manufacturer locating in Spearman, would be the fact that people of this area produce 16% more than the average people in America.

Of importance, also is how to get money to finance new plants, and industrial development in your area; of course local banks and savings & loan plus individuals head the list. Area money is available from Insurance companies, Mortgage companies, and government loans.

In closing the seminar, Homer Tucker stated that the way to prospect for new business' is to track down every tip; if you hear of someone in the county who has invented something, and might need a place to manufacture the invention, try and help him out. Tucker stated that the Dallas metropolitan area is full to the brim, and must move further out to find new locations for plants. AND, OF COURSE TUCKER REMINDED THE GROUP THAT 80% OF ALL OF YOUR DEVELOPMENT FOR YOUR AREA IS RIGHT AT HOME, AMONG THE BUSINESS MEN WHO ARE IN SPEARMAN TODAY! This is a startling fact. It seems that if we would practice the "Golden Rule" right at home, this community would literally "bust at the seams!" And, sure enough our town is on a big BUILDING BOOM right now! In conjunction with this story, Max Banks informed the newspaper that they are adding 15,000 more square feet to their shop in Spearman, making a total of 23,400 square feet at the Baker & Taylor yard in Spearman!

Clarence Rice Services Held

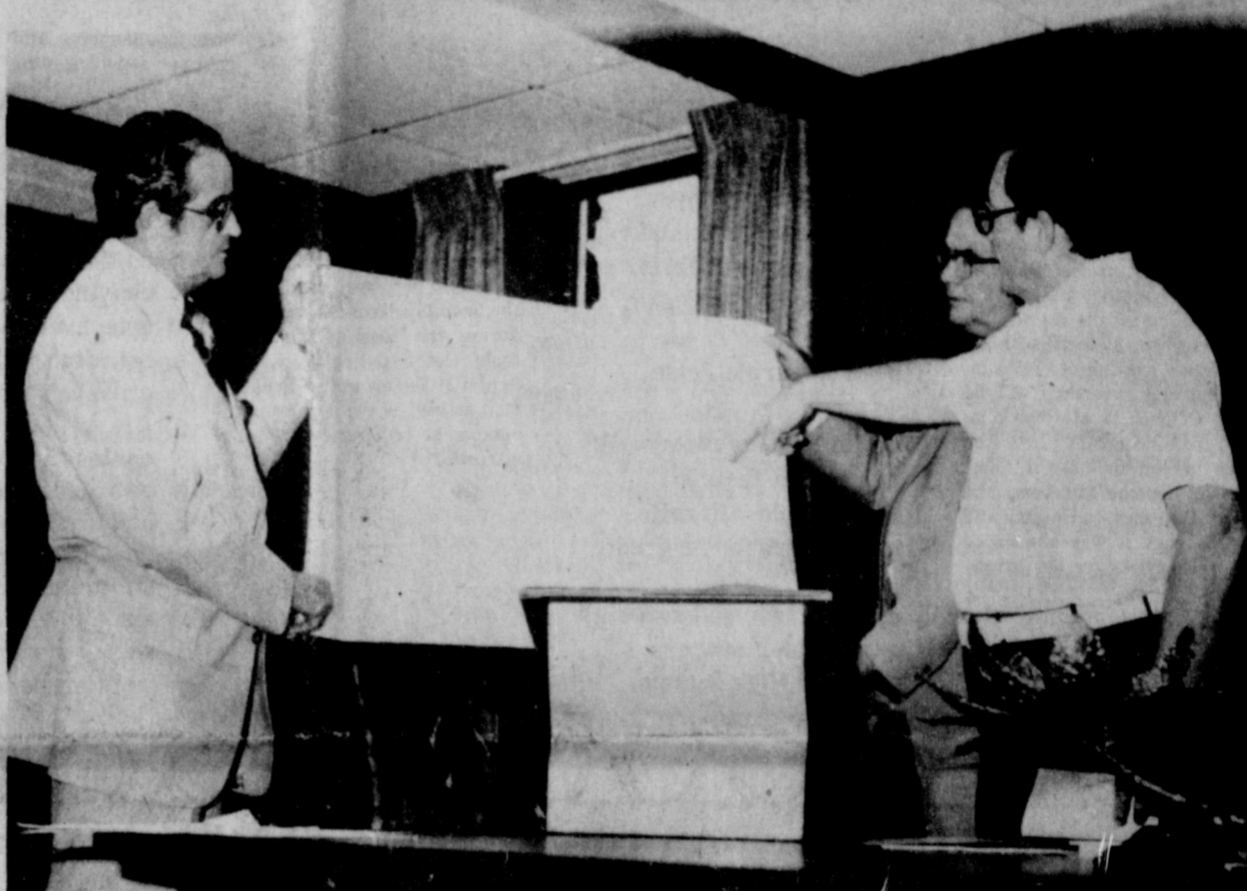

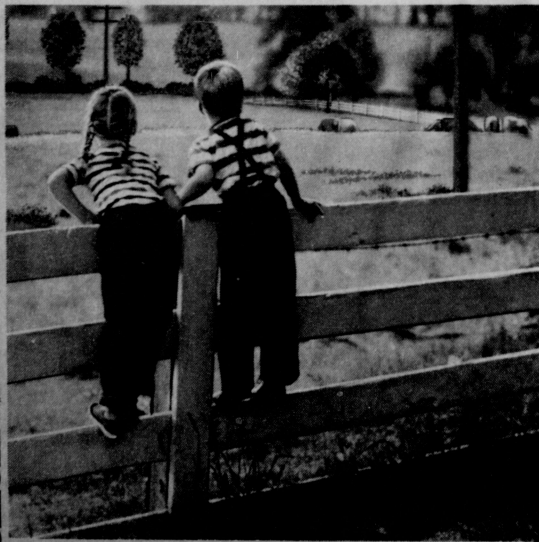

8th Grade wins one, 7th ties

The 7th Graders went to Canadian to play football Thursday. Both teams moved the ball pretty well but both teams had defenses that just wouldn't allow a score when the going got tough. As it turned out Spearman's 7th graders were playing penalties more than they were playing Canadian. Jeff Quimby had two touchdown runs called back on penalties. The first was a 38 yard run from scrimmage nullified by a clipping call, with 3:54 left in the second quarter. The second came two minutes later when Jeff ran 43 yards from scrimmage reaching the end zone only to have that one called back on an illegal possession penalty.

The defenses pretty much controlled the game after that, allowing little offense. There was an exciting finish. Some brilliant coaching gave the 7th Graders one last chance. Spearman turned the ball over on the 9 yard line on downs with just seconds remaining in the game. Coach Brown used his time-outs wisely hoping for another opportunity to get the ball. That opportunity came when Canadian fumbled the ball on their 11 yard line with 1:12 second remaining on the clock. The Little Lynx ran one last play that failed to score ending the game in a 0-0 tie. The 7th graders are 2-1 on the season.

The Lynx 8th Graders fared a little better. At the start of the game it looked like they might have as much trouble moving the ball as did their younger counterparts. 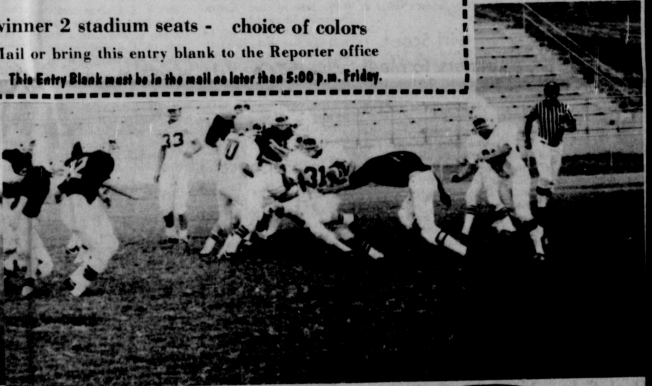

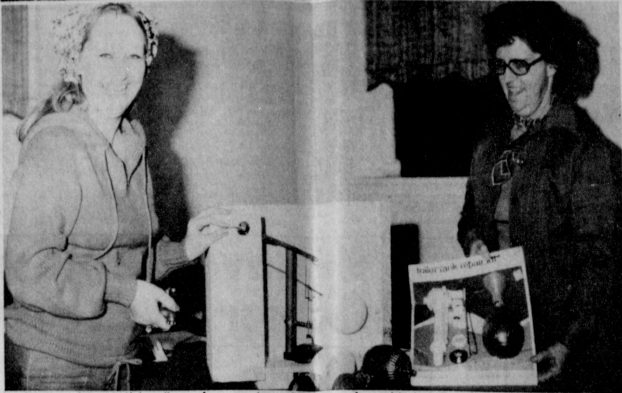

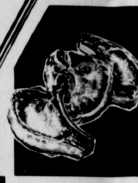
