

Official Rainfall 2.73 Inches At Spearman

Spearman television viewers, Thursday night, might well wonder if there is not a credibility gap in weather reporting after warnings were issued for four neighboring counties for severe thunderstorms...

--Almost two hours after lightning had flashed and thunder had rolled across Hansford county along with rain ranging from 2.5 to 4.3 inches.

Rain began spattering Spearman about 6 p.m., Thursday. Then, the storm built with all the fireworks of a high plains storm. About 8 p.m., programming on Amarillo television stations was interrupted to issue the severe thunderstorm warning for Moore, Hutchinson, Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties with no mention of Hansford.

There was a brief span of clearing when the setting sun was visible here then the rain set in again steadily toting up the two-and-a-half inches at Spearman and up to 4.3 inches southwest of town.

With an assessment Friday morning came the information that there had been average rainfall in the counties under warning with flash flood warnings actually unneeded--but other portions of the Panhandle had been inundated.

McLean, in the south part of Gray County from Pampa, had an official 4.8 inches with unofficial reports from outlying farms and ranches ranging to almost six inches. Pampa's unofficial report ranged to slightly more than three inches.

The story was the same at

Clarendon where an official 1.58 inches was recorded with unofficial reports from nearby farms and ranches ranging to five inches.

The city of Amarillo was about the only area in the Panhandle that did not need--and did not want the rain.

Where Amarillo used to speak of "drying out" after a heavy rain, reports now say "high water is receding somewhat." That was the condition when skies turned gray over that city, Thursday evening. Homes and businesses in the Wolflin-Georgia area--particularly Paramount Blvd. and around the shores of controversial Lake Laurence Duniven had watched water recede after a week of damaging waves.

Friday morning, the day began in Amarillo with water up to the windows of stalled cars in the area extended from Lake Duniven to Paramount and Mockingbird. Many streets had been blocked off by authorities but motorists were driving around the barricades creating the same problem of a week ago: waves that pushed the high water into homes and businesses in the area. In this latest surge of storm-caused high water there was some retribution against motorists: the barricades were for their benefit and those who drove around found themselves stranded in water high enough to be damaging to autos.

Meanwhile, back on our part of the High Plains, there was no reported damage from the rain and those who live by the land were smiling broadly.

Hansford Sheriff's Department Gets Two Convictions Here

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department saw two cases of conviction in court here this week with one extradited prisoner in custody and another to be transferred here from Andrews.

William Clifton Allen was convicted of auto theft, assessed a \$240 fine and sentenced to one year in prison. That sentence was probated.

Larry Bonham drew a four-year sentence for burglary of the Shamrock service station at Gruver. This sentence was probated. He was assessed an \$840 fine.

James O. Smith, a fugitive from Hansford County two

years on a charge of hindering secured creditors, was returned here from Vale, Ore., Monday.

Authorities at Andrews are holding Albert Ortega Jr. for Hansford County on a charge of auto theft. He will be brought back for trial.

Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin pointed to Smith as an example of the problems facing any law enforcement department in the nation in locating fugitives. Though Smith had been sought two years, this is no reflection on the efficiency of the sheriff's department. In fact, it reflects an advance in apprehending fugitives. In times past, it would have been

almost impossible to locate a man who is not an habitual felon after two years. Today is a different story.

"Electronics is one reason we usually locate them sooner or later," Sheriff McFarlin said earlier when Smith was first apprehended and Hansford County was waiting to see if he would waive extradition.

The sheriff said another plus is the training law enforcement officers get today. They are schooled to check out individuals that would not have received a second look beyond their local offense in earlier days.

The sheriff noted that even today it is very difficult to locate

a wanted person after the second move. He explained that this is why he moves so quickly, especially on "hot" check cases.

"Usually, they can be located following the first move away from the area but the second multiplies our problems a thousand fold," McFarlin said. He credits this fast move on a complaint with the record his department has established, particularly in the recovery on bad checks.

Not willing to rest on the laurels of recovery and conviction, Sheriff McFarlin and his staff of deputies are continuing investigation of a number of cases.

DPS Warns 48 May Die In Labor Day Traffic

AUSTIN--The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety has warned that as many as 48 persons may die in traffic accidents this Labor Day weekend on the state's streets and highways unless drivers are especially cautious.

"Otherwise," said Colonel Jim Adams, "the 78-hour period could be a repeat of the most recent holiday. Traffic accidents during the last July 4th weekend took a total of 60 lives. 16 more than had been estimated," he said.

Drunk driving and excessive speed were the major contributing factors in the fatal accidents recorded over the July 4th holiday, according to data furnished by the DPS Statistical Services Division.

None of the drivers or passengers killed during the July

4th holiday were wearing seatbelts. In addition, 35 percent of these fatalities resulted from the person being ejected from the vehicle.

Adams urged motorists to wear their seatbelts to minimize the hazard posed by careless

drivers. He said safety belts should be used during city driving as well as long distance trips.

Adams has instructed DPS Regional Commanders to utilize additional Troopers during the three-day holiday and he said "Operation Motorcide" would

be placed into effect.

"DPS patrol officers will be enforcing the laws and assisting motorists by watching for drivers who exceed the speed limit and those impaired by alcohol or drugs," Adams said. They will also be on the lookout for vehicle defects.

Adams said Operation Motorcide would be in effect from 6:00 p.m. Friday, September 4 through midnight Monday, September 7, 1981.

During the Fourth of July holiday, 73 percent of the fatal accidents occurred between 8:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m.

having a cake walk or bake sale or something on this order can contact Ed or Ronnie.

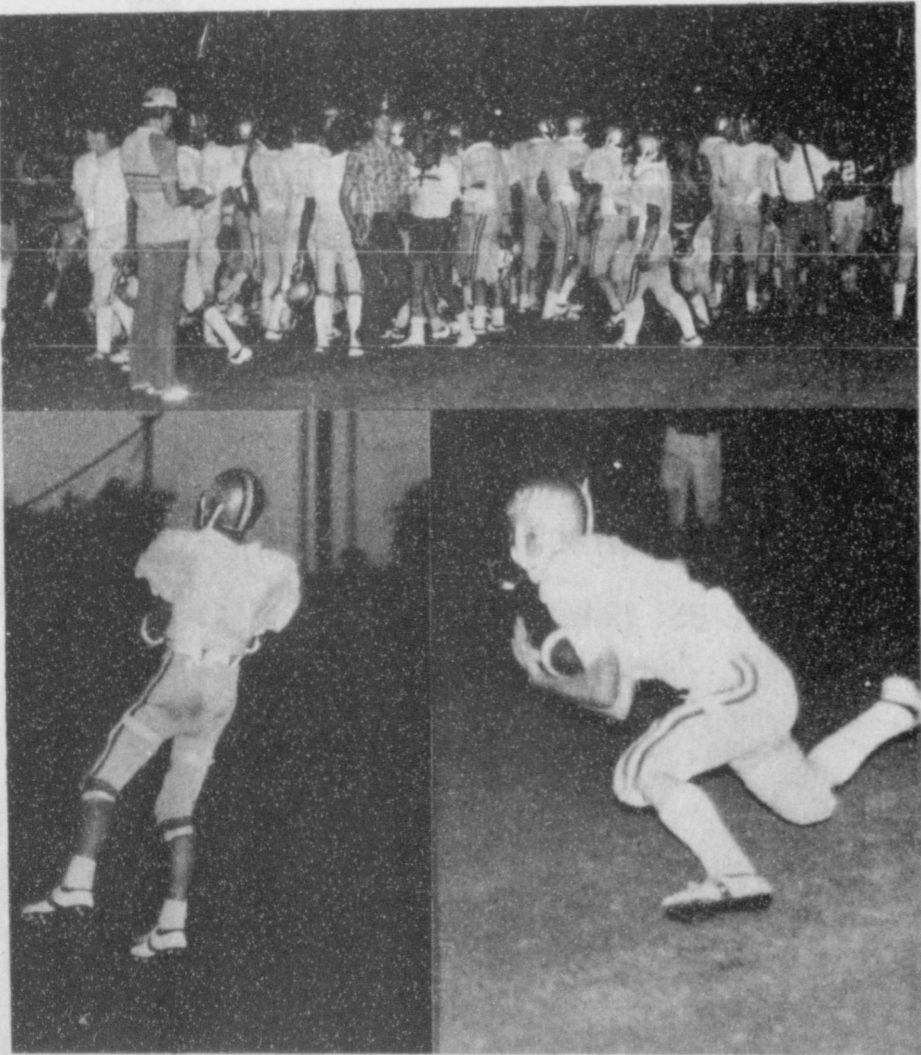

Spearman Story Off To Chicago

Cyclists Leave Under Lynx Colors

State Highways 207 and 15 are becoming "Bicycle Boulevard" these days with Spearman the chief attraction.

Travelers range from foreign young men in search of adventure for a season of the land of the Free to American young men with a Cause that is legitimate and a burden for the world.

Dwight Yackley and Brian Burkross of Lisle, Ill. and Brian Dolatowski, Chicago are forceful examples of the latter.

The trio stopped off in Spearman, Monday night, where Sheriff R.L. McFarlin gave them the hospitality of the dormitory facilities at the courthouse while a host of people ranging from Lynx Coach Jimmy Duncan to Mary Lou Wyson of the Chamber of Commerce, extended to them the warmth of the city that has made it a memorable stopover for travelers on all kinds of wheels.

Yackley, spokesman for the trio, explained they had taken their cycles to California where they began their ride back to Chicago in behalf of an organization called "Save the Children." Though not generally known as to character and purpose in this area, the organization and its program

are both legitimate and effective--and certainly well known in most of the world.

Funds collected by the varied campaigns of the "Save the Children" organization--including such projects as the ride of Monday's visitors--are spent both in the United States and the rest of the world, particularly Africa where, as Yackley noted, children are the chief victims--through a lack of food, clothing, schooling and love--of the rush of African tribes and nations to "emerge."

In the United States, funds are provided for underprivileged children, Indian children, the offspring of poverty-plagued families of Appalachia and in the intercity areas of some of America's metropolitan areas.

Yackley's "pedal-and-sprocket" companion, Burkross, emphasized at this point that even their presence in Spearman was for the primary purpose of raising funds for "Save the Children." He grins a small American station wagon with a special rack on the roof for both the wheels they were riding and spares. He also acted as a safety buffer when necessary in heavy traffic.

The cyclists had spent the previous night at Fritch and



were out to make Liberal, Kans. because there was a bicycle shop there but they encountered one of the unusual aspects of this country: a wind out of the northeast.

The prevailing strong wind against them, they had only reached Spearman on that leg of their journey when "quitting time" came for the day. After they had been "capped" with Lynx headgear and well-supplied with Spearman bumper stickers and other mementos of their stop overnight here, all settled down for a visit.

Those visiting with the young men, Monday night at the courthouse, were agreed that, if they were out to purchase such a set of wheels, they

**PROPOSICION NO. 1
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes."

**PROPOSICION NO. 3
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

**PROPOSICION NO. 2
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.

This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date of the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."
