 closing of Amarillo Air Force Base, it is not a political or military move. The Air Force is just trying to get out of Amarillo before someone steals their airplanes.As we approach the season of good cheer and good will toward men, we are sorry to see the old newcomers vs, oldtimers conflict raise its head. We thought it had died.
However, we have had two or three phone calls and an unsigned letter to the editor from people in the oil and gas inustry who were rather unhappy. It seems someone opposing the school bond issue brought up the baseless old saw that the oil field people brought the excess pupils, but pay no tax-
es. The idea is without foundaparties calling we would try to present some facts, we are going to rehash some figures, The exact figures are available to anyone at the school tax office if you have time to dig Some were presented at the public meeting Monday night. The total tax valuation for the school district this year is $\$ 32$ million dollars. According to the Monday meeting information industry and oil royalty owners pay 68 percent o the tax bill, therefore, the value of their share of the total property that is assessed for taxes would be about $\$ 21.5$ million.
The value of all business, personal and real property on the city tax roll is just over $\$ 5.5$ million. This is 35 per cent of actual value, which makes the actual value of the city property over $\$ 16$ million The school takes 30 percent of actual value for tax value, so this makes valuations within the city approximately $\$ 5$ million, this leaves about $\$ 5$ million outside the city. There are fallacies in this simple figuring, because some of the oil and gas industry is business property outside the business property outside the ity limits
These figures are generalities, but it should be evident o everyone that no one is geting a rree tax ride and everycost of education
Instead of squabbling about who is paying the cost of education, we should be thankful we live in a district where there is money enough to have decent facilities, good teachers and adequate teaching materials.
Just go down into some of the areas where the total valuation of the district is two or three million, and look at the kind of education those children are getting. Then, come home and be thankful.
