Tractorcade Leaving Here

Planning and preparation is moving into high gear this week for Hansford County's participation in the American Agriculture Movement's National Tractorcade to Washington, D. C. Points of origin are located all across the central part of the nation, on the major east-west Interstate highways, with the assembly point for this area being Amarillo, from which the caravan of tractors and support vehicles will depart Monday morning Jan. 15. The travel time is estimated to be 16 days, with two Sundays set aside for rest and renewal.

At present, there are six tractors committed to the Tractorcade from Hansford County, together with support vehicles to service the tractors with fuel, supplies, and repairs, and a camper trailer to provide sleeping accommodations for some of the group, although another one is needed, according to planners. It is estimated that the cost for each tractor making the historic trip will be \$2,000.

A local AAM "activist," in a statement to this newspaper, said, "Everyone in a farming community is well aware that

agricultural prices have been disastrously low in recent years, and that this has worked a hardship on farmers, on businessmen who sell to farmers, and on the entire economy, since agriculture is by far the largest consumer of goods and services in the nation."

"The American Agriculture Movement came into existence a year ago in response to the grave problems this situation poses, and was successful in obtaining some relief in some areas—for example, a higher target price for wheat—already largely wiped out by the 10% inflation rate—easing of credit, and an expanded Federal crop insurance program. I would point out, that prices are still well below cost of production in most sectors of agriculture, so the battle will continue until a farmer can be in a solid enough financial position that he can support his family, finance his own operation out of earnings, instead of constant and increasing borrowing, and absorb the risks inherent in his business without the need for Federal disaster or insurance programs."

"To this end, the Tractorcade will proceed to Washington, D. C. in a determined effort to convince the National Legislature that the problem still exists and requires firm action, and to point out that the present farm law provides for setting loan levels for storable commodities at 90% of parity, which will have the stop-gap effect of raising both the floor and the ceiling prices of these commodities, while long-term legislation is developed to deal with the chronic "boom-bust" nature of agriculture."

He continued, "The supporters of AAM who have been able and willing to travel and work for agriculture through this movement are mindful that many local businessmen and other people have backed these efforts with their money, and we are very appreciative of this help. We are continuing to ask for such help only because we ourselves are determined to continue to "put our money where our mouth is," so to speak. It is certain that anything that is accomplished for agriculture will benefit virtually everyone in this area. We are also asking people to assist in any other way they can, whether to provide a tractor (a driver will be found), or to drive a tractor (a tractor will be found); to come to where the tractorcade is anytime after the trip commences in order to give part-time relief to tractor or vehicle drivers; or to help provide many of the small items needed—check with the AAM Office.

As for financial help, special AAM Tractorcade accounts have been set up at the local banks in Spearman and Gruver, and anyone wishing to can deposit directly into these accounts any time prior to or during the Tractorcade—or they can bring it to the local AAM OFFICES.

Likewise, anyone who can come to Washington after the Tractorcade arrives there, to help carry the word to Congress and the Administration, is urged to make this known to your local AAM office—as soon as possible."

This newspaper will carry additional reports as the Tractorcade progresses.

Coming Home!

David McClellan, M. D., will soon be coming home! In fact the Hansford County native is currently assisting at the Hansford Clinic while waiting to return to his current duties as Medical Director of Student Services at South Western State University at San Marcos, Texas.

The Hansford Plainsman was advised that Dr. McClellan will apparently return to Hansford County on a full time professional basis next August, and will reportedly take up his medical practice at the former Hackley Clinic building. This facility was recently purchased by the Hansford hospital District Board of Trustees and reportedly it will be renovated to accommodate Dr. McClellan's coming to Spearman.

Dr. McClellan, 30, received his M.D. degree four years ago from the University of Texas and completed a three year

residency at Memorial Hospital in Houston, Texas before going to his current assignment in San Marcos.

The Hansford Hospital District Board of Trustees held an Emergency meeting last Tuesday to take action reportedly on Dr. McClellan's availability as a physician, and also apparently to take Executive Session action on the possibility of renovating the Hackley Clinic.

That meeting originally had been posted as to be Friday January 5th at 7 P.M., but reportedly there was a typographical error and the meeting was held Tuesday, January 2nd.

The Hansford Plainsman congratulates the Hospital District Board of Trustees on their affirmative action in securing the services of such a qualified physician as Dr. McClellan and welcomes David and Ginger back to this community.

Passmore and Wilson repeat vows Dec. 30





SMOKE DETECTORS

The most important step in cutting fire deaths has been the installation of automatic smoke detectors in homes. Experts are unanimous in praising the devices as an inexpensive, effective way of saving lives. If you're awake, your nose is as good as an automatic detector. But the problem is that so many people don't wake up until it's too late. We've had actual cases of people who finally woke up, detected the fire, sat up in bed and died right there. They just had no time left to react.

The owner of an older home can purchase a reliable, UL-labeled detector for \$30 to \$75 from a hardware store. The detector should be fastened about 6 to 12 inches below the ceiling on a corridor wall just outside the bedroom area. More detectors will be needed if bedrooms are located at opposite ends of the home.

Of course, an early warning does no good if the family doesn't know what to do when the alarm goes off. Fire drills are essential, especially for children. Make sure to find a safe exit.
