Tractorcade Leaving Here

Planning and preparation is moving into high gear this week for Hansford County's participation in the American Agriculture Movement's National Tractorcade to Washington, D. C. Points of origin are located all across the central part of the nation, on the major east-west Interstate highways, with the assembly point for this area being Amarillo, from which the caravan of tractors and support vehicles will depart Monday morning Jan. 15. The travel time is estimated to be 16 days, with two Sundays set aside for rest and renewal.

At present, there are six tractors committed to the Tractorcade from Hansford County, together with support vehicles to service the tractors with fuel, supplies, and repairs, and a camper trailer to provide sleeping accomodations for some of the group, although another one is needed, according to planners. It is estimated that the cost for each tractor making the historic trip will be \$2,000.




