Included on the afternoon program will be testimonies by the Building Committee including Mr. and Mrs. Gene Fletcher, Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Rasor, Mr. and Mrs. Dorsey Schad, Mr. and Mrs. Les Barkley, Mr. and Mrs. Mack Bevell and the Reverend John Denton.

Special music will be offered at the Service by Mr. and Mrs. Ben Harris, Les Barkley, and Rachel Painter.

Following the inspirational program will be an Open House with members of the Building Committee serving as hosts and hostesses for the occasion.

Included in the facilities in the new Activities Building which is joined to the original building by a covered port are seven upstairs classrooms. On the main floor are two restrooms which are complete with showers for use of overnight youth groups and guests of the Church. A spacious and well arranged modern kitchen is a highlight of the Building.

The large, spacious Fellowship Hall and Recreation Room is located at the east end of the building which also includes a smaller group room which features a fireplace.

Extensive remodeling has been completed throughout the Church unit. Many classrooms have been paneled and some walls textured. The entire Church has been carpeted adding to the inspirational atmosphere of the area. Also included in the remodeling have been the addition of five restrooms; dignified commodious study for the Pastor; and a bright roomy office area for the Church Secretary.

A much needed library with adequate shelves for all age literature and teaching material is located in the remodeled section. Three nurseries for various ages with bright youth-inspired interior decor have been situated in new locations.

Also a feature of the remodeling has been the ad-

dition of a parlor area with blue flocked floral design wall paper and a lighted-mirror dressing area for use of wedding parties and other special guests.

A cordial invitation and welcome have been extended to all area residents and friends of the Gruver First Baptist Church to participate in the joyful occasion of this, the Dedication Service, at 2:30 P.M., Sunday, April 4th.

# Gruver Artist Gives Demonstration

Artist's Studio Northwest saw Doris Marie Meyer, guest artist of Gruver, demonstrate eggery techniques during Monday night's meeting held in Guymon Junior High School Library.

Mrs. Meyer gave a brief history of how Eggery began in 1722 in China. Later the Jews used eggs on seder plates as part of the Passover. Finally our present day custom of giving decorated eggs at Easter time. She told how different countries had contributed to eggery. The beautiful eggs she displayed were inspired by the Russian Faberge', who decorated his eggs with real jewels. She stressed that neatness was a determining factor in the finished work of art. Goose eggs are the easiest for beginners to work with, because of size and toughness of the shell. She demonstrated how to mark the egg, drilling holes in each end, blowing and cleaning the inside, sawing the egg in various shapes. Her finished eggs were truly works of art. One contained a Christmas tree with lights which can be turned on and off, the sides were divided into three equal parts and would open and close with miniature images of the three wise men, the shepherds and the manger scene. Mrs. Meyer wore a tiny quail egg necklace she had decorated with tiny pearls with the dove of peace inside.

Jo Dunham, president, announced that the watercolor picture which was donated to the club by Richard Harris of Hugoton will be on display at On West, a western store, in Guymon. Tickets will be given for \$1.00 donations by any member of the Artist's Studio Northwest. If donations have been received in the amount of \$200 which is the value of the picture by Pioneer Day the picture will be given away during the Pioneer Daze Arts and Crafts Show and Sale.

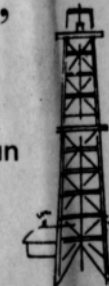

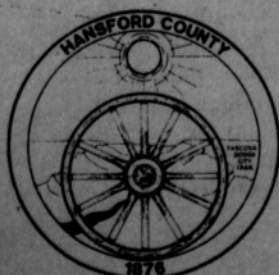

In Spearman, Mrs. Garland Head, Mrs. Alva Garner, and Mrs. Joel Lee Lackey are the cooperating chairman for the Crusade and in Morse, Mrs. D. M. Womble and Mrs. Lynn Davis are co-chairmen for the Morse area.

## Cancer Treatment Advances Reported

Several new anti-cancer drugs, often used with vaccine-like substances designed to help the body fight its disease, are providing improved results in controlling cancer, a Houston physician told a U. S. Senate subcommittee this week.

Dr. Jordan U. Gutteman of The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute reviewed recent progress in cancer therapy for the Senate Subcommittee on Labor-HW Appropriations last Tuesday (3-16-76). During his testimony, Dr. Gutteman outlined treatment advances for cancers of the breast, bone, colon, lung and rectum, leukemia and melanoma, among others.

Use of chemotherapy, or anti-cancer drugs, and immunotherapy is providing among the most significant progress in treating cancer in recent years, he said.

Although he observed that much of this work "is too new to talk about in terms of long-term remissions and possible cures," Dr. Gutteman expects the results "to get even better with time and more patients."

Based on reports from many cancer centers, including M. D. Anderson, he reviewed progress in controlling several types of cancer with drugs and immunological agents.

Some cancer centers, for example, are achieving remission rates of up to 70 percent for breast cancer patients with the use of Adriamycin, and anti-cancer drug introduced about two years ago, Dr. Gutteman said.

By administering a three-drug combination, the remission rate for one group of breast cancer patients at M. D. Anderson has reached 75 percent, he said.

Another cancer drug, 5-Fluorouracil, combined with an immunotherapy agent known as BCG has shown initial excellent results among a small group of colon and rectal cancer patients at M. D. Anderson. Some 22 months after treatment began, 84 percent of these patients still show no sign of the cancer reappearing, Dr. Gutteman said.

He also revealed that reports from several cancer centers have indicated a "two-fold improvement in the disease-free interval and survival" of persons with malignant melanoma following treatment with BCG.

While Dr. Gutteman, an Anderson associate professor of medicine, explained several advances in the use of drugs or immunotherapy alone, he said that the largest increases in remissions and long-term survival probably will come when both types of treatment are used together.

Dr. Gutteman was the only U. S. cancer specialist to testify before the subcommittee regarding appropriations for the National Cancer Institute, which supports much of the cancer research under way in the United States today.

In order to apply irrigation water efficiently, the needs of the crop being grown and the type of soil being irrigated have to be taken into consideration. Grain sown in boot stage through soft dough stage will need about 3/10 of an inch of moisture per day for maximum production. Different soils have different water intake rates. Some soils soak up irrigation water too rapidly, and as a result, plants near the end of the furrow are not irrigated as well as those at the beginning of the furrow. A well designed irrigation system will better distribute the water to the crop and eliminate water loss and expensive pumping costs.

The 1975 communicable disease morbidity figures released this week indicate that gonorrhea is again the Panhandles' #1 communicable disease; 1287 cases were reported. Only 6 of the 25 Panhandle counties had no report of gonorrhea. The other major venereal disease, syphilis, is ranked as the third communicable disease in Public Health Region 1 (Panhandle). Infectious hepatitis ranked as second, with 71 cases being reported, and Tuberculosis was fourth. Other reported diseases, by rank, are serum hepatitis, rubella (German measles), mumps, meningococcal infections, and brucellosis.

State Public Health Laws require that many communicable diseases treated by located physicians be reported to the Texas Department of Health Resources. Since many physicians fail to comply with these laws, the morbidity reports are generally considered to be a "conservative estimate" of the true disease situation in most counties. This is especially true of such diseases as gonorrhea and syphilis.

# Lion Biggers On Re-Districting

**EDITORS NOTE: LION CECIL BIGGERS, a member of the Spearman Lion Club presented this information to the club in a recent meeting. We at the newspaper join in thanking the Lions Club, and Mr. Biggers for the story on re-districting in Hansford County.**

### LIONS COMMENT ON REDISTRICTING

Lion Cecil Biggers

It is not the purpose of this article to belittle any person or group of persons in our community. The purpose of this article is to inform our citizens that we do have a problem regarding the redistricting of our county.

The laws governing the actions of our city and county governments are among the most complex that we have. Add to those laws the almost incomprehensible Texas Election Code, and you have the stuff of which law suits are made.

For example, assuming that we are all county commissioners, how would we go about redistricting an election precinct? First, we would call in our County Attorney and ask him to meet with us to determine the proper procedure to redistrict our election precinct. Next, we would assure ourselves that all the actions taken by our Commissioners Court were correctly reflected by the Minutes of the Commissioners Court. This is important as we, as commissioners, have authority to order things done only if these things

appear correctly in the Minutes. We would next assure ourselves that we had taken the proper action to redistrict an election precinct in the Month of July or August, as those are the only two months in which we may redistrict election precincts. Immediately after making our redistricting order through our Minutes, we would publish notice of this order in a newspaper of the county for three consecutive weeks. We would recognize that had we inadvertently formed an election precinct from two or more congressional districts, or from two or more justice precincts, or from two or more commissioners precincts, that we could correct these errors only during the month of September. If we merely had an error in our Minutes of the Commissioners Court we would correct those errors at our next term, monthly meeting, and if we did not catch the error then, we could correct the error with an order "nunc pro tunc" if the error were one of omission of an action actually taken or a typographical/clerical error.

We would also insure that a copy of the description of the new precincts in the form of a map would be forwarded to the Secretary of State's office within four months of the order of our Commissioners Court. Perhaps, then, we would be in compliance with the law.

There are two other types of precincts in Texas, namely the justice precincts and the commissioners' precincts. Each of these precincts is a separate entity from the other; yet, since the law governing each type of precinct

interacts, it is almost impossible to change one without changing the other. Also, any deviation from the statutory procedure for the changing of these precincts renders the change void (of no effect) or voidable (of no effect if properly challenged). Thus, the law governing our local governments is assuredly, complex.

It is just such a complex problem that has been the subject of a lawsuit here in Hansford County. Acting under the Court order of the Honorable Max Boyer who was until his retirement, Judge of the 84th Judicial District, our Commissioners' Court re-districted Hansford County to bring our county within the Constitutional and legal guidelines of "one man, one vote". This redistricting action was indirectly challenged when Mrs. Ruth Gumfory of Gruver, Texas filed for an injunction against Dan Desimone and L. M. Womble enjoining them from having their names placed upon the ballot as candidates for County Commissioner in Precinct #3. As a basis for the injunction, Mrs. Gumfory contended that Dan Desimone and L. M. Womble were not residents of Precinct #3 (Commissioners). The crux or main questions raised in this suit were as follows:

1. Was the redistricting of the Commissioners' Precincts accomplished in the proper statutory manner?

2. Was the redistricting of the Election Precincts accomplished in the proper statutory manner?

Although the actual order of the Court has not been filed as of this writing, the court will deny the

granting of the injunction. The decision of the Court is probably based upon the premise that to issue the injunction and thereby answer the two questions above in the negative would void the action of the Commissioners' Court in redistricting, thereby, resurrecting the prior precincts which were declared unlawful. Thus, to hold an election under the old precinct system would contravene the rights guaranteed by the 14th Amendment of the United States Constitution to the majority of voters in Precincts #1 and #3 in Hansford County, Texas. Therefore, the injunction will be denied and the election, in all probability, will be held as the time limits for the perfection of an appeal from the Court's ruling fast draws to a close.

Does this mean that our Commissioners' Precincts and our Election Precincts are valid? Does this mean that our County will not have to redistrict again? The answer to both these questions is not necessarily. There is little doubt that there were errors made in redistricting our County which render such redistricting void or voidable upon the suit of any citizen whose rights have been prejudiced by such redistricting. However, there is a provision in our law which provides a presumption of validity to actions by a governmental body such as our County Commissioners, if the redistricting action goes unchallenged, then it is presumed valid.

Thus, there exists a problem in regard to the redistricting of Hansford County. Only the definitive action of an appellate court or the less likely inaction upon the part of all affected citizens will resolve the problem.

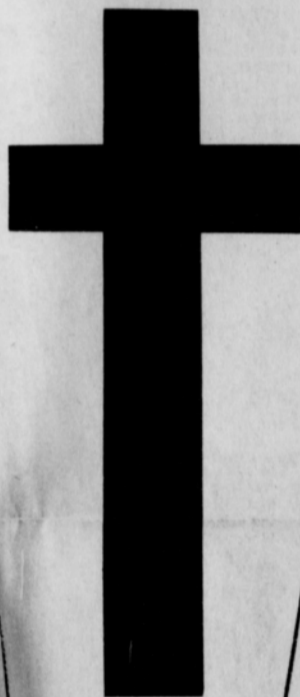

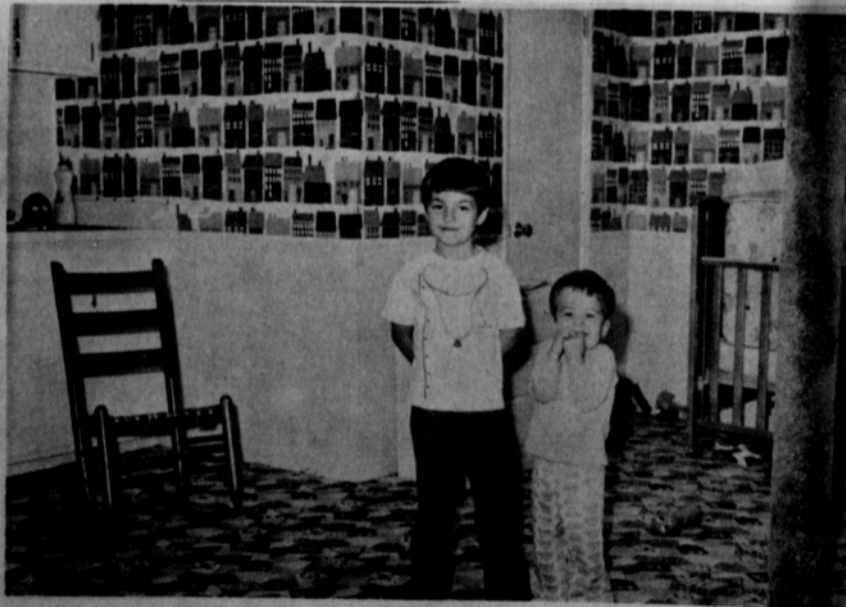

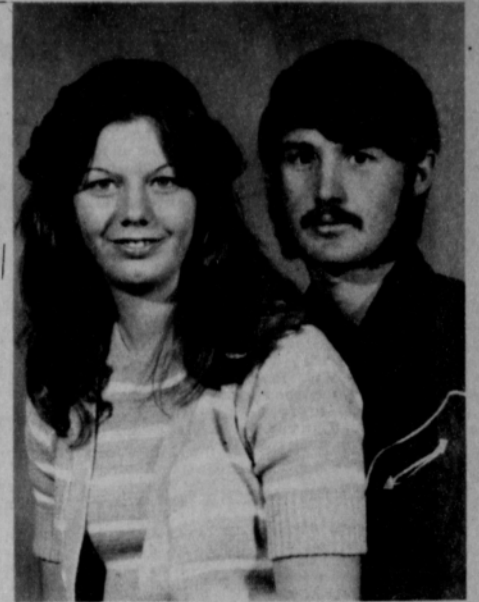

## Defensive Driving Week Proclaimed

AUSTIN, March 31 -- Governor Dolph Briscoe has proclaimed April 4-10, 1976 Defensive Driving Week in Texas and called for personal participation by Texas drivers to help reduce traffic crashes in the State.

He called the loss of more than 3400 Texans in traffic deaths last year, and more than 138,000 personal injuries "an unconscionable burden of suffering and economic loss to the people of Texas."

Governor Briscoe's proclamation called attention to the Defensive Driving Course now available throughout Texas as a means of fostering positive driving attitudes to cut traffic crashes. The eight-hour National Safety Council training course is conducted by 600 training agencies in Texas coordinated by the Texas Safety Association.

In 1975, more than 100,000 Texans completed the Defensive Driving Course (DDC).

Calling on Texas drivers to drive defensively, Governor Briscoe said that the number of motor vehicles, drivers and miles traveled continue to increase and that the job of reducing traffic crashes "requires more personal responsibility, individual commitment and consistent practice of defensive driving techniques than ever before."
