Lions Host District Gov. Here Tuesday

Spearman Lions were host Tuesday to James Wheeler the District Governor of District 2-T1 in his annual visit to the club.

Wheeler, a member of the Pleasant Valley Lions Club in Amarillo, spoke to the club about Lionism.

He said the Spearman club has compiled a good record in its 36 year history. However, he pointed out that a club cannot look back or go back, but must plan and work for today and the future.

The Governor said there is no U in Lions, but there is an I and each Lion must not consider what U can do to build his club and community, but consider what I can do.

In discussing current projects, Wheeler said the Lions sponsored High Plains Eye Bank was growing and had received four eyes to be used for cornea transplants recently. The eyes went to a little girl, two teenage boys and a man. Two of those receiving transplants now have two good eyes.

In the near future the Spearman and Perryton Lions Club will have a joint Ladies Night meeting in Spearman.

TEC Opening Labor Employment Office

A Texas Employment Commission office is being opened in Spearman, according to an announcement made today by Charles J. Warner, manager of the Borger TEC office.

The office will be primarily concerned with supplying farm labor for the Spearman area. It will also serve as a labor center for all other employment needs of the area.

This new office will be managed by Richard Curtis and it will be located on the second floor of the County Courthouse, according to Warner.

This office will be established as a sub-office of the Borger office to give better service to the Spearman area. Warner explained that an increase in irrigation farming in the Spearman area and the loss of the bracero farm labor program makes the labor needs of the area greater.

Farmers and other employers of the area can use the office as a convenient point for seeking needed workers and also give persons seeking employment a place to seek work.

Warner said a labor supply cannot be built overnight, but if all farmers and others seeking employees will make their needs known to the office, it will be possible to get the needed workers into the area.

Warner also urged persons seeking work to leave their applications at the local office as soon as possible.

J. Crawford Has Surgery

Johnny Crawford underwent knee surgery at St. Anthony's hospital in Oklahoma City on Christmas Day.

The operation was for the repair of a damaged leader in his knee.

Crawford was the starting quarterback for the Lynx football team this year and received honorable mention on the All-State AA team. He has received some college scholarship offers.

Bank Burglars Are Sentenced

Four of the five men convicted of the burglary of the Gruver State Bank early this year were sentenced last week in Federal Court in Amarillo.

The fifth convicted man is free on bond and will be sentenced Jan. 5, in Federal Court.

Tommy Lee Knott was sentenced to 15 years. Knott was apprehended and charged with another bank burglary in Illinois after breaking into the Gruver Bank.

Lexie Knott received four years, Harold Brewer and Larry Taylor each received three years. Donnie Bradford is out on bond and will be sentenced Jan. 5.

The men were convicted of breaking into the Gruver bank and trying to cut a hole in the door of the vault. They worked on the door several hours before being scared away early on a Sunday morning.

All the money they took from the bank was a few dollars in mutilated coins from a drawer in the bank.

Thieves also hit a parked pick-up and took about \$400 in tools. Sheriff Cooke said the pick-up was owned by a Mr. Thompson. He left the pick-up and when he went back the tools were gone.

County Irrigation Sets New Record

A late rush in irrigation well permit requests by Hansford County farmers has made 1964 the largest irrigation year in the history of the county.

The county set a new record for number of wells completed and also for the number of applications. The 170 wells completed this year surpasses the 164 drilled in the county last year and there are still 58 permits applied for this year that have not been completed.

This big rush this year, coupled with the boom of 1963 gives Hansford County a total of 695 wells when all the pending permits are completed.

North Plains Water District office secretary Dallasene Reynolds reports a rush in well applications during the past two weeks.

She attributes this increased activity to farmers having their milo crops harvested and now having time to plan more irrigation wells and systems.

A milo crop which averaged approximately 6,000 pounds per acre this year and produced a \$7 million income for the county after three years of dry-land wheat and maize failures has greatly increased the popularity of irrigation.

GRAIN SORGHUM IN RATION

This is the second part of this series. Steam heating ground milo in a trial at the Oklahoma station resulted in lowered feed intake and reduced daily gains of calves self-fed rations containing 55 per cent of the treated grain. Average daily feed intake for calves receiving steam heated milo was 15.33 pounds compared with 16.84 pounds for those receiving normal ground milo. Average daily gains were 2.27 pounds and 2.51 pounds for the steam heated and normal ground milo groups, respectively.

Just why the results of the California and Arizona trials have varied so widely is not clear. It may be speculated, however, that wide differences may exist between varieties of grain sorghums as well as differences in the same variety grown in different soils and locations.

This may be confirmed from results of a survey made by the Kansas Experiment Station. An extensive 2-year study was made of the protein variation of some 20 varieties of grain sorghum grown in several locations of the state and under varied fertilization

programs and cropping systems. Wide variations and protein content were found in both 1961 and 1962. The highest 1961 protein level found was 12.8 per cent; lowest 6.6 per cent—difference of 6.2 per cent. A similar wide protein level variation was found from the study of environmental and location effect.

In 1962 similar results were obtained between varieties and location on the protein level of grain sorghums. The effect of fertilization resulted in an increase in both protein content and yield. It was observed that samples with relatively high protein levels in 1961 also tended to have high levels in the 1962 crop.

It seems quite evident from trials and observations made that there is a wide difference between varieties of grain sorghum which may make it desirable, if not necessary, to analyze each lot of milo before including it in a ration in order to properly balance the ration. This is very difficult but could be quite important. For example, if grain made up 60 per cent of a complete ration and contained 6 per cent protein instead of 11 per cent the final formula would be approximately 3 per cent deficient in protein.

Seventy Sorghums Are Tested

Seventy grain sorghum hybrids were tested and compared in the research program at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1964. The tests were under the supervision of Barry Love, Associate Agronomist.

Thirty four of these hybrids were of equal value in yielding ability. Yields among these 34 hybrids ranged from 7,165.4 to 6,286.6 pounds per acre. These 34 hybrids are the largest number to be listed as of equal value in any year since research began at the Foundation. This shows an increase in the number of grain sorghum varieties found to be acceptable for high and profitable yield in West Texas.

Testing of grain sorghum for the various commercial seed companies started in 1960 with 52 hybrids and varieties. The test has grown to seventy in 1964.

The information on the seventy entries in the hybrid grain sorghum tests and the 2, 3, 4, and 5 year average yields will be included in the 1964 research report now being prepared for the supporters of the Foundation. The chemical composition of the grain will also be reported for each hybrid.

There were eight hybrids that had a four-year yield average of above 7,000 pounds per acre. Four hybrids also averaged above 7,000 pounds per acre in the five-year yield record at Halfway.

Tax Return To Be Mailed

District Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell, Jr., said today that employers in the Dallas District will receive through the mail on or about December 31, pre-addressed Forms 941, "Employers Quarterly Federal Tax Return" for use in reporting income taxes withheld and social security taxes for the calendar quarter ending December 31, 1964.

District Director Campbell pointed out that the use of these pre-addressed forms, which also carry the correct employer identification number, will insure the prompt and proper credit to taxpayer accounts when these quarterly returns are processed through the ADP systems at the regional service center.

Mr. Campbell said that blank forms are available in the District and local offices for new filers and urged that those employers who have been assigned identification numbers make sure the number entered on the tax form is correct.

Employers without identification numbers should attach application Form SS-4 to the return for a number when filing. Mr. Campbell said.

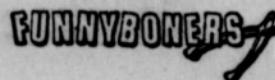
