# **Bond Election Called** Saturday, December 19

The election of the proposed \$250,000 school bond issue for improvements in the Spearman School facilities was officially

called for Saturday, Dec. 19.
A petition signed by more than the required number of qualified voters was presented to the school board in a spec-ial meeting Monday night. The petition fulfilled the legrequirements for the bond issue which was decided upon last week,

The bond issue is for generimprovements throughout the school and athletic plants. Work to be done with the money includes repairs and im-

provements to the junior high school building, the parking areas at the school, and the bus loading area between the junior high and elementary school buildings,

At the high school the parking areas originally planned when the building was built, will be paved, the lawn in front of the building landscapand a watering system installed and tennis courts erected on the parking area east of the school.

Christmas is observed around the world in so many different ways. It seems the traditions you observed as a child always remain your best loved ones, so even the ones that seem the oddest to us, are someone's favorites.

For instance, in Armenia, boiled spinach is eaten because it is believed that Mary did so the night before her Son was born. In Holland, small gifts are hidden in puddings and sausages. In Scandinavian nations, a large rice pudding containing a single almond is prepared in the belief that the person receiving the portion with the almond will be married before the following Christmas. In Poland, wafers are exchanged between friends instead of gifts, and hay is spread under the Christmas dinner tablecloth. In Ireland, it is believed that the gates of Heaven are flung open on Christmas Eve, admitting all deceased with no questions asked. Though it has been celebrated around the world in many ways that astonish us, a similar thread of religious observances makes Christmas our most cheristed holiday.

3 cups sugar 3 cups flour 1 cup Crisco

1/4 tsp. soda 1/2 tsp. salt 2 tsp. lemon extract





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

# ld Farwell andmark announced

Old Farwell a historic landlark in Hansford County will by have an Official Texas istorical Marker relating its story. The marker has been pproved by the Texas State istorical Survey Committee, ccording to John Ben Sheppard f Odessa, president. Scheduled for erection two

Scheduled for erection two niles southeast of Gruver, Texas on FM289, the marker ssponsored by Hansford County, It measures 18 by 28 inches and is made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect. The Official Medallion of Texas appears at the top with the inteription below.

The inscription recounts that old Farwell was established in 1886 about 1/2 mile northeast of this site. It was intended to be the county seat of Hansford County, which was created in 1876 and organized in 1889, but lost the election to the town of Hansford which served until 1928 but is also now non-existent. It was named for an early surveyor, John V. Farwell, and members of his family, Chicago department store executives who operated the XIT Ranch in this and 9 other counties. The stones here are from the casing of a 200 foot well dug by hand to supply water to the town.


The erection of Official Texas Historical Markers is part of the five-year program of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee to record, appreciate, mark, preserve and survey history in Texas (RAMPS). These markers are designed to interpret the history of an area or site, and are sponsored by the state or through counties, cities, civic clubs, local groups or individuals.

Through the RAMPS program, 5000 of these markers are to be placed in the next five years in this joint state and local program. These markers will include archeological finds, old trails, Indian activities, Texas Ranger deeds, cattle baronies, river crossings, early railroads and industry, schools, businesses, birthplaces or homes of outstanding Texans, and the origin of the name and history of each town and stream in the state, with particular emphasis on oddly-named sites and ghost towns.

This Farwell marker is cheduled to appear with other Official Texas Historical Markers in tourist guides and maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide highpoints on historical tours, and to acquaint the citizens of the county with their unique historical past.

leave quite a few cows unbred "Second, never feed a bull up too well just before the breeding season; the quicker he poops out thefewer calves you will have."

"Third, never rotate bulls--give a bull a rest and he's liable to recharge his battery and breed

more cows.

"Fourth, buy bulls just any old place. They're most apt to be carrying one of the venereal diseases that produce lots of dry cows. And better yet, the feilow that produces them probably doesn't have any production records on them; so if the rancher is unlucky enough to get some calves, they'll be poor gainers.

'Fifth, use bulls with low quality semen. It's been proven that these bulls produce very few calves, if any

"These simple rules in man-aging bulls will put a real crimp in your bank account. crimp in your bank account. But, there are a few more tricks to this trade of going broke.
The cow end must be concentrated on too.

"If a rancher is having a low calf crop, he'll be happier if he doesn't find out what is causing it. So first, he shouldn't preg-nancy test; he might find out part of his trouble.

"Secondly, sell the best heif-

er calves at weaning time. What's left over will give some of the money-losing type of replacements needed.
"Thirdly, don't feed replace-

ment heifers very well. That way they won't breed 'til late the year, if at all; and that to cut down on produc-

"There are, no doubt, many more ways of going broke than I have outlined, and maybe some ways have not been dis-covered as yet. But, there are cattlemen, particularly those no longer in business, who will testify that these points are cer-
