If any one had any doubts about why the Spearman High School Choir and its satellite groups were the Sweepstakes winners in the Tri-State Festival, they learned at the concert Tuesday night.

If there was ever a group that capped off a great school year, the choir students did it with the stirring and thrillingly beautiful numbers they presented to about 500 people in the audience.

From the opening notes of "Last Words of David" to the powerful finish on the traditional "Battle Hymn of the Republic," it was a smashing success.

The traditional close for choir concerts "Battle Hymn" brought a demand from the audience for more and when the choir finished the encore, the audience was on its feet with a standing ovation.

There was nothing weak, or highschoolish about the concert. The group sang with power, beauty and training. It was a tribute to the work of the director and the students this year.

There are very few times that we have unkind words to say about students or the school, but even as great as the concert was, it was almost ruined by a bunch of unrestrained fifth and sixth graders.

This choir group sang first and came out into the audience to sit in a group. By the end of the concert they were making so much noise talking and parading up and down the aisles that it was very distracting for the adults trying to listen to the beautiful work being done by the high school choir.

We hope the next time a group of children are put in an audience like that, either the parents or the school officials will see that the children mind their manners.

And, while we are on the subject of children's manners, we think that if some parents would just go to the movie sometimes and watch their children, when the children do not know they are there, the parents might be a little embarrassed.

Drowning Victim Found After 10 Day Lake Search

Funeral services for Marvin L. Shapley of Gruver will be conducted at 3 p.m. today (Thursday) in the First Metho-

dist Church of Gruver. Services for the drowning victim will be conducted by the Rev. Norman Grigsby, pastor, and a former pastor, the Rev. R.L. Kirk, Jr., pastor of the Seminole Methodist Church.

Mr. Shapley's body was recovered from Lake Meredith about 7:30 a.m. Wednesday, May 18, ending a search that began late Sunday evening, May 8.

Paul Gumfory of Gruver spotted Mr. Shapley's body while flying a search pattern of the lake and Park Rangers recovered the body about one and one-half miles from where Mr. Shapley was knocked from his boat on May 8.

Mr. Shapley was in a 14-foot motorboat when the engine stopped. He walked to the back of the boat to try and start the engine. As he was standing a large wind driven wave hit the boat and he fell (Con't. on page 2.)

There will be no arguments in the Arthur Adkison home about which son in the 1966

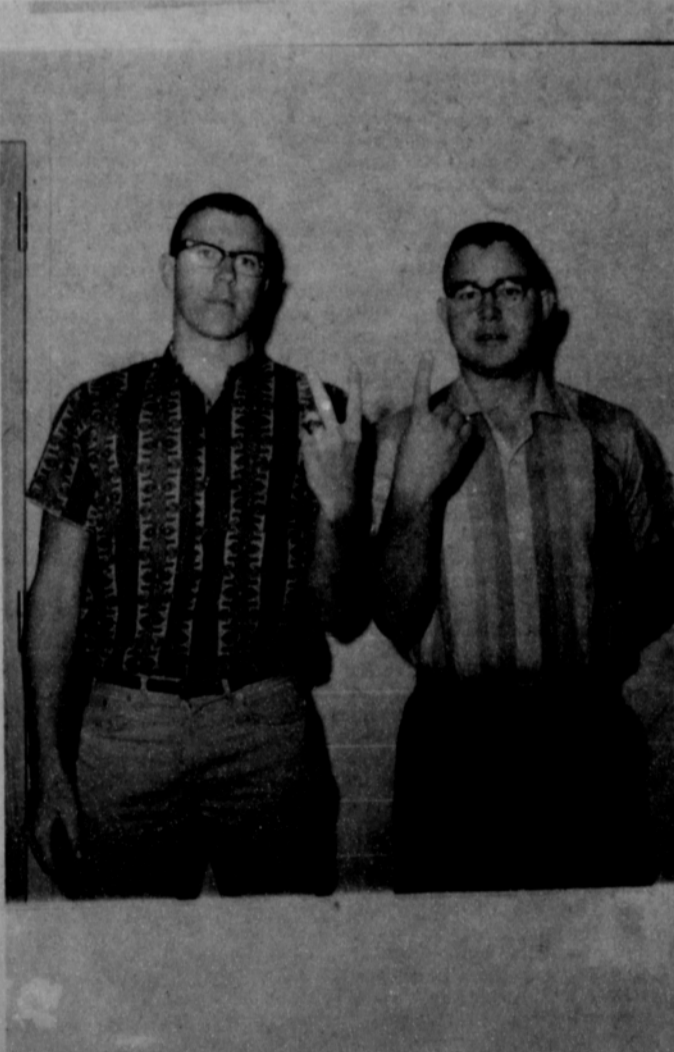
Senior Class in Spearman High School is the most intelligent. Twin sons Harrell and Dar-

COOKLESS WONDERS

Melt one six ounce package each chocolate and butterscotch bits. Remove from heat and stir in 3/4 cup powdered sugar (the new non-lumpy kind is perfect), 1/2 cup sour cream, 2 tablespoons grated orange rind and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Blend in 2 cups vanilla wafer crumbs. Chill until firm and shape by spoonfuls into balls. Roll in powdered sugar.

overboard.

Witnesses in the boat said he apparently hit his head, for when he came to the surface once, there was blood on his face. The women in the boat tried to throw him a rope and life jackets, but the high winds from the squall that hit the lake blew them away from him.

He was fully dressed and wearing boots when he fell overboard.

It was more than an hour before the women and the stalled boat drifted to shore and notified authorities. The boat was almost swamped.

Mr. Shapley was a native of Hansford County. He was born May 26, 1922, the son of Willard H. and Eula Wallin Shapley.

He was a farmer-stockman. He was a member of the Methodist Church of Gruver, a member of the Gruver City Council, Past-Commander of the Gruver American Legion, a member of the Blue Lodge #1326, Mason Scottish Rite, El Paso Consistory, Khiva Temple.

He served in the Navy in World War II.

Research Foundation Gives Test Results on Weed Control

The most economical castorbean weed control system for careless weeds was found to be a light early application of treflan at planting time followed by late season control by use of flame weeding, at the High Plains Research Foundation in their 1965 test.

The least expensive early weed control was achieved by applying two-tenths pound of treflan per acre in twenty inch bands after seeding. Cost of the treflan was \$0.80 per acre. It achieved 77.9% weed control with the highest yields of the four methods used.

Late season flame weeding took place on August 11th and again on September 3rd. The flame equipment, operator and propane cost was \$2.00

per acre for each application. Treflan application was less expensive than other herbicides used in the test.

Dr. Arthur F. Gohlke, Principal Soil Scientist and Administrative Assistant of the High Plains Research Foundation, conducted the herbicide tests. Dr. Gohlke reported that "castorbeans are much more sensitive to propazine and atrazine than cotton. Castorbeans should therefore not be planted in fields where these two herbicides were used the previous season."

The complete research report on this combined test will be found in report no. 189 in the Foundation's 1965 Annual Research Report.

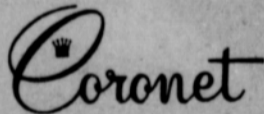

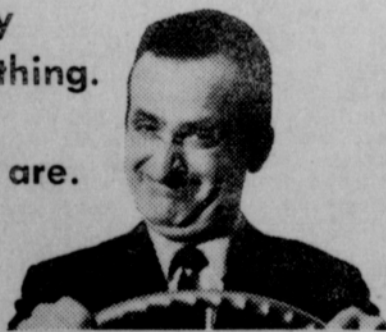

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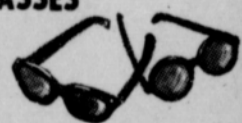

The Office of Water Resources Research in Washington, D.C., will provide \$15,487 for two studies to be conducted through the Texas A&M University Water Resources Institute.

Smerdon, Institute director, said that although the two projects involve research in different areas, information provided will be "vitally important to Texas as it moves toward a more complete development of its water resources." "These projects are part of the annual allotment program of the Water Resources Institute and will receive additional funding from OWRR in the next fiscal year," Smerdon explained.

isms of evaporation from soils in semi-arid climates. The research will be supervised by Dr. Charles Wendt, soil physicist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center near Lubbock. Runkles said 40 percent of the average annual water income

for Texas is lost by evaporation.

If 1 percent of this loss could be prevented, enough water would be saved to supply 26 cities the size of Lubbock or to irrigate the South Plains cotton crops for one and a half years," he emphasized.

The other project, directed by Dr. R.J. Baldauf of the A&M Wildlife Science Department will study influence of water development projects on the ecology or environment of a river system.

Baldauf will conduct the research on the lower Trinity River, the upper Trinity Bay, and the nearby delta and marsh areas. Data will be observed in relation to water quality and populations of animals living in the water, such as fish and shrimp. Ways in which upstream reservoir development affects fish populations and other water life will be determined.

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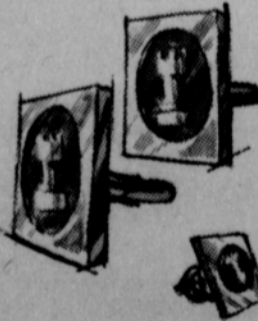
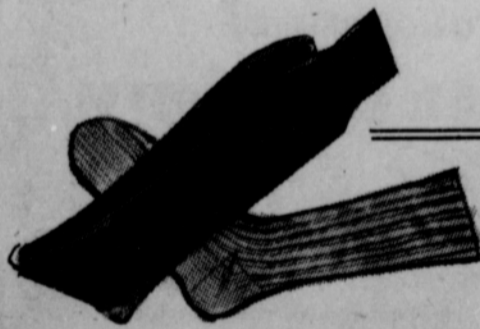

Homemaking Notes

The week of May 1-7, I was privileged to attend the Southwestern Recreation Leaders Laboratory near Glorieta, New Mexico. It was a wonderful week and I have been real anxious to report on it.

The laboratory is held annually for adult leaders working in recreation with adults and youth. The emphasis is placed on recreational leadership development and training.

All phases of recreation are included during the week, including training in leading games, songs, folk games, ceremonials, crafts, hobbies, and party planning. It is an excellent opportunity for adults to learn and to share ideas with other recreation leaders from over the Southwest.

If anyone is interested in more information on the Recreation Lab, I will be happy to talk to you about it. The 1967 lab will be held May 1-6 at Arrowhead Methodist Assembly, Glorieta, N.M. New lab members are always welcome!

Food costs, along with everything else, are continuing to rise. But, do you realize that our food costs include a lot of extra maid service?

This maid service is included in such food items as quick frozen dinners, cake mixes, frozen fruit and vegetables, and commercially baked bread, rolls, and cookies. While food prices did go up in 1965 and this year, too, incomes generally advanced more rapidly than food costs. In this country, food now takes only 18 percent of our after-tax income, compared with approximately 25 percent required a few years ago. In England, consumers spend 29 percent for food; in Italy, 45 percent; in Japan, 47 percent; in Russia, 53 percent; and in most South American countries 66 percent.

Management Workshop Held at A&M

Consumers cast their votes with their dollars. Therefore, family members who shop can vote a loud "no" to products they find impractical or those with misleading labels.

Dr. Barbara Reagan of Texas Woman's University told Home Management Workshop members at Texas A&M University recently that "consumers need to be well informed however, in order not to be fair game for the old shell game."

Many housewives have stopped "bringing home the bacon" and other food products with skyrocketing prices, the TWU professor of home management and family economics research, emphasized.

Homemakers have posed a virtual embargo on many items which they believe to be priced out of line, Dr. Reagan added.

She said that most economists will agree, however, that consumers do not use a rational approach to buying "all of the time." On the other hand, many consumers do study new products—and their labels—very carefully and thus cannot be considered shallow thinkers.

In her address, "Impact of Economic Environment on the Family," Dr. Reagan emphasized that state and national legislation is showing much concern for the consumer.

"And the President's Consumer Advisory Council and Committee on Consumer Interests are directly concerned with consumer affairs and truth-in-packaging legislation," Dr. Reagan emphasized.

Mrs. Florence W. Low, assistant director for home economics with the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service, is a member of the President's Committee on Consumer Interests, Dr. Reagan reminded the workshopers.

Salvation Army Drive Depends on Volunteers

One third of the funds collected remain in the county and the remainder goes to the state headquarters for the state work.

Probably the Salvation Army has the lowest operating expense of any organization asking for funds to assist the sick and needy.

Only 8.7 percent of the Salvation Army's total budget is spent on administrative cost.

Salvation Army Col. Swires recently retired after 34 years in the work. He was head of all Salvation Army work in Texas. His salary when he retired was \$56 per week, plus living quarters and utilities.

The top salary paid in the organization is \$75 per week.

The Army's entire budget for all its work in Texas last year was \$3 million. It spent almost one third of that on three different storm hit areas over the state.

An Army spokesman said the federal government didn't invent deficit spending. The Salvation Army has been doing it for years.

Some of the services of the Army are a missing persons bureau, a home and hospital for unwed mothers, a camp for underprivileged children, disaster relief, work with parolees from prison, and the many other smaller relief works associated with the Salvation Army.

A large number of the people who dedicate themselves to Salvation Army work are those who have been given a helping hand by the Army.

In its work with men released from prison, the Army has had great success. Less than five percent have returned to prison.

He plans to finish his doctorate in science next year and is going to do research and/or teaching. Mr. Barker thinks that the students of Spearman are some of the finest in the world. He thinks that the program has been progressing at a constant rate which is better than acceleration without reasons or regard to efficiency.
