

Gee is President of the Hansford-Hutchinson County Farmers Union which is host for the meeting scheduled for Monday, Aug. 13 at 8:00 p.m. at the County Barn in Spearman. A barbeque meal is also included in the agenda and any interested area farmers are invited to

Dechant has been at the helm of the 300,000 member National Farmers Union since 1966 and is recognized policy leader both domestically and international-

ly. He is the recent past president of the International Federation of Agricultural Pro-CARE, and a trustee of the American Freedom from Hun-

His address to the District TFU members will center on the ever growing problems faced in international trade and the critical role of grain exports which could again be used as a political tool for bargaining, possibly through embargos rather than price agreements between food exporting coun-tries, Dechant is also expected to discuss the role of farm organizations in the face of hallenge coming from Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland for a national dialogue prior to the enactment of new farm legislation to replace the Agriculture Act of 1977.

Proposition No. 2 is to determine whether the hospital district be authorized and em-

provided by law.

The bonds are to be payable from ad valorem taxes levied, assessed and col-lected on all taxable property in the District subject to hospital district taxation, and issued in one or more installa series, mature serially or other-

wise not more than 40 years. Description of the proposed project includes remodeling of portions of the hospital to provide a new operating room eled and enlarged kitchen, cafeteria and emergency room, and a new 54 bed domiciliary care and convalescent building

The proposed new building will contain 18 single rooms with private baths and 18 double rooms with private bath.

## **USDA Calls For Comments** on 1980 Proposals

WASHINGTON, July 18--John W. Goodwin, associate administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilzation and Conservation Service (ASCS), today ration are to appear in the asked the public to comment by Sept. 18 on proposals for the 1980 corn and sorghum programs and the soybean loan

Although the secretary of agriculture is not required to make most of the program determinations for the three commodities before Nov. 15, he has set the Sept. 20 comment deadline so that the programs may be announced earlier than the statutory date if he determines it desirable to do so,

Goodwin said. Comments are requrested for the following determinations for

corn and sorghum: -- the amount of the national

program acreages; -- the reduction from the previous year's harvested acreage required to guarantee established (target) price protection on the total 1980 planted acreage; --whether there should be a set-aside requirement and, if so, the extent of the setaside;

-- whether there should be a land diversion program and, if so, the extent of such diversion and the level of payment;

-- if a set-aside or land diversion program is required, whether a limitation should be placed on planted acreage; -- the established (target)

-- the loan and purchase levels for 1980 crops of corn, sorghum and sovbeans; and

-- other related actions such as: Commodity Credit Corporation minimum sales price, com-

#### Solar Grain Drying

The Agricultural stabilization and conservation service ASCS) will finance solar grain drying systems under the farm

cility loan program.

Martin Chandler, an official of the agency, says farmers are encouraged to develop and use solar grain drying systems because of rising fuel costs.

Grain drying using the conventional fuels, liquid petro-

leum gas and natural gas, is a high energy use operation. Solar grain drying is an alternate technology that uses less energy but still preserves the crop for the feed use intended.

Chandler says producers eligible for farm facility loans will be eligible for financing of commercially constructed or homemade solar drying sys

Ten states and 27 countie particpated in the program last fall as part of a pilot project. Farm fuel shortages and higher costs prompted ASCS to open the program to all farmers.

Additional details on solar grain Drying laons may be

obtained from the local ASCS office. Farmland owned by foreig ers must be registered at the Agricultural stabilization and

conservation service (ASCS).

#### No Foreign Landowners Reported In County

Foreigners who owned or had at least a five percent interest in farmland on February 1, 1979, were required to report owner-ship by August 1, 1979. Those acquiring land after February 1, must report it within 90 days.
ASCS Officials say failure to

report could result in a fine of up to 25 percent of the property's fair market value.

For reporting purposes, The U.S. Department of Agriculture considers farmland as any tract of more than one acre now i agricultural, forestry or timbe production. Idle land used for agriculture within the past ive years must be reported.
