Farm Leader To Speak Here

National Farmers Union President, Tony Dechant, will address the volatile situations of the world wheat market and the impact of both domestic and international policies on the future of the family farm when he addresses an area meeting of Texas Farmers Union District I, according to Jerry Gee of Spearman.

Gee is President of the Hansford-Hutchinson County Farmers Union which is host for the meeting scheduled for Monday, Aug. 13 at 8:00 p.m. at the County Barn in Spearman. A barbecue meal is also included in the agenda and any interested area farmers are invited to attend.

Dechant has been at the helm of the 300,000 member National Farmers Union since 1966 and is recognized policy leader both domestically and internationally. He is the recent past president of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers, a vice-president of CARE, and a trustee of the American Freedom from Hunger Foundation.

His address to the District TFU members will center on the ever growing problems faced in international trade and the critical role of grain exports which could again be used as a political tool for bargaining, possibly through embargos rather than price agreements between food exporting countries. Dechant is also expected to discuss the role of farm organizations in the face of challenge coming from Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland for a national dialogue prior to the enactment of new farm legislation to replace the Agriculture Act of 1977.

Hospital Cited For Cost Containment

Hansford Hospital of Spearman has received a 1979 Certificate of Participation citing the hospital for its outstanding effort in cost containment.

Jerry Taylor, Administrator of Hansford Hospital, in announcing the receipt of this Certificate said, "We're proud of the progress our hospital, together with its medical staff and employees, are making toward holding down the cost of hospital care. We will continue to make every effort to hold our expenses to the absolute minimum without sacrificing the quality of care delivered to patients."

In early 1978, the hospital industry launched a program to control costs and this program is known as the Texas Voluntary Effort. This is part of a national effort which commits hospitals to reduce the national rate of cost increase by two percent a

year for 1978 and for 1979. In 1978, the hospital industry in Texas reduced the rate of rise by 2.6%.

Hospital District Election

The Board of Directors of Hansford County Hospital District has called a tax and bond election for August 11, 1979.

The special election is for the purpose of increasing the maximum tax rate for hospital district purposes and authority for the issuance of bond.

There are two propositions on the ballot. The first is to determine whether the maximum rate of tax levied for hospital district purposes should be increased from 50 cents to 75 cents per \$100 valuation of taxable property situated within the District subject to hospital district taxation for hospital district purposes, including the payment of all indebtedness assumed, incurred or issued by the District, as provided by law.

Proposition No. 2 is to determine whether the hospital district be authorized and empowered to issue bonds in the

total amount of \$1,400,000 for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping the same for hospital purposes (a domiciliary care facility). The bonds are to be payable from ad valorem taxes levied, assessed and collected on all taxable property in the District subject to hospital district taxation, and issued in one or more installments or series, mature serially or otherwise not more than 40 years.

Description of the proposed project includes remodeling of portions of the hospital to provide a new operating room, enlarged laboratory and remodeled and enlarged kitchen, cafeteria and emergency room, and a new 54 bed domiciliary care and convalescent building.

There will be a day room, dining room, physical therapy and inhalation therapy facility. The proposed new building will share the kitchen facilities of the Hansford Hospital.

Polling places for the election will be Precinct No. 1 (consisting of Hansford County Voting Precincts No. 1, 2, 5 and 6) at the County Agriculture Barn, Spearman; Precinct No. 2 (consisting of Hansford County Voting Precincts No. 3, 4 and 7) County Agricultural Barn, Gru-

Firemen Attend School

The Spearman Volunteer Fire Department was fortunate in sending three men to the school. Ron Antalek, Stan Hudson and Ronnie Bullard, from Spearman, two Gruver firefighters, John Cotter and Robert Blount attended the five day school.

The school attendance was down this year compared to last year because of the fuel shortage. A total of 2132 firefighters and instructors participated in the training with the majority coming from small volunteer departments. There were approximately 550 cities and towns representing Texas. Also participating were firefighters from Alaska, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Illinois, Louisiana, New Jersey, New Mexico, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin. There were students also from Canada, Mexico, Saudi Arabia and the Virgin Islands.

The school is conducted each year at Texas A & M in the last full week in July. The school,

INDIVIDUAL RETIREMENT PLAN (IRA)

Every one wants retirement security with the knowledge that when they quit working they'll still get a steady income. The government and many private firms provide retirement plans, but there are companies that don't do this. The Individual Retirement Plan was set up so that a person not covered by a qualified private or government plan could set up his own personal plan.

Under the IRA, an employed person can contribute up to 15% or \$1,500, whichever is less, each year to a fund. This fund is not taxed until the person takes out the money when he retires. Furthermore,

the amount the person puts in each year is tax-deductible from his gross earnings. The money can be invested in an account, bond, or an individual retirement annuity. The Individual Retirement Annuity (IRA) is issued by an insurance company, and there are certain restrictions involved here. The Annuity must not contain any life insurance element, it must be nonforfeitable, and it cannot be transferred. The IRA is actually a trust that is set up for a person or his beneficiaries. Husbands and wives are considered separately in this plan.

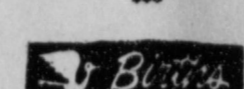
I intend to vote yes on the propositions, as I feel that the nursing home, and improvements to Hansford Hospital are needed and will be an asset to our county.

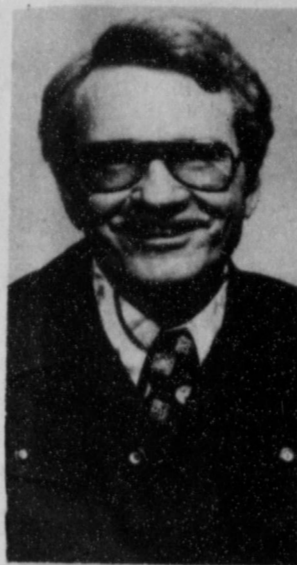
The new paving on Kenneth Ave. is going to be great. I spent about 15 minutes the first day they had it blocked off trying to get home, it seemed that every street I thought of

FE WEARS MANY FACES

USDA Calls For Comments on 1980 Proposals

WASHINGTON, July 18--John W. Goodwin, associate administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), today asked the public to comment by Sept. 18 on proposals for the 1980 corn and sorghum programs and the soybean loan rate.

Although the secretary of agriculture is not required to make most of the program determinations for the three commodities before Nov. 15, he has set the Sept. 20 comment deadline so that the programs may be announced earlier than the statutory date if he determines it desirable to do so, Goodwin said.

Comments are requested for the following determinations for corn and sorghum:

- the amount of the national program acreages;
- the reduction from the previous year's harvested acreage required to guarantee established (target) price protection on the total 1980 planted acreage; --whether there should be a set-aside requirement and, if so, the extent of the setaside; --whether there should be a land diversion program and, if so, the extent of such diversion and the level of payment; --if a set-aside or land diversion program is required, whether a limitation should be placed on planted acreage; --the established (target) prices; --the loan and purchase levels for 1980 crops of corn, sorghum and soybeans; and --other related actions such as: Commodity Credit Corporation minimum sales price, commodity eligibility, storage requirements, premiums and discounts and other provisions as may be necessary to carry out the programs.

The provisions under consideration are to appear in the July 20 Federal Register. Before reaching his decision, the secretary will consider any recommendations and views regarding the proposed determinations.

To be assured of consideration, all written comments must be received no later than Sept. 18 by the director, production adjustment division, ASCS, USDA Room 3630-S, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013.

All comments will be available for public inspection at the office of the director during regular business hours. On June 6 at the public was asked to comment on the 1980 barley and oats program along with a request for public comment on the wheat program. These comments were due July 16.

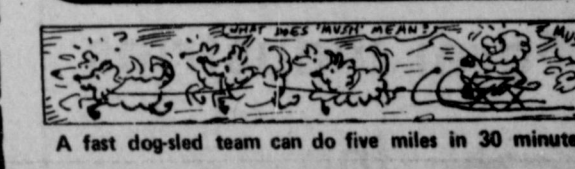

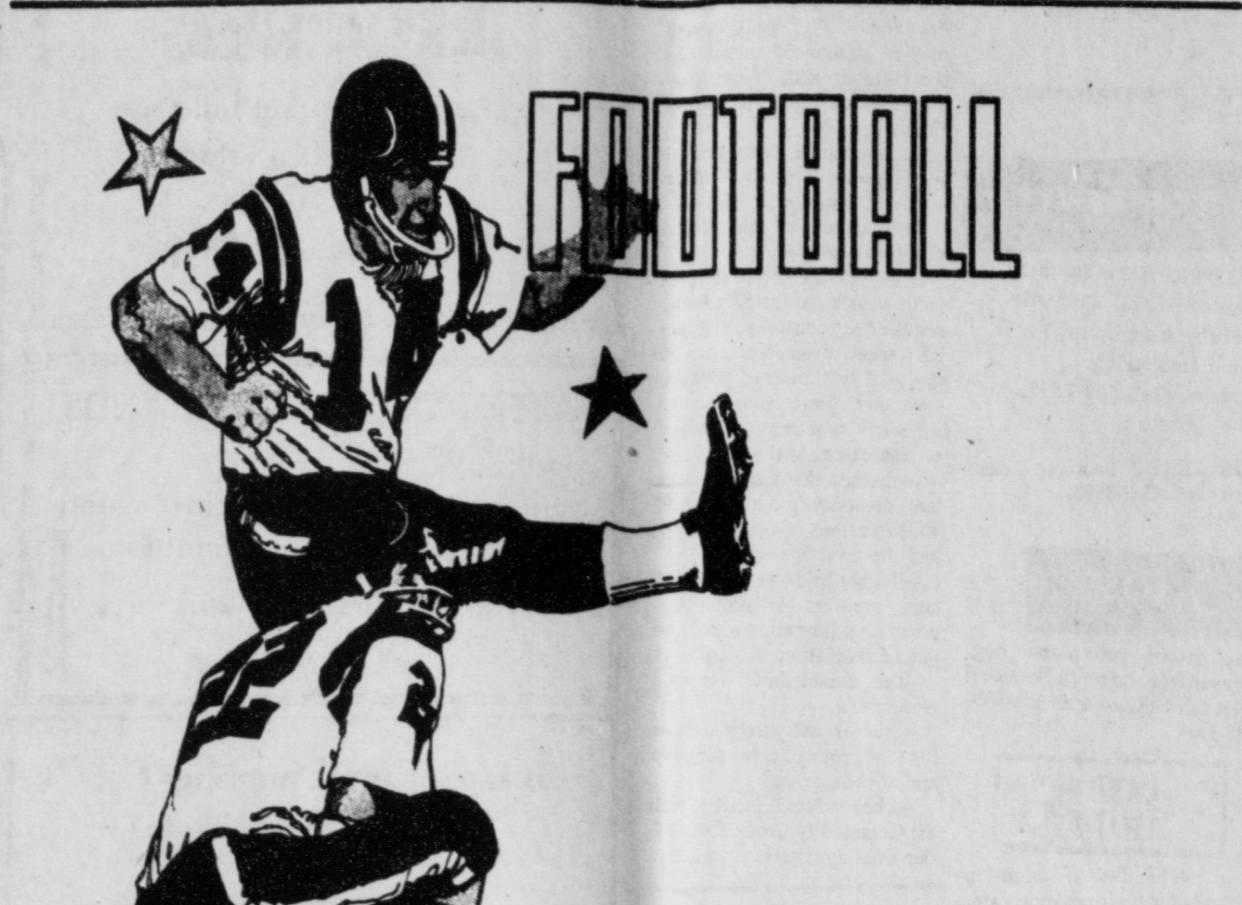

We will be glad to show you some films which show explicit photos of what might and does happen. If anyone is truly interested, we also could use more personnel on the department if they care to submit an application. Come on down.
Please remember to keep a safe distance from any fire related hazard and let the personnel who are trained in these matters handle them. We would appreciate your cooperation. After all, it is for your own safety.
