School Board hears reports

Spearman school board trustees gave the go-ahead to order a new 36-passenger bus and approved a request by Christian Community Television Inc. of Guymon, Okla. to tape certain Spearman sporting events during a regular session Monday night in the ISD board room.

The Board also took up an discussed the need to select a nominee for a vacancy on the tax appraisal district board, but decided to not take action on the nomination until the next trustee meeting. Deadline for such nominations by the taxing entities in the county is Oct. 15.

By unanimous vote, the board authorized Superintendent James Cunningham to order purchase of the new 36-passenger bus for the ISD through state board of control. As purchase of the bus was already budgeted, no adjustment of the budget was necessary.

A representative of Christian Community Television Inc. from Guymon appeared before the trustees. He said he wanted board approval for him to tape an occasional Lynx athletic event for broadcast on later dates on the new television station.

Responding to a question from a board member, he said the station is not at this time broadcast programming that are being picked up by Spearman television sets. But he said he would like to tape an occasional sporting event anyway, and the board agreed they had no objection to this.

The naming of a nominee for the tax appraisal board was tabled to give the trustees more time to study the matter.

Superintendent Cunningham made several reports to the board members. He told the board in his lunchroom report that an average of 124 students were eating lunch every school day in the high school cafeteria, but that the number of students eating in the elementary school cafeteria is "way down" this year. He said that quite a number of the elementary pupils are bringing sack lunches to school.

He told the board the school board breakfast will be held on Sept. 27 at 7 a.m., broke down the assignments of coaches and gave enrollment figures for the various schools in the district, and a total enrollment figure of 872.

City Councilmen adopt 1983-84 city budget

City Councilmen adopted a 1983-84 city budget of almost \$2.5 million and voted to keep the same tax rate as last fiscal year's during a regular meeting Tuesday night at temporary City Hall.

Afterward, the council also held a public hearing on the amended 1982-83 budget, then adopted an ordinance approving it.

Before approving the new budget, the council voted to switch a proposed \$3,000 in Revenue Sharing Funds from the Golden Spread

Senior Citizen's Center fund to the Stationmaster's Museum fund.

On a motion by Councilman Bob Pearson, seconded by Councilman Burl Buchanan, the aldermen voted unanimously to adopt a \$2,465,901 in general fund expenditures for a surplus of \$1,322; \$1,552,101 in enterprise fund Revenue, and \$1,549,898 in enterprise fund expenditures for a surplus of \$2,203.

After approving the new budget, the councilmen voted unanimously on a motion by Councilman Jim Nicholson, seconded by Councilman

Wilson McClellan to adopt 72 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation as the new tax rate, the same as the 1982-83 tax rate.

The council men all voted to change the tentatively allocated Revenue Sharing for Stationmaster's Museum from \$2,000 to \$5,000 and to offset this by cutting the \$5,000 tentatively allocated for Golden Spread Center to \$2,000, on a motion by Pearson, seconded by Buchanan.

In other action, the council: --Approved a 10 percent increase

in fees charged for H&S Emergency Medical Services;

--Approved an agreement with Hansford County, whereby the city will provide rescue with fire department services to the county at \$225 per each rural fire call and \$125 per rural rescue unit call;

--Amended the zoning code, resetting certain boundaries on the city zoning map to allow construction of a house on Archer Street;

--And approved monthly fire, ambulance, police, municipal court and animal control reports.

Hansford County receives \$16,051.92

AUSTIN, Tex. Sept. 8—Texas Treasurer Ann Richards is sending checks today totaling \$7.3 million in grants to the state's 254 counties for road construction and maintenance projects.

The 27 counties in the Panhandle area are receiving a total of \$500,000.

The State Treasurer each year disburses money appropriated by the legislature for the Lateral Road Program. The grants may be used for the purchase of right-of-way and for construction and maintenance of lateral roads, farm-to-market roads or state highways.

Richards said the \$7.3 million is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's area, rural population and lateral road mileage.

Cricket invades Hansford

Hordes of field crickets have invaded parts of Hansford County, creating a nuisance in some areas and causing minor damage.

Large numbers of crickets usually occur in the fall following prolonged dry weather in the spring and summer, points out Jim Smith, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. If temperatures get cooler and rains occur, increased nuisance will occur from massive migration from yards and fields into homes and other lighted areas.

Field crickets can damage ornamental and garden plants. Inside homes and other buildings they become a nuisance and may occasionally feed on fabrics, especially clothing stained with perspiration or food.

Smith suggests cleaning yard and garden areas to reduce cricket feeding and breeding sites. This includes destroying weeds and dense vegetation around homes and other buildings and removing piles of bricks, stones, wood and other debris where crickets may hide.

Eliminating outside lights at night also helps keep crickets away from buildings, and making sure that all screens and doors fit tightly will help keep the pests out of the home.

As far as insecticides are

concerned, Smith advises spraying a band from 5 to 20 feet wide around foundation walls and treating window and door faces, crawl spaces, door thresholds, and around garbage cans and wood piles to keep crickets from moving indoors. Effective insecticides for outdoor use include chlorpyrifos (Dursban R), diazinon, malathion, propoxur (Baygon R), resmethrin, carbaryl (Sevin R) and metaldehyde, the latter two as baits.

Application of insecticides indoors will only be minimally effective points out Smith. Residual sprays as chlorpyrifos, diazinon, propoxur, and resmethrin applied to the baseboards, closets, under stairways, and wherever crickets are hiding may be helpful.

Be sure and use insecticides according to label directions, reminds Smith.

NECKLINE NEWS

A neckline makes a tremendous difference when it comes to flattery and the effectiveness of a total fashion look.

A well-chosen collar or neckline can actually draw attention away from figure flaws by making the neckline an eye-catching focal point. For example, the fashion experts tell us that ideally, hips and shoulders should have the illusion of equal width. A neckline or collar can help create that illusion.

Wide shoulders can be "narrowed" with an open convertible collar or deep V. Likewise, narrow shoulders can be "widened" with horizontal lines such as bateaus, or "eye-widening" lapels on notched collars.

The small-busted figure can be enhanced by full, blousy tops with eye-catching neckline details that give the illusion of better proportion. The full-busted figure looks best in simple, uncluttered designs that bring flattering attention to the face. Large collars and high, fussy details such as ruffles should be avoided and flat collar variations that are open at the neck used instead.

Be sure to study pattern details and different views so you can select the neck variations that best meet your figure and wardrobe needs. Also consider the fabric suggestion on the pattern envelope, since not all necklines make up well in all fabrics. Linen, for example, is not well suited to a drapery cowl neckline.

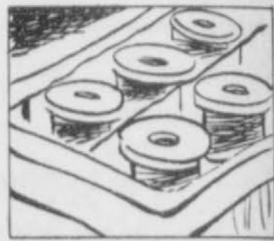
Because the neckline has naturally "high" visibility, it demands flawless construction. A well-made collar should have identically shaped curves or points, and should lie smoothly at the neck without straining.

A crisp collar will only hold its shape if it is properly interfaced so it receives good support. Special care should also be taken in selecting, cutting and sewing interfacing for a true professional look.

Whether the neckline is a simple flat collar or a fancy ruffled extravaganza, it

should look good on the garment and on you.

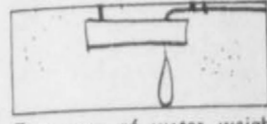

**PUBLIC NOTICE
BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS
OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 8, 1983**

**PROPOSITION NO. 1
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 91 proposes a constitutional amendment which requires a county with a population of 30,000 or more to be divided into not less than four nor more than eight justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of 18,000 or more but less than 30,000 shall be divided into not less than two nor more than five justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of less than 18,000 shall be designated as a single justice of the peace precinct or, upon a finding of necessity by the commissioners court, shall be divided into more than one justice of the peace precinct but not more than four. The amendment provides further, that in any precinct in which there is a city with a population of 18,000 or more, two justices of the peace shall be elected. The amendment allows a justice of the peace, constable or commissioner to continue in office until the expiration of his term, although a change in precinct boundaries results in the officer no longer being a resident of the precinct for which he was elected or appointed and allows a justice of the peace or constable to continue in office until the expiration of his term even though a change in precinct boundaries results in the abolition of the precinct or more than one justice of the peace or constable serving the precinct. Vacancies in the office of justice of the peace or constable that result from a precinct boundary change shall be filled by the commissioners court until the next general election. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 1984, and counties with populations of less than 30,000 and with more than four justice of the peace and constable precincts would have until January 1, 1987 to comply with the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing fewer justice of the peace and constable precincts in counties with a population of less than 30,000 and providing for continuous service by justices of the peace, constables, and county commissioners when precinct boundaries are changed."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 105 proposes a constitutional amendment which would limit a homestead in a city, town or village to a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land, together with any improvements on the land. The constitutional requirement that, at the time of

designation, an urban homestead not exceed ten thousand dollars in value without reference to the value of any improvements on the land would be eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation that permits representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on their product sales to be used solely to finance programs of marketing, promotion, research and education relating to those products. It provides, further, that adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment will bring into effect Senate Bill 607. Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, with rejection of the amendment resulting in Senate Bill 607 having no effect.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the advancement of food and fiber production and marketing in this state through research, education, and promotion financed by the producers of agricultural products."

**PROPOSITION NO. 4
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 30 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the Legislature to enact laws to provide for the succession of members of the Legislature in the event of enemy attack and allows the suspension of procedural rules imposed by the Constitution in the event of, or immediate threat of, enemy attack. The amendment empowers the Governor, after consultation with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, to suspend the constitutional requirement that the Legislature hold its sessions in Austin and allows the suspension of procedural rules by the Governor issuing a proclamation in which the House of Representatives and Senate concur by resolution approved by a majority of the members present. Suspension of the constitutional rules may not exceed a period of two years under a single proclamation; however, the Governor may renew the suspension by issuing a new proclamation concurred in by the House of Representatives and the Senate through a resolution approved by a major-

ity of the members present.

The amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing statutory provisions for succession of public office during disasters caused by enemy attack, and authorizing the suspension of certain constitutional rules relating to legislative procedure during those disasters or during immediate threat of enemy attack."

**PROPOSITION NO. 5
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 12 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation providing for the use of the permanent school fund and income from the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. The amendment provides, further, that the Legislature may appropriate part of the available school fund for administration of the permanent school fund or of a bond guarantee program established pursuant to the amendment.

The constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts."

**PROPOSITION NO. 6
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment which would permit the Legislature to provide for the garnishment of wages to enforce court-ordered child support payments. The garnishment remedy would not be available for other purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing the Legislature to provide for additional remedies to enforce court-ordered child support payments."

**PROPOSITION NO. 7
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Veterans' Land Board to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$800 million to provide financing to veterans of the state. The amendment requires that three hundred million dollars of the state bonds be dedicated to the Veterans' Land Fund. The Fund is to be used to purchase land to be sold to veterans under such terms, rules and regulations as may be authorized by law. The amendment creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and requires that \$500 million of the state bonds authorized by the amendment be dedicated to the Fund. The Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund will be utilized by the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of making home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within the state and for the administrative

costs of administering the fund and issuing the bonds.

The amendment provides, further, that if there is not money in either the Veterans' Land Fund or the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund available for payment of principal and interest on the general obligation bonds issued pursuant to the amendment, then money coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year is appropriated in an amount sufficient for payment of principal and interest due in that fiscal year.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment for financial assistance to veterans and to authorize the issuance of \$800 million in bonds of the state to finance the Veterans' Land Program and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Program."

**PROPOSITION NO. 8
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes political subdivisions to exempt veterans' organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the veterans' organizations be chartered by the United States Congress, be composed of members or former members of the United States Armed Forces, and be organized for patriotic and public service purposes. The amendment provides, further, that political subdivisions may exempt fraternal organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the fraternal organizations be organized to perform and be primarily engaged in charitable or benevolent functions. The Legislature would be authorized to enact laws that prescribe the eligibility requirements for fraternal organizations to benefit from the exemption and to pass legislation limiting the types or amount of property owned by a fraternal organization which may be exempted from ad valorem taxation.

**PROPOSITION NO. 9
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 70 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide, by local or general law, a method by which judges of statutory courts with probate jurisdiction may be assigned to any other statutory court with probate jurisdiction and to any constitutional county court in any county in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for assignment of judges of statutory probate courts to other statutory county courts with probate

jurisdiction and to county courts."

**PROPOSITION NO. 10
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact laws which would allow a city or town to expend public funds to relocate or replace sanitation sewer laterals on private property if done in conjunction with the replacement or relocation of sanitation sewer mains serving the property. The amendment requires that the law authorize the city or town to affix a lien on the private property, with the consent of the owner, to cover the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the property. The lien may not be enforced until five years have expired since the date the lien was affixed. The amendment provides, further, that the law require that the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the private property be assessed against the property with repayment to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years and at an interest rate provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a city or town to expend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of sanitation sewer laterals on private property."

**PROPOSITION NO. 11
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and would eliminate the Governor's power to revoke paroles. The Legislature would be authorized to establish the Board of Pardons and Paroles and to require it to maintain records of its actions and the reasons for its actions. The amendment would empower the Legislature to enact parole laws. Constitutional language specifying the qualifications and terms of office for members of the Board of Pardons and Paroles is eliminated.

**PROPOSITION NO. 12
ON THE BALLOT**

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and to give the board power to revoke paroles."

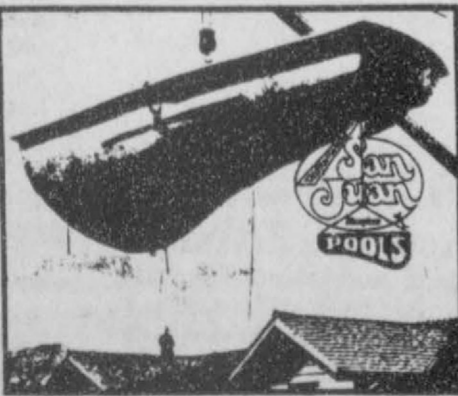

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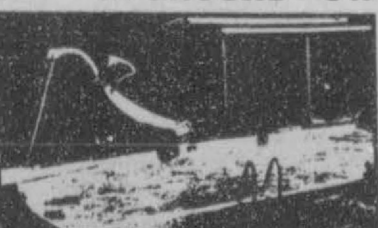
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Sheriff reports arrests, sentencing, indictments

Sheriff R.L. McFarlin reported three arrests, one sentencing to the state penitentiary and three of the indictments returned by Hansford County Grand Jury.

The sheriff said Douglas Crow, 28, of Goodwell, Okla. was arrested Sept. 7 on charges of leaving the scene of an accident north of Gruber on Hwy. 136.

On Sept. 8, Jimmy Nunnery, 33, who has been residing in Spearman, was arrested on a Guymon, Okla. warrant for bail jumping.

And on Sept. 12, his department arrested Romiro Arjona, 55 on a federal warrant from a U.S. Marshal's office in Virginia, charging Arjona with transporting of illegal aliens and failure to appear. The judge had set bond of \$250,000 on Arjona who was turned over to federal marshals for trial in Corpus

Christi, according to McFarlin.

LeRoy Cada, 28, of Dumas was sentenced in district court to five years in prison on a charge of possession of a prohibited weapon.

And the grand jury returned true bill indictments on Robin Jensen, 21, and Blake Johnson, 28, both of Perryton, McFarlin said. Jensen and Johnson were indicted on charges of theft over \$200. Bond was set at \$2,500 for each and both have made bond and been released, the sheriff related.

Roy Berkley, 24, of Electra City was also indicted on a charge of forgery. He had not been arrested when the indictment was returned on Sept. 6, but has since been arrested in North Platte, Neb. and at press time Friday, a Hansford deputy was enroute to North Platte to pick him up, McFarlin said.

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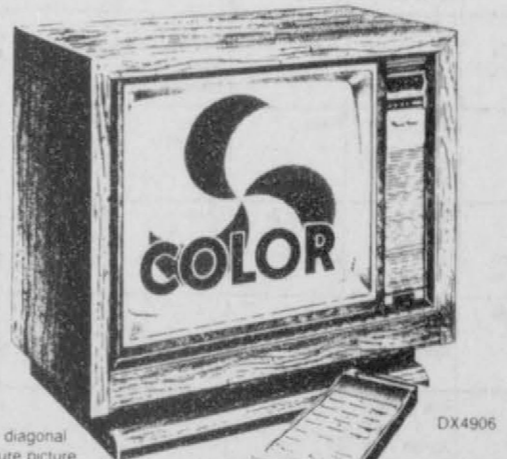


"Big Mac" McCain snags this touchdown pass for the Lynx. Notice the ball in his hands.

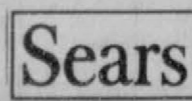

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JV's lose to Perryton Rangers here

It was first and 10 at the Perryton six with just 17 seconds left in the half—the Spearman Lynx JV would have to hurry.

So they gave the ball to their "hurry up" man. Quarterback Bob Cook took the snap, pivoted and pitched out to Monty Morris. The speedy halfback took the ball in full stride, got a couple of good blocks along the right side of the line, and outspiced the Ranger JV defense, racing untouched into the end zone for a Spearman touchdown.

Morris' TD dash was the brightest flash in a dark evening for the Spearman JV—the only time they lit the scoreboard, although they came close a couple of times against a big, rugged Perryton Junior Varsity that rolled to a 39-6 victory.

The game was a battle of unbeaten teams. The Spearman JV opened their season with a 0-0 tie against Panhandle, a game the Lynx JV won every way but on the scoreboard where it counts, then topped Canadian JV in a 14-12 thriller. Meanwhile the Perryton JV had rolled to two impressive lopsided victories, the last being a 32-7 win over the LeFors varsity.

So the Lynx JV'ers came into the game with hopes of an upset win over the highly regarded Ranger JV as a springboard to an undefeated season, but it was not to be.

Perryton scored its first TD on the Ranger JV's second possession, methodically grinding out the yardage on the ground. It took them 12 plays to cover 72 yards against a stubborn Spearman defense that almost halted the drive at the Spearman 45. But on fourth and one, Perryton gambled and quarterback Troy McKee gained to the 38 for a first down on a keeper.

Wesley Jines broke off tackle and scored on a 17-yard jaunt, McKee booted the PAT and it was 7-0, Perryton.

Early in the second quarter, Perryton marched on its own 23 to score its second TD as Jines carried

over on a third down and one foot situation.

After the ensuing kickoff, McKee intercepted a first down Spearman pass and ran it to the Spearman 39. Nine plays later Mike Parks got the TD from the four at the PAT kick made it 20-0, Perryton.

Just when it looked like Perryton might rout the Lynx JV, the Spearman team uncorked a scoring drive, starting at its own 31. An offside on the first play penalty made it five yards harder. Mike Lopez gained five yards in two carries and on third and 10, Cook dropped back to pass, was rushed and scrambled to a first down on the Spearman 45.

Jessie Lozano pounded through the bigger Perryton line to midfield, but two running tries netted only two yards, setting up a fourth and three at the Perryton 48. Cook then hit tight end James Coombes with a pass for another first at the Perryton 40. Morris carried on a pitch right to the 38, another offside pushed the ball backwards to the Perryton 44, and trying to pass, Cook had to scramble again but only gained a yard this time.

After a timeout Cook drilled a pass toward Morris, and a falling Perryton defender got in Morris' way, breaking the pattern so Spearman had a first down via interference penalty at the Perryton 27.

Cook gained to the six, then pitched out on the next play to Morris who skirted end for the TD. Morris was stopped a foot-and-a-half short on a plunge try for two point conversion, and with 12 seconds left in the half it was 20-6, Perryton.

Perryton ran one play after the kickoff and fumbled the ball away, but time had run out in the half.

Spearman opened the second half trying an inside kick, and Lopez fell on the ball for the Lynx JV, but it did not go the required 10 yards, and Perryton had a first and 10 at Spearman 44. Eight plays later they

scored, a big Jeff McKinley barreled over for a TD.

Another Perryton third quarter was axed when Morris fell on a Ranger JV fumble at the Spearman 10.

The Spearman drive died at the Spearman 38 when Morris was rushed hard in trying a halfback pass, and a defender made a diving shoestring catch. Perryton's Jines got the TD on a three yard plunge in their next series, and in the fourth quarter got their final TD on a five yard off tackle burst by Brad Herring.

In the last three minutes, Spearman mounted a spirited, determined drive. In at quarterback, David Mires threw a pass and Cook, playing end, made a diving, come-back shoestring catch for a second and three at the Spearman 34. Back at quarterback, Cook scrambled to a first down on the Spearman 43.

Then came one of the most spectacular individual efforts of the game. Mires lobbed a pass toward Cook. The ball was up for grabs in heavy traffic. Surrounded by three taller defenders Cook leaped, wrestled in the ball, was hit by two tacklers but broke loose and fought his way to the Perryton 35. Lopez fought his way to a first down at the Perryton 23 on crossback, but the drive fizzled when a fourth down running try was stopped at the Perryton 15. Perryton ran one play to run out the clock.
