At the half Gruver led 30then Spearman started shooting in the third quarter and at one time cut the Gruver lead to nine points. It was 38-28 with one quarter left.



Growth Continues

Spearman continued its steady growth during 1963 with more than three-quarters of a million dollars in construction and a population increase.

The issued building permits for \$780, 390 in new construction and expanding and remodeling old construction. Of this amount, \$582, 620 was for new residential, and commercial buildings.

According to the number of city water meters in use at the end of this December as compared to a year ago, the population has increased 136 and is now 4, 119. This figure is arrived at by taking the number of meters, 1177, and multiplying by 3.5 persons. Last year there were 1128 water meters in the town.

October and November were the big residential construction months. In October permits were issued for \$60,500 in new homes and in November the figure was \$52, 200.

There were four large commercial buildings put up during the year. Baker-Taylor Drill-

Hansford Farm Bureau built a new office building, North Plains Truck and Implement built a new building and a new animal hospital was constructed on the west edge of town.
