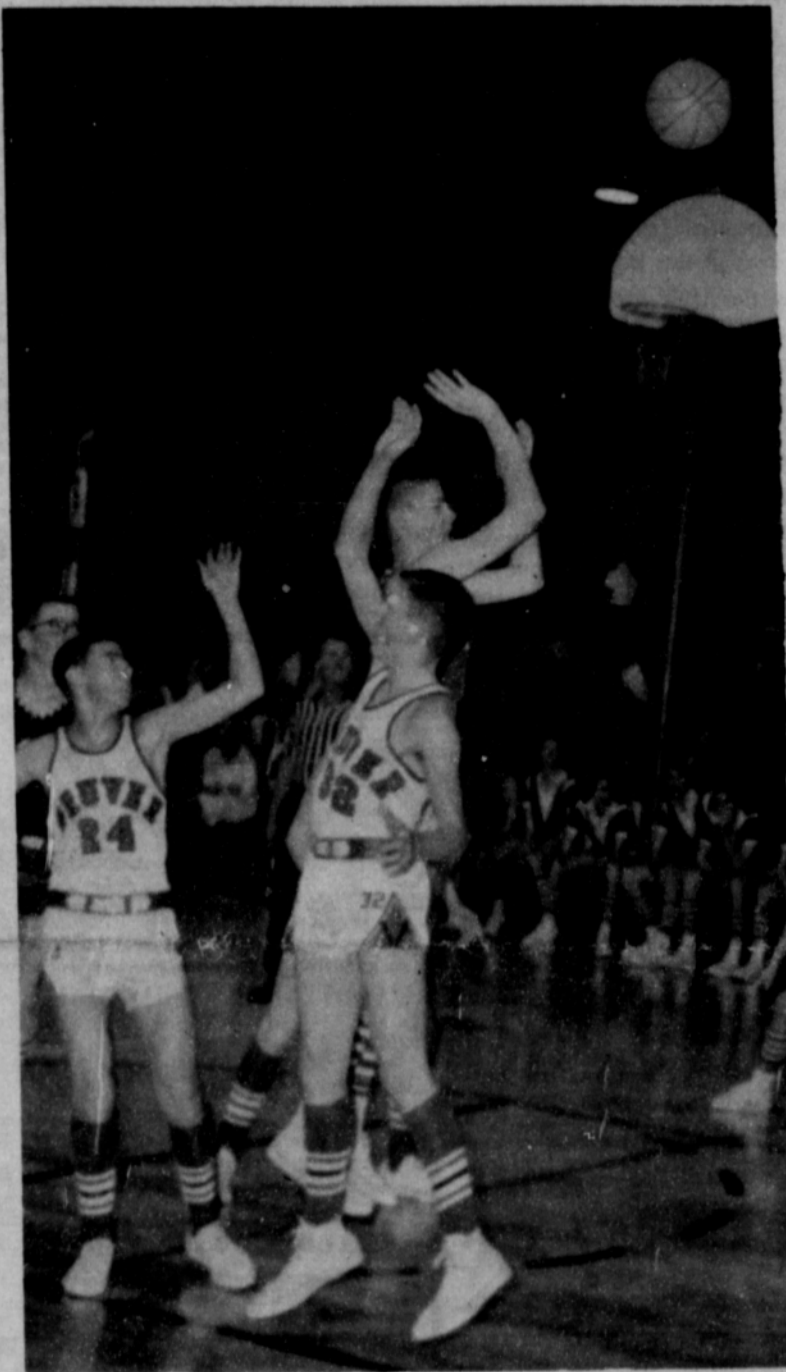

Gruver Wallops Spearman

Gruver's varsity basketball teams stood at the foul line Monday night and shot the Spearman Lynx and Lynettes out of the Gruver gym.

The Gruver girls, led by Anita States walloped the fumbling Lynettes 58-45 and the Greyhounds beat the Lynx 53-40. Sophomore Sammy Tipton led the Greyhounds with a 30 point barrage.

Led by Phyllis Patterson Spearman outscored Gruver 17 to 16 field goals, but Gruver scored on 26 of 36 free throws and Spearman hit only on 11 of 20, missing on several one and one free shot situations.

Spearman got into hot water on fouls almost immediately when Joan Hackley and Sharon Close picked up some quick fouls guarding against the pushing shot of Anita States. States led the scoring with 32 points, 10 field goals and 12 free-throws. Lanetta Blankenship had three field goals and 14 free

shots for 20 points and Odom hit three field goals for six points.

Patterson bombed the basket from all over the outside area of the court to hit 11 field goals and seven free throws for 29 points. She fouled out early in the fourth quarter while trying to keep the Gruver guards from getting the ball down court.

Vickie Wilde scored 10 points on three field goals and four free throws. The big girl again found the going tough under the basket on all of her shots.

States had her troubles until fouls forced Spearman guards to pull off and let her shoot.

Helen Greever scored four points and Susan Hutchison scored 2 to round out the Spearman scoring.

Spearman led 13-11 at the first quarter, then Gruver free-shot themselves into the lead and stayed there. They had it 27-23 at the half and 43-34 at

the three-quarter mark.

The Lynx waited until the second quarter to start shooting but were too far behind to make a game of it. With a 14-4 first quarter lead Gruver made Spearman come after the ball then scored at the foul line.

Gruver held a 18-17 margin in field goals and 17-6 in free throws.

At the half Gruver led 30-17, then Spearman started shooting in the third quarter and at one time cut the Gruver lead to nine points. It was 38-28 with one quarter left.

Sophomore Sammy Tipton was the big gun for Gruver as he pumped in 12 field goals and 6 free throws from the outside. Bob Gillispie had 8, Lieb 7, Leatherman 5, Hoel 2 and Rice 1.

Pat Pattison led Spearman with 23 points. He hit 10 field goals and three free shots. Jim Kirkland had 8, Leroy Callaway 7 and Ken Shufeldt 2.

Growth Continues

Spearman continued its steady growth during 1963 with more than three-quarters of a million dollars in construction and a population increase.

The issued building permits for \$780,390 in new construction and expanding and remodeling old construction. Of this amount, \$582,620 was for new residential, and commercial buildings.

According to the number of city water meters in use at the end of this December as compared to a year ago, the population has increased 136 and is now 4,119. This figure is arrived at by taking the number of meters, 1177, and multiplying by 3.5 persons. Last year there were 1128 water meters in the town.

October and November were the big residential construction months. In October permits were issued for \$60,500 in new homes and in November the figure was \$52,200.

There were four large commercial buildings put up during the year. Baker-Taylor Drill-

ing Co., put up a new shop building.

Hansford Farm Bureau built a new office building, North Plains Truck and Implement built a new building and a new animal hospital was constructed on the west edge of town.
