Medical facilities in South Korea compare favorably

Korea compare favorably with similar ones in the United States in most instances. There are some minor differences depending on the ability of the patient to pay. He commented favorably on such Peace Corps work in South Korea with which he was acquainted.

But like most young men, a spirit of adventure began to

a spirit of adventure began to assert itself and when the opportunity to come to the United States of American presented itself, Dr. Son availed himself of it.

In the meantime, a nurse he had met while a medical ne had met while a medical student took him up on his offer to be his wife and on June 25, 1975, Dr. Son and His wife, Soonja, were mar-

The marriage fit nicely into future planning. His wife's sister lives in Rutherford, N.J., where she is a nurse and her husband is a doctor. Dr. Son and his wife, while in touch with a professional referral service in New York City, stayed in Rutherford, studying English and for his

Liking what he saw, he was granted a temporary license to practice medicine in Texas pending his passing the state medical examination as required.

Loss estimated in truck fire

Total loss has been set at between \$16,000 and \$20,000 in a truck fire January 18 at the Peoples Natural Gas Co. Division of Northern Natural Gas Co. installation on the Gruver highway in which a 1973 model truck and its cargo of methanol were consumed by fire. The loss was covered by insurance.

A spokesman for Nortl ern Natural Gas Co., owner, Friday reported that an investigation revealed an apparent leak in the fuel line and gasoline from one of the saddle tanks ignited when it came in contact with the hot exhaust system. There were no injuries. The driver had just returned from his route. At the time of the fire, the spokesman said there was \$500 gallons of methanol in the tank, with a value of about \$300.

The truck has been replaced and the company is awaiting the arrival of a replacement tank and other equipment. This will be installed and the unit is expected to be back in full service in about 10 days.
