

Spearman Moose Lodge Being Organized

tremendous assistance from four Perrytonites - Mr. and Mrs. Bob West and Mr. and Mrs. Junior Hollis.

In discussing the role of the lodges in community and national life, it was mentioned that the Moose Lodge should be considered a home away from home.

The Moose Lodge is a family fraternity and is strongly active in community affairs. The local lodges through the enrollment fees and dues of the members sponsor Mooseheart for

Children in Illinois and Moosehaven, a retirement village in Florida.

Enrollment fees are \$20 and annual dues are \$25.

Dr. enjoying residency

The fascination of standing in any of several locations on the North Plains in the vicinity of Spearman and seeing for miles in any direction plus the friendly people in Spearman are two of the many reasons why Dr. Khun Son and his family are enjoying their residency in Spearman.

This coupled with the fact that the doctor can put to use all his medical training, using the most modern facilities and techniques available, provides a substantial reason for the young doctor his wife and their 10-month-old daughter, Shun Hee, to adapt to their Panhandle Texas location.

Dr. Son, 29, is a native of Seoul, Korea, who completed his elementary and secondary education before attending a Catholic mission medical school for his college training.

Completing that, he spent a required one year internship before completing three years of military duty. He was stationed one year in Seoul and two years with the South Korean Army on the South Korean perimeter of the DMZ.

During this time he was with an infantry regiment and was commanding officer of a medical company for one year.

The captain reported he enjoyed this duty and most of his work was treating non-combat wounds, things like frostbite, injuries received in automobile accidents and some infectious diseases.

Medical facilities in South Korea compare favorably with similar ones in the United States in most instances. There are some minor differences depending on the ability of the patient to pay.

He commented favorably on such Peace Corps work in South Korea with which he was acquainted.

But like most young men, a spirit of adventure began to assert itself and when the opportunity to come to the United States of America presented itself, Dr. Son availed himself of it.

In the meantime, a nurse he had met while a medical student took him up on his offer to be his wife and on June 25, 1975, Dr. Son and His wife, Soonja, were married.

The marriage fit nicely into future planning. His wife's sister lives in Rutherford, N.J., where she is a nurse and her husband is a doctor.

Dr. Son and his wife, while in touch with a professional referral service in New York City, stayed in Rutherford, studying English and for his

medical examination in Texas.

Through the professional referral service, Dr. Son was lined up with a vacancy in Spearman and on December 6, 1976, he made his first visit to Spearman.

Liking what he saw, he was granted a temporary license to practice medicine in Texas pending his passing the state medical examination as required.

On December 21, he and his wife and daughter moved to Spearman and settled into an apartment on East Sixth Avenue.

Since that time, he and his family have been having an American adventure. The flat landscape in this region is in contrast to the mountainous terrain of South Korea with which he is acquainted.

However, South Korea is less windy than this region of the U.S., he noted.

A general practitioner, Dr. Son is in charge of the Hansford Clinic at 721 S. Evans. The clinic is open Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Saturday from 9 a.m. to noon.

Much of the American menu, particularly hot dogs and hamburgers, appeal to the doctor and his family and steaks are a principal favor-

ite.

Commenting on the ease with which people move about in the U.S., even at night Dr. Son mentioned that crime was a problem in South Korea which was reduced when severe penalties were imposed to curtail criminal activities.

Circumstances and his medical duties permitting, the doctor and his family are avid fans of such spectator sports as baseball and football.

One of the things they plan for future doing in this area is to pile in the family car with a camera and go see some of the country, a sort of exploratory journey to acquaint themselves with this region.

Dr. Son's father is a retired manufacturer and while the young doctor is in Spearman, one of the doctor's brothers is doing three years required military service as an enlisted man, the other brother is in college majoring in economics and a sister is graduating from high school and preparing for college.

The doctor and his family are Presbyterians and he spoke favorably of the work over the past decades which has been done in South Korea by the Presbyterians. He plans an indefinite stay

in Spearman, working at the Hansford Clinic and in local medical circles while devoting as much time as possible to his wife and daughter and their American adventure.

Canvass

The official canvass of votes cast January 15 in the decision about the naming of members of the Hansford Hospital board members and the school consolidation in the Morse Independent School District was completed by Hansford County Commissioners Thursday, January 20, and the results, as reported earlier in the Spearman Reporter were correct.

Voters in Spearman voted 311 to 217 to continue to have hospital board members appointed by County Commissioners.

Voters in the MORSE ISD favored consolidation 82 to 8.

The canvass was conducted by County Judge Johnnie Lee, Garland Head, Commissioner of Precinct 1, Joe T. Veneman, Commissioner of Precinct 2, B.J. Renner, Commissioner of Precinct 3, and George C. Lowe, Commissioner of Precinct 4.

Spearman Doctors Participants

Five doctors in Spearman are participating in a continuing education program through the University of Texas Health Science Services of San Antonio, it has been announced.

This is an audio-visual program of education to provide staff doctors at Hansford Hospital and Hansford Clinic with the latest information about the newest techniques in medical treatment and practices.

The doctors devote their own time to studying the materials which are made available to them. The service is provided by the hospital and the doctors do their studying either at home or elsewhere as circumstances dictate.

A spokesman for the hos-

pital board stated that this program is part of the overall efforts to provide the very latest techniques and practices so that patients, in or out of the hospital, can be sure of obtaining the best and latest in medical service and treatment in Spearman.

Participants in the program are Drs. Khun Son, Le Huu Thu, R.D. Stephenson, R. L. Kleeberger and Tom S. Nugent. The latter is an Amarillo resident who does consulting pathology work for Hansford Hospital.

Area grain thefts

Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin Jr. and his officers Friday were deep into an investigation of the theft of two loads of corn weighing a total of approximately 150,000 pounds and valued at \$8,000 which had been contracted for delivery from Bernstein Elevators to Bellflower, Calif., and which had not been delivered as per contract.

A spokesman for the sheriff's office Friday said the grain was loaded out several days ago. He added that similar thefts have occurred in Kansas, Oklahoma and Amarillo when drivers using false credentials drive up and load out and disappear.

The spokesman added the sheriff is continuing his investigation in other areas.

Federal investigators also are participating in the matter.

Loss estimated in truck fire

Total loss has been set at between \$16,000 and \$20,000 in a truck fire January 18 at the Peoples Natural Gas Co. Division of Northern Natural Gas Co. installation on the Gruver highway in which a 1973 model truck and its cargo of methanol were consumed by fire. The loss was covered by insurance.

A spokesman for Northern Natural Gas Co., owner, Friday reported that an investigation revealed an apparent leak in the fuel line and gasoline from one of the saddle tanks ignited when it came in contact with the hot exhaust system. There were no injuries. The driver had just returned from his route.

At the time of the fire, the spokesman said there was 500 gallons of methanol in the tank, with a value of about \$300.

The truck has been replaced and the company is awaiting the arrival of a replacement tank and other equipment. This will be installed and the unit is expected to be back in full service in about 10 days.

During the course of the fire, explosions occurred when the tires on the vehicle exploded. The tank of methanol and the gasoline tanks on the truck did not explode, an indication of the preventive methods employed by the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department in averting such a situation.

As the heat intensified, vapor from the truck spewed out with a roar like a blowtorch and burned upon contact with the surrounding flames.

With the arrival of the tanker of water from B&B Farm Industries, Inc., additional water was turned on the fire in quantity enough to quell it and cool down the remains of the truck.

Some two hours were required to bring the fire under control and extinguish it.

During the fire, traffic along the adjacent highway slowed to a crawl as passers-by got a glance of what was going on and some of them pulled off to the shoulders of the road to get a better view of events but there was no disruption to traffic.

All Lions Club members are selling tickets. And the price is right, \$2 for each adult and \$1 for each student

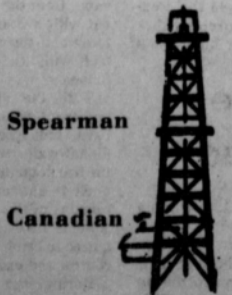
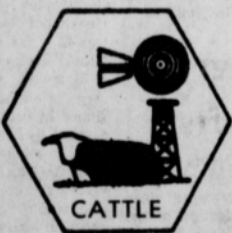
ticket. In addition to the food for the inner being, the court action afterward should be enough to more than satisfy any avid basketball fan.

IRS News

Taxpayers can receive their refunds faster by using the preaddressed peel-off label on their returns, the Internal Revenue Service said.
 The label, which appears on the cover of the tax package mailed to taxpayers, lists name, address and social security number.
 The IRS emphasized that if any information on the label is incorrect, the taxpayer should make corrections right on the label.
 Married taxpayers filing a joint return should check to see that two social security numbers appear on the label. If only one social security number is shown, the other spouse's number should be entered on the appropriate line.
 According to the IRS, taxpayers can also ensure a faster refund by mailing their return in the coded envelope also included with the tax package.

Mike Evans, noted Evangelist and Speaker will appear at the Spearman High School Auditorium on the evening of Tuesday, February 1st at 7: p.m.
 Evans is the Founder and Director of B'nai Yeshua, Inc., and evangelistic organization whose primary purpose is to present the "Good News" and, also, to present to the Jewish people that they too can believe in Yeshua Ha'Maschiach (Jesus the Messiah) as their Saviour and still retain their Jewish identity.
 Among his literary achievements, Evans is the author of Logos best seller Young Lions of Judah.
 Evans has travelled extensively throughout the U.S. and abroad as the keynote speaker at rallies, conventions and conferences. He has spoken at the World Conferences of the Full Gos-

pel Businessmen's Fellowship International (FGMFI) and is the Founder and National Coordinator of the Schechinah Conferences. The most recent conference was held in June of this year at USC in Los Angeles, where 800 Jewish believers met together for three days and nights under the theme of "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." Active in youth work, he had addressed crowds reaching 30,000.
 "In these local meetings it is our desire to minister to the entire community according to direct mandate from the scripture declaring, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." In this ministry, he says, "there are no gimmicks or tricks. Instead the sovereign and unpredictable Spirit of God falls upon individuals. They are Elden Allen, Sam Boone, Kyle Nollner, Trevor Williams, Todd Williams, Ty Williams are the local youth entered.

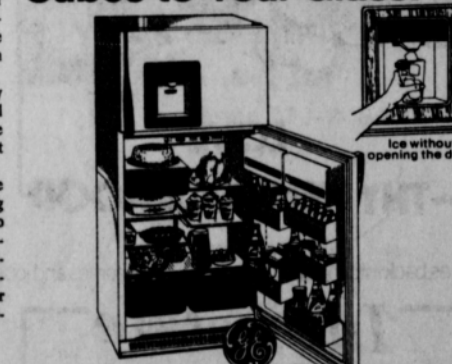
