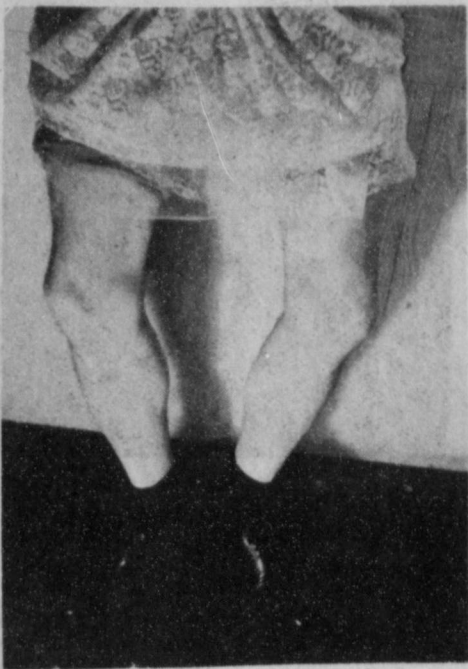

## Plans Presented For Co-Op Gasohol Plant

At a meeting held Tuesday night, Nov. 13, at the County Barn, the organizers Northwest Texas Grain Products Cooperative, a farm co-op for the production of fuel alcohol from grain, presented their plans for construction of a plant North of the Canadian river for this purpose. Present were about 45 interested farmers, some of whom were from other towns in the area.

The proposed plant will produce 20 million gallons of ethanol (grain alcohol) annually from 7 million bushels of grain, which will be subscribed by area farmers. Present economics indicate that a price substantially above current market levels could be achieved for grain-wheat, milo, or corn. Since the outlook for fuel prices is that they will continue to rise, the speakers contended that this would effectively tie grain production to a market which will keep pace with-or beat-inflation.

The present drive is to raise finances for a feasibility study on locating such a plant in this area, by collecting 5¢ per bushel from each farmer who joins the cooperative, for a minimum contract of 10,000 bushels. The organizers and temporary directors of the co-op, which was chartered by the State of Texas on October 3rd, are shooting for a goal of having sufficient funds on hand to initiate the feasibility study (required by the investment bankers who will be supplying a major part of the financing) by Dec. 1. Tommy Harbert of Dumas, temporary chairman, says the directors are very encouraged by the response to their efforts, and are optimistic that the Dec. 1 goal can be met. They will return to this area in the near future to make a progress report and allow opportunity for questions from interested farmers.

Those who sign up in each area where the program has been presented are asked to designate one of their number to serve on the temporary board. At the time the results of the feasibility study are received, there will be a meeting of all who have at that time become members, to elect a permanent board of directors, adopt by-laws, etc.

Designated from the Spearman area to serve as a director until that time is R. C. Porter, who says he will be happy to try to answer questions about this endeavor, and enroll members.

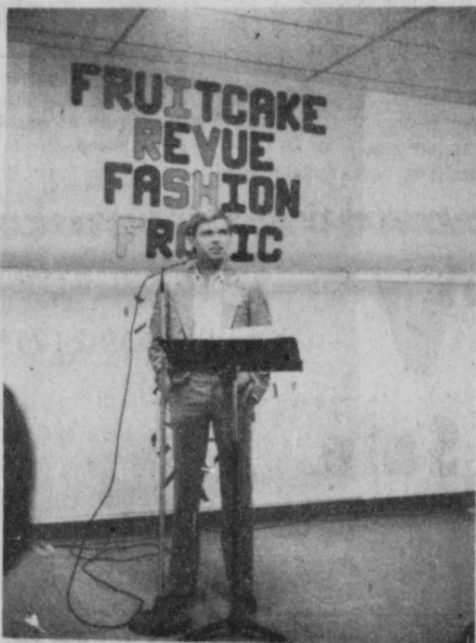

## Commissioners Vote For Appraisal Board Members

The Commissioners Court of Hansford County met Tuesday, November 13, instead of their regular meeting day of Monday, because of Veteran's Day Holiday.

They approved payment of bills, and heard the treasurer's report, and quarterly report.

There will be not meeting Nov. 26 because of a state judges meeting in Dallas which the majority of the court will attend. The next meeting will be Dec. 10.

They amended the budget to meet the District Attorney's request in the amount of \$19,072 instead of \$12,000 originally budgeted. The increase is due to the investigator for that office who has been paid previously by a state grant, must now be paid by counties in the District. 7% pay raises to employees, and increases in costs of operating the office.

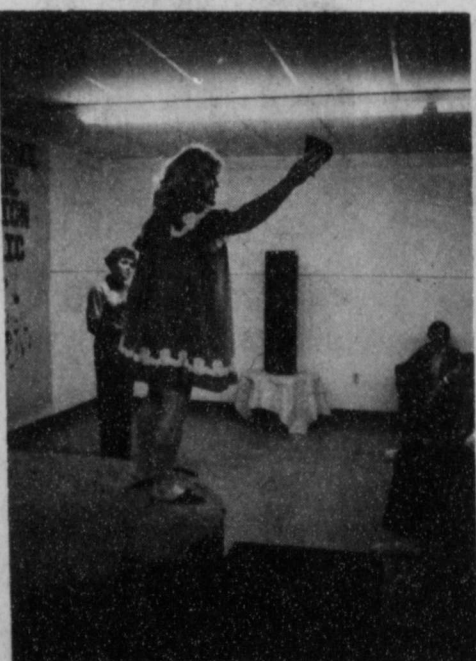
The considered and approved a jail contract with the City of Spearman.

They also approved an error & omission insurance policy for the County Clerk & District Clerk.

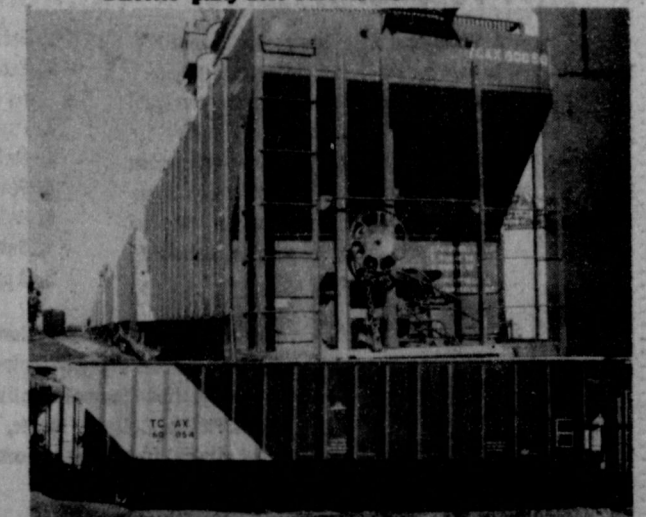

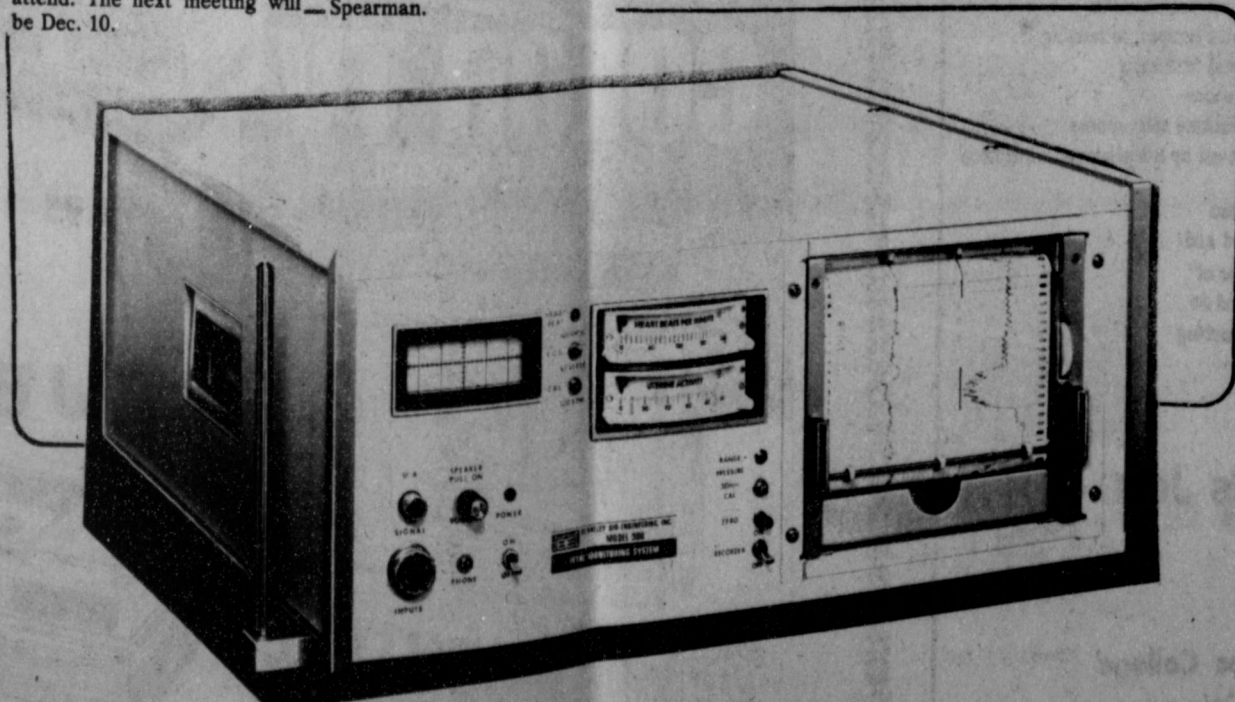

## City Sales Tax Rebate Received

The City of Spearman sales tax rebate from Bob Bullock, Comptroller of Public Accounts for October was in the amount of \$7,428.91. This compares to last year for this period of \$5,836.70.

The city has received checks totaling \$96,818.54 for 1979 payments to date compared to

\$94,144.79 for the same period last year, up 2%.

The City of Gruver received a check in the amount of \$2,159.04 for October sales, compared to \$1,088.66 for October last year. Total payments to Gruver to date are \$19,934.93 compared to \$17,405.22 for the same period last year, up 14%.

**Christmas Bazaar Is Dec. 1**

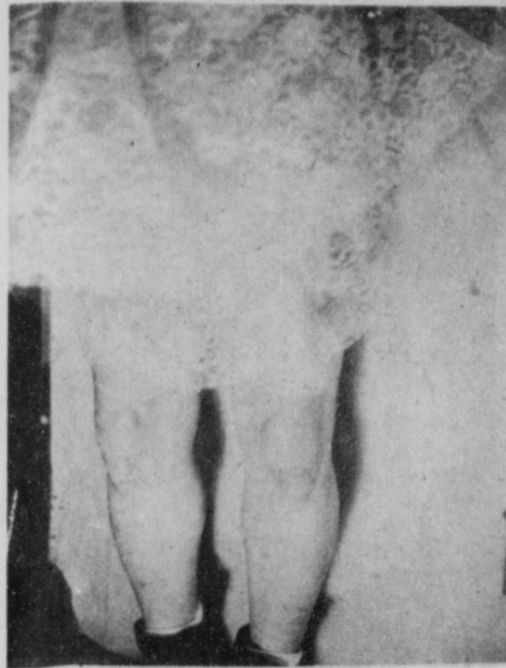

**Calico CowBelles RECIPES**

**SHAPE\* SEASON\* TOP GROUND MEAT FOR THRIFTY VERSATILITY**

Meals interspersed among those featuring steaks and chops cooked on the outdoor grill are usually planned with thrift in mind. Ground beef, the first choice of most homemakers for these menus, can provide variety, points out Reba Staggs, home economist with the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

**Beef Pepper Cups**

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 1 can (2 oz.) mushroom stems and pieces
- Milk
- 1/4 cup soft bread crumbs
- 2 tablespoons chopped onion
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 3 large green peppers
- 2 tsp. catsup
- 2 tsp. grated American cheese

Drain mushrooms, reserve liquid; add milk to make 1/2 cup. Combine with mushrooms, ground beef, bread crumbs, onion, egg, Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper. Cut peppers in half; remove ends and seeds. Pack meat mixture into pepper cups; place in a shallow pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 35 minutes. Combine catsup and cheese; spoon over meat. Continue baking 10 minutes. 6 servings.

**Hungarian Beef Rolls**

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 3 strips bacon
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
- 1/4 tsp. paprika

- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup coarsely grated potatoes
- 1 cup unsalted cooked rice
- 1 medium head cabbage
- 2 cups tomato juice

Cook bacon until crisp; drain and chop. Combine ground beef, salt, garlic salt, paprika, onion, potatoes, rice and bacon. Shape into 12 rolls. Remove core from cabbage and steam until leaves begin to wilt. Separate cabbage leaves and wrap each meat roll with a leaf. Place in frying-pan with bacon drippings and add tomato juice. Cover and simmer for 1 hour. 6 servings.

**Beef Patties with Tangy Sauce**

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 cup fine bread crumbs
- 2 tsp. grated onion
- 1/4 cup milk
- Lard or drippings
- 1/4 cup catsup
- 1 tsp. prepared mustard
- 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Combine beef, salt, pepper, bread crumbs, onion and milk.

Shape into 5 or 6 patties 3/4 to 1 inch thick. Lightly grease frying-pan with lard or drippings. Add patties and brown on both sides pouring off drippings as they collect in the pan. Turn frequently, allowing 10 to 15 minutes for cooking. Remove patties. Combine 2 tsp. drippings, catsup, mustard and Worcestershire sauce. Heat and serve. 5 to 6 servings.

**SWEETBREADS STAR IN GRILL AT LUNCHEON**

A hostess with a luncheon on her spring agenda enjoys serving an entree that's delicious and different enough to be a conversation piece. For such a woman, a grill with a highly prized variety meat is the answer.

Sweetbreads are delicate in flavor, tender in quality. They're so tender, in fact, that it's best to precook them in water with a little vinegar or lemon juice, advises Reba Staggs, meat authority with the National Live Stock and Meat Board. This not only firms the sweetbreads but helps them

retain their creamy whiteness. In this recipe they're broiled with bacon and peaches for contrast in flavor and texture.

**Sweetbread Grill**

- 1 pound sweetbreads
- 1 quart water
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. vinegar or lemon juice
- 4 canned cling peach halves
- Butter or margarine

- 8 slices bacon
- 1/4 cup cranberry sauce

Wash sweetbreads. Add water, salt, vinegar or lemon juice. Simmer 20 minutes. Drain. Remove membrane. Brush sweetbreads and peaches with butter or margarine. Place sweetbreads, peaches (cut side up) and bacon on broiler rack. Insert broiler pan and rack so sweetbreads are about 2 inches from heat. Broil 2 minutes, turn bacon. Continue broiling 2 to 3 minutes or until bacon is done and sweetbreads and peaches are lightly browned. Serve, filling peach halves with cranberry sauce. 4 servings.

**BEEF AND EGGPLANT COUPLE FOR DELICIOUS SUPPERTIME DISH**

Beef combines with many foods for delicious results. One pleasing pairing is ground beef with eggplant.

Although everyone knows the flavorsome goodness of ground beef, eggplant is less familiar to many. Yet this dark purple vegetable pleases palates too. When ground beef is coupled with eggplant in Mediterranean tradition, the meat usually stuffs eggplant halves, explains Reba Staggs, home economics authority for the National Live Stock and Meat Board. But the partnership is equally enchanting, she points out, when the ground beef is baked with eggplant slices.

**Beef and Eggplant Bake**

- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 2 tsp. flour
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp. oregano
- 2 cans (1 oz. each) tomato sauce

- 1 small eggplant, pared and cut crosswise into 1/2-inch slices
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Lightly brown ground beef, green pepper and onion. Pour off drippings. Stir flour, salt, pepper and oregano into beef mixture. Add tomato sauce. Boil eggplant in salted water until just tender, drain and arrange half the slices in a 2-quart greased baking dish. Add half the meat mixture and top with half the cheese. Repeat layers of eggplant, meat mixture and cheese. Bake in a slow oven (300 degrees F.) for 30 minutes. 8 servings.

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## Hightower Highlights

(WASHINGTON, D.C.) Congressman Jack Hightower (D-Tex.) this morning asked his colleagues in the Congress to support his efforts to commence immediate hearings concerning legislation he has authored that would clarify the Immigration and Nationality Act regarding the deportation of Iranian students.

H.R. 5813 by Hightower, who is Chairman of the Texas Democratic Delegation in the Congress, was the first piece of legislation submitted in the House addressing the specific issue of deportation of nonimmigration alien students. Tehre is a growing list of co-sponsors, which now totals 48 members of both parties in the House of Representatives.

In his speech on the floor today, Congressman Hightower stated that: "Questions have arisen concerning actions by the President and the Attorney General to ferret out Iranian students who might be subject to deportation under existing law."

"Those who are proven to be in the United States illegally, who lie about their immigration status and who do not report will be subject to deportation proceedings." Hightower noted that it is clearly the will of the great majority of the American people and the intent of the Administration to deal with the deportation of the Iranian students immediately, and not prolong the agony with long court proceedings.

"Yesterday I wrote to the House Judiciary Committee Chairman Peter Rodino asking that he commence hearings immediately on H.R. 5813." Hightower told his colleagues. "In view of the potential legal

test of the President's and Attorney General's recent actions pursuant to existing laws, I believe the hearings offer the best and most immediate forum for clearing the air on this admittedly complex issue and can lead to formulation of amendments to the Immigration and Nationality Act that can eliminate the threat of lawsuits and prevent prolonged court battles."

## IRS News

Dallas, Texas--Be prepared--that's good advice for taxpayers who plan to itemize on their 1979 tax returns. "By starting to gather records now, taxpayers can spend a little extra time organizing them and pay attention to deductible items they might overlook later," said A.W. McCanness, IRS Director for the Dallas District. "Sorting records into the categories--medical, interest, taxes, charitable contributions, employee expenses--will also enable taxpayers to locate supporting evidence which IRS auditors may request during an examination."

When itemizing, taxpayers should keep track of interest paid on loans and mortgages, as well as payments for medical insurance which are documented on various financial statements. These amounts are often deductible and easily overlooked by the taxpayer.

Medical expenses, union dues and charitable contributions are a few other commonly-claimed deductions for which IRS auditors often request supporting evidence. Mr. McCanness noted that it's a good idea to keep both cancelled checks and bills when possible. "Good recordkeeping is a fine start to filing an accurate tax return," McCanness said. "Gathering records now will enable taxpayers to file an early return, and, if a refund is due, get an early check from Uncle Sam."

## Brent Biles Appearing In Musical

WTSU--Music and dance will erupt on the stage of West Texas State University's Branding Iron Theatre for the first Panhandle staging of Steven Sondheim's "A Little Night Music" which will run from Wednesday, Nov. 14, through Sunday, Nov. 18.

The musical which has a score composed entirely of waltzes has been described as a "stylish celebration of romantic love."

The story essentially is a fairy tale for adults, set at the turn of the century, in the enchanted birch grove of Sweden inhabited by leisure-class people, whose most pressing problems revolve around their past, present and future affairs of the

heart. The musical is the result of a collaboration between Stephen Sondheim and Harold Prince. Their other credits include "West Side Story" and "A Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum."

Ingmar Bergman's 1956 film, "Smiles Of A Summer Night," one of the Swedish film maker's few comedies, is the basis of the musical's storyline.

Burt Rosevear, WTSU's new director of the Opera-Theatre Workshop, said that this production is a "maiden voyage" for many of those involved with it.

"A lot of firsts are going on with the Opera/Theatre Workshop," he said.

This will be the first WTSU production which will combine the artistic efforts of several WTSU faculty members. They include Debbie Bray, physical education instructor as choreographer; James Kemmerling, assistant professor of speech and theatre, as technical director; Dr. Gary Garner, professor of music, as orchestra director; and Dr. Larry Menefee, assistant professor of the Department of Speech and Theatre, as drama director.

Rosevear said that one of the feature songs of the musical, "Send In The Clowns," became commercially well-known after it was popularized by Songstress Judy Collins.

Other popular songs from the musical's score include "Remember," "Every Day A Little Death" and "It Would Have

Been Wonderful."

Performances for the play are at 8 p.m. Nov. 14, 15 and 16, and at 3 p.m. Nov. 17 and 18.

Tickets are \$4 general admission, \$2 for Friends of Fine Arts members, and free from WTSU students with valid identification cards.

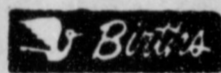
## Shop Early & Mail Early

Gary Evans of Gruver was named the Outstanding Conservation Farmer at the Hansford Bankers' Awards Banquet held Nov. 8 at 7:30 p.m. in the Gruver High School Cafeteria.

The First State Bank, Spearman and Gruver State Bank, Gruver, co-sponsored the banquet with Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District.

Rev. J.W. Duke gave the invocation.

Horace Curlee of the Gruver State Bank was master of ceremonies.

Entertainment was by the Spearman High School Celebrates.

Ray Ingle of the First State Bank gave the welcome with Dennis Stedje giving the response.

Richie Fletcher introduced the guests.

Adalyn Barnes, last year's Homemaker of the Year, presented this year's award to Pennyne Ralston.

Willard McCloy presented the award for outstanding Conservation Farmer to Gary Evans.

Elmo Dahl gave special presentations, and Keith Lamb introduced the speaker, Dan Baker.

Outstanding Conservation Farmer Gary Evans owns two sections of rangeland east of Gruver and he felt that he was not getting the most out of his land with the level of management he was using.

He requested assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program and developed a contract with the assistance of the local Soil Conservation Service Technicians.

A bad wash across part of the land was controlled by critical area shaping and seeding.

Cross fences were constructed to divide two pastures into five. A water storage facility was installed to provide plenty of clean fresh livestock water in a portion of the ranch that was an excessive distance from water.

Gary initiated a high intensity low frequency planned grazing system which allowed each pasture to be grazed four months and rested eight months each year. The rest period came at a different time of the year for each rest. The high intensity grazing caused stock to eat less

palatable plants, and the long rest periods allowed more palatable plants a better growth medium.

By following his planned system of grazing for the past several years he has improved the grasses on the ranch, increased beef production, and improved the wildlife situation on his ranch.

Homemaker of the year, Pennyne (Mrs. Dan) Ralston, wife and mother of two children, has been actively involved in the betterment of home and family life through Extension Homemaker Club work for six years. Pennyne has exhibited outstanding qualities of devotion, trust and leadership in this community through her active involvement in church, social and service projects.

A member of the Extension Home Economics Family Living Committee, Pennyne has played a major role in planning, organizing and conducting parenting workshops, clothing construction workshops, home tours, health, housing and clothing seminars.

As Chairman of the Hansford County Extension Homemaker's Council, Pennyne has worked to provide a 4-H Scholarship, train volunteer leaders and increase membership in an organization that strives to improve home and family living. She has assumed responsibilities in her club and on the County level, serving as Vice Chairman, program, education and finance committee chairman. She was elected to represent Hansford County homemakers on the District and State level at the Texas Extension Homemaker's Association.

A devoted member of the First Christian Church, Pennyne is currently serving as worship chairman of the Christian Women's Fellowship, Deaconess, and Outreach Chairman. She has served as First Vice President of Rho Rho social sorority.

This year we salute Mrs. Ralston as Homemaker of the Year for her continued interest, time and support of home and community life, and for her belief that the home is truly our hope in a changing world.

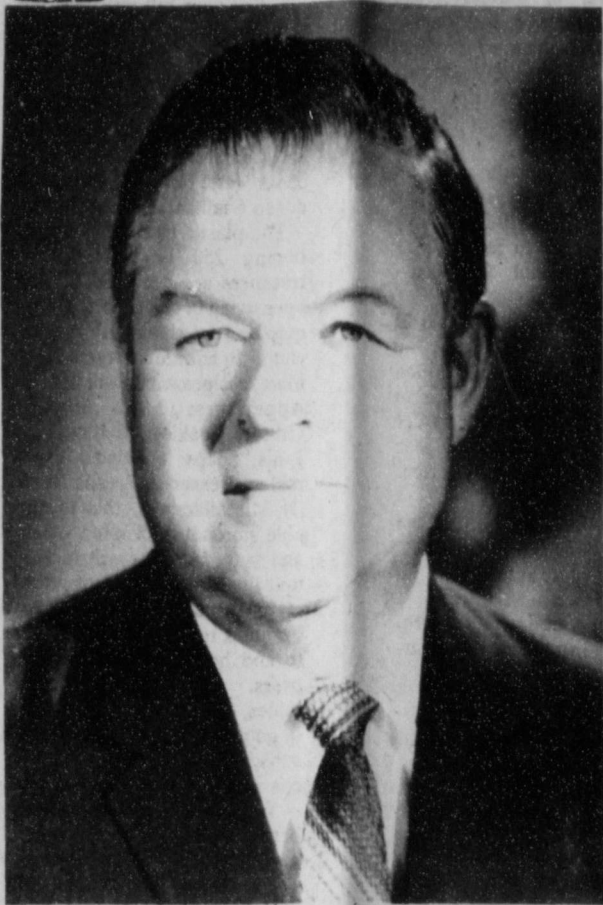

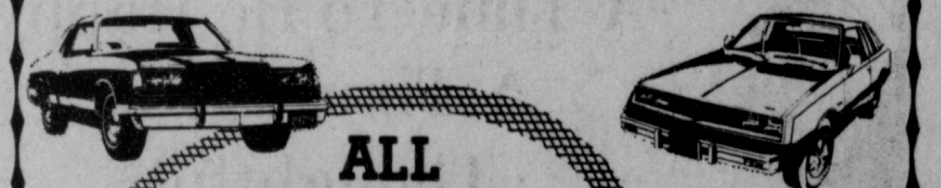

the board approved the 5 new members of the tax district.

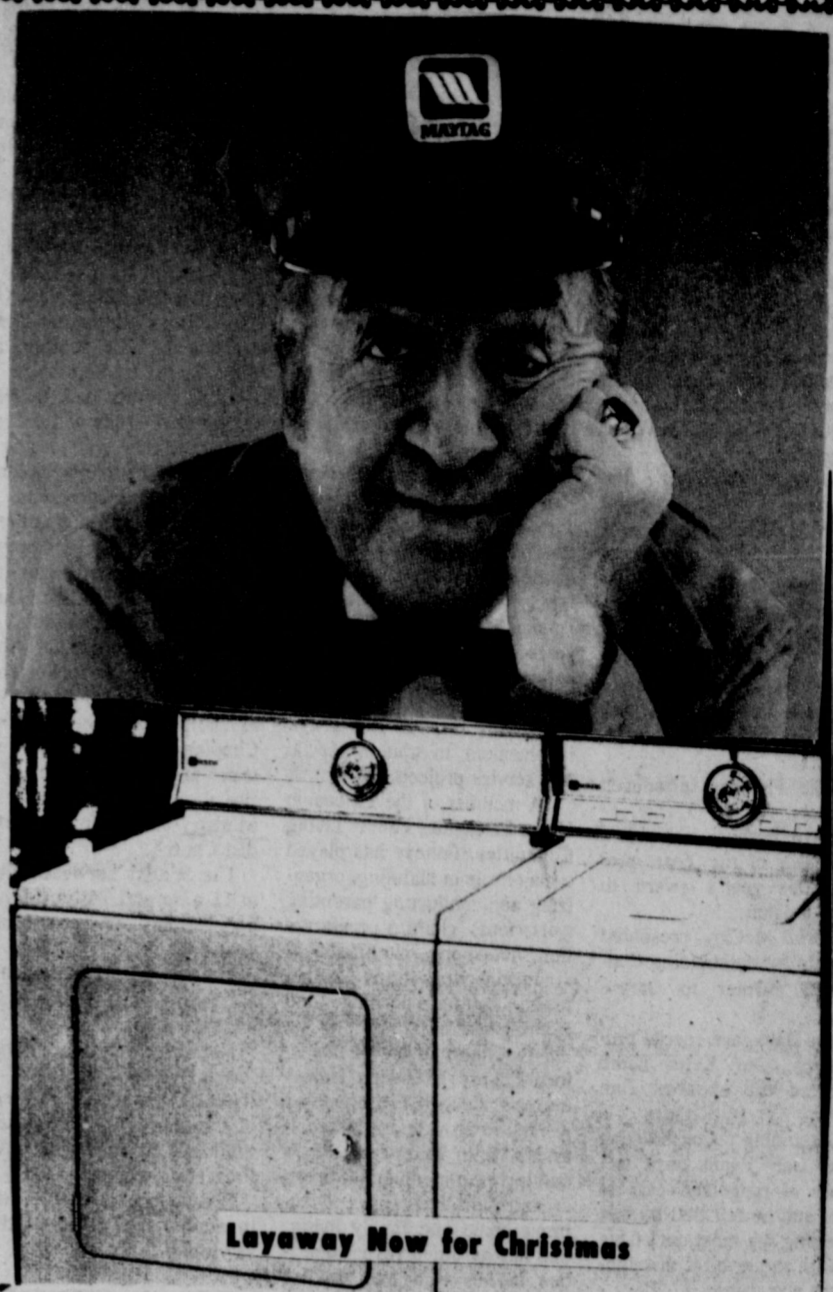
