## Sheriff Issues Statement

Hansford County Sheriff R. L. McFarlin, in response to a letter to the editor published in The Spearman Reporter April 28, 1977, asking why Department of Public Safety personnel have left Spearman and raising other questions, authorized the following answers.

In reference to John Sims, he informed me that he wanted to go to Childress because he had some friends in Oklahoma which Childress is near.

In reference to Joe Sanders, he is now on special assignment with the Department of Public Safety which would have been impossible for him to do had he been living in Spearman.

County officials furnished DPS personnel with radio equipment, citizen's band radio and other equipment

DPS asked for. I know of no single item that DPS asked for that they did not receive from Hansford County.

State taxes, paid by everyone in Texas, paid for all other costs of DPS personnel stationed in Spearman other than those items provided by Hansford County which I have noted.

I might take this opportunity to point out that Hansford County Sheriff's Department personnel are as highly trained and as qualified in their areas of law enforcement as are DPS personnel.

DPS responsibility ends when a ticket is issued. Court procedures are then followed to determine disposition of the alleged offense.

## New Doctor Coming To Spearman

The Hansford Plainsman interviewed Jerry Taylor, the Hansford Hospital Administrator, and Dr. Myun Ho Cho, concerning Mrs. Cho's move to Spearman for the purpose of setting up a practice.

Dr. Joseph E. Swanton of the Delta Community Hospital and Health Center in Mound Bayou, Mississippi, introduced Dr. Cho in a letter to Jerry Taylor. Dr. Swanton is an Obstetrician-Gynecologist and a member of the Fellow American College of Gynecology. His renown in Mississippi can only add credence to his recommendation of the OB department of the Delta Health Center, and that she is very capable, affable, extremely industrious, always punctual and always friendly to her patients, sending his regards with her peers. **SAFETY TIPS**  
from your **POLICE DEPARTMENT**  
According to No. 344: Any bicycle that is driven or ridden on the public streets of Spearman after sundown or before sunrise shall be equipped and in working order with a front headlight that will illuminate the road ahead of the bicycle for a distance of at least 20 feet, rear red taillight that can be seen from a distance of at least 100 feet from the rear of the bicycle, and a rear red reflector at least 2 inches in diameter.  
Any person violating these provisions shall be fined up to \$100.00.

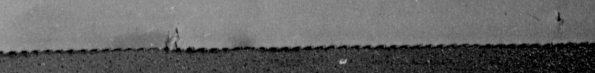

### Gas + Kids - Dangers

Since the gas shortage and consequent hoarding of gasoline, the rate of gasoline-caused burns in children has skyrocketed. Last summer this resulted in a number of extensive burns to children who found and spilled gasoline.

Research has shown that children are less apt to note the distinctive odor than the distinctive taste of gasoline and thus, fail to be warned of its potential dangers. It is also hazardous to breathe the fumes from the fuel.

In fact, what makes gasoline so dangerous is that the fumes as well as the liquid are combustible. Gasoline vapor expands and tends to fill all the available space in a container. The pressure

can split the seams of an unvented can or plastic vessel, but the vapors can even leak from a vented "safety" can. All that is needed are sparks from a light switch, electrical appliance, car ignition, or a short in the tail-light or brake-light circuit combined with the fumes to trigger an explosion. The explosive power of one gallon of gasoline equals that of 14 sticks of dynamite.

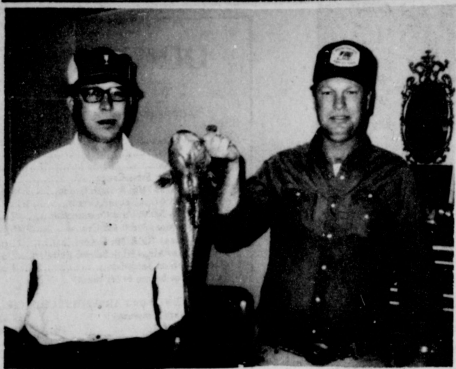

# SISD Self-Study Planning Program Started

The Spearman Independent School District, as a participant in a statewide program for select school districts, has begun its self-study planning program designed to continue and upgrade Texas, and for those districts affected, Southern Association accreditation.

The self-study procedure, which is in no way a reflection on the existing educational levels in Spearman schools, has been mandated by the Texas Education Agency, Supt. James Cunningham of Spearman High School pointed out in his announcement of the start of the program which eventually will involve a large segment of the population of Spearman.

Initial activities included the appointment of various committees.

Cunningham is chairman of an 11-member steering committee composed of staff members, students, SISD board members and community residents.

Working under direction of the steering committee are such other committees as:

- A Schools and Community Committee of 13 members
- A Philosophy and Goals Committee of 11 members
- A Needs Assessment Committee of 13 members
- A Schools and Community Committee of 13 members

with Miss Dorothy Roden as chairman.

A Needs Assessment Committee of 13 members with Terry Schneider as chairman.

A Philosophy and Goals Committee of 11 members with Buddy Benton as chairman.

Cunningham noted that all committees are now functioning and in the near future inquiries in the form of questionnaires will be distributed throughout the community, some taken home to parents by students, others by mail throughout the business and residential community in the city, with questions designed to determine the thinking of the public as to their opinion of the level of education offered through Spearman schools.

Cunningham urged everyone receiving such an inquiry to complete it and return it as soon as possible in order for the results to be tabulated.

Results obtained will then be used by other committees

in future activities in connection with the self-study program.

As an example, the School and Community Committee will be seeking basic data regarding students, the community and related to agencies affecting education in the community.

The Needs and Assessment Committee will be obtaining information regarding the status of students in relation to the district goals and for putting the data in a form suitable for use by the curriculum committee.

The Philosophy and Goals Committee will get data which will enable it to develop a set of learner goals and goal indicators describing the district's purposes.

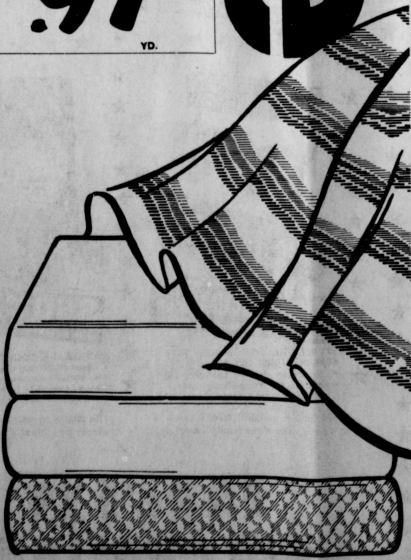
