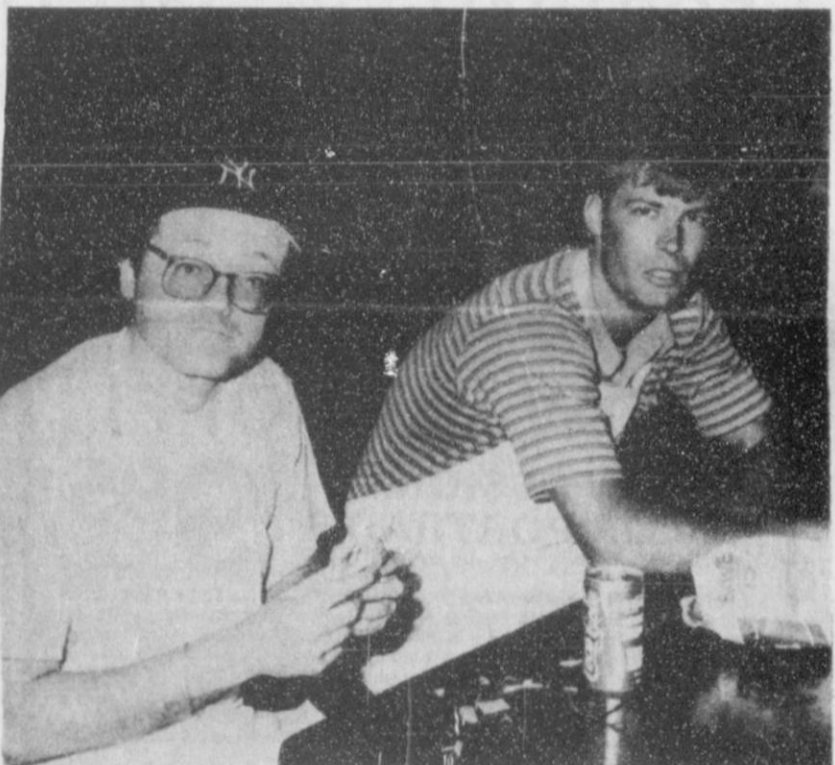

Pledge and Invocation.



Lee Story will be in Hansford County

At its quarterly meeting in Austin the 1986 Texas Sesquicentennial Commission officially accepted plans for the celebration of the states 150th year as a republic and sanctioned Texas Independence Communités, including Hansford County.

The Texas Centennial had a statewide exposition in Dallas in 1936. Several people from Hansford County went by train, including Ruby Jo Wilbanks and Virginia Head and others in Hansford County who are active on the Sesquicentennial Committee.

The Texas Sesquicentennial will be observed in each county permitting more Texans to have a part in their history. Hansford County will have their own set of specific plans for observances during 1986.

Lee Story, Texas Sesquicentennial Commission program officer for West Texas stated the plans have included events sponsored by groups such as chambers of commerce, historical societies, school districts and professional and civic organizations.

As scheduled now Storey will

be in Hansford County in September to present official flags and documents of sanction declaring Hansford County, Texas has a Texas Independence County.

On September 29 Storey will direct a regional workshop for all Texas Independence Community committee representatives. The workshop will update the committees on statewide observances planned, assist committees in developing and implementing plans, and allow community representatives to visit with their representatives regarding their plans for area coordination and cooperation. The workshop will be sponsored by the Amarillo Sesquicentennial Committee and be held at the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum in Canyon.

The next meeting of the Hansford Sesquicentennial Committee will be at the Lutheran Church (6 miles west of Gruver on SH 15, North on 1262 to FM 2349 then west one mile) Tuesday night August 21 at 7:30 p.m. Albert Graves said he would have his van in the Court House parking lot at 7 p.m. if anyone would like to ride with him.

Two-Bit Sermons

Baptism

In Acts 2:38 it says, "repent and be baptized". These four words have been the reason for many arguments and will be responsible for many more. Even in my own family the argument frequently arose. Does baptism help save a man. My answer is always no! Again baptism is a work carried out by man and if a man can earn his salvation by righteous acts, then unrighteous acts by that man can lose his salvation.

Ephesians 2:9 says "Not of works lest any man should boast." No man is capable of working for his own salvation. Not even to help keep it. Gal. 3:11 states that "no man is justified by the law (or works) in sight of God." Romans 3:20, "Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in his sight." Romans 3:28, "Man is justified by Faith." Never in scripture is a man justified or even kept (in

salvation) by the act of Baptism. Even in Ephesians 1:13 says we are sealed by the Holy Spirit not salvation. Baptism does not even seal salvation. Baptism is an outward showing of an inward action. That action is repentance.

Acts 8:26-39 is the story of Phillip and the Ethiopian Eunuch. This man after accepting Christ as Savior was baptized. Verse 37 says that he was already a believer and saved. Acts 2:38 says repent and be baptized. This a biblical command to be baptized once a man is born again. Even Acts 2 does not teach baptism for Salvation. Act 2:41, 44, 47, 21, "whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved.

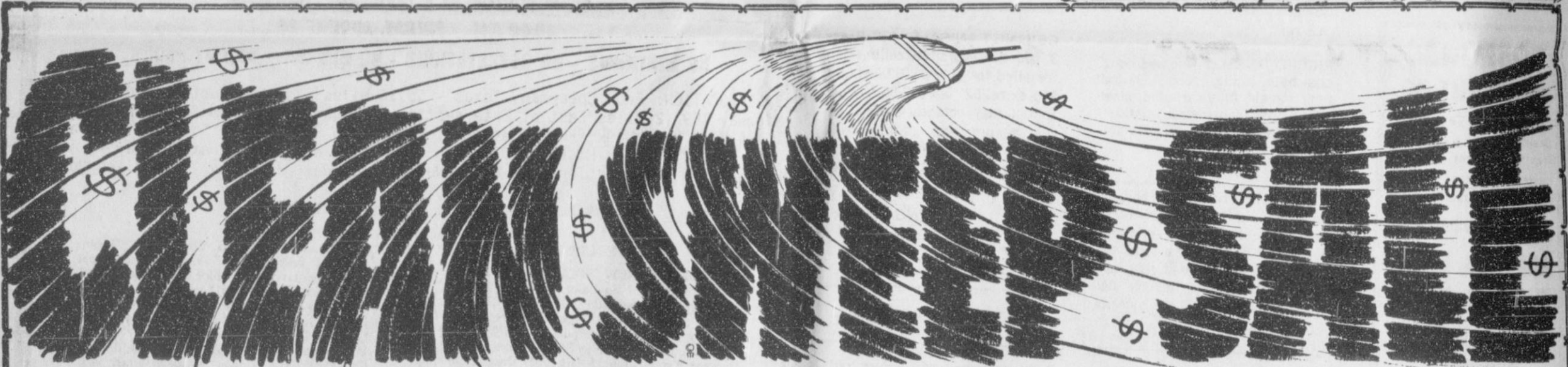

New running policy at YMCA

The fitness community was shocked last month when world crown running writer Jim Fixx died while on an afternoon run near his house in New England. Since Fixx died at only 52 years of age many people began to question the belief that running was good for you and promoted health and longer life. These fears did not bother local YMCA Director, Winn Crenshaw, who told the Reporter that he still stands behind America's need for physical exercise in general, and running in particular. "In fact, Jim Fixx's death confirmed the Y's stand for aerobic exercise," Crenshaw stated. Crenshaw said that Fixx's running probably did extend his life rather than shorten it as was feared as news of his death began to spread. Crenshaw explained that Mr. Fixx had a family history of cardiovascular disease and that his dad had had his first heart attack at 35 and died at age 42 from another attack. Several males in Mr. Fixx's family had died in their 40's from heart disease. Probably the fact that Mr. Fixx lived to be 52 was a testimony of running giving him a longer life, rather than shorter.

Crenshaw went on to explain that another factor in Jim Fixx's

death was that he strongly refused to visit a doctor on a regular basis. "The newspapers have reported that Fixx had not been to the doctor in several years. At the Y we encourage people to see their doctor regularly and especially before beginning an exercise program," Crenshaw said.

In reaction to the concern about participant safety, the Y in

Spearman has established a new policy concerning fitness class participation. Starting with this falls quarter, any person wanting to participate in a Y fitness class who is over 35 years old must either bring a signed form from their doctor permitting their participation or go through the Y's fitness evaluation program. This program evaluates the person's aerobic endurance, checks blood pressure, measures body composition, and measures muscle endurance. The procedure lasts approximately one hour and cost \$5.00 for anyone who is in a fitness class.

Crenshaw stated that physical fitness seems to stop a positive correlation to a longer, fuller life and encourages every apparently healthy adult in Hansford County to participate in a program of some sort.

Supt. Cunningham explains new school laws

In previous articles we have shown how H.B. 72 may effect parents and students in certain areas. We have shown how the bill involves extracurricular activities as well as changes to be made in grade reports to parents and the elimination of final exam exemption.

The new law states we will not have social promotions in the future Driver Education state funding has been discontinued. Funding for this program must, therefore, be provide by the local district and the students.

The law speaks to these two areas as follows:

Section 21.721. Grade Requirement for advance or course credit. (a) A district may not grant social promotions. Students may be promoted only on the basis of academic achievement.

(b) A student who has not maintained a grade average for a school year equivalent to at least 70 on a scale of 100 may not be advanced from one grade level to the next.

(c) A student who has not maintained a grade average for a course equivalent to at least 70 on a scale of 100 may not be given credit for the course.

(d) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules prescribing alternatives to social promotion for students who are consistently unable to be promoted because of poor academic achievement, and a district may provide for those students in accordance with the board rules, provided that the parent, guardian, or person having lawful control of the student participates in the deliberations.

The State Board of Education will develop rules regarding promotion of students at the elementary grades and alternatives to social promotions for students who do not meet the standards prescribed in law and board rules.

The use of a grade of 70 on a scale of 100 for determination of whether students may be advanced from on grade level to the next or receive credit in a course applies to grades 1-12.

Districts may convert numerical scores to letter grades for reporting purposes if they desire.

Section 1. Section 16.177, Education Code, is transferred to Sub-chapter D, Chapter 21, Education Code, is renumbered, and is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 21.102. Driver Education. (a) The Central Education Agency shall develop a program of organized instruction in driver education and traffic safety for public school students who are 15 years of age or older.

(b) With the approval of the State Board of Education, the commissioner of education shall establish standards for the certification of professional and paraprofessional personnel who conduct the programs in the public schools.

State funds to school districts for driver education programs are being discontinued effective the 1984-85 school year. However, school districts may continue to offer programs of organized instruction in driver education and traffic safety for public school students who are 15 years of age or older.

Under existing Section 20.53 (a) (11), which is unchanged, school districts may require payment of fees for driver education courses, provided that such fees shall not exceed the average statewide cost per student in the programs for the prior school year or the actual district cost per student in such programs for the current year, whichever is less. For school year 1984-85, districts may use \$145 as the average statewide cost.
