

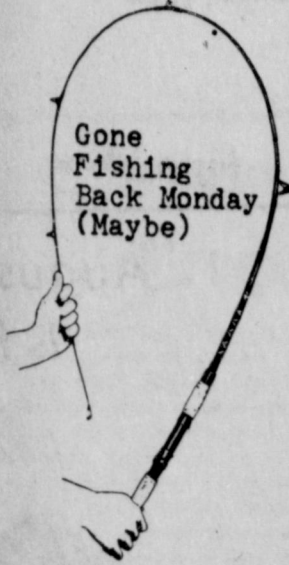


SHOWERS OF FASHION--Top winners in the Junior I bracket of the District 1 4-H Fashion Revue display the outfits they entered. From left

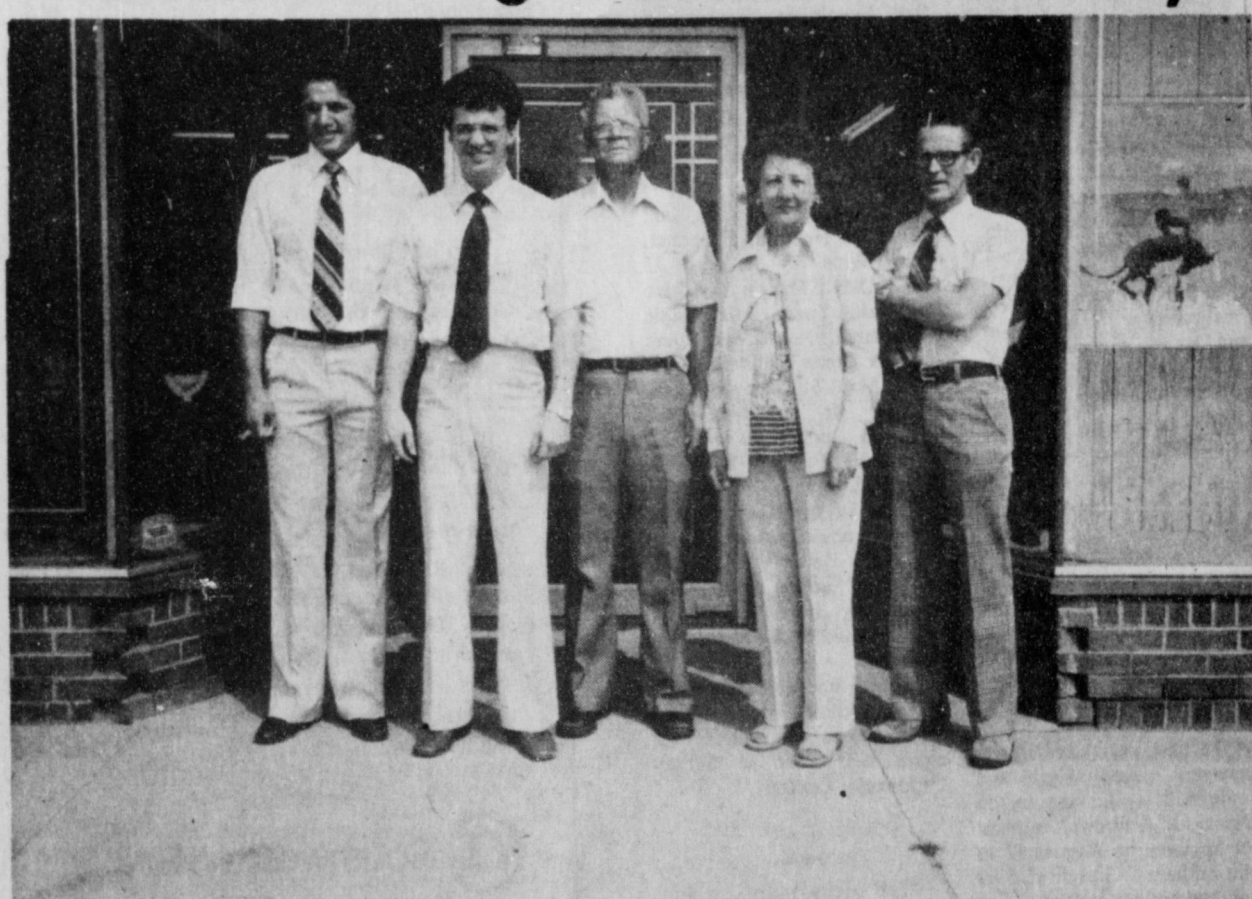

THOUGHT YOU WOULD LIKE TO KNOW

The Oil Dailey of March 16, 1979 makes the suggestion that controls be imposed on milk prices. To implement these controls, the government would, of course, have to set up a "Council on Wholemilk Stability and Mandatory Intrastate Lowfat Controls (COMS MILC)." The Council would then in all probability establish the following Price Control rules:

1. Old Milk - any milk produced from a cow born on or before December 31, 1972. The milk can be sold at the May 1973 price adjusted for inflation.
2. New Milk - any milk produced from a cow born on or after January 1, 1973. This milk can sell for the September 1975 price adjusted for inflation.
3. Stripper milk - any milk produced from a cow that makes less than 10 pints a day or alternately any milk produced by a group of cows that graze at a density of less than 10 per acre. This milk can sell at the 1970 uncontrolled price.
4. "New" new milk - any milk produced by a cow born after May 31, 1979 that grazes 2- 1/2 miles from another cow or in a ravine a thousand feet deeper than the nearest cow. This milk can sell at the June 1, 1979 uncontrolled price adjusted for inflation.

TIPS FOR THE OLDER DRIVER

About 8% million, or nearly 8% of all U. S. drivers are over the age of 65. More than one million of these older drivers were involved in motor accidents last year. Here are some suggestions for older drivers to consider:

If your eyes do not adjust well to night driving, limit your driving to the daytime. If your hearing is not quite as keen as it used to be, you will need to be especially alert. Keep your window cracked open and your radio down. If you get tired easily, take only short trips. If emergency situations and heavy traffic frighten or confuse you,

avoid driving during rush hours. Driving requires complete attention. On long drives, take frequent rest periods or change drivers regularly. Use seat belts EVERY TIME you ride.

Recognize that certain medications may make you an unsafe driver temporarily. Ask your doctor if any medication might make you sleepy or dizzy or blur your vision. If the answer is "Yes" or even "Possibly" don't drive while using them.

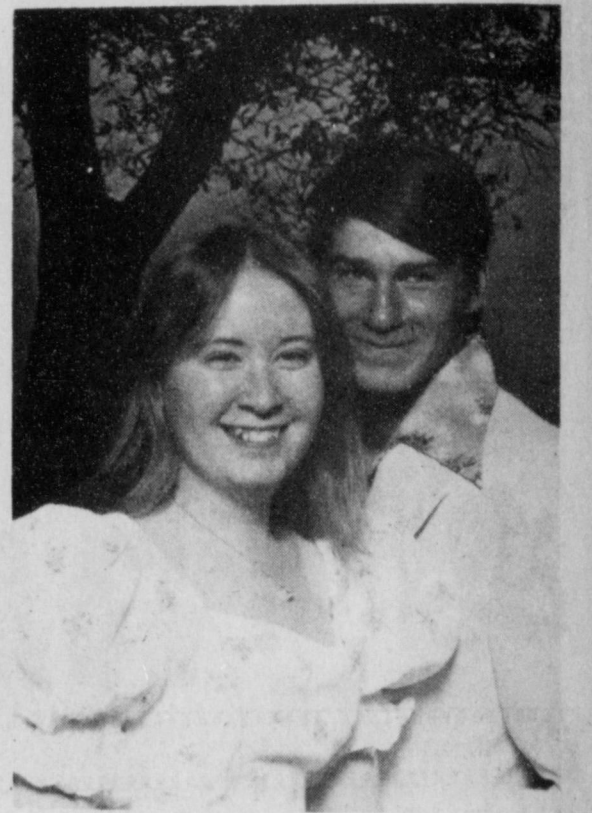

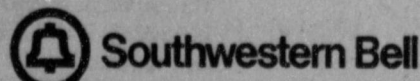

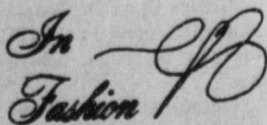

Cell Chemical Can Help Cancer

DENTON, (16) -- A cell chemical that may improve the chances of persons prone to cancer has been found at North Texas State University, a scientist there disclosed today.
Dr. David A. Busbee, Director of the Genetics Center and Associate Professor of Biology at the University, told an interviewer he believes a protein cell component discovered "by accident" in his laboratory can lower the abnormal level of an enzyme, AHH (aryl hydrocarbon hydroxylase) in patients with lung cancer and perhaps other types of cancer caused by hydrocarbons similar to those found in cigarette smoke.
Dr. Busbee and his colleagues, whose research was supported by the American Cancer Society, previously found that AHH was responsible for breaking down such hydrocarbons as benzopyrene and benzantracene into other compounds believed to be responsible for producing cancer.
Tests on tissues from lung cancer patients at U.S. Veterans Hospitals indicated high levels of AHH. Patients with other ailments had lower levels of AHH. And cigarette smokers in both groups had relatively high levels of the enzymes.
Dr. Busbee believes that these AHH differences are controlled by genetics and persons with higher AHH levels may be more prone to cancer. Other studies have shown that some kinds of cancer "run in families." One such study followed a family for several generations, reporting that do date more than half of all blood relatives developed cancer.
The discovery of a relationship of AHH to lung cancer may pave the way to devising a diagnostic test for finding lung cancer earlier while there is some chance for cure. It could also be useful in screening those among cigarette smokers who are at a higher than average risk of getting lung cancer.
The cell component that inhibits AHH or reduces its activity was discovered by Dr. Busbee as an accidental offshoot of a three-year search for a relationship between breast cancer and estrogen production which turned out to be negative.
