### 36 EMT Students At Half Way!

It's "half way" for the 36 dedicated Emergency Medical Technician Trainees! These unusual community servants have been meeting weekly at the Spearman High School and are looking forward to an April completion of their strenuous course of study.

In addition to their weekly stint of intensive three hour classroom study the 36 are required to obtain a minimum of 40 "In Hospital" clinic hours actually assisting in various Emergency techniques and procedures.

Three area Hospitals have welcomed the 36 students with

open arms: they are Ochiltree General, in Perryton, North Plains Hospital in Borger and North West Texas Hospital in Amarillo. The trainees journey to these cooperating hospitals each weekend to fulfill the stringent course requirements. The course is being coordinated and taught by an outstanding instructor... Harry Vermillion of Frank Phillips College. He's ably assisted by Spearmanite Keith Hutton, an EMT Instructor and Para Medic.

In addition to the Classroom instruction and practical work, and the clinical training in the

area Hospitals, each of the 36 trainees will have to participate in two CODE 3 Ambulance runs.

The Texas Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System has been rated Federally as the outstanding Regional EMS program in the United States. The Panhandle systems serves a twenty five county area in a vast medical communication system.

# Houston Show

Twenty three 4-H members from Hansford County and 25 FFA members from Spearman will be participating in the 1979 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, Feb. 21-March 4. With more than 27,800 expected livestock entries, the Houston Show will once again be the largest in the world.

For junior exhibitors throughout the state, the Houston Show is the culmination of a year's hard work of preparing their animals for the toughest of show ring competition. It is hard work that often pays off: open show and junior exhibitors will vie for more than half a million dollars in prize monies and premium action prices above market value.

From a spectator's point of view, the young exhibitors are center-stage in a two-week extravaganza that begins when Houston, the fastest growing city in the nation, takes a step backwards in time and brings a bit of western heritage to its busy streets.

Horses, buckboards and stagecoaches take to the concrete and businessmen don western hats and boots to welcome the largest civic event in the history of this bustling oil and space flight capital.

More than 6,000 trailriders journeying as far as 380 miles will join city officials and bands as the annual rodeo parade winds through the canyons of downtown streets at 9:15 a.m. on Friday, February 23.

Horses, buckboards and stagecoaches take to the concrete and businessmen don western hats and boots to welcome the largest civic event in the history of this bustling oil and space flight capital.

Following the parade, the action moves farther out Main Street to the Astrodome and the adjoining Livestock Exposition Facilities where the rodeo opens with a matinee performance in the Astrodome at 2 p.m.

The livestock show begins a week earlier with open show competition on February 21. Professional breeders and ranch owners from some 35 states will bring in the best in breeding stock to compete in breeding beef, dairy, swine, poultry, sheep, Angora goat and rabbit shows.

The Houston Show is a showcase of the livestock industry and cattlemen from Europe, Mexico, Central and South America plan to attend the open show to get a look at the best in stock. In 1977, hundreds of international visitors from 28 countries registered with show officials and the number expected for 1979 International Day, February 21-25, is expected to be even larger.

Horse show activities will fill the 4.3 acre Abercrombie Arena, adjacent to the livestock exposition building (Astrohall).

With 2,600 horses entered in the nine shows, the horse show must run 16 days, beginning on February 17, in order to accommodate all classes. In addition, the third annual horse judging contest in expecting 800 contestants for competition on February 22.

Junior show exhibitors take over the 22.3 acre livestock exposition facility for the second week of the livestock show, with judging beginning on March 2. Each exhibitor knows he is up against the best in livestock, with much riding on the decision of the most experienced livestock judges in the nation.

Junior shows include breeding beef heifers, dairy, breeding sheep, Angora goats, beef and dairy scramble heifers, commercial steers, breeding rabbits, market lambs, market poultry, market swine and market steers, including a carcass contest.

In addition to the premium awards and trophies, exhibitors of market animals know that a grand championship in their market division at Houston can translate into the stake for a future cattle herd or college diploma.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo holds the world's record for prices paid for three junior market animals—Grand Champion Lamb, \$19,500; Grand Champion Turkey, \$13,005; and Grand Champion Pen of Broilers, \$18,000.

More importantly, community involvement and civic support from thousands of individuals and businesses alike combine to assure junior exhibitors that their animals selling in the market auctions will bring premium prices. Show officials estimated that 35 percent of animals entered in market competition make the auction sales.

Thousands of junior exhibitors are also competing in livestock and dairy judging contests where their knowledge of animals can win calf purchase certificates worth \$275 toward the purchase of a purebred, registered beef or dairy heifer.

For the 1979 rodeo, 388 boys, including 48 from Spearman, will be participating in beef and dairy calf scrambles as part of rodeo action in the Astrodome.

More than just a crowd-pleasing rodeo event, the calf scramble offers winning boys the opportunity to earn a calf purchase certificate worth \$275.

With the top 40 winners of the livestock and dairy judging contest, calf scramble winners participate in a special year-long program that stresses education and responsibility. It concludes with special show ring competition at the following year's show.

Spectators at the 1979 rodeo, February 23 thru March 4, will again be treated to top flight rodeo competition. Cowboy champions will be matched against rodeo's toughest stock with the richest purse in American rodeo riding on the outcome.

For the final performance of the rodeo on March 4, the top finalists in each event will compete in Houston rodeo finals for additional prize money, trophy saddles and the coveted title of Houston All Around Cowboy on the line. In 1978, rodeo contestants split more than \$172,000 in prize money. Rodeo fans can always count on the top cowboys and barrel racers making a stop at the Astrodome.

Also on hand is a spectacular line up of television and recording stars to perform at the rodeo. The line up includes the stars rodeo fans most want to see and they hold more gold records than is usually found in Fort Knox.

**CRIME TO EASE BURGLAR'S TASK**



One city has reversed the trend toward rising crime rates against businesses. Oakland, California has made it a crime for a businessman not to burglar-proof his establishment. The result has been a drastic reduction in burglaries. Requirements include non-removable door hinges; force and pick resistant locks; heavy screens on rear and side windows; anti-break-in skylights and transoms; and burglar alarm systems. Penalty for non-compliance is up to six months in jail and a \$500 fine. The success of the program has gone far beyond any expectations. Burglaries are dropping at the rate of 8 percent a year against commercial businesses while everywhere else in the country, these statistics are rising steeply. In a study of 34 businesses that did not comply with the regulations, in 169 burglaries, 148 points of entry would have been closed off if the owners did comply.
