

HUD housing for Hansford

Better living conditions habitation-wise - particularly for the elderly - are coming to Hansford county in a two-fold program of rent-payment assistance to the tenants and a structure rehabilitation program for property owners.

It is a part of a program for 26 counties in the Texas Panhandle administered for "HUD" by the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation (TPCAC) headquartered at Amarillo.

The rent payment assistance program is the HUD Existing Section Eight Housing Assistance Payment Program for those of low-income, the elderly, disabled or handicapped.

Tenants participating in this program will pay a portion of the monthly rent according to their income and the program will pay the balance of the monthly rental amount directly to the owner. This is on a 12-month contractual basis renewable each 12-month period subject to the eligibility of the tenant and the standards of the structural housing involved.

No greater qualification standards shall be imposed than those involved in the initial contract agreement. Realizing there are many rental housing units in every community across the nation that are sub-standard due to a low rental income level that barely allows maintenance and a small profit, the federal government -- through HUD and its various administrative agencies at the area levels -- have designed a program to aid owners of these rental units to upgrade them thereby upgrading the comfort and general living standards of the tenants.

First in this program are the standards. An interested property owner can obtain information regarding these standards, determine the needs of his property in their light and arrange financing for the structural rehabilitation work.

In return for this action, the federal program offers attractive incentives.

The first is a rent increase. In the rent assistance program outlined at the beginning of this article, rent amount levels are fixed by the program. In the rehabilitation program, incentives include rents at 120 to 132 percent of the normal allowable level. This increase is not imposed on the tenant. It is paid to the rehabilitation program property owner by the federal agency.

A second incentive is a 15-year guarantee of rental assistance payments by the agency to the property owner with annual adjustments for increases in cost of operation and maintenance with certain tax incentives due to the length of the assistance program contract.

It sums up that the property owner arranges his or her own financing for the rehabilitation work and HUD, through the program, pays back the amount financed for the rehabilitation expenses including whatever the prevailing interest rate is at the time of closing.

There is an added benefit to the community being touted. All contractors in the Panhandle are welcomed by the agency to submit bids to owners whose application and proposal for the program has been accepted. Minority contractors are especially encouraged to participate in this program.

One added guarantee to the property owner participating in rehabilitation of rental units is that the agency will continue to refer eligible renters from its lists for any units vacant during the entire 15-year period.

McClellan and Vera Beth McClellan; 1962-1981 Sheila Patterson Watley and Gaye Daniel Woolley. A reception will follow the service, hosted by the United Methodist Women.

A 10:00 A.M. Sunday Worship service will be conducted by J. Waid Griffin preaching. A covered dish dinner will be

held immediately following the worship service at approximately 11:30 A.M.

A tour of Old Hansford will begin at 2:30 P.M. Participants are to meet at the church at 2:30. J. B. Buchanan will give a brief introduction to participants about Old Hansford, sharing a map of the community and highlighting points which may be observed when the group travels west to the site of Old Hansford. At Old Hansford the group will find placards noting the homes, businesses, school, church and other important buildings as it was at the turn of the century.

Police officers, Sunday, considered a domestic disturbance but when it was discovered that the incident occurred at Borger, the parties involved were referred to authorities there.

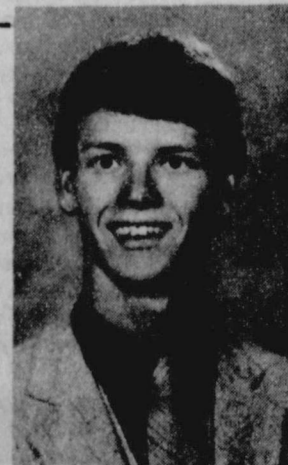
Chief Robinson pointed out that his department has no jurisdiction over incidents that occur in other cities.

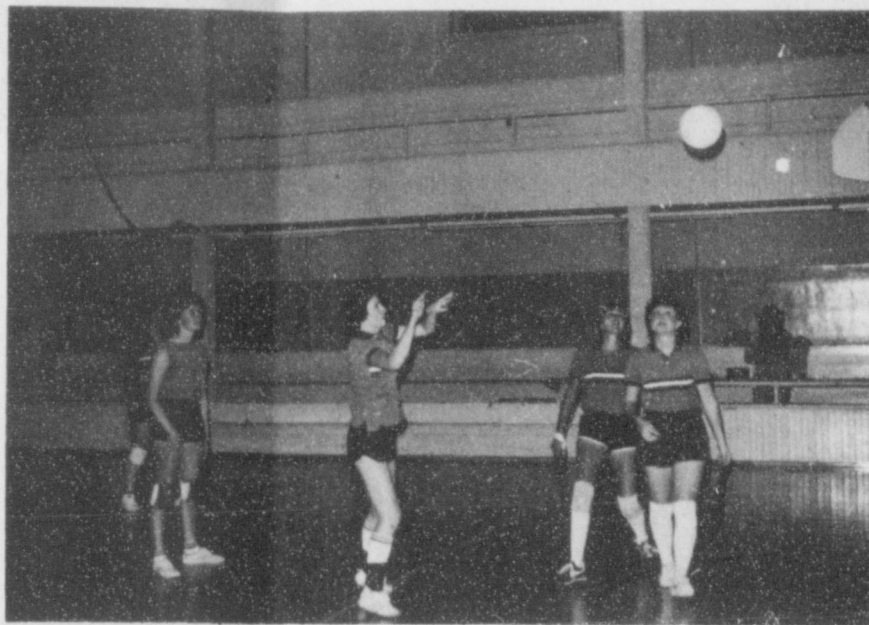
8th Lynx Lose at Home

"NOTICE" RENTAL PROPERTY OWNERS

The Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation is administering the HUD Existing Section 8 Housing Assistance Payment Program in the 26 county area of the Texas Panhandle. Owners of rental property are encouraged to make these rental units available to eligible families. Rents are set in accordance with the Fair Market Rates in each county and the rental unit must meet Housing Quality Standards. Eligible families are those that are Low-Income, Elderly, Disabled or Handicapped. Tenants who participate in this program will pay a portion of the rent (according to their income) and the program will pay the balance of the monthly rent amount directly to the owner. The Housing Assistance Payment Contract between the landlord and tenant is a twelve (12) month contract, renewable every twelve (12) months, provided that the unit and the tenant are again eligible for the program. Renewed contracts are certified by the same criteria procedures as the original contract.

The Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation is administering a new federally-funded HUD program in the same 26 county area. This is a Housing Rehabilitation Program designed to help upgrade existing rental property by offering property owners of rental units incentives to rehabilitate their rental properties. Such incentives are: [1] allowable Fair Market Rents (120% of the Section 8 Existing Fair Market Rents [132% for Elderly, Low-Income, Handicapped and Disabled]. [2] Rental Assistance Payments for occupied units are guaranteed for a fifteen (15) year period with annual adjustments for increases in the cost of operation and maintenance and tax incentives due to the fifteen (15) year Housing Assistance Contract.

The owner arranges his/her own financing for this rehabilitation; and HUD, through this program, pays back the amount financed for the rehabilitation expenses, including whatever the going rate of interest is as of the time of closing.

All contractors in the Panhandle area are welcome to submit bids to owners whose application/proposal for the program has been accepted. Minority contractors are especially encouraged to participate in this program.

After rehabilitation, rents are set to cover these repair costs, operating expenses and a reasonable profit. Up to fifteen (15) years thereafter, the Agency will refer Low-Income, eligible families, to the owner from our waiting list. The tenants will pay a portion of the rent each month. The program will pay the balance of the rent directly to the owner.

Are you aware of how the moon affects our lives? You won't believe this, but read on:

The following is an excerpt from a letter from Gretchen Alexander who now lives in Kenai, Alaska. She is a former resident of Spearman, having been a legal secretary for Jarvis & Biggers and a sheriff's dispatcher. The letter is very interesting and I thought you would enjoy reading it.

I have been in Alaska for 16 months now and have loved every minute of it. I was very lucky and was hired at the Kenai Police Department within 5 days after I arrived in Denai. I work 3 days 12 hour shifts and then I have 3 days off. Am becoming very spoiled. We rotate shifts every 3 months. I am on the night shift at present. I go to work at 6:00 P.M. and go home at 6:00 A.M. the next day. The town of Kenai has a population of approx. 5500 persons. Our department has 12 officers. We have a Chief, a Lieutenant, 3 Sergeants, 7 patrolmen, 6 dispatchers. We have the jail with our building and there are 6 jail personnel. We also have the Fire Department with paid personnel. There are 12 firemen/EMTs.

Last fall I bought a pair of cross country skis with which I planned to learn to cross country ski. We did not ever have enough snow for me to ski. BUT this year they are predicting something like 92" of snow. If I can climb up high enough I may be able to ski this year. Winter sports such as hockey, skating, snowmachines and skiing are very popular. The city floods an outdoor skating rink every winter and have large lights all around and you can skate all winter. They have snowmachine races on frozen lakes, winter carnivals, etc.

The summers are beautiful and the fall colors are gorgeous. We have hundreds of wild flowers and berries. We have wild blueberries, strawberries, raspberries and cranberries.

Kenai is on the Cook Inlet and has one of the first Russian settlements and an old Russian Orthodox Church and an old army fort - Fort Kenai. The Kenai River runs along the City Limits and empties into the Inlet. During the high tides during the salmon runs, white Beluga whales come into the Inlet and river following the fish.

Moose run around here just like the cattle do in Texas. We have had several moose-vehicle accidents on the highways. I have had moose walking through my front and back yard. We have caribou and black bear here also. In the spring White geese stop on their way North and feed along the river. They come by the thousands Sometimes the ground is covered near the river.

I hope all of you in Spearman Reporter are doing well. I will be in Texas sometime in March of 1982 to visit my daughters and will stop by if I get a chance.

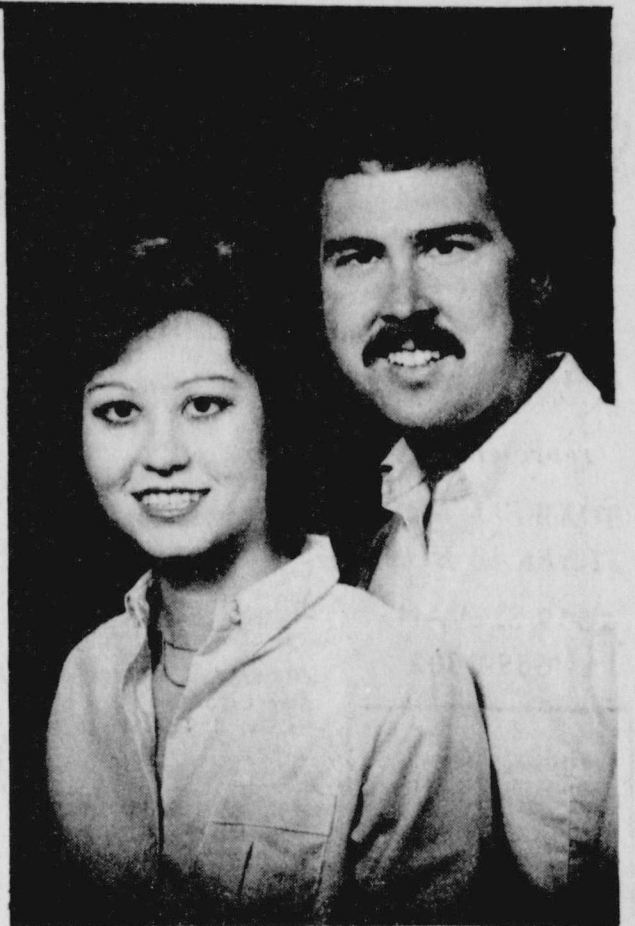

5 bids

A public hearing and resolution on airport improvements, consideration of five bids for equipment and payment for services were the salient points of the agenda at the regular meeting of the Spearman city council, Tuesday night.

The public hearing on airport improvements concerned an application for financial assistance for the specified improvements from the Texas Aeronautics Commission (TAC) with Resolution 8-81 being approved following the hearing and attendant discussion. This empowered Spearman Mayor Ralph Blodgett to file a grant application for the TAC financial assistance.

Bids were at hand on a police package four door sedan, two half-ton pickup trucks, one service body, thirty three cubic yard refuse containers and a copy machine.

Davis Chevrolet, Borger, was the low bidder on the police sedan at \$10,040. This unit will basically be identical to the two units recently delivered to the department.

Specifications for the two half-ton pickups were for a three speed automatic transmission in one and a four speed manual in the other. Davis Chevrolet was the dollars-and-cents low bidder on these units, too, but the law allows purchase "at home" from a local vendor if the price is not more than five percent more than the low bid.

Hergert of Spearman's bid on the two pickups came within this five percent margin and it was the vote of the council to purchase these units at home.

It might answer questions before they are asked to point out here that the two units recently delivered by the local Chevrolet dealer were purchased before Gerald Heinrich became a member of the council. Law precludes the council--with Heinrich as an executive--from bidding on city purchases.

The three other items purchased at low bids were from out-of-town suppliers with none of them available at the local level.

Recently Texas-New Mexico Power Company requested permission to replace the tariff for the current purchase power cost adjustment with assurance that the move did not constitute a rate increase or an increase in revenues from current rates. With a hearing by the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) only days away, the city council decided to table this item until they could see the wording used by PUC.

In other business, payment to West Texas Equipment Company for repairs on a loader were authorized in the amount of \$4,620.34 and similar approval went to payment to H&H Water Well in the amount of \$6,757.90 for repairs on the water well located at Rocket Slide Park.

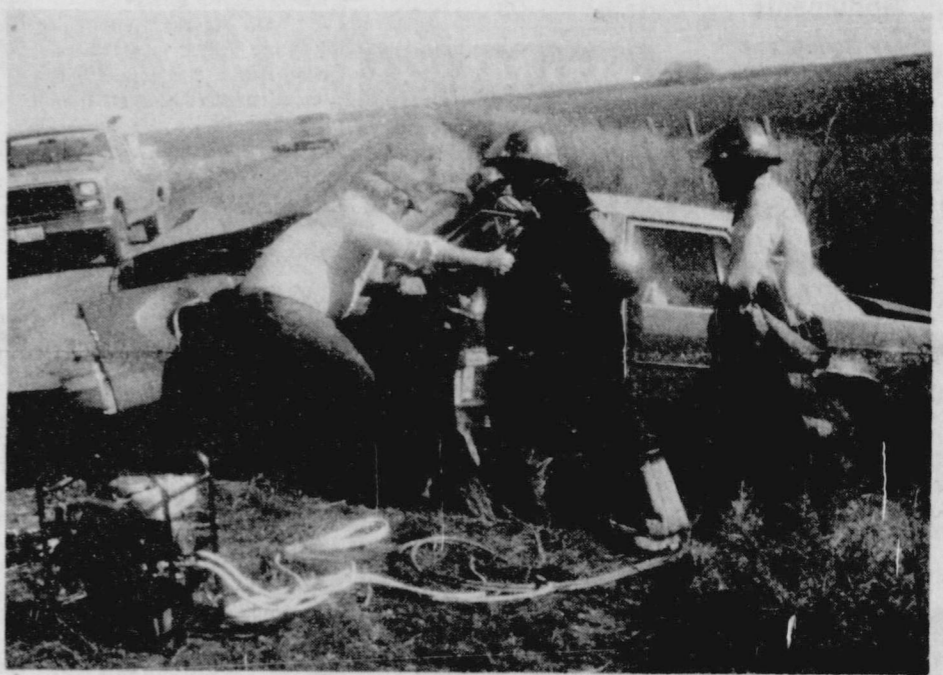
Remainder of the meeting was occupied with reports from the various departments of city government and routine payment of bills--all of which were allowed and approved.

Next regular city council meeting will be Nov. 24 at 7:30 p.m. These meetings, conducted in the council chamber of city hall, are open to the public.



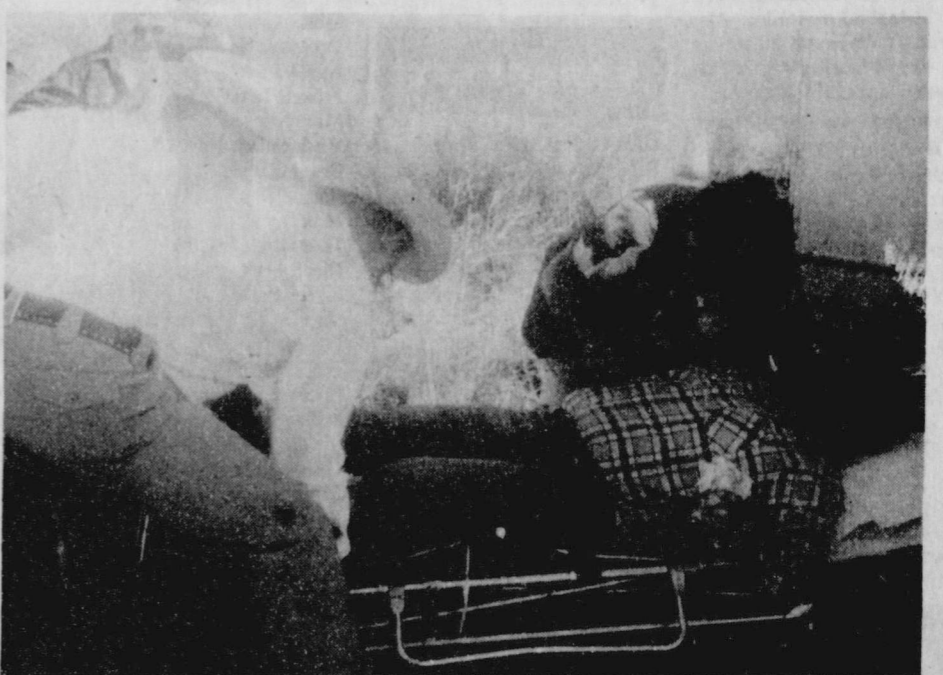

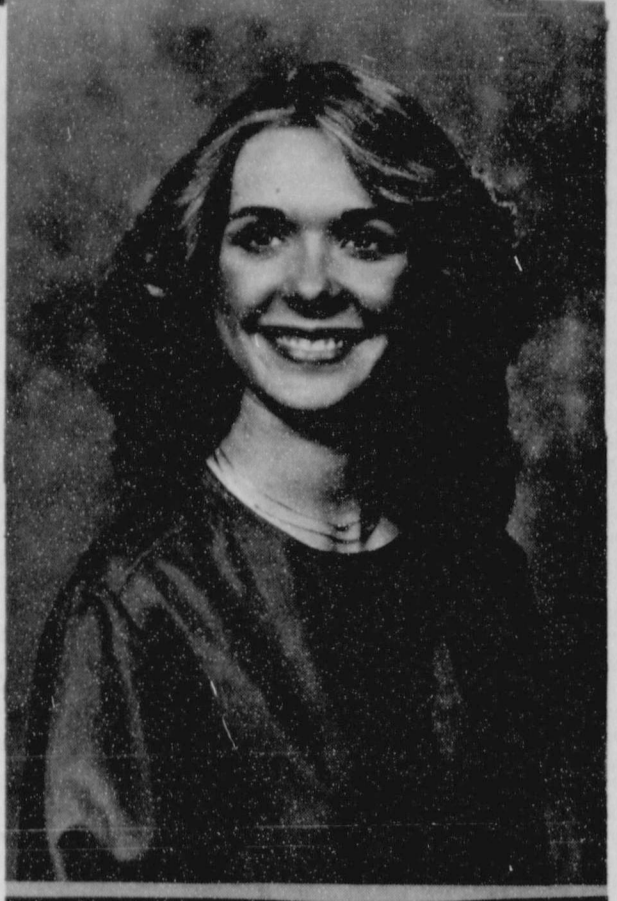

8th Lynx Beat Wolves

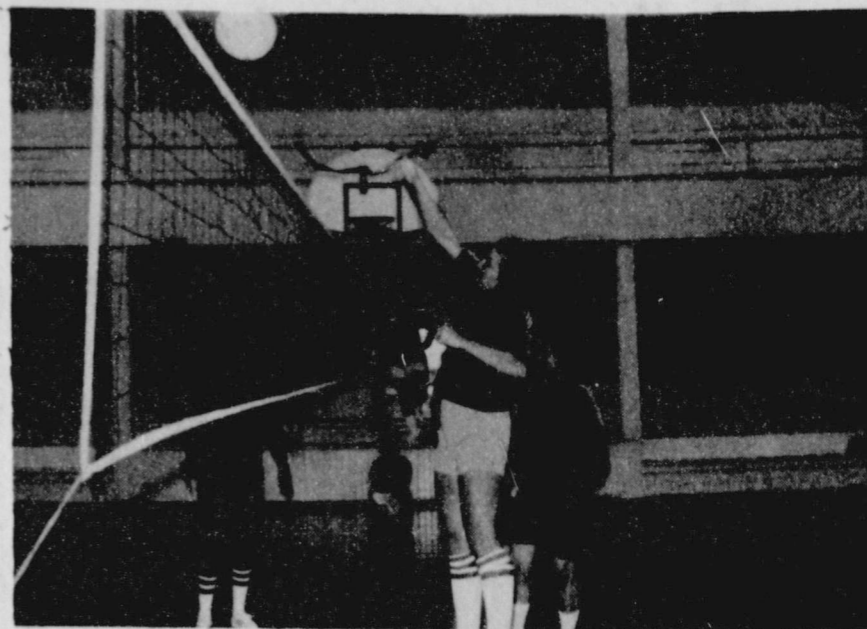
The 8th Lynx were the team that won the final game of their season. They did a great job against the Dalhart 8th Wolves.

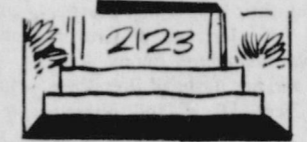

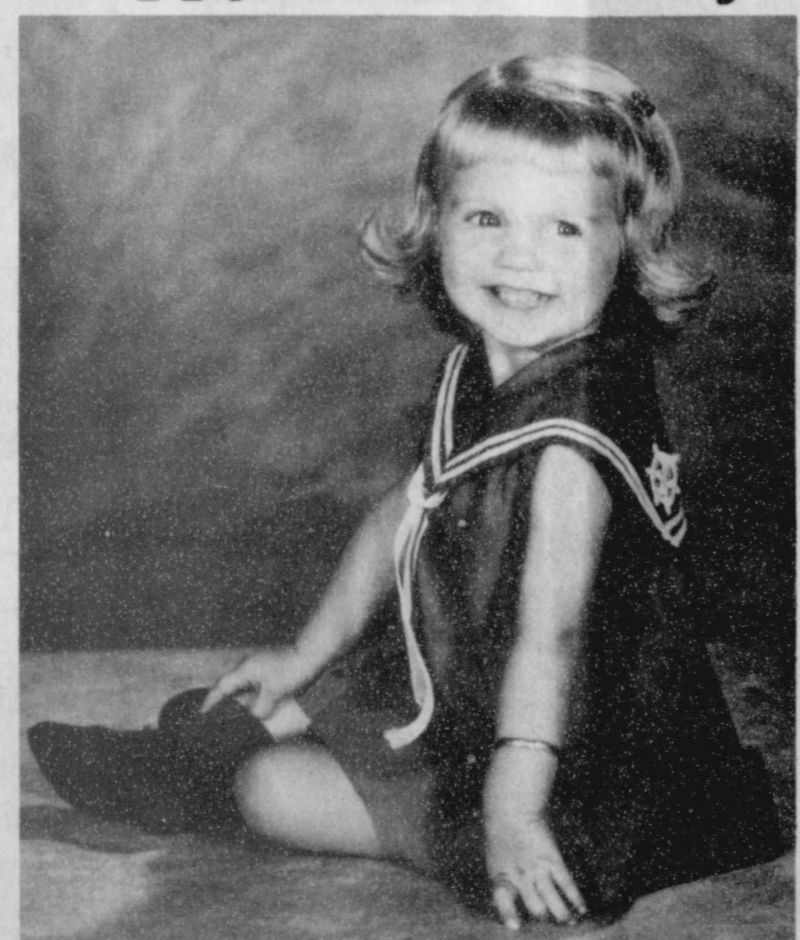
