Okinawan Student Finds Texas And Nation To Be Big Country

"It's a big country!" That is Akemi (Kim) Takamine's reaction to Texas and the United States. Miss Takamine is a freshman business major at Texas Tech and has been in Spearman during the semester break visiting Miss Joan Hackley. There are many freshmen at Tech, but probably few who have traveled so far and worked so hard to gain admission to the school. Miss Takamine's home is in Naha, Okinawa, and she has been working to attend an American school for five years. She graduated from high school in Naha five years ago, she is 23, and has been studying and working for opportunity since then.

She is going to school on a U. S. Army scholarship. There were 165 people taking the tests for the scholarships and 25 were selected. The group arrived in the United States in August and went to the University of Michigan

for four weeks instruction in English. It was a very intensive course. "We went to school from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. six days a week," Miss Takamine recalled. She had studied English while in high school, but it was still a hard course. After arriving at Tech in September, she felt all of her instruction had been wasted. She had a hard time understanding "Texan talk." "It was not too good to learn English in the North and then come to Texas," joked the petite young woman. She had never heard of Texas Tech before being assigned to the school. All 25 students were assigned to different American schools.

Speaking as though embarrassed about her lack of knowledge about this country she said, "I only knew about a few of your schools-- Cornell and a few others."

Although a stranger when she arrived at Tech, Miss Takamine found a friendly school and people were quick to make friends with her. Since school started she had been home with friends from Houston and Muleshoe, before coming to Spearman.

Language was not the only change the visiting student had to make.

"Everything is so fast here. In Okinawa I was quick doing things, but here I am so slow."

Although she had seen basketball games and baseball which is her favorite sport in Okinawa, football was a new game to her.

"It was more interesting than I thought it would be," she commented. "However, I like the cheerleaders best."

"We have no girl cheerleaders. Just boys and they do not jump around."

Miss Takamine says her homeland is becoming modernized. Naha, the capital, is now a city of 20,000 and there are other towns and villages which have grown up

since World War II. Okinawa was the last bloody battle of World War II and a few towns and villages on the island were flattened. It is now this country's largest Far Eastern military base and many of the island's people work for the military. Miss Takamine says she will return to Okinawa after four years in Tech and be either a secretary or teacher. Right now, she is taking three subjects, math, English and shorthand. She dropped her economics course. "I could not understand it." The petite Okinawan, only 4'9" tall, lives just across the hall from Joan Hackley in Drane Hall. The two became friends from being such close neighbors.

She came home with Joan and Joan's roommate, Mary Ellen Barkley.

"I like Spearman very much," Miss Takamine said.

Miss Hackley has given her a complete tour of small town living, including basketball games and a visit to the high school.

While Kim likes Spearman, those who have met the small young woman have also liked her immediately. Miss Hackley says she will be coming back to visit often.

MOD Fund Campaign Begins This Afternoon

Spearman will open its pocketbooks today to the annual March of Dimes fund raising campaign.

At 1 p.m. today, the annual Mothers' March and the Radio Auction and Hootenanny will begin in a twin fund raising campaign.

Members of the two local Beta Sigma Phi sorority chapters and other individuals will make the Mothers' March, calling upon each house in town, according to Mrs. Virgil Mathews, county chairman.

Radio Station KBMF-FM will broadcast the radio auction and hootenanny and the show will

also be open to the public. It will be in the high school auditorium and there is plenty of seating capacity.

About 15 local artists have donated paintings for the auction and many of the merchants of Spearman have donated merchandise to be sold by auction.

A number of home baked pies and cakes have also been donated.

A group of local men will act as auctioneers for the program and the Jaycees will deliver and pick up the money for the merchandise.

The balmy January Spring came to a cold, snowy end Saturday morning as a small blizzard ripped into the area on a cold front.

The cold and clouds moved into the area late Friday afternoon and the snow started falling Friday night and Saturday morning.

Mrs. Pat Cates, official weather observer, said Spearman received approximately four inches of snow and because of it being so dry, there was only about .2 of an inch of moisture.

She said an accurate measurement was impossible because of the drifting.

Winds of 30 to 40 miles per hour drove the powder dry snow into drifts several feet deep around buildings and across roads, while leaving open areas barren of snow.

Sheriff J. B. Cooke said all roads in the area could be called passable, but should be used only in emergencies.

Livestock owners who went out to check cattle said traveling was extremely difficult.

At noon Saturday, the snow showed some signs of melting in the streets and the skies were clearing.

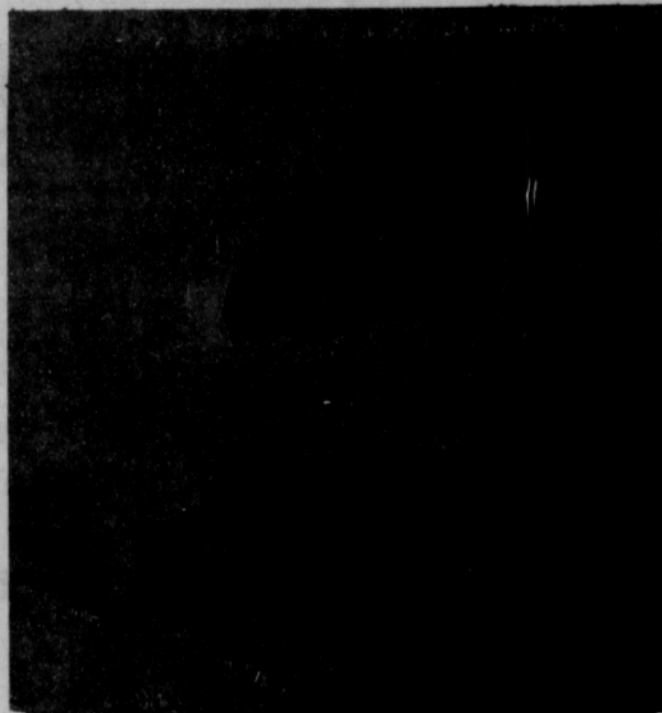
FFA Enters Stock Show

Local Building Was Slower

Residential and business construction in Spearman went ahead at a slower clip this year than in the few previous years, but construction still totaled more than a half-million dollars.

According to the building permits on file in the city offices, there were 28 new homes built here last year and the total value of the construction was \$429,840.

Business and industrial construction in the city totaled just under a quarter million dollars. The exact total was

\$248,000.

September was the biggest month for home building. Permits were issued for six houses and their cost was \$98,600. August was the runner-up month with five houses totaling \$91,050.

May was the largest total month with four homes costing \$56,000 and one business permit, Pioneer Manor, totaling \$150,000 for a grand total of \$206,000.

Two months, July and December, were very poor building months. Not a single permit was filed in either month.

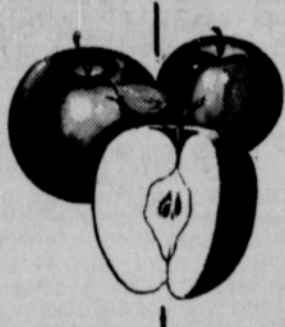

Three County '64 Record Shows 7 Traffic Deaths

Seven persons were killed and 84 injured in 192 highway accidents in Hansford, Ochiltree and Hutchison counties during 1964, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The total property damages in these accidents were \$105,120 for the three counties.

Hansford was the low county in all three categories.

There was one person killed and 13 injured in 12 different accidents on county roads. The property damage in these wrecks totaled \$10,845.

Ochiltree County had three deaths, and 19 injured in 54 accidents. Property damaged was set at \$55,710.

In counties north of the Canadian River Moore County had the most deaths, four, but only 30 were injured in accidents. Moore County also led

in property damage with \$137,295.

Potter County with the heavy Amarillo population led in all categories in the district with 7 rural deaths, 126 injuries in 125 accidents. Property damage was \$160,608.

Texas drivers have killed more people during 1964 than any other year in the state's history. Unofficial figures indicate the Texas death toll may have reached 3,000 during 1964, but the final tabulation will not be completed until March 15.

Meanwhile, officials are hopeful that motorists will heed warnings and drive with greater care during 1965 and give special consideration to the hazards of driving during the winter months ahead.

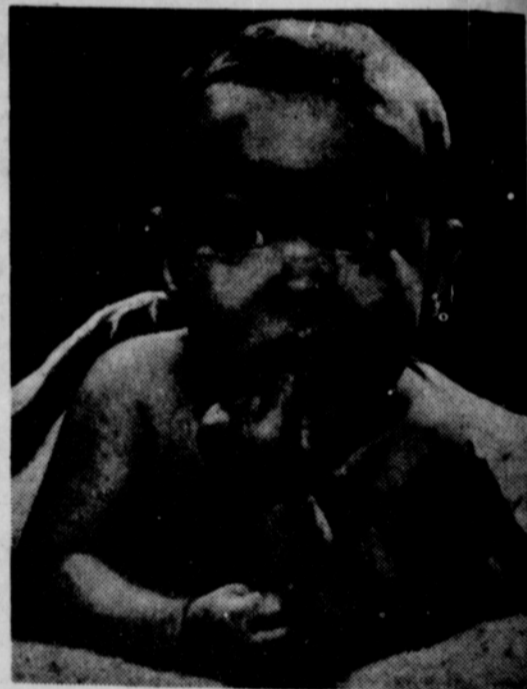
