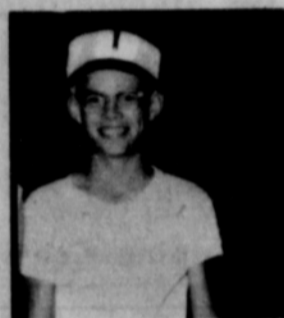

Council Gives Firemen Right To Name Chief

Spearman's Volunteer Fire Department will again elect a fire chief and officers of the organization.

An amendment to the fire department ordinance was passed Monday night by the Spearman City Council. Under a recently passed fire department ordinance the Fire Chief and Officers were appointed

by the council. The amendment to the new ordinance returned the right to elect officers to the department.

All actions of the department will remain subject to Approval by the council.

Another amendment to the ordinance said that no honorarium member of the fire de-

partment may serve as an active member.

The council agreed to secure the right of way for a new farm to market road from the Gruver Highway north at the west edge of Spearman. The council will secure the right-of-way for the road if the property owners will give it at no cost to the city.

This road will start at the intersection of the Gruver Highway and the dirt road that goes to the dumpground. It will be built north for 5.2 miles.

Highway officials said it would cost approximately \$100,000.

A request was made for the city to continue to furnish irrigation gas for farms next to town until Oct. 1.

It was also agreed that Albert Mackie should receive \$100 in damage to a feed crop. The crop was damaged last summer when contractors put water and gas lines across the property. Mackie is to give the city a utility easement to service the lines.

A committee of Bob Vaughn, E. J. Copeland and Ken Conrey was appointed to meet with the LaMaster family and work out more details of getting flood water across the LaMaster land east of Spearman.

City Manager, Ken Conrey, was told to take action immediately towards getting a small tractor mower for mowing city parks and other city property.

A drive is underway across the top of the Panhandle to get a highway designated State Highway 15 to make a link with Oklahoma City and Colorado.

The drive is being carried on by the Texas Highway 15 organization. The group hopes to get Highway 15 re-routed from Spearman, through Gruver, Stratford, and to Dalhart. The highway presently goes from Spearman south of Borger, Panhandle and Claude.

Association President Glenn Lemon of Booker has appointed committees to work on this project. The east committee is Don Buckner of Follett, Joe Hershey of Darrouzett, F. S. Robertson of Booker, V. R. Coon of Perryton and John Mayfield of Perryton advisor.

The West committee is Chas. Gilliam of Spearman, Paul Gurnfory of Gruver, Van Boston of Stratford, David Nobel of Dalhart and Earl Blankinship of Spearman advisor.

These committees will contact the Texas Highway Department and towns along the route to help get the route es-

ablished.

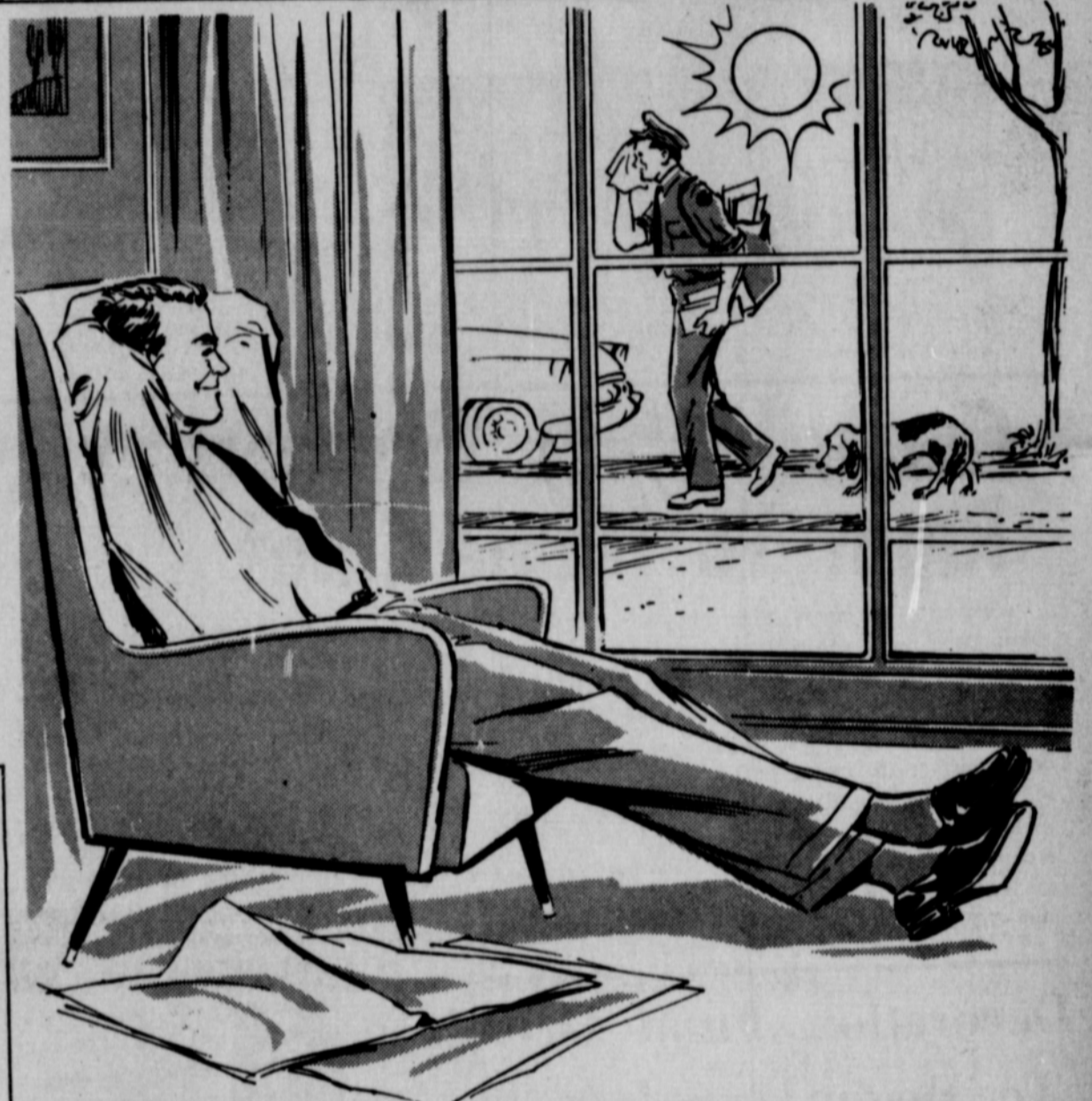

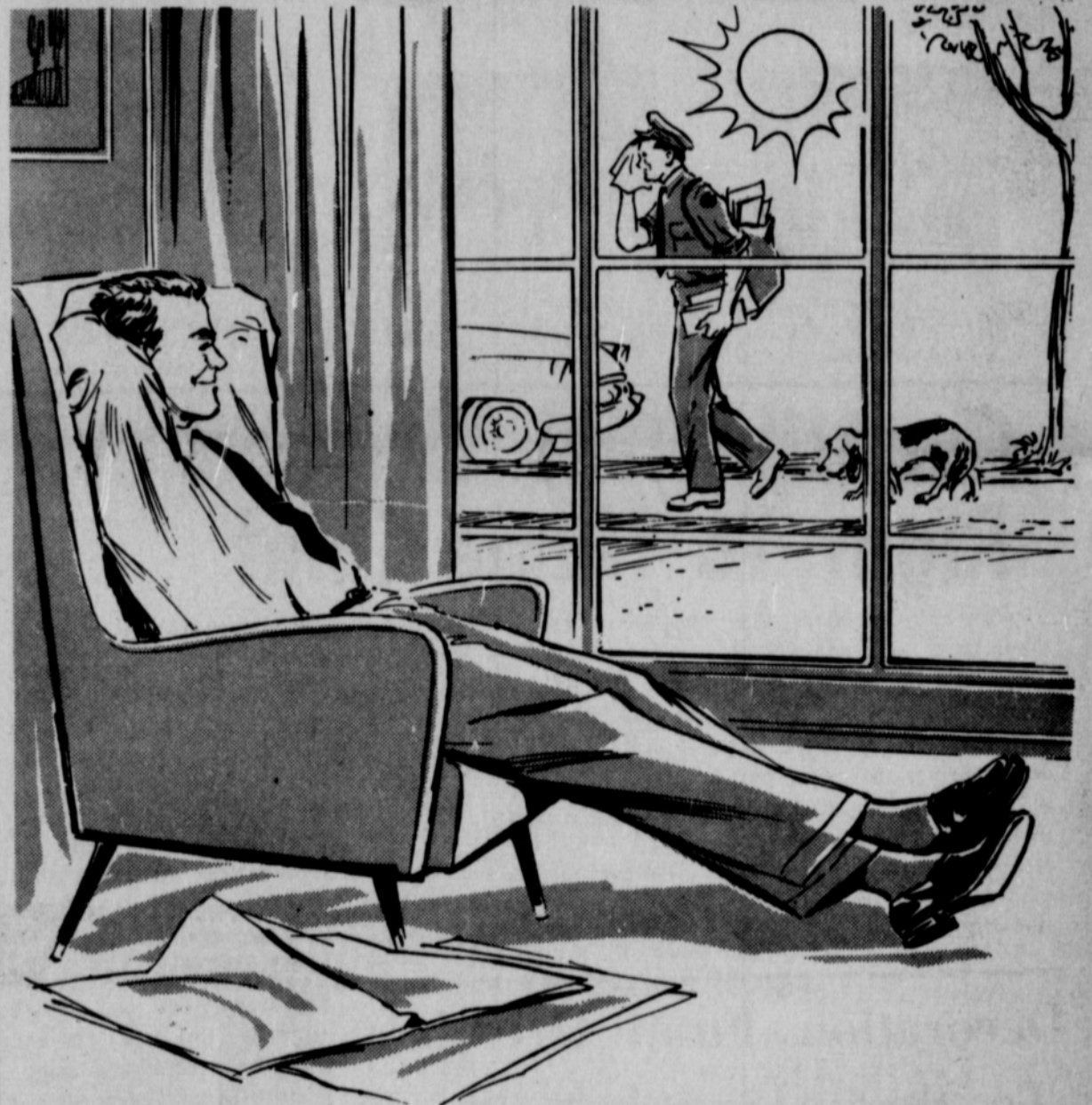

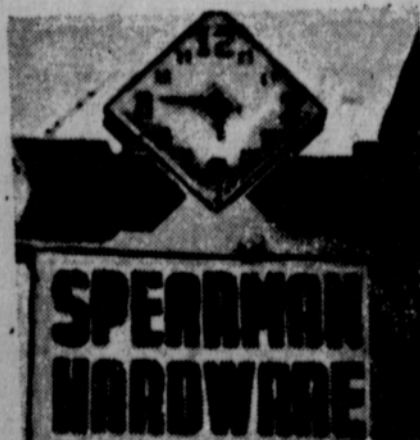

County Agent's Report

Any little tomato who knows her onions can go out with an old potato and come home with a couple of carrots.

USE 2, 4-D CORRECTLY
This is a reminder to farmers, custom applicators, and chemical companies to use 2, 4-D so that susceptible crops will not be damaged. Some grain sorghum will be sprayed and there will be cotton nearby. Use the low-volatile ester or the amine form of 2, 4D near

cotton so that it will not be damaged. The butye vapors from this form can damage susceptible crops. This hot weather we are having will make the butye ester form more dangerous as vapors will be released more readily in hot weather.

FARM SAFETY WEEK July 21-27
"Inspection Plus Correction Equals Protection" is the theme for National Farm Safety Week July 21-27. President John F.

Kennedy, in proclaiming the week, called upon all Americans, especially those allied with agriculture, to unite their efforts to cut down the number of farm, home and highway

accidents takes action by people and it must be continuous throughout every year, says the Council.

A very high percentage of all farm accidents can be traced to a specific cause, and carelessness is a major contributor, the councilmen say. A little checking close to home, they add, will likely reveal that most crippling or fatal accidents on the farm or in the home result from actions

wherein people should know better.

The accident record of agriculture is not good and with the ever-increasing use of power machinery and allied equipment, the rate can be expected to move higher unless the people involved make up their minds to do something about it, warns the Council. Therefore, they add, it's up to farm families to find and remove hazards which can cause accidents and to practice safety in their daily living. The outstanding records in accident prevention by other industries of the nation haven't just happened, says the Council, but are the result of well-planned and conducted safety educational programs.

National Farm Safety Week is sponsored by the US Department of Agriculture and the National Safety Council. They work in cooperation with the state Agricultural Extension Services, farm organizations, the farm press, radio, television and other interested individuals and groups.

Screwworm eradication program officials report that producers from 104 Texas counties discovered 439 screwworm infestations during the month of June. This is less than six percent of the 8300 cases that were reported during the same month last year.

Allthough the number of cases are extremely low for this time of year, eradication workers warn, livestockmen cannot afford to become complacent. Infestations have been reported from widely scattered areas of the state, as a result of trying

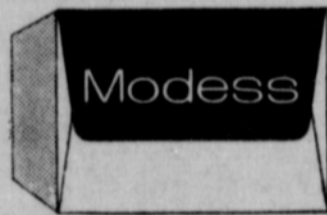
