The Texas 4-H Horse Show, one of the world's largest and most competitive youth horse shows, is coming to the Heart of Texas Coliseum in Waco July 13-16.

The annual show is the premier event for almost 12,000 4-H members across the state who raise and show horses as their 4-H projects, points out Jim Smith, County 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

More than 300 of these young men and women will qualify for this grandest of 4-H horse shows and the opportunity to vie for a coveted state championship. In addition some 400 youth will participate in open show competition.

4-H'ers from across Texas will compete in 28 different classes and divisions during the six-day event, notes Smith. Actual competition will begin on Tuesday, July 14, with all roping events, hunter under saddle, cutting and the first go-round of all futurities. Roping events include calf roping, a judged event; breakaway rop-

ing, a timed event; and team roping, a new event in the 1981 show. Fast-paced action continues throughout the day and into the night as 4-H'ers compete to make the finals in the futurity classes.

Friday night is the playoff time for many 4-H members; that's when the annual 4-H futurity sale is held. According to Smith, some of the best yearling and two-year-old western pleasure horses available in Texas will be auctioned to the highest bidders.

These horses, selected, purchased and trained by 4-H members, are excellent buys for ranchers, horse producers and pleasure riders, points out Jim.

The sale is open to any qualified buyer, and the entire show, from Tuesday's opening to Saturday's finals, is open to the public.

The theme for this year's event is "Fashion Extra," said Peggy Winegarner, County Extension Agent.

Representing Hansford will be Karen Kenney, Anne Marie Jarvis and Carol Poole.

Already these entrants have won in county competition. Contestants are judged on their sewing and construction skills, overall appearance, modeling abilities and their 4-H record books.

Participants in the district competition will register at 9 a.m. at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Boulevard West, in Amarillo. Judging will begin at 9:30 a.m.

AGING HEARINGS FOR BORGER AREA

PRPC-Representatives for the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission's Area Agency on Aging will be in Borger, Wednesday, July 15 to hold hearings on the agency's three-year plan. Citizens of Hutchinson, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hemphill and Roberts counties will be especially interested in the proceedings which will be held at Opportunities, Inc. from 1:00 until 4:00 p.m. on the 15th.

The plan that will be reviewed during the meetings includes sections on senior center programs, finances, long-range plans and overall goals and objectives. The hearings will also be an opportunity to interested citizens to ask specific questions about sections of the plan and to make comments about the goals and objectives listed.

One of the hearing team's major concerns will be finances. Last year, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) sent a little less than \$600,000 into the 25-county area to support the programs of senior citizens' centers, nutrition projects, information and referral programs, transportation, legal services, homemaker services, and adult day care.

During the coming year, the HHS funds will amount to \$640,000 and will directly affect over 6,000 Panhandle citizens.

That money will be used to finance nutrition programs at six Panhandle senior citizen facilities and also will partially fund information and referral projects at a number of the sites.

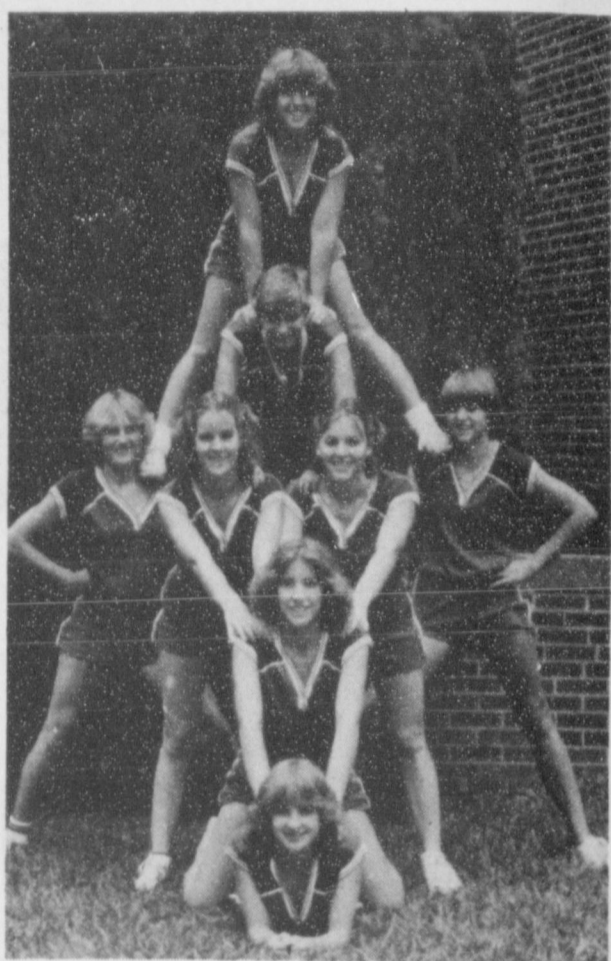
The Federal money is passed through from the Governor's Committee on Aging. It amounts to 90 percent of the actual expenses of the individual programs. The local centers are responsible for a 10 percent match of each dollar in order to operate under aging agency guidelines.

Pork Specialist To Give Demonstration

AUSTIN--Texas Department of Agriculture meat specialist Frank Brooks will be in Spearman July 14 at 2 p.m. to give a pork demonstration showing families how to save on their meat budgets.

Brooks will appear at the Extension Homemakers Clubroom, 319 Bernice, where he will show the audience how to cut a whole pork loin into steaks, chops and a roast, according to Brooks, turning large cuts of pork into smaller ones at home can save consumers 50-60 cents a pound.

Karen Reimer of Spearman first taught Delinda watercolor. She has also taken lessons from Mary Selfridge of Cloudcroft, N.M.

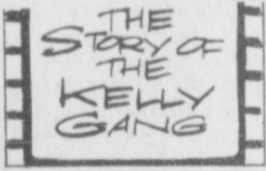
