DPS Expects 42 Deaths

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety said today indications are that some 42 persons will be killed in Texas traffic accidents during the Fourth of July weekend, and called upon Texas drivers to "prove our estimate is too high."

Colonel Wilson E. Speir said his department expects "unusually heavy traffic" throughout the state, especially around recreational areas and where Bicentennial celebrations are scheduled.

He said the estimate covers a 78-hour period which starts at 6 p.m. Friday and continues until midnight Monday, July 5th.

During a comparable period last year, the department estimated that 54 persons would be killed during the holiday period. At the conclusion of the July 4th holiday last year, statewide statistics indicated 44 lives lost and rose to 49 with late reports.

In a concerted effort to keep deaths down, the DPS and local law enforcement agencies will be cooperating in an all-out effort to make the streets and highways as safe as possible. All available DPS troopers will be on duty, Speir indicated, and they will be especially watchful for drinking drivers, speeders and persons driving in a reckless manner.

In addition, the DPS will be working with the news media in a special public education program termed "Operation Motorcide" which focuses public attention on where and why fatal accidents are occurring during the holiday period.

Texas Farmers & Ranchers Get Tax Break

"It's good news today because the ruling published last week by Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts Bob Bullock will be much easier for farmers (and others) to understand. It also eliminates an arm-long list of items that were taxable which Bullock has deemed "a headache to administer". Effective July 15, 1976, exceptions will be considered on "use" of the item. If the IRS allows an item as an investment credit, it will be exempt from sales tax. Exempt items will include repair or replacement parts for farm machinery or equipment including tires (not for highway use); all animal health supplies, whether administered by a veterinarian or cattleman; equipment such as fences, gates, chutes, and portable grain bins, etc. "This is a sound, practical approach to sales tax exemptions," was the comment of Texas Cattle Feeders Association Richard McDonald.

Researchers Looking For Tornado Pictures

LUBBOCK--The home movie market has a new outlet. A team of researchers at Texas Tech University is eager to see any home movies of tornadoes. They want still photos as well.

Faculty and graduate students in meteorology and civil and electrical engineering -- working with the National Severe Storms Laboratory -- are embarking on a study of wind fields near the ground.

Dr. Joseph E. Minor of the Civil Engineering

faculty said that most people, upon sighting a tornado, turn their cameras toward the sky. "That's not where the damage is done," he said. "We're studying the near ground wind forces -- from ground level to about 200 feet above ground."

Dr. Thomas F. Trost of the electrical engineering faculty will use radar and radio listening devices to locate storm cells. Dr. Richard E. Peterson, who teaches meteorology, will

identify storm cells which have a strong potential for tornado action, and he can predict with some accuracy the direction in which the storm cell is moving. The civil engineers' job is to grab camera gear and drive to potentially hazardous locations, ready to photograph near ground action. "Our pictures will show the ground and the area immediately above it. We don't need the cloud pictures," Minor said.

"We hope to get some good pictures ourselves," he said, "but we really are depending upon good chance shots anybody might get on his own. There is a real scientific value in these home pictures," he said, "particularly if we can get more than one movie-- each from a different angle -- of the same tornado."

"We can from these dual recordings, judge wind velocity and the configuration of the wind, and we can piece together the wind field."

While Minor warned cameramen to take no chances, it is possible in his view to take good pictures of a tornado in action at a safe distance. "Who knows what might be in some amateur's movie, black and white stills, or slides? There may be the very information we most need in some amateur production," he said.

The research project has sponsorship from the National Severe Storms Laboratory of the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration, U. S. Department of Commerce, and of the state of Texas through state organized research funds.

Talk Softly to Cows

If OSHA's new pamphlet, "Safety With Beef Cattle," is an example of the agency's efforts to promote occupational safety, it is the biggest waste of taxpayers' money we've seen in a long time. It is also an insult to the intelligence of cattlemen.

In large, bold print, the pamphlet first declares that "hazards are one of the main causes of accidents." Wow! What a profound statement! We can't help but wonder how long it took the Occupational Safety and Health Administration to come up with this one.

But this is just the beginning. "You can make your work area safe by finding hazards and removing them," the pamphlet continues. And it keeps getting worse.

"Be careful when you are handling animals. Tired or hungry or frightened cattle can bolt and trample you. Be patient, talk softly around the cows. Don't move fast or be loud with them." Says the bureaucrats to the cattlemen, and now get this: "Always try to keep a fence between you and your cattle."

Also, "When floors are wet and slippery with manure, you can have a bad fall. You could also trip over junk and trash." Still more: "Be careful that you do not fall into the manure pits." And, OSHA warns the cattlemen, "Bare feet or

sneakers aren't safe around cattle." The entire pamphlet reads as though it were prepared by city slickers for use by kindergarten students. It is difficult to believe it was released by a government agency for the benefit of cattlemen. If this is typical of what our government considers helpful information, we are worse off than we thought.

As Sen. Carl Curtis of Nebraska said concerning the pamphlets for cattlemen and farmers, the language is "so incredibly arrogant and insulting that it nearly leaves me speechless," he said OSHA material for other industries is not so childish.

The American National Cattlemen's Association said the cattle booklet has them "laughing with tears in our eyes." They're right. If it wasn't childish, ridiculous and insulting, it would be funny.

But it isn't funny -- and neither is the cost to the taxpayers. OSHA printed 155,000 copies of this and 27 other pamphlets concerning cattlemen and farmers at a cost of \$347,220, plus \$199,500 paid to "experts" at Purdue University for developing the material.

OSHA has only been in existence for four years and has already spent \$293 million. We suggest this is one boondoggle we'd certainly be better off without.

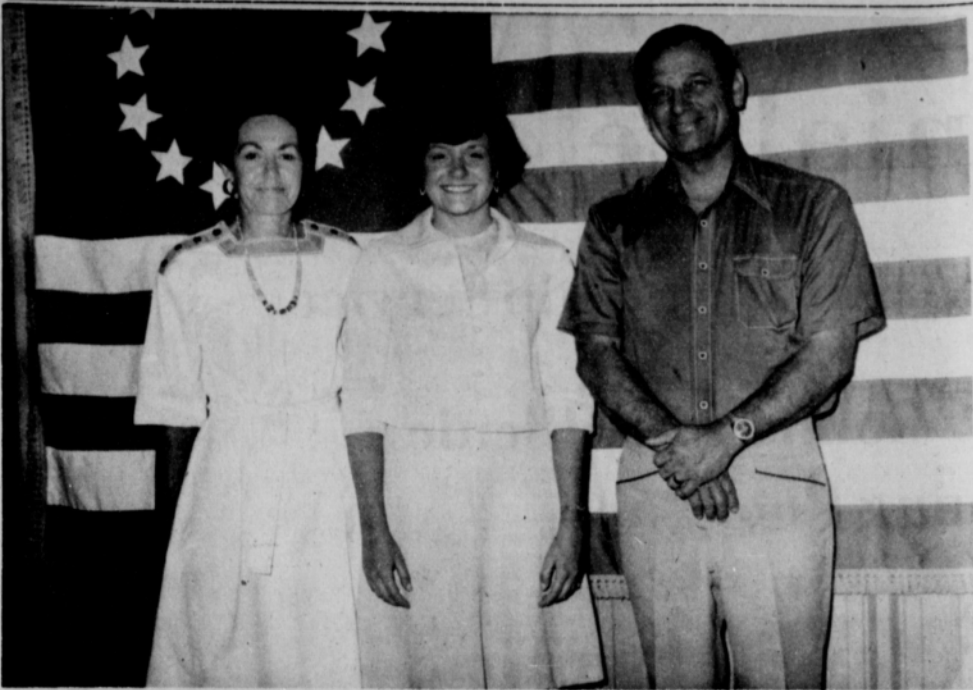

Harvest Shifts To High Gear

The 1976 wheat harvest has been long in arriving but with Monday activity has picked up considerably in the area and what promises to be "a very good year" should be in full-swing by weekend.

A sampling of those at area elevators show that Monday was the first big day of the 1976 harvest and that aside from a shortage of Rock Island railroad cars to haul the golden grain, not too many problems have confronted anyone as yet.

In talking to genial Continental Grain manager,

Kermit McKee, Tuesday, he felt that the harvest 1976 was "picking up" with moisture running 14% on the average. Wheat is testing 61 lbs. per bushel on the average according to Kermit who also said he had heard dryland wheat was varying from 5 to 20 bushels per acre. Irrigated wheat is running at 65 bushels per acre for a high as far as McKee had heard. Price for wheat at the Continental on Tuesday afternoon was \$3.44 and the problem the shortage of Rock Island railroad cards was the only

big "hitch in the harvest" so far.

Up the road at the Palo Duro Grain, helpful Mrs. Bill Pittman answered our queries and stated that they were really just getting started today (Tuesday) with the moisture running anywhere from 8 to 20. The wheat is testing up to 65 lbs. per bushel and she had heard some dryland wheat yielding from 10 to 17 bushels per acre. The price at the Palo Duro Grain on Tuesday afternoon was \$3.44 and again the only "hitch in the harvest" so far

was the shortage of railroad cars on the Rock Island.

Fred Davidson, of the Bernstein Elevators, answered our queries there when we called Tuesday stating that today's (Tuesday) was the big day so far with the moisture varying from 11 to 12 to 15% and up. He said that the wheat was testing a little light in that area with an average of 58 pounds per bushel for the first couple of days. The dryland wheat in that area around Bernstein is pretty good although it is a bit late this year. The price

Tuesday afternoon (posted Monday afternoon and remaining the same) for wheat at the Bernstein Elevators was \$3.44. Again, would you believe, the only "hitch in the harvest" so far is the shortage of railroad cars from the Rock Island Railroad.

A call to the Equity Elevator in Morse brought Polly Neal to the phone to help us with our queries on harvest saying that they were just now getting started really. Most wheat is coming in fairly dry for irrigated and astoundingly, two farmers

were said to have been cutting dryland wheat in that area around Morse which is yielding a fabulous 60 bushels and is testing on the average 60 lbs. to the bushel. The price at the Equity Tuesday afternoon was \$3.43. They have had no great problems so far in wheat harvest 1976 but think that overall it will not quite measure up to the 1975 harvest.

It's just the beginning but the amber waves of grain will soon be a wonderful memory in the Panhandle of Texas and the Harvest 1976 will be safely in the elevators to be used world wide for everyone.

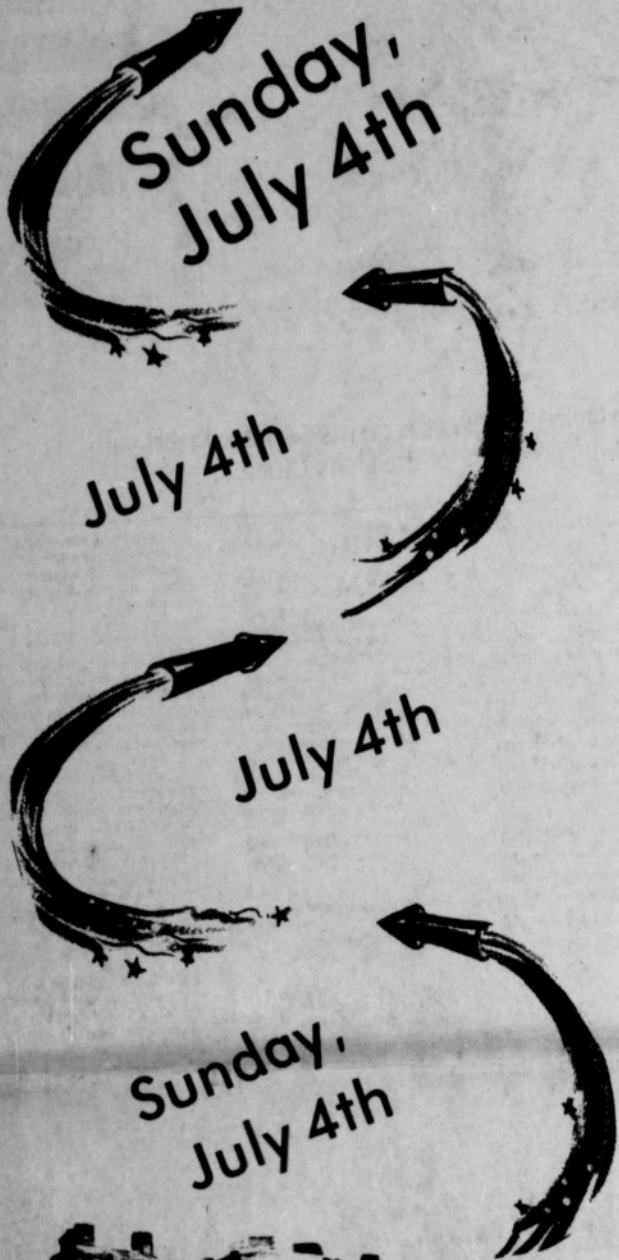
