Spearman Swelters as Temperature Tops 100

While people across the state revved up their air conditioners Thursday in their race against the rising mercury, the weather service was promising that Saturday would be a perfect day for the Hansford Roundup, maybe?

Temperatures across the county surpassed the 100-degree mark Thursday. In Spearman the high was 100-degrees probably setting a record for May. The First State Bank temperature recorded 103-degrees at 2:00 p.m. Thursday.

The weather bureau in Amarillo reported that the 100-degree tem-

perature set an all time record for the panhandle of Texas.

But the record high temperatures on Wednesday and Thursday have had some effect on the wheat crop. Whether it is good or bad we do not know. We do know that we are running low on moisture in the county as far as row crops are concerned.

No one has died of heat stroke in the area but the temperatures have been extremely uncomfortable. For instance Friday morning Hansford County citizens had to pull covers as the temperature dipped to

62-degrees. The 40-degree temperature variation is uncomfortable.

In Spearman the demand for electricity to cool homes and businesses was handled extremely well by Texas-New Mexico power company. In nearby states some of the power companies were unable to handle the demand for electricity.

Temperatures east of Spearman into Oklahoma saw Hobert, Okla. hit 106-degrees, and most all of western Oklahoma and the Panhandle of Texas hit the 100-degree temperatures.

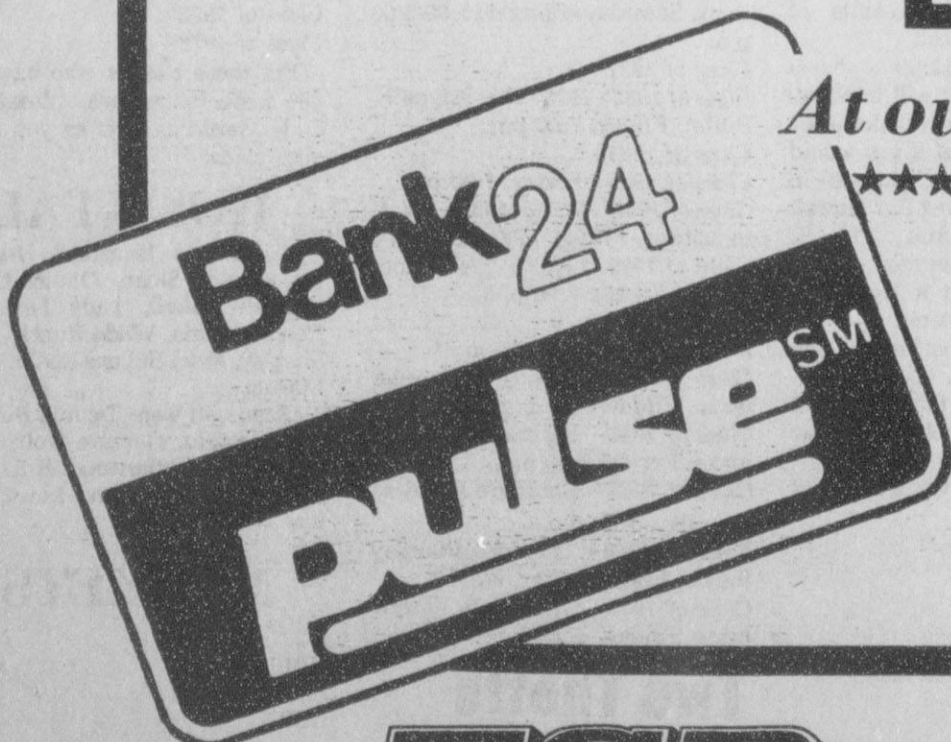

Panhandle Crisis Center

Have you seen or heard the ads for the Panhandle Crisis Center? Perhaps you are wondering what this is all about.

Possibly you are already aware that national television, national magazines and newspapers have been publicizing the astonishing prevalence of family violence on the national level.

But few of us thought family violence to be an issue in our own communities.

Last year Joe Hannon, Perryton's Chief of Police, presented a program to a group of Perryton women illustrating the fact that family violence is an issue in our community. Some of the women got busy with inquiries, writing the police chiefs, the sheriffs, and the judges of the Commissioners' Courts in Ochiltree, Lipscomb, and Hansford counties to see whether indeed the issue does exist.

—It does.

With the wholehearted endorsement of these departments, the organization of the Panhandle Crisis Center began. A group of 12 persons agreed to serve as the Board of Directors. They secured an initial funding from the Ochiltree County Commissioners' Court, rented office space, installed a telephone, recruited volunteers, all with the volunteered assistance of a trained counselor. When the counselor had to get on with the business of making a living, the Board hired an office manager to serve from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

With funds donated by various individuals and service organizations, and two fund-raising projects of its own, the Crisis Center now has a 24-hour answering service (donated after the initial installation charge), so victims may call day or night at any hour. In addition, Heley Bussey continues to donate her services beyond the hours that the Crisis Center is able to pay her for.

And what are the services provided by the Crisis Center?

Shelter for those women (and their children) who must leave the house.

Help for those who need hospitalization.

Counseling for those who want time to think about their situation and to choose among the various ways and means of dealing with it.

Support groups for those who need to talk with others who have been in the same or similar situations.

Referrals to the proper person or agency when the needs are more than the Panhandle Crisis Center can provide.

Information for those who wish to know what procedures are open to them.

An opportunity to talk with someone who cares.

A support group, with baby-sitting services, for those who have suffered sexual abuse in the past but who need help to ease the anxieties that are still produced by those impossible-to-forget experiences. This means that we minister to children as well as to adults.

Who refers clients to us? The hospitals, the police and sheriff departments, and the victims themselves who have heard of us. Sometimes a woman who has received help refers another woman to us. The telephone number is easily remembered:

435-5008. We are here to help, even if all you want is to know what procedures are open to you. If you are a victim, call us. If you know someone who is a victim, persuade her to call us. Or you may come to the office: 101 West Fourth, Perryton. The telephone number, day or night, is 435-5008. There is no charge! We care!

The Panhandle Crisis Center is catching on!

From 3 calls during our first month of operation in September, 1984, we now have 3 to 4 calls per week.

We now have Board members from Lipscomb and Hansford counties as well as from Ochiltree County. Volunteers continue to dribble in. Once a month they meet together for fellowship, mutual recognition of the meaningful service they are giving, and for in-service training. We even have some bi-lingual volunteers! Yes, we provide service for anyone who requests it, whether Anglo or Mexican. Again we emphasize that each client's situation is absolutely confidential. No information whatever is given to anyone, whether husband, family, or friends, without the written consent of the client. The clients don't even know the names of the volunteers - just the name each volunteer goes by.

Volunteers do not go to the homes of the victims, and until they have some experience, another volunteer may accompany them to give them confidence. Of course all volunteers undergo training. Let me emphasize the gratification the volunteers feel when the clients express their thanks (often with tears).

If you have an impulse to become one, please call the Panhandle Crisis Center office, 435-5008, and give your name to the office manager. The only other person who will know your true identity will be the director of the Crisis Center. Not even members

of the Board know the names of the volunteers. Husbands can be anxious, I know, but the chances of your being observed and identified as a volunteer are absolutely minimal. So give us a call. We especially need volunteers from Lipscomb and Hansford Counties.

Volunteers from Ochiltree are glad to serve in the other counties, but distance makes immediate service difficult. And we have received calls from both counties.

Funding? By the middle of next month, money should be available from the Department of Human Resources. We are still waiting to hear from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. Funding is imperative, for office expense, telephone expense (the 24-hour answering service is donated, after the installation cost) salary for the office manager, and shelter expense are continuing costs. Also, occasionally, emergency food and clothing, and, frequently, minor travel expenses come up. We are deeply grateful to those who have helped make these services available: individuals, organizations, churches, the Ministerial Alliance, and, recently a bake sale sponsored by the Menonite ladies.

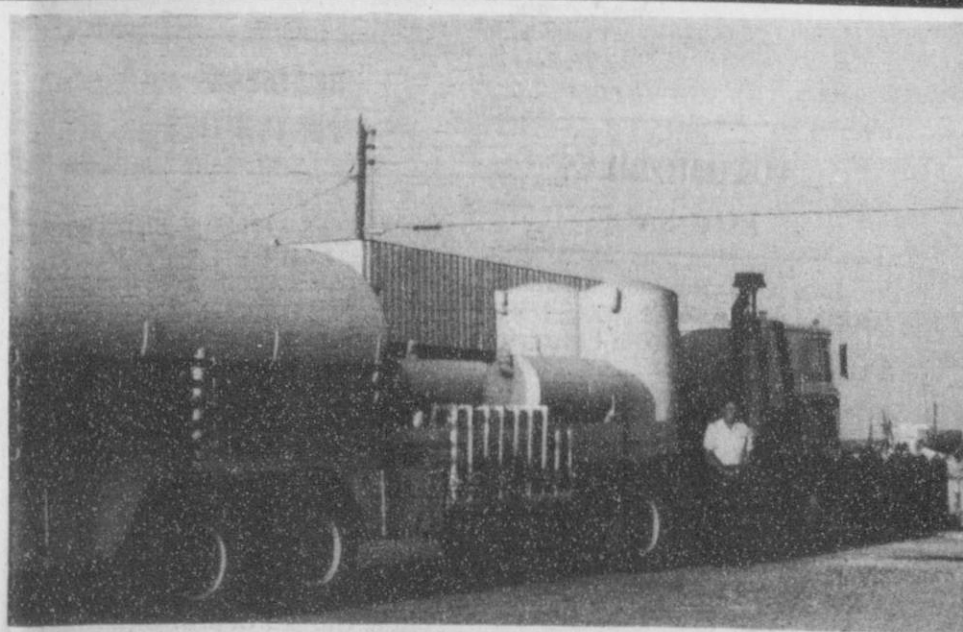

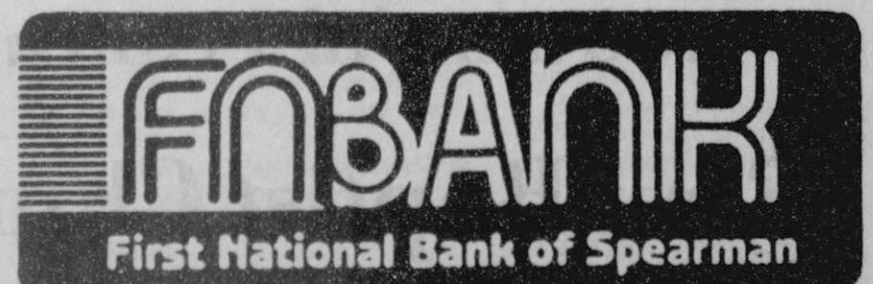

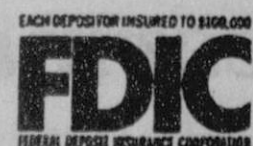

Trio convicted on mail fraud

On May 17, 1985, RICHARD L. HUNT of Dallas, Tx.; MARY E. TUBBS of Irving, Tx.; and SUSAN MADDOX of Arlington, Tx., appeared before U.S. District Judge Jerry Buckmeyer, Northern District of Texas, in Dallas, for sentencing in connection with their April 8, 1983, conviction of 14 counts of mail fraud. They had been indicted in October, 1984, for their participation in a scheme to defraud people who are interested in obtaining Mastercard and VISA credit cards.

According to Postal Inspector in Charge D. C. Strader of Fort Worth, Tx., between December, 1983, and August, 1984, the trio operated FIRST SECURITY CREDIT, 13500 Midway Road, Suite 208, Dallas, Tx. 75234, and placed ads in national publications which led readers to believe that VISA, Mastercard, and other cards were available, regardless of credit, to anyone who would telephone an 800 telephone number for

free details and application. Upon responding to the 800 number, respondents were mailed a "Dear Future Cardholder" lead letter, signed with an assumed name, and an attractively colored brochure/application in which they were instructed to complete and return with a \$35 fee. The brochure also said "The rest is up to us!" Those who sent money were mailed an eight-page booklet entitled "TEN EASY STEPS TO GOOD CREDIT," but never a credit card.

In June, 1984, a second company called CREDIT SAVER, INC., 1100 East Airport Freeway, Irving, Tx. 75062, was formed and persons who had not, after a reasonable time, responded to the First Security Credit offer were mailed the Credit Saver, Inc., offer for \$25. Those who sent money to Credit Saver were mailed a smaller book with similar contents entitled "THE CREDIT HANDBOOK", but never a credit card.

Judge Buckmeyer postponed

sentencing for approximately 45 days in conjunction with his unique request that the defendants submit plans for making full restitution. Plans for restitution are to include the refund of each \$25 or \$35 fee that the defendants received from victims as a result of the scheme. In addition, Buckmeyer requested that the defendants submit plans for informing the public about similar schemes by advertising in the same national publications originally used to promote their own scheme.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Cheryl Wattlely, who prosecuted the case, indicated there were over 10,000 victims of the scheme from all across the United States, who were defrauded of more than \$355,000. On August 16, 1984, Postal Inspectors obtained Temporary Restraining Orders to hold mail addressed to First Security Credit and Credit Saver, Inc., which prevented delivery of mail to the two firms. At the conclusion of the six-day jury trial, the court ordered the return of over 2,600 pieces of mail,

containing approximately \$91,400, which had been held as a result of the Temporary Restraining Orders.

Postal Inspector E.D. Odom, one of the investigators in the case, stated that those who respond to similar ads found in newspapers and magazines, are told that for fees ranging from \$25 to \$40 anyone can be guaranteed a

Mastercard or VISA credit card, regardless of credit history. Those who pay the fee are either sent complicated lists describing ways to improve credit so that the financial institution will eventually issue a card or are told to place \$300 to \$2,000 in a pledged savings account at a financial institution which issues credit cards. Those who respond to such ads, Odom noted, usually do so because they do not have that amount of money available for savings accounts.

Strader indicated that investigations are continuing nationwide by Postal Inspectors to prosecute promoters of such schemes who prey on those people who can least afford to lose money on fraudulent

offers. He added that the public should contact Better Business Bureaus and Postal Inspectors regarding questionable promo-

tions, and encouraged the victims of such schemes to contact their local postmaster or the nearest Postal Inspector.
