

# 30 man seismic crew brings \$141,000.00 to local economy: tip of iceberg!

Indicative of the increase in oil and gas exploration in Hansford County, Geo-Search Seismic Surveys, Inc. of Lubbock, Texas, has recently moved its Party into the area to perform some seismic testing. You might not have noticed the army style convoy of trucks moving down County highways. You have noticed the increase in restaurant revenue, motel revenue or maybe even super-market revenue. Let's take a 30 man seismic crew and see what, on the average, their expenditures are for the month. Roughly, they spend approximately \$750 per day for motel facilities and about \$450 per day on food. Miscellaneous items, such as hats, gloves, toiletries, etc., run about \$100 per day and fuel about \$600 per day. But this isn't everything. If you include repairs to the vehicles, parts and labor, permit fees to county land owners and office

supplies, you can add \$2800 per day to the above total. This all totals approximately \$4700 per day and overall, for the month, that 30 man crew spends approximately \$141,000 in the local economy. Now consider; this spurs an increase in leasing activity, which in turn spurs a potential interest in drilling for oil. Then, if oil is found, county and school taxes benefit. And on and on. So the next time you see a fleet of those strange looking trucks in the area, realize their arrival is only the "tip of the iceberg". The bottom line is future development and increased revenues throughout the community.

### Council approves bills of \$67-thousand

Members of the Spearman city council made short shrift of a full agenda authorizing payment of some \$67 thousand in goods and services already contracted, at the regular council meeting Tuesday night. A case in point was approval for payment the \$41,255.30 due Lipham Construction company for the 1981 street seal coat program. An additional \$3,506.70 payment was approved to McMorries and Burns for engineering services in connection with the seal coat program. Payment of \$17,085.40 to J.L. Brock Insurance Agency for 1981-82 gas insurance coverage

was approved, as was \$5,642 for auto liability insurance. Members of the council voted to authorize Mayor Ralph Blodgett to execute an agreement between the engineering firm of McMorries and Burns and the city of Spearman for consulting services involving completion of the Spearman municipal airport. This involves extension of a runway and installation of lights. This work was originally being paced according to the date federal and-or state grants were available to pay for the airport. It developed that entities ahead of the city of

Spearman were not ready with required matching funds while Spearman had already produced these matching funds. Spearman stands to advance in placement for these funds and must advance completion work. This includes that approved for engineering work in this item on the agenda, Tuesday evening. In routine matters of city government, the council considered and approved monthly reports from the fire department, ambulance service, police department, animal control and municipal court. Monthly bills were also

approved for payment. Following a set item on the agenda entitled "other" the meeting adjourned. The "other" classification deals with discussions from both council members and those in the audience of items deemed important but not on the agenda. Action can be taken only on agenda items but "other" items can be discussed. They are during this period of the regular meetings and many items often find their way to the agenda and official consideration and action. Meetings are conducted in the council chambers at city hall and are open to the public.

## Freshman Lynx Beat Perryton At Home

### Sales Tax Figures Continue Rise

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced 750 Texas cities received \$40.9 million in city sales tax rebates for September. The September payments push the city's rebates for this year to \$480.3 million up 14.7 percent over yearly payments to date during 1980.

The optional one-percent city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the four-percent state sales tax and returned each month by the Comptroller to the city in which it is collected.

The City of Spearman net payment for the period ending 9-8-81 was \$10,449.34 compared to \$5,247.21 last year. 1981 payments to date to the city are \$147,472.91 compared to \$112,505.35 last year, up 32.08%.

The City of Gruver received \$1,754.33 for the period ending 9-8-81 compared to \$0.00 for the same period last year. 1981 payments to date are \$22,810.25 compared to \$22,461.27 for the same period last year up 1.55%

# "Clash of Cultures" Thursday Film

Bobby Weaver, curator of ethnology at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum at Canyon, will be program and discussion leader for a film, "Clash of Cultures", at HANSFORD COUNTY LIBRARY, Thurs., Sept. 24, 7 p.m. Indians, the first settlers on the Great Plains, will be the subject of this month's series program. "Clash of Cultures" is third in a series of programs on THE GREAT PLAINS EXPERIENCE, a library community outreach project funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities through the University of Mid-America at Lincoln, Nebr. Elders of the tribe recall the differences in cultural outlook that resulted in conflict between Indians and white settlers in the northern plains. Discussion following is also likely to include modern problems: Indian/white, bracer/farm owner, industry/agriculture. Cultural conflict on the Plains was inevitable, according to Weaver, and is a part of every region's history, although

there was less in the Panhandle-Plains area than in most. Weaver will bring the discussion down to the southern area and compare the Panhandle-Plains experience with Comanches and other tribes to that of the north. The series is composed of film, museum exhibits, and discussion. The Amarillo area project is one of nine sites chosen nationwide by UMA, and is the only one in Texas. It is administered by Amarillo Public Library in cooperation with Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum. The series has been shown in Amarillo and Canyon and will be taken to the four Panhandle towns of Dalhart, Hereford, Shamrock and Spearman this fall with museums and libraries in those towns providing the library and museum exhibits. Interest in programs in the series has been strong, according to Anite Pitts, assistant project director. Attendance at the PPH Museum series averaged around 70, with similar

numbers projected for the area series. "The Land", an introductory film discussion led by Dr. Frederick W. Rathjen, professor of history, West Texas State University, attracted an audience of 140 at Dalhart May. 3. Byron Price, PPH Museum curator of history, and Carol Daffern, curator of exhibits, created 6 special exhibits for the Amarillo and Canyon series, and consulted with local museums in planning exhibits for each program. The exhibits emphasize and add dimension to the film material on the Great Plains. Local humanities scholars introduce the films and adapt them to the special Panhandle-Plains experience. They are Dr. Frederick W. Rathjen, history professor at WTSU; Roberta D. Speer, lab supervisor of Killgore Research Center; Bobby Weaver, PPH Museum curator of ethnology; Dr. Peter L. Petersen and Dr. Garry Null, professors of history at WTSU; and William C. Griggs, director of PPH Museum.

## Battle To Curtail Drug Abuse

DALLAS, TEXAS -- State Senator Bill Sarpalus, D-Hereford, played a significant leadership role in the battle to curtail drug abuse by children and adolescents in Texas, the Texans' War on Drugs Committee, established by Gov. Bill Clements and headed by Ross Perot, was formed to combat illegal drug trafficking in Texas. The committee's weapons are the education of parents, support of anti-drug legislation and improved communications among state law enforcement officers.

"Sarpalus and several other legislators went above and beyond the call of duty to support the Texans' War on Drugs program," said Perot, chairman of Dallas-based Electronic Data Systems Corp. "He heeded the call from parents all over the state to protect the children of Texas from the drug culture."

Perot emphasized that without the effective teamwork of state officials like Sarpalus and concerned Texas parents, the five-part legislative package developed by the Texans' War on Drug Committee would never have been passed. Perot also stressed that support from House Speaker Billy Clayton and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby was also an integral part of the program's success.

"The record number of letters and personal visits to state officials from their constituents during the regular legislative session indicates that illegal drug trafficking is a major concern for Texans," Perot said.

New statutes passed in the session toughen penalties for delivery of drugs to minors, tighten the laws against drug trafficking and make it illegal to manufacture, deliver or possess drug paraphernalia. Also passed was a triplicate prescription bill that will help identify persons who divert prescription drugs to the illegal market. The fifth new law permits immediate revocation of licenses of health care professionals convicted of drug-related felony crimes.

All of the laws became effective September 1, with the exception of the triplicate prescription bill.

## Rotary Club News

Bob Davis, aide to Congressman Jack Hightower was the speaker at the September 14 meeting of the Spearman Rotary Club.  
Little progress was made, when in 1979, President Carter attempted to cut the Federal Budget by 39 billion dollars. Reagan, on the other hand, has proposed a reduction in Federal spending at 36 billion dollars, 3 billion less than Carter.  
The basic difference between the two proposals and the action taken by the House and Senate relates to the communication of the Reagan administration with those on Capitol Hill. Congressman Hightower has met with Reagan, at small informal meetings, at least four times. These meetings have given the administration a chance to not only voice its points, but also have given the administration a chance to hear the input from the law makers. This two-way communication is a key.  
The debt paid by the Federal Government in interest now is greater than the total Federal Budget thirty years ago, some 100 billion dollars. The total deficit or national debt is one trillion dollars. This is a great cause of inflation. Many of the dollars available for lending each day is "gobbled up" by the government to pay its debt.  
It is seen by the administration as important to cut costs in every department and phase of government spending in order to get the system into balance and the economy moving ahead. A direction has now been established by the administration and lawmakers through the tax package being considered now. We will be in a budget and economic transition because of the shift in thinking about the budget and government spending. The goal is to get more for the dollar in upgrading equipment, salaries and efficiencies, not only in those programs related to the federal government, but also in the private sector.  
This transition and the time it takes to upgrade productivity and increase labor forces will

take time, with 18 months a realistic projection, after the tax package becomes law. Time will also help in making more money available through savings programs and investments in local savings and loan associations. The time will be when a passbook account will be profitable. This will make more money available for loans and construction, ect.  
The farm bill has not made much progress to date. It will probably be a one year bill. The proposals so far have been weak and sponsors have been hard to find because of its weakness. There is a need for a commitment for higher commodity prices which equal the cost of farm production costs and a greater export for the grain produced. Most of the other parts of the bill continue programs which are adequate, for example disaster relief, loans and the like.  
It is important for citizens to let their elected representatives know how they feel on important issues like the general tax bill, farm bill, military spending, ect.

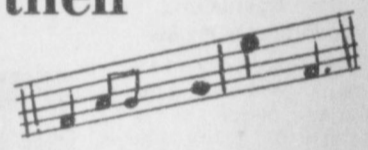

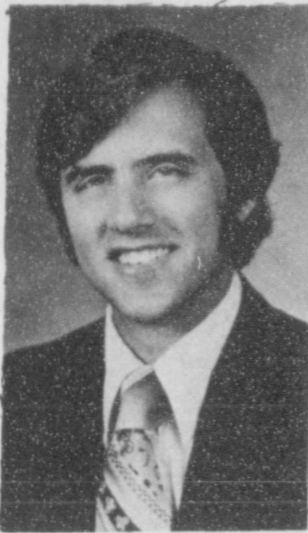
The second theft report that day concerned letters spelling out "Gruver" taken from the marquee of the Pizza Hut. The letters were located and no charges were made in the matter.

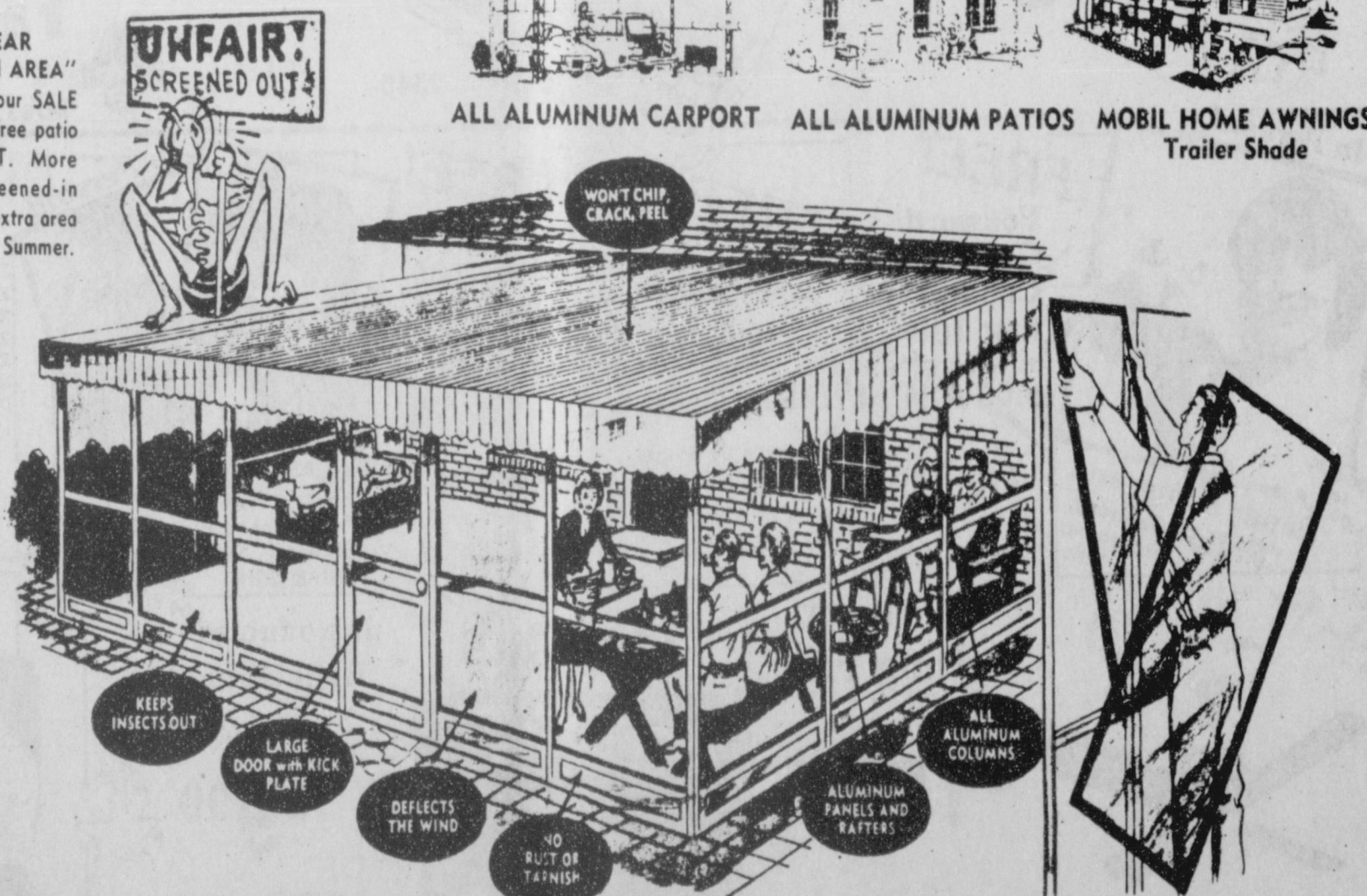

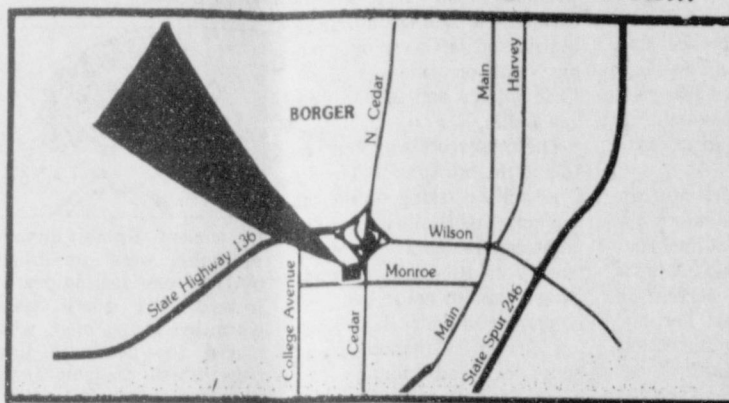
