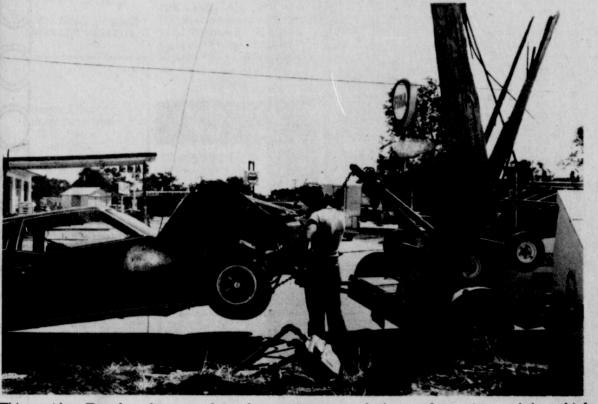

## Lynx Skin "Sneaky Snakes"

It was awesome, impressive! And the weather was perfect as the fine Stinnett Rattlers 41-0 in their homecoming game at Lynx Stadium Friday night. It is almost impossible to try and pick the key to victory. Was it the offense, the defense, the aerial game, or the running game? It had to be rated as a perfect game all-around for the Lynx. The passing was near perfect, the defense was unbelievable, the offensive blocking was the best in the school's history and even the weather was cooperating.

Elaine Reimer was crowned as homecoming queen in pre-game ceremonies. She was lovely and the three Trans-Am Herget Pontiacs—black, red, and blue—lended a real professional parade of class and beauty to the ceremonies.

On the first play of the game after Spearman had kicked off to Stinnett, the Rattlers raced 12 yards for a first down right through the entire Lynx forward wall. It looked like the Lynx were in trouble. But, ironically enough, this was the longest

gain of the nite for the classy Rattlers as the Lynx just didn't give an inch the rest of the game. Newton kicked the extra point to make the score 7-0. With 1:34 left in the first quarter, Sellers crashed over from the 1 yard line to give the Lynx a first quarter lead of 13-0, as Newton missed the extra point.

In the second quarter, Newton, behind good blocking, raced into the end zone from 12 yards and Sherwood ran over the 2 point try, to give the Lynx a 21-0 half-time lead.

With 2:45 left in the third quarter, Bodey smashed into the end zone and Newton added the extra point to give the Lynx a 28-0 lead. Billy Sellers added another touchdown a minute later, after the Lynx recovered a fumble; Seller's touchdown came on a 25 yard gallop that looked just like the Dallas Cowboys! Newton added the extra point and the Lynx had a 35-0 lead, with 1:29 left in the third quarter.

Randy (the dandy) Reid and his wrecking crew took over the last quarter and Reid made a

sensational TD run as he faded back to pass and swivel-hipped through the entire Rattler defense, 16 yards for a TD, with 3:36 left in the game.

The stats tell the whole story! Sherwood threw 5 passes and probably set a school record for Spearman, as he completed all five: his first pass was to Newton, 45 yards and a touchdown; he threw to Jones on his second pass, for 6 yards; his third and fourth passes were to Martin for 11 and 16 yards; pass number five was to Whitaker for 30 yards. Sherwood threw another pass, complete to Martin for 35 yards but it was called back! Actually he completed 6 of 6 and that has to be a school record!

In the ball carrying department, Bodey carried 11 times for 41 yards; Sellers 11 times for 99 yards; Sherwood 4 times for 14 yards; Newton 12 times for 97 yards; Snider 3 times for 15 yards; Boone 1 time for 1 yard; Reid 4 times for 6.3 yards; Barber 1 for 1, and Brown 1 for 2 yards. Total rushing yardage for the Lynx was 292.

Cris McClellan and David

Ortega thrilled the crowd with two fumble recoveries that set up touchdowns. The win was very impressive and the Lynx will prepare this week for the Shamrock Irish at Shamrock next Friday night!

## Hansford Soil & Water District Board Election Set

An election for a director to serve in Zone 4 of the Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 4, 1977 at the Morse Community Building, announced Charles Billhart, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 7:30 p.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 21 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 21 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Zone 4 of the district includes the southwest portion of Hansford County.

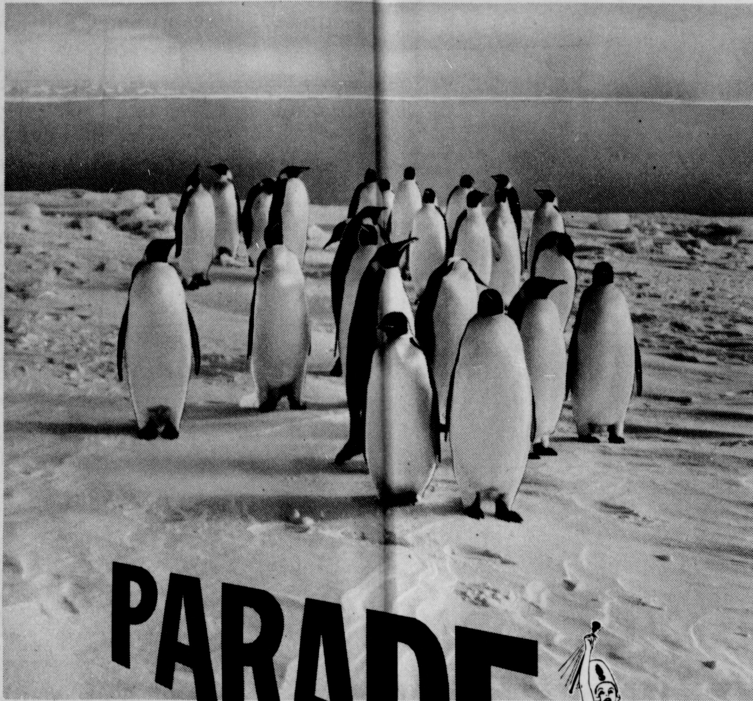

 We have been advised by the Texas Department of Health that results from one of the ten samples from our public water supply submitted to the state laboratory on July 25, 1977 indicated that we exceeded the maximum contaminant level on coliform bacteria for the July reporting period as set forth in Public Law 93-523. This law, better known as the "Safe Drinking Water Act," went into effect June 24, 1977, and requires all public water systems to notify the public in the event that any maximum contaminant level is exceeded. We have since submitted check samples from the same sampling point, and all check samples analyzed have shown satisfactory results. The coliform bacteria is an indicator of possible contamination and is not harmful in itself. We therefore feel there is no threat to public health and that since contamination of samples can result from human error involved in sampling and testing procedures, we feel that no further action needed at this time. If any future testing reveals that we exceed any maximum contaminant level, we will immediately inform the public. Sincerely,

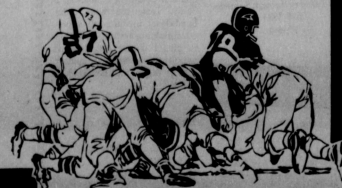

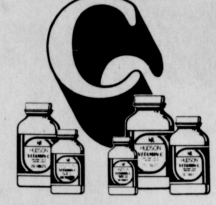

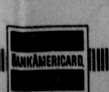

# In Depth

This will be the fourth in a series of articles bringing you to you in depth interviews with the Lynx coaches. This week our interview was with Bill Hamilton.

Coch Hamilton was raised in Dumas where he attended and graduated from Dumas High School. His sports participation in Dumas included baseball and basketball lettering for three years each. Upon graduation from high school Bill did not start attending college full time. He was offered a baseball contract by the Baltimore Orioles which he accepted, beginning as a pitcher in the Norfolk League in South Dakota. The next year the Orioles transferred him to the Florida State League. A most unfortunate injury occurred nearly in the middle of the season when Bill wrenched his knee badly tearing the muscles and ligaments. This permanent injury ruined any further chances he had of playing m-ball.

Coch Hamilton left baseball and started attending WTSU full time in 1973, majoring in Physical Education and Biology. While attending WTSU he was assisted Coach Bob Sloan at Canyon High School coaching baseball. After receiving his teacher's credentials from West Texas State, his first coaching job was right here in Spearman. He started here in Spearman in 1975 and now specializes with the quarterbacks on offense and the defensive ends in Varsity football. He's also the Head Coach of the Spearman Football Club, assists with the Varsity Girls' Basketball and is the Head Girls' Basketball "B" Team Coach.

In Coch Hamilton's Varsity duties, he attempts to teach the quarterbacks how to deliver the ball in various plays and how to keep pass protection when they are throwing. With the defensive ends he teaches them that their primary job is to turn the line inside, giving the linemen and backs an opportunity at making the tackle. If they've seen that their primary function has been achieved he teaches them how to help make the tackle. He instructs them on how to read the positions of the offensive backs, trying to see if they will be a pass or a run.

If they read the defensive ends are taught to circle around the pass protection from the outside and rush the passer. Coaching has come along since the sixties and Coach Hamilton is another one of the reasons why we think Spearman has the best coaching staff in this part of the state.

# The Purpose of SWCD

He taught history for four years in a California high school prior to becoming an agent to rescue ancient art objects and religious artifacts which were treasures of the Jewish Community in Cairo and Alexandria, Egypt.

As an intellectual, sophisticated atheist he was confronted with a crisis and his need for a personal dynamic faith while in Israel. He is now engaged as a speaker of numerous colleges, churches, synagogues and civic groups. He shares his life's experiences to the contemporary world.

He ministered for several months with Kathryn Kuhlman. He has been the leading speaker at the Holy Spirit Conference, and other world charismatic conference. He has written two books

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)**  
S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the State of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges, and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)**  
S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)**  
S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been previously convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a felony offense while that person was convicted of a prior felony offense, providing for a 60-day trial to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal.

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated as cultural, historical or natural history resources.
