Although for several years, we will have ample supply of water for our irrigation wells in the South part of the county, already several wells in the North part of the county and other spots is getting short. "The Tax Relief Amendment'

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal erty, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment reprovide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public ool property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be in-

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the govern-ing body provides public notice and conducts a hearing. public amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax pur-poses. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities.



"Even though there can occassionally be symptoms such as frequent changes of glasses and the inability to adjust eyes to darkened rooms, the major indication of glaucoma is a build-up of pressure within the eye. This pressure can only be

To give the tonometry test for the disease, the doctors will put a few drops of a mild anaesthetic in the eye, then place the tonometer on the eyeball to gauge the pressure within. The test takes only a few minutes, is painless, and does not affect vision for driving afterwards.

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

On Sunday, September 17, a very special person will be celebrating her 93rd birthday. To many she is known as Aunt Jessie, to me, Mother. She has experienced many changes throughout the years - covered wagons, trains, automobiles, airplanes, and the space flight to the moon; tents and half dug-outs for homes, no running water, electricity nor gas; sparcely settled communities to thickly populated areas and cities; so I would like to share some of her experiences with

In June of 1901, my grandparents, the late Jake and Amanda Mathews along with three of their children, their son Frank, his wife Maude and their infant son Dewey; and their daughters Cora and Jessie left their comfortable home and a thriving business in Young County Texas to come to the Panhandle to help pioneer a new land.

Grandaddy had made a business trip to the Panhandle the previous winter. He liked it so well that he was determined that it would be their new home, so he disposed of his business and home, packed up their belongings, loaded them on covered wagons, and with extra horses and a cow, they set out. Grandmother and Grandaddy traveled in an old buggy. The others in the party drove the

They were on the road for 13 days, and as Mother relates it, ment and discomfort of Grand-

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mother and the kids, cow chips were burned. They had never heard of such a thing. My Grandmother thought they had come to the end of the world.

Grandaddy had dug a well while there in the winter, but during his absence, a cow had fallen in the well and drowned, consequently drinking water had to be hauled in until another well could be dug.

Grandaddy had cattle in Oklahoma, so he was gone for long periods of time. This placed a lot of responsibility on my Grandmother. Fortunately the Indian problems had already been solved. The main problems were from the weather and prairie fires.

A lot of the groceries were bought by trading one item for another, especially eggs. They sold for one cent a dozen. Mother relates that Gran-

daddy wasn't very careful with his belongings. One time he lost his wallet in the pig pen. Mother and Aunt Cora attended school in the Lieb school house. It consisted of

one small room. They were

more fortunate than some, they

only had to walk a mile to

boarded with them. They got their mail at the 'Old Tyler Place." It was about three miles from them. Mail was delivered to the Post Office three times a week.

Mother relates that on one occasion when she had been sent to get the cows, she encountered a large Prairie rattler. Grandaddy had always told them if they saw a snake to always kill it. Unfortunately, Mother didn't get this one killed. She just made it mad, and it started chasing her. She says it didn't catch her though.

For entertainment they would saddle their horses, don their black riding skirts, and ride many miles to dances and parties. Because of the distance, they would have to spend the night. Every Sunday evening they would go somewhere to 'Singing.

Grandaddy finally got around to building on to their house. It consisted of a large living room and an outside hall. Mother said you had to go outside and down this long hall to get to the kitchen. Prior to this time, they had slept in a half dug-out but had still used the small rock

In a short time, the rest of the family moved and settled in or near the Panhandle. Aunt Cumi married Ben Clifton; Aunt Ava married W. J. (Will) Mathis: Aunt Georgia married Hosea Jones; Aunt Cora married Roscoe Parks and Uncle Luther

married Alma Womble.

On October 21, 1906, my mother and father, the late Raine Tompkins, were married in a double wedding with his sister, Ara, and Edgar Womble. (Aunt Ara only lived a few years and Uncle Edgar married Bessie McGuiney). The wedding took place at Old Hans-

Mother and Daddy established their home in Hutchison County in what is known as the Lieb Community. It was a wonderful community with the Lieb family, the Womble family, the Jarvis family, the Harbour family and many otahers sharing the good times and the

One of the highlights of the times was the visit from the traveling "Peddler." He came every two weeks. Mother would trade eggs for what she needed. Calico material sold for one

eye glasses from this "Ped-

One winter a blizzard blew up unexpectedly. Mother had clothes on the line and they were blown all over the place. She found some of them six months later.

On December 14, 1913, their home was made even happier by the birth of a daughter, Alda, and on February 16, 19920, I was born to this wonderful

The years were happy ones even through the ups and downs and hardships of life. In 1927 Mother and Daddy moved to Spearman. Daddy died on March 10,

1933 and Mother had to pick up the pieces of her shattered life. This she did with grace and During my lifetime I have

seen my Mother as she really is The Most Wonderful Person there will ever be in my life. She is always there when you need her - to talk to, or just be there. I have seen her open her home, her purse and her heart to anyone in need. She always knows the exact words to say to the person in need as is always there to lend a helping hand.

If there is any good in me, I owe it all to Mother because it was through her teaching and influence and by knowing that she is always there when I need
