It is quite a thrill to watch the 7th graders in their debut as footballers. I had the privilege of watching our 7th grade Lynx in action Thursday night, as they made their first real big crowd appearance before the hometown folks. I enjoy watching all of the clubs, but this is the first time for our grade school kids to play in an official game and they had real live officials, headed by our own Clark Mires. The rest of the official staff was made up of West Texas State boys who are taking a course in officiating. They called a real fine ball game and in spite of the 7th grade losing a thriller 14-8 to Perryton, it is very exciting to see the young kids play their first "real" game before their parents, uncles and aunts, grandmas and grandpas! We have always tried to cover the games equally. Some of the games we get in the Thursday paper, and some in the Sunday paper. So, if we missed your boy's game, it will be in the Thursday paper.

Building continues at a torrid pace in Spearman. Besides the new motel and jewelry store being erected in the shopping center, many new homes are going up. I am anxious to find out what our building permits for the past few months total.

Palo Duro River Authority manager Johnnie Lee spoke at the Lions Club last Tuesday and discussed the new Palo Duro Dam, that will be built North of Spearman. Water is suddenly getting back in the news. In just a few short years, water will be one of our major problems. Although for several years, we will have ample supply of water for our irrigation wells in the South part of the county, already several wells in the North part of the county and other spots is getting short. Lee now heads the Palo Duro Dam project in Spearman, and ironically enough, this may be our most important project for the city and area! And, much sooner than you think!

The loss of enrollment in the area schools can be directly connected with the low farm prices, and the drouth, of course. If you don't have some kind of industry to carry on in the time of drouth and low farm prices, you suffer. Dumas school enrollment is up over 200 students this year, to a total of 3,223 students. Sunday also is up, and all of this is a result of industry in the area. A new Southwestern Public Service coal fired generator is going to be constructed Southwest of Amarillo in the near future, and the towns in the area will benefit some 3,000 families! Wouldn't it be terrific if we could get some type of industry like that? Here we are in the middle of the cattle, wheat, milo capital of the world and no processing plants!

The oil industry looks promising. What we need is a new deep well discovery in the area. However, until the price gets better, the oil companies can store their gas and oil in the ground cheaper than they can produce it. Don't let the peace talks in the Middle East fool you. We are in for a terrible conflict over this fuel. While President Carter, Sadat and Begin are trying to straighten out their problems, the Communists are continuing to take over. Their one objective is to cut off our fuel supply from the Middle East.

The weather has been hotter this September than at anytime I can remember! It was 96 degrees Thursday of this week, and I think it was even hotter on Friday.

Water & Trash Rates Raised

Councilmen of the City of Spearman held their regular semi-monthly meeting Sept. 12 at City Hall.

A final budget hearing was held and the budget was approved for \$1,204,000 for the 1978-79 year.

An ordinance was passed adopting the budget and setting the tax rate at \$1.20 per \$100 valuation, which is the same as last year's tax rate.

Also passed was an ordinance raising the sewer rates 50 cents and trash rates 50 cents. Monthly reports from department heads were given, and the

council approved bills for payment.

Mayor Ralph Blodgett, City Manager Len Simpson, and city attorney, J. E. Blackburn will be going to Austin Oct. 25 to appear before the Railroad Commission concerning the increase in the gas rate being asked for by High Plains Gas Company, the city gas supplier.

LYNX win 18-7

The Spearman Lynx won their home opener Friday night, 18-7. Tri captains for the game, were Billy Snider, Billy Sellers, and John Reneau. Shari Fox gave the welcome, and Christi Collier the invocation. The Spearman high school band played the National Anthem, and at 6:30 p.m., the game between Frenship and Spearman began.

The first half saw the Lynx defense rise to the occasion early in the game, when Ortega jumped on a Frenship fumble to stop a scoring drive on the five! Both teams fought back and forth the first half, with the game ending in a 2nd quarter deadlock.

In the third period, Newton scored on a 10 yard run, with 2:25 left. The try for extra point failed. Frenship rushed back in the fourth and went ahead 7-6, with 10:55 left.

With three of his starting running backs injured in the first half, Cocah Smith put in "Daniel Boone" who promptly ripped off a 7 yard touchdown with 5:36 left in the 4th period. The try for extra point again failed.

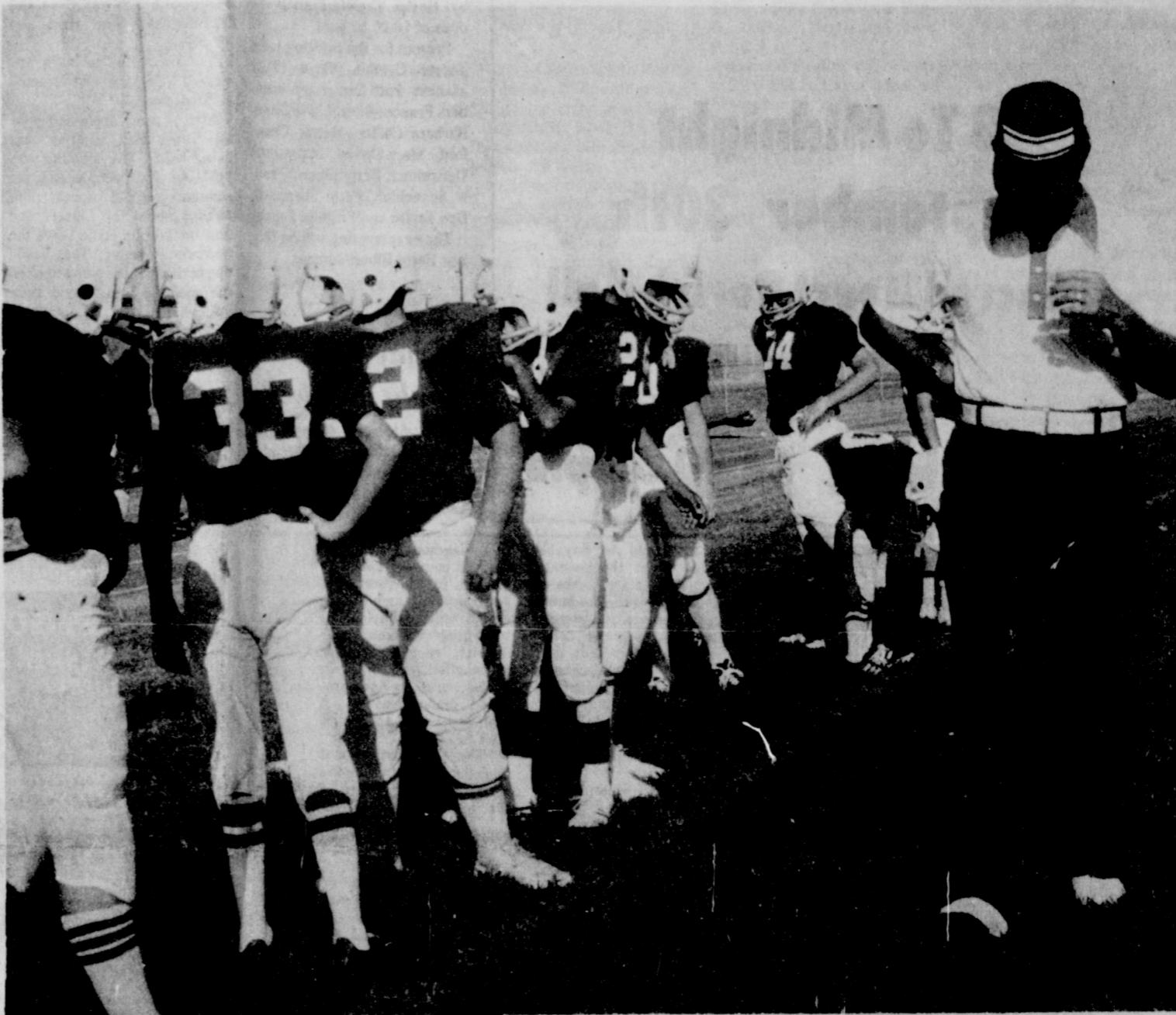
Frenship, desperately trying to get back in the game, trailing 12-7, tried a long pass late in the 4th period, and Martin picked it off and raced 40 yards to set up the final TD. With 2:47 showing on the clock after the interception, quarterback Newton alternated with his running backs Lozano, and Boone, to set up a quarterback sneak from the 2 ft. line.

Hospital Board Approves Increase

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of Hansford County Hospital District met Thursday, Sept. 14 at 7:30 p.m. in the Hospital Library.

Max Baggerly, president presided. The reading of the minutes was held and the financial report was given and payment of bills authorized.

The lawsuit against Dr. Abrams is scheduled to be on the docket of District Court early in October.

The building committee reported that the ice machines were working and the boilers had passed inspection.

J. Mack Hoel, CPA of Gruver, was hired for the year end audit.

The salary schedule was approved as presented, bringing the salaries up to the present minimum wage, \$2.95.

The board appointed a committee to investigate the possibility of purchasing the Hackley Clinic building.

Dr. Thu Plans Move To San Antonio

Gruvers Dr. Le Huu Thu, who has been a practicing physician in the Gruver area since November 1976, indicated Monday that he was resigning and would be moving to San Antonio at the end of the week.

Dr. Thu, who with his lovely family, arrived in the Gruver area in July 1975, will be with a clinic in San Antonio as well as pursuing his specialty of Family Life Training and further schooling.

Following the families arrival in Gruver, Dr. Thu who had received his degree from the Medcole University in Saigon in 1964 and had practiced there prior to his arrival in the States, received certification from the

University of Oklahoma, College of Medicine, 1 July 1976 having completed a formal Review Course conducted from March 1st through June 30th.

He received his Certificate of Proficiency in Basic Science from the State of Texas the following November, allowing him to practice medicine in Texas. This certification was signed by the Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates.

Dr. Thu and his family were welcomed to our community and it is difficult for them to leave and for us to have them leave. Appreciative Gruver citizenry presented him with a plaque inscribed with "Le Huu

Thu, M.D., "for outstanding service during his 1st year of service in the USA. Signed "City of Gruver" November 22, 1977." At the same time Mackie Wood, R.N. was recognized for her outstanding service to the community through the Gruver Clinic.

In interview with Dr. Thu late Monday, he indicated that a prime motive in making such a move was, perhaps, the excellent children's hospitals which are available in San Antonio as well as opportunities for advancing studies.

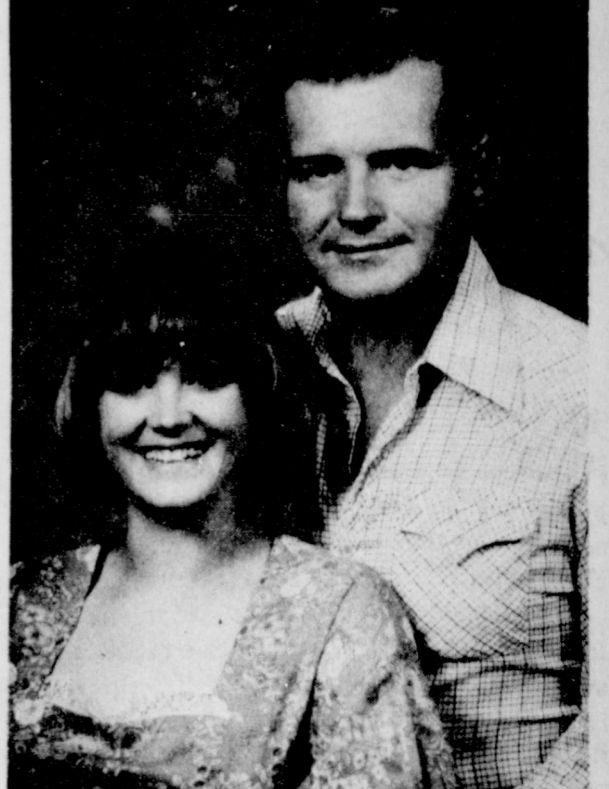
We will miss Dr. Thu and his gentle family—they have indeed become friends along with becoming Gruverites.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

'The Tax Relief Amendment' (H.J.R. 1)
H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

bonds would be payable solely from the revenue from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities.

'The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration.'

NUMBER ONE (S.J.R. 50)
S.J.R. 50 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete an archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in nonprofit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts.

'The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes.'

NUMBER TWO (S.J.R. 55)
S.J.R. 55 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit local governments to issue bonds for the reconstruction or acquisition of facilities (land, equipment and improvements) designed to develop employment opportunities. These

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"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes.'

'The amendment grants justifications of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court.

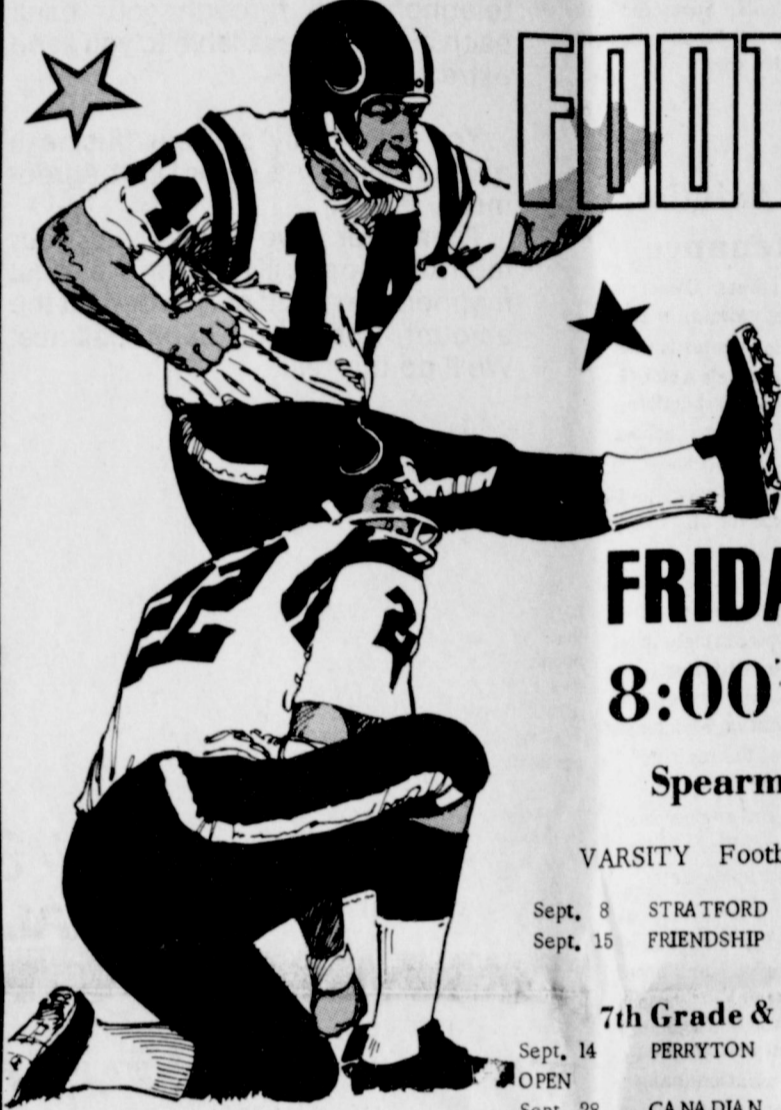

BLANKET AND SCHEDULE FORMS

Two types of forms are used with regard to "float" insurance policies. One of them is called a "blanket" policy. It gives a general description of all the articles involved. This type is used when there is a frequent change in the items of property. It is also employed when there are a great number of articles to be covered, with the result that enumerating and describing them would take up too much space on the form.

Schedule forms, on the other hand, get down to specifics and particulars. They list all the various things that are to be covered. When a precise definition of an insurance company's liability is necessary, a schedule form is in order. It is also used to make sure the am-

ount of insurance is pegged as closely as possible to the actual value of the items. Furs, jewelry, fine arts, cameras, and musical instruments are written on schedule forms. Stamp collections are written on both forms, and personal effects policies are on the blanket type. This insurance, by the way, comes under the "inland marine" category—coverage on land—an outgrowth of "marine (ocean) insurance."

Glaucoma Tests To Be Given

The Spearman Lions Club has scheduled a free glaucoma screening for Thursday, October 5, from 7-9 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall of the Spearman First United Methodist Church, 407 South Haney. R. L. Kleeberger, M. D. is chairman of the screening which is being co-sponsored by the Panhandle Branch of the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness. Dick Elbert is president of the Spearman Lions Club and Claude Newell in charge of publicity for the screening.

The free screening is one of the major community services of the Lions Club and has been undertaken to combat the insidious nature of the eye disease which is the second major cause of blindness in the country today.

Working with the Lions club on the project will be their wives, members of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce, and members of the Texas

Graduate Nurses Association.

"Glaucoma generally starts without pain or noticeable symptoms and what sight it destroys can never be restored," says Mr. Elbert. "That is the reason why it is necessary to catch it in its earliest stages."

"Even though there can occasionally be symptoms such as frequent changes of glasses and the inability to adjust eyes to darkened rooms, the major indication of glaucoma is a build-up of pressure within the eye. This pressure can only be detected with a tonometer, such as the Shiotz tonometer that the doctors will be using at the screening."

"Since this build up of pressure occurs most often after the age of 35, we urge all those over this age to come for a free test for the disease on Thursday, October 5th."

According to Prevent Blindness, damage caused by glaucoma cannot be undone once it

progresses to a point of impairing vision. There is however, effective treatment to arrest the disease, in most cases, if it is detected in time.

To give the tonometry test for the disease, the doctors will put a few drops of a mild anaesthetic in the eye, then place the tonometer on the eyeball to gauge the pressure within. The test takes only a few minutes, is painless, and does not affect vision for driving afterwards.

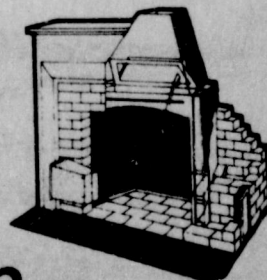

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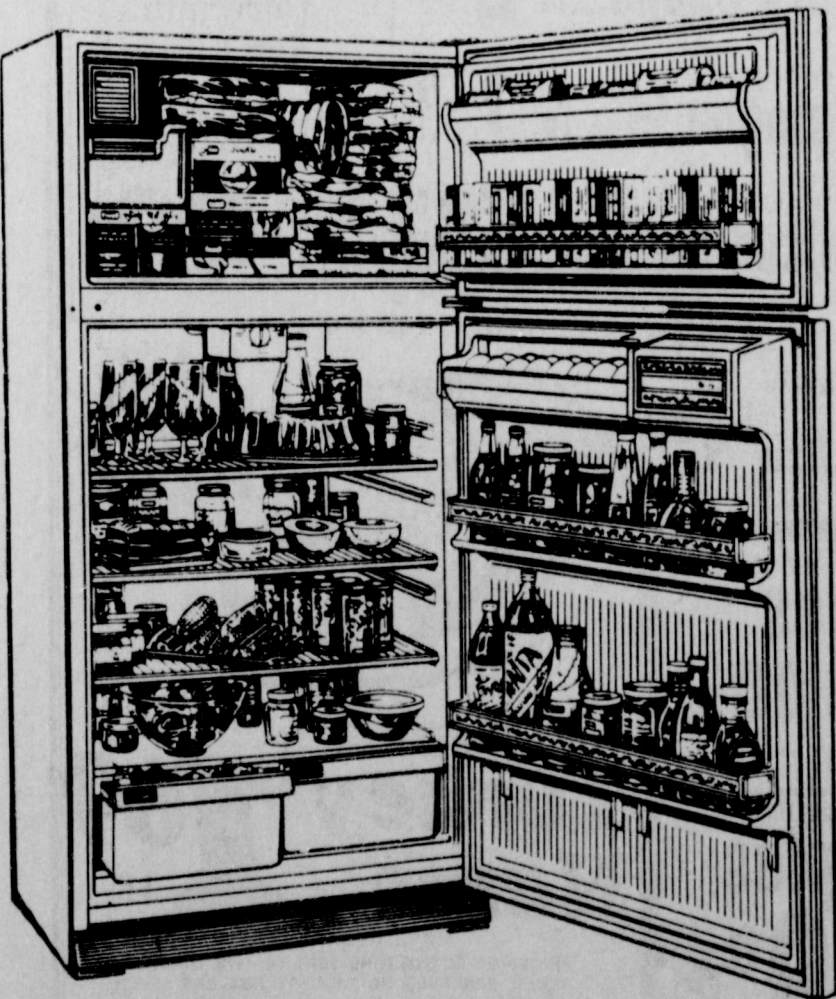

She has experienced many changes throughout the years - covered wagons, trains, automobiles, airplanes, and the space flight to the moon; tents and half dug-outs for homes, no running water, electricity nor gas; sparsely settled communities to thickly populated areas and cities; so I would like to share some of her experiences with others.

In June of 1901, my grandparents, the late Jake and Amanda Mathews along with three of their children, their son Frank, his wife Maude and their infant son Dewey; and their daughters Cora and Jessie left their comfortable home and a thriving business in Young County Texas to come to the Panhandle to help pioneer a new land.

Granddaddy had made a business trip to the Panhandle the previous winter. He liked it so well that he was determined that it would be their new home, so he disposed of his business and home, packed up their belongings, loaded them on covered wagons, and with extra horses and a cow, they set out. Grandmother and Granddaddy traveled in an old buggy. The others in the party drove the wagons.

They were on the road for 13 days, and as Mother relates it,

not very comfortable ones. The other members of the party didn't share Granddaddy's enthusiasm. Mother says she has never liked "camping out" since then. My Grandmother had never faced any discomforts or hardships, so it was very difficult for her.

When they reached the Brazos River, there was no visible crossing. Due to heavy rains, the river was very high. Mother states that Granddaddy wasn't a very patient person, so instead of waiting or hunting for a crossing, he decided to ford on across. He had two beautiful black horses that plunged into the water. They were immediately immersed with just their heads above water. Mother said she just knew the horses would capsize, but they swam right on across.

They had never experienced dirt storms and high winds until they were well on the way. Not only dirt and wind, but thunderstorms as well. Mother says the thunder and lightning was much worse then than it is now.

After thirteen days on the road, they reached their new home in Hutchison County Texas. The new home was a small one room rock house, so the tent still had to be used for the bedroom. The small rock house had to be used as the kitchen.

It was late when they arrived and there was no wood to build a fire, so much to the astonishment and discomfort of Grand-

mother and the kids, cow chips were burned. They had never heard of such a thing. My Grandmother thought they had come to the end of the world.

Granddaddy had dug a well while there in the winter, but during his absence, a cow had fallen in the well and drowned, consequently drinking water had to be hauled in until another well could be dug.

Granddaddy had cattle in Oklahoma, so he was gone for long periods of time. This placed a lot of responsibility on my Grandmother. Fortunately the Indian problems had already been solved. The main problems were from the weather and prairie fires.

A lot of the groceries were bought by trading one item for another, especially eggs. They sold for one cent a dozen.

Mother relates that Granddaddy wasn't very careful with his belongings. One time he lost his wallet in the pig pen.

Mother and Aunt Cora attended school in the Lieb school house. It consisted of one small room. They were more fortunate than some, they only had to walk a mile to school. The teacher always

boarded with them.

They got their mail at the "Old Tyler Place." It was about three miles from them. Mail was delivered to the Post Office three times a week.

Mother relates that on one occasion when she had been sent to get the cows, she encountered a large Prairie rattler. Granddaddy had always told them if they saw a snake to always kill it. Unfortunately, Mother didn't get this one killed. She just made it mad, and it started chasing her. She says it didn't catch her though.

For entertainment they would saddle their horses, don their black riding skirts, and ride many miles to dances and parties. Because of the distance, they would have to spend the night. Every Sunday evening they would go somewhere to a "Singing."

Granddaddy finally got around to building on to their house. It consisted of a large living room and an outside hall. Mother said you had to go outside and down this long hall to get to the kitchen. Prior to this time, they had slept in a half dug-out but had still used the small rock house for a kitchen.

In a short time, the rest of the family moved and settled in or near the Panhandle. Aunt Cumi married Ben Clifton; Aunt Ava married W. J. (Will) Mathis; Aunt Georgia married Hosea Jones; Aunt Cora married Roscoe Parks and Uncle Luther married Alma Womble.

On October 21, 1906, my mother and father, the late Raine Tompkins, were married in a double wedding with his sister, Ara, and Edgar Womble. (Aunt Ara only lived a few years and Uncle Edgar married Bessie McGuiney). The wedding took place at Old Hansford.

Mother and Daddy established their home in Hutchison County in what is known as the Lieb Community. It was a wonderful community with the Lieb family, the Womble family, the Jarvis family, the Harbour family and many others sharing the good times and the bad.

One of the highlights of the times was the visit from the traveling "Peddler." He came every two weeks. Mother would trade eggs for what she needed. Calico material sold for one cent a yard. You could also get

eye glasses from this "Peddler."

One winter a blizzard blew up unexpectedly. Mother had clothes on the line and they were blown all over the place. She found some of them six months later.

On December 14, 1913, their home was made even happier by the birth of a daughter, Aida, and on February 16, 1920, I was born to this wonderful couple.

The years were happy ones even through the ups and downs and hardships of life. In 1927 Mother and Daddy moved to Spearman.

Daddy died on March 10, 1933 and Mother had to pick up the pieces of her shattered life. This she did with grace and dignity.

During my lifetime I have seen my Mother as she really is - **The Most Wonderful Person** there will ever be in my life. She is always there when you need her - to talk to, or just be there. I have seen her open her home, her purse and her heart to anyone in need. She always knows the exact words to say to the person in need as is always there to lend a helping hand.

If there is any good in me, I owe it all to Mother because it was through her teaching and influence and by knowing that she is always there when I need her.
