County Has Two Teams In Regional

Hansford County's two bi-district Champions girls basketball teams will see action Friday morning in the Tech coliseum in Lubbock in the first round of the regional tournament for A and AA teams.

Gruver will open the action at 8:30 a. m. when they meet a tough Sudan six. The Hornets have been tough on the South Plains this year.

Lynxettes To Meet State's Top Team

At 11:10 a. m. the Spearman Lynxettes meet the top rated team in the state, Friona, for the first round of the tournament.

The finals will also be played Friday.

Gruver advanced to the finals with a solid 49-37 win over the Wellington Skyrockettes in Caprock gym in Amarillo Tuesday night. Anita States led the Gruver victory with 27 points.

Spearman moved to the regional tournament with a thrilling last minute 55-51 win over Abernathy.

Coach Dean Weese said Granberry and Hamlin are the other two teams in the regional tournament. He said Trent had beaten Hamlin by 20 points earlier this season.

Tough is the only word Weese had for Friona. He scouted them Monday when they swamped Post in bi-district.

He said their guards are extremely tough. The girl he thought was their best guard when Spearman played the Squaws at Tulia has been beaten out for her position. They have developed some really good girls. They have two big guards and one small fast one.

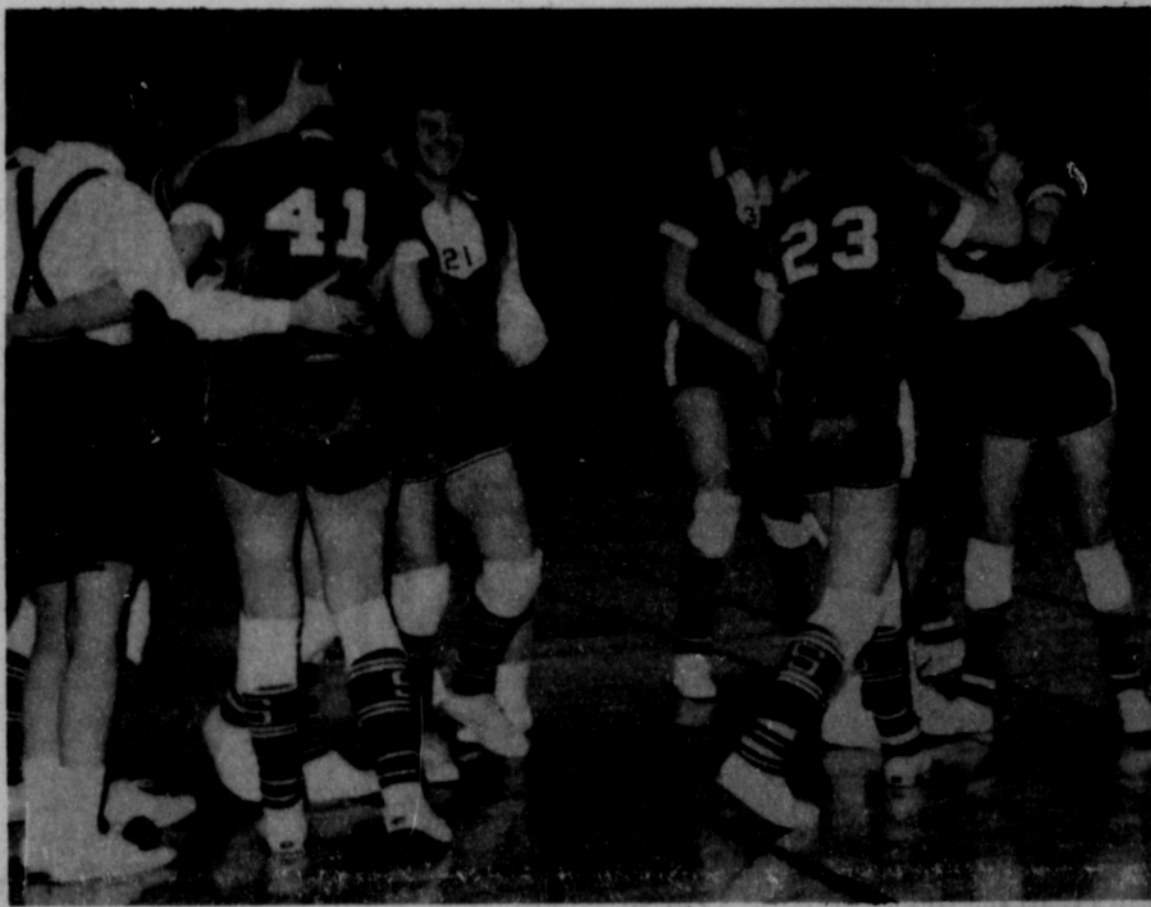
We are going to have to be real tough to score against Friona, Weese said.

City's Financial Condition Steadily Increases Reserve

An improving financial situation for the City of Spearman was pointed out in the financial statement presented at the regular meeting of the city council Monday night.

The statement showed that on Jan. 31, 1964, the eight different bank accounts for the different city funds and the change and petty cash fund showed a balance of \$21,861.38.

City receipts in the month totaled \$41,312.38. Expenditures in the eight funds during the month totaled \$29,795.44, leaving a total balance of \$33,378.32.

City Manager Ken Conrey told the council that on March 1, a payment of \$20,000 was made on systems bonds. This

money comes from income from utilities.

Conrey pointed out that the city's cash money situation is improving every month and besides the cash money the city has had \$10,000 in U. S. Series HBonds drawing interest for the past three years.

In routine business the city received an application for changing the zoning from A to C at Eleventh and Roland for the home for senior citizens.

Also, a request for a change in zoning was made by Wilcox Flowers at Tenth and Haney for expansion of the shop.

After a long discussion on ways to repair the holes in the streets it was decided to use the city's small penetrating oil equipment to seal the holes.

Lynxettes Overcome Abernathy Lead 55-51

A kitten size Lynxette came off the bench in the third quarter Tuesday night in Canyon and provided the spark the Lynxettes needed to break the bi-district jinx with a 55-51 win over the Abernathy Antelopes.

With Abernathy in the lead and adding up points Robbie Ownbey went into the game midway of the third quarter to lead the Lynxettes out of what looked like a third consecutive bi-district defeat.

While Ownbey was sparking the guards, the second little scratcher on the team, Phyllis Patterson stopped passing and went to shooting to overcome the Abernathy lead.

During the wild third quarter Abernathy took a nine point lead at one point. The Antelopes built the lead up on some quick baskets as a result of Spearman miscues.

During the bad third quarter the Lynxette defensive troops lost the ball out of bounds several times when trying to pass it in after an Abernathy score. Joan Hackley was trying to hit Sharion Close on the sideline with a long pass over the tall Abernathy defenders. Hackley was missing her target by a few inches and the ball was going

out of bounds.

When Ownbey climbed on Abernathy's high scoring Donna Webb to slow her scoring spree, Hackley and Close turned on the work on the boards and Spearman started getting back into the ball game.

At the end of the third quarter Spearman was leading 38-37. The lead changed several times in the final eight minutes and was tied numerous times. Then, with about one minute remaining Patterson put Spearman in front by two points on two free shots.

The Lynxettes kept Abernathy from scoring and the forwards got the ball with 48 seconds on the clock. They went into a stall just passing the ball and Patterson dribbling. With about ten seconds on the clock Abernathy sent their best guard after Patterson, but she could not beat the little dribbler. With four seconds on the clock and Patterson dribbling in a circle, Wilde was alone under the basket. Patterson whipped her the ball, and she added the two insurance points.

The buzzer sounded bringing forth oceans of tears of victory and defeat.

Spearman opened the game trying to feed Vicki Wilde under the bucket as the Antelopes stuck their fastest guard on Patterson. Wilde carried the scoring punch in the opening minutes as Spearman took a 3-0 lead. Then Abernathy tied it at 3-3 with 4:27 left in the first quarter. They went ahead 6-5 with 2:36 remaining. They were leading 10-7 at the quarter.

Abernathy was to keep the lead until Spearman tied the game at 14-14 with 5:37 left in the second quarter. They were leading 10-7 at the quarter.

Abernathy's Donna Webb was shooting Spearman out of the gym. She had 19 of Abernathy's 26 points in the first half. She came back strong in the third quarter and hit most of the Antelope points in their surge to the front. She had 36 points for the night. Linda Miller had five for Abernathy and Denise Baker hit 10.

Vicki Wilde had scoring honors for Spearman with 13 field goals and two free shots for 28. Patterson pumped in nine field goals and five free shots for 23. Helen Greever hit four points, and the hustling forward gave the Lynxettes some badly needed rebounds at crucial points.

In the school board election Ray Moore and R.E. Sanders, Jr., are seeking re-election. The other two candidates are Charles Gilliam and Massie.

Home To Be Constructed

Construction on a 36-bed Senior Citizens' Home will begin in Spearman as soon as a zoning change can be secured from the city, Dr. D. E. Hack-

ley said this week. Dr. Hackley, one of the organizers of the Golden Years Inc., organization, said the home would be built by private

money and be operated by a Pampa couple, Mr. and Mrs. James Davenport. The brick home is to be built at the corner of Roland and Eleventh Streets and plans now call for it to face north on Eleventh.

Blueprints of the planned home show private, semi-private and four-bed wards for persons living in the home.

Dr. Hackley said the administrator of the home will be a registered nurse, there will be 24-hour nursing service for all persons needing care.

Bill Didlake of Borger is going to build the home. He has recently built homes in Borger and Pampa. The Davenports have two homes in Pampa, one of them is a 100-bed home.

Dr. Hackley said now that the home is about to be started, the Golden Years organization would probably disband. The group has been working for about three years to get a home in Spearman.

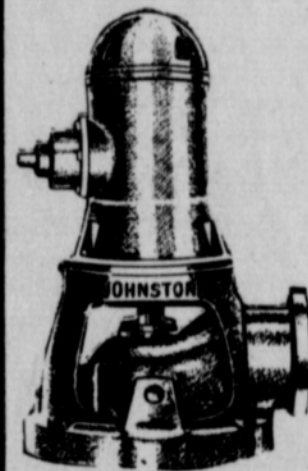

Gruver Boy Is Finalist

GRUVER, March 3 — Named a finalist in the National merit Scholarship competition, Bill Pittman, a senior, is the first Gruver High School student to earn such an honor.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Erlis Pittman, he was one of 13,000 students in the U. S. to reach the finals. That number represents the upper one-half of

one per cent of secondary school seniors in the nation.

About 1,600 winners will be selected from the finalists. Last year 1,528 were named to receive scholarships averaging \$796 annually or \$3,184 for four years of college.

An estimated 600,000 students in more than 16,000 high schools took the qualifying test last March.

Lawmakers' Report

Congressman Walter Rogers and Senator Ralph Yarborough discuss the tax cut law this week, while Senator John Tower was interested in the farm bill.

Rep. Rogers said he agreed with President Johnson in considering the tax cut as the single most important thing done since World War Two to strengthen the economy.

The Congressman says the capital freed for spending by the private sector of the economy will help the economy more than spending by the government.

Rogers reported that Gov. John Connally said redistricting should be a priority matter for the state legislature next January. However, the Gov. hopes he does not have to call a special session to do the redistricting.

Our Representative expects Congress to adjourn late in June or early July. He says both houses are trying to get bills clear of committee consideration before the Senate goes into the Civil Rights debate that may last for months.

One other item pointed out by Rogers is that a silver short-

age is causing the withdrawal of silver certificates and the issuing of Federal Reserve notes. The silver backing the notes is needed for minting coins.

Sen. Yarborough says the tax cut will help cure unemployment because the extra spending power will create new jobs.

However, the liberal senator is still expecting government jobs to take care of much of the unemployment through public works programs for local cities and towns over the nation.

Senator Yarborough said if there had not been a tax cut more people would have been put out of work.

Senator John Tower discussed the farm bill that is to be considered by the senate.

He said the bill's sections on wheat and cotton have not been aired enough for farmers to be

completely familiar with its contents.

Sen. Tower said it was for this reason that he raised an objection to the Administration's efforts to run the bill through the Senate in what he considered undue haste.

For cotton he is sponsoring an amendment that would set the support at the world market and then pay a direct subsidy to the producer.

He is also preparing an amendment to prohibit the Export-Import Bank from guaranteeing credit on the sale of farm products behind the iron curtain unless authorized by Congress and then half of the commodities must be shipped in American ships.

Land Conversion

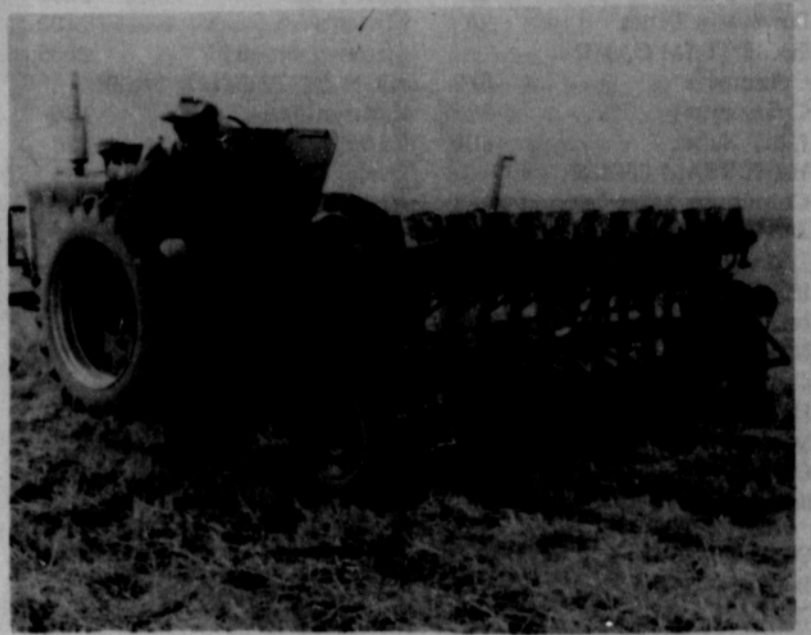
Plan Initiated

A cropland conversion program is being initiated on a pilot basis, helping farmers and groups of rural people convert cropland into recreation areas or to wildlife habitat, or to grazing, timber, or water storage. Some 2,800 agreements had been signed by Dec. 1, 1963 to divert nearly 130,000 acres of cropland to such uses.

According to Wayne Chapman, who is Work Unit Conservationist of our local Soil Conservation Service, this program is not yet available in the Hansford Soil Conservation District.

Congress has not voted adequate money to set this Cropland Conversion Program up nationwide. It will not be the same as the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank. However, some incentive type payment would be made to a farmer retiring cropland from production. Only farmers who submit a conservation plan which calls for the treatment of all the conservation needs of the farm would be accepted.

When and if this program is set up for our area you will be notified.

Conservation Cooperators Ready To Seed Grass

Now is the time to seed your grass. As soon as the weather permits grass drills are expected to start rolling for several Hansford Soil Conservation District Cooperators: Eula Goodall, N.F. Renner, James Langston, Marvin Shapley, Tommy Joe Bergin, and Orville Mathews are planning to seed grass this spring. All these have Great

Plains Conservation Program plans. This is a 3 to 10 year program designed especially for the Great Plains area of the U.S. Under this program a farmer or rancher presents a complete conservation plan outlining the conservation work he wants to carry out on his place to the local Soil Conservation Service. This plan to be accepted must treat all the conservation needs of the farm. Cost share ranging from 50% to 80% is then authorized and approved for all permanent type practices in the plan. Assistance in developing a conservation program for your farm or ranch is available from the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service. After you develop this plan you may elect to ask for a GPCP Contract or ACP Cost Share Assistance. You may wish to receive technical assistance and install conservation practices without cost share. This technical assistance is provided through you Soil Conservation District without charge.

Planting Time Is Ripe

February through April is the recommended time for planting your farmstead and field

County Agent's Report

Several Hansford County 4-H members will exhibit animals at the County Stock Show which

break should be planned so as to give protection from the north, west and southwest directions. Multiple row windbreaks are more satisfactory where space permits. The windward row of a windbreak should be at least 100 feet from the buildings to be protected. The inside row of the windbreak should never be further than 300 feet from the area to be protected.

A good guide to use for spacing the rows of a wind break is as follows: If irrigated-rows may be spaced 10 to 16 feet apart. If the windbreak is to be planted dryland the rows may be spaced 16 to 30 feet apart. These spacings will also depend upon the type of trees used in planting your windbreak. Also, drier sites and sites with soils low in fertility should have the widest spacing between rows.

In order to have a successful windbreak planting you should keep all competing vegetation away from the young seedlings at least during the first growing season, if not longer. The windbreak must be protected from livestock in order that it may grow to become an efficient barrier against the wind, seedlings that die should be replaced in order to maintain the tree stand.

The factors mentioned above plus using healthy, vigorous seedlings for the initial planting give you a very effective and beautiful windbreak. Potted evergreen 12" to 18" high can usually be purchased for around \$40.00 per 100.

CHEMICAL RESIDUES
Food production today is a highly complex business, and top production involves the use of numerous chemicals for disease, insect and weed control. Chemical residues have become very important. Residues permissible by law are expressed in terms of parts per million.

Since most people probably have never given much thought to what the term implies, here are a few examples. One inch is 1.0 ppm in 16 miles. A postage stamp is 1.0 ppm of the average adult's weight. A one gram sewing needle is 1.0 ppm of a one-ton haystack. One minute is 1.0 plus using healthy, vigorous ppm of two years.

One part per million is a surprisingly small entity. It is important to the consumer to have some knowledge of how little pesticide residue actually remains on the fresh produce he

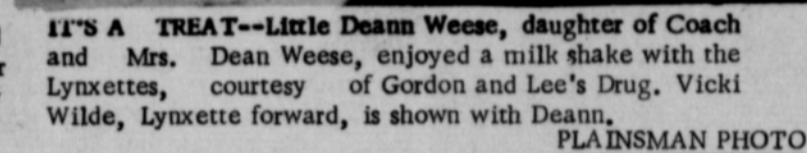
