Bake Sale Is Saturday

A bake sale will be held May 13 at Cut Rate beginning at 9 a.m. to benefit the Texas Association of Mental Health, according to Mary Lou Mathews, mental health chairman for Spearman.

This will be a great time to buy some home baked goodies for Mother's Day and also to help with a worthy cause. All proceeds will go to the Mental Health Campaign.

Anyone wishing to donate baked goods are asked to have them at Cut Rate at 9 a.m. Saturday, May 13.

Spearman Meals Nutritious

The Spearman I.S.D. serves nutritious meals every day in the cafeterias. Students may purchase lunches for .55 cents in the Elementary, .60 cents for the Jr. High, and .65 cents for the High School. Extra milk for students is .05 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on a scale furnished by the state are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Children who qualify for free lunches are also eligible for an extra carton of milk free, if served at a time other than the lunch period. The price for reduced lunches is .20 cents. If your income is greater than those shown on the scale, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education costs due to the mental or physical condition of your child, or disaster or casualty losses, then your children may also be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced price meals during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the state scale.

Applications for free and reduced price meals may be made anytime during the school year and forms are available in the school offices.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin.

The state now requires that all schools in Texas with at least 10 percent of the enrollment on the free and reduced price lunches must enforce the law concerning the serving of breakfast in the child feeding programs.

Beginning with the 1978-79 school term in August, breakfast will be offered on the same basis as the lunch program-if your child qualifies for the lunch program, they will automatically qualify for the breakfast program.

Serving time for the breakfast will be 7:45-8:15 a.m. only. Prices for the breakfast to students will be .25 cents and reduced breakfast for students will be .10 cents. Faculty price for breakfast will be .40 cents.

Lunch prices for faculty will be \$1.00 and \$1.25 for any guests.

The type A lunch pattern is at least 2 oz. meat or meat alternate; 1/4 cup fruit and/or vegetable; 1 slice bread or equivalent; and 1/2 pt. whole fluid milk. The breakfast pattern is 1/2 pt. fluid milk; 1/2 cup fruit or 1/2 cup of full strength fruit or vegetable juice; a serving of bread or 1/4 cup cereal or an equivalent combination.

Beginning with the 1978-79 school term, students in High School do not have to take the full meal on their trays, but have to take at least 3 of the main food components listed above in the type A lunch. This is called the Offer-Versus-Serve Program, but regardless of what 3 foods the students take or chooses to eat, they must still pay the full price for their meal.

It will be no cheaper because only 3 food components may be chosen. This is for grades 9-12 only.

An anti-rabies shot is \$4 with the price of \$5 for a distemper shot. Tags are \$2 per female or male animal spayed dog or cat and \$5 for female or male dog or cats.

All dogs and cats are required to conform to the city ordinance.

Changes

There have been some changes in the Texas 4-H and FFA Steer Validation program which affect all youth showing steers in these organizations. This year, all steers will be tagged for Fall Shows 1978 and Spring 1979 during the month of June. Other aspects will remain the same including recording the beginning weight, even though the 1 1/4 pound daily weight requirement has been eliminated.

**Two Local Men Form
Drag Racing Team**

Two Spearman men have teamed up to form the C&S Drag Racing team. Bill Crouch and Hal Shufeldt, longtime friends and owners and operators of C&S Rig Service, sponsor and drive "Texas Rat I" and "Texas Rat II."

Shufeldt's car, "Texas Rat I" is currently 10th in total points standing in the Modified Bracket at Five State Raceway. The Spearman man's drag race machine is a 1967 Chevy Camaro powered by a 427 cubic inch, dual carb G.M. powerplant with about every go fast part imaginable. Shufeldt's Camaro will run consistent low to mid 12 second E.T.'s (elapsed time) at Five State's quarter mile drag strip.

Crouch's race machine is also a 1967 Chevy Camaro powered by the 427 "rats" little brother396. The doomsday black colored Camaro currently leads the stock Bracket E.T. category

in total points. Crouch won first place money at Five State's first points meet of it's Super 78 Season and made an impressive showing despite mechanical problems at Liberal's second meet during the middle of April.

Bill, who is a welder by trade, is not satisfied with being the points leader in the stock bracket. Crouch and his "Texas Rat II" is gearing up to be number 1 in the Super Stock bracket. He says that transmission problems has kept his drag buggy from turning anything faster than a high 13 second E.T. However, Crouch states that these problems have been eliminated and "Texas Rat II" should streak down that quarter mile strip with E.T.'s in the low 13's and high 12's.

"They are persons who drove their tractors to town even if they did not agree with what had to be done for how else would people know our problems if we don't do this to attract attention to our cause. Talk has not helped; letters have not helped so what is left except for the courageous to stand up before the world and say, "I won't take it any more."

"So the men and women of American Agriculture stood up even against the sneers and jeers of their neighbors and friends--some even went to jail and told the world of the beef and vegetable imports that are ruining the economy of the nation's farmers and ranchers. We do not care what they did or said about us for we will not feed and cloth the world out of our own pockets any longer.

"We took our case to Washington and told the leaders there what was happening to rural America, our cities and towns, farms and businesses. They listened but they did not hear for what did they do?--they threw us a bone. They do not know the determination that is in the heart of American Agriculture. They voted down the flexible parity bill. They did not care that a young farmer from Alabama sat on the step of the capitol and cried a puddle of tears and said, "it's too late for me--the banker had said it's now or never for you."

May 13," Charles Brillhart, Chairman of the Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District, said.

The meeting is in response to President Carter's signing of the Resources Conservation Act last November which requires an appraisal and evaluation of the state and nations' soil and water conservation program.

"The RCA act authorizes and directs the Secretary of Agriculture to develop a national soil and water conservation program in cooperation with the

public, our local soil and water conservation districts, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, and the Soil Conservation Service," said Brillhart.

"This program will establish new direction for future soil and water conservation efforts in Texas based on current soil, water, and related resource appraisals," Brillhart continued. "One point I want to make clear is that districts in their 40-year history have always assisted landowners with voluntary conservation programs on their farms and ranches. We do not advocate any other approach since farm and ranch land is privately owned and that the interests and welfare of the owners must be served and that

programs must be acceptable to them," Brillhart added. Actions required by the RCA act include gathering data to appraise the condition and quality of Texas and the nations' soil and water resources by 1979. The act also outlines a 5-year plan for the U. S. Department of Agriculture's conservation assistance to districts and requires an evaluation of the effectiveness and progress of ongoing programs. Reports will be made to the public and Congress.

"Our first meeting will primarily deal with discussions on soil and water resources in the district and how to conserve them," Brillhart said.

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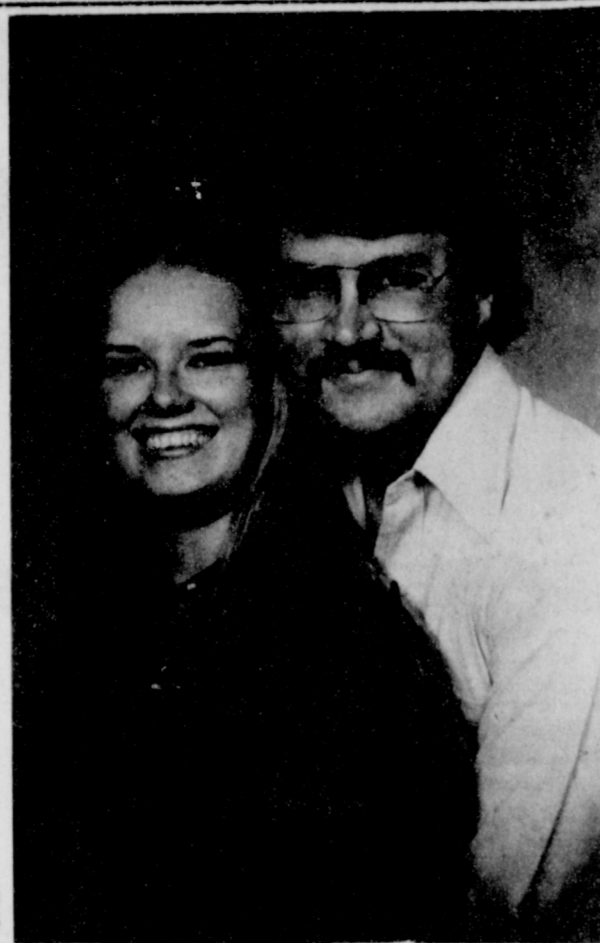

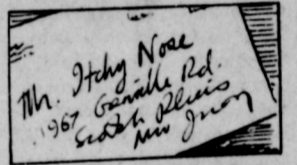

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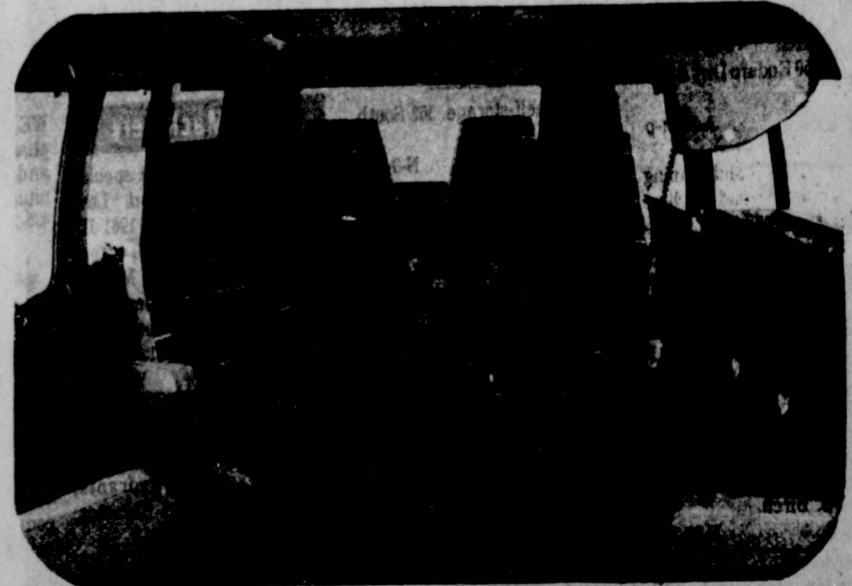

NRA Makes Legislative Alert

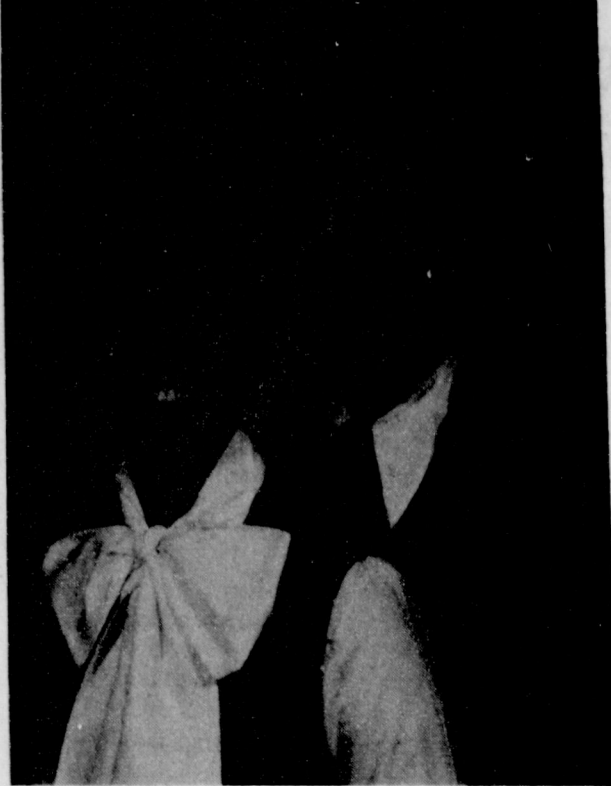

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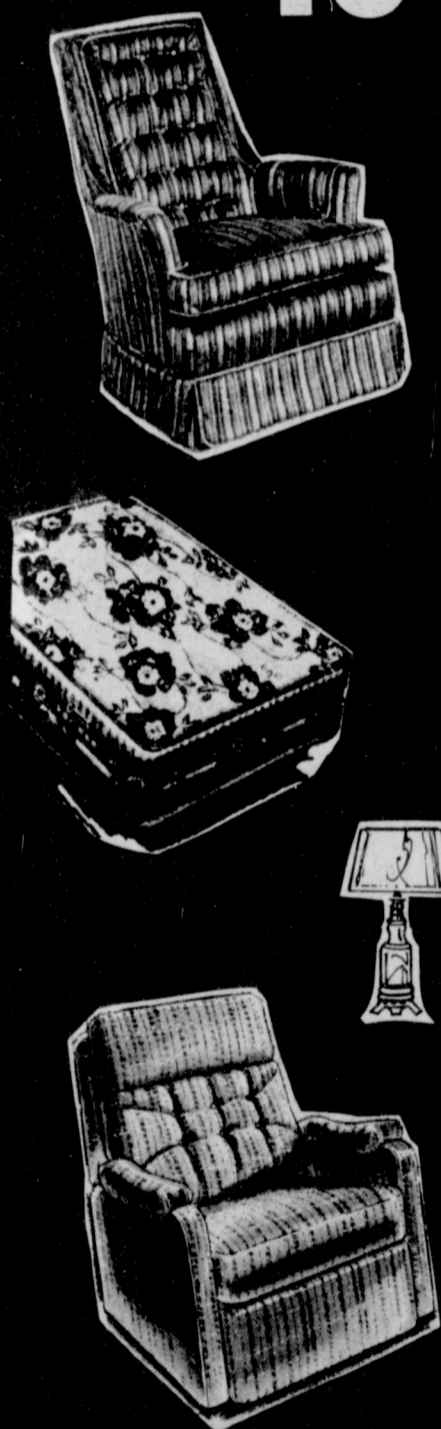

The workshop will be conducted by Barbara Chappell of Columbia, South Carolina, who is nationally known for her work and teaching about adoption. She is director of the Office of Child Advocacy in the South Carolina Governor's Office.

"This workshop marks the beginning of a concerted citizen's movement throughout the 40 counties of the Panhandle and South Plains to find suitable permanent homes for all children who are available for

adoption, and to begin a cooperative effort among community people to meet the needs of the 'hard to place' child," Mrs. Nugent said.

She defined a "hard to place" child as one with physical or mental handicaps, severe emotional problems, minority group or racially mixed, a child with continuing medical problems, or any child over five years of age.

"We are seeking the cooperation of child welfare boards, child placing agencies, child caring institutions, foster parent and adoptive parent associations as well as churches, business and civic organizations," she said.

"The workshop in Amarillo is free, and no advance registration is required. We are hoping that all concerned persons from throughout the area will attend."

Insurance Corner Hedge Trimming Mishaps



An electric hedge trimmer can inflict a deep wound, even slice off a finger. Accidents serious enough to require emergency room treatment happen 8,400 times a year, says the Consumer Product Safety Commission, most often when the operator takes on hand off the trimmer to push a branch out of the way or hold the cord away from the moving blade. If you have a hedge trimmer, follow these common-sense practices:

Use an extension cord connector that holds the trimmer cord firmly in the socket. Use a connector with a hood for hanging the cord on your belt, away from the moving blade.

Avoid hasty, careless movements with the tool. Avoid standing on a chair or

ladder that may tip as you work. Clean and adjust the trimmer only when it is unplugged. Examine the cord regularly for cracks and breaks in the insulation. If you are shopping for a trimmer, buy one with two handles and cutting guards that are close enough to the cutting teeth to prevent entry of a finger. The tool should be double-insulated or have a three-wire cord for grounding.

Defining American Agriculture Movement

Demands by the American Agriculture Movement dictate the need for possible production and marketing curtailments that will allow supplies to match demand. Supporters are willing to accept these conditions. All commodity groups will participate in the formulation of policies from the local level that effect their respective commodities.

The five point proposals include (1) 100% parity for all domestic and foreign used and/or consumed agricultural products. (2) All agricultural products produced for national or international food reserve shall be contracted at 100% parity. (3) Creation and approve policies that affect agriculture. (4) Imports of all agricultural products which are domestic must be stopped until 100% parity is reached, thereafter imports must be limited to the amount that the American producers cannot supply. (5) All announcements pertaining to any agricultural producing cycle shall be made far enough in advance that the producer

will have adequate time to make needed adjustments in his operations.
