First United Methodist Church First United Methodist Church offered the invocation, and then Spearman Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett.

told the banker the community is appreciative of his efforts over the years, and added, "This is a great years, and added, in the history of Spearman." "We thank God for Dr. Gibner

they offered him $\$ 75$ a month.

He remained with First National when both banks moved to Spear-

into Spearman. When a group of local citizens bought the Guaranty bank, they hired Gibner to run it for them. The name had already been changed to Fidelity Bank of Commerce, but the new owner changed it again to the present First State Bank of Spearman, Gibner said.
