

Crowd witnesses First State Bank's groundbreaking

A large crowd turned out Monday morning to help the First State Bank celebrate formal groundbreaking for its new banking facility at the old carnival grounds just north of Hansford County Courthouse.

The crowd watched as Clay Gibner, chairman of the bank's board of directors, turned the first spade of dirt while other bank directors and officers "dug in" with shovels. In the background, huge earthmoving equipment was already in action leveling the field.

Before the ground was broken, several city, county and Chamber of Commerce officials spoke, praising the bank's role in the community, and Gibner briefly gave a history of the bank and his long affiliation with it.

Chamber of Commerce president Monty Blackman opened the program by congratulating the bank officials and welcoming the crowd. The Rev. Lane Boyd, pastor of the First United Methodist Church offered the invocation, and then Spearman Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett.

Mayor Blodgett referred to his long years of friendship with Gibner, told the banker the community is appreciative of his efforts over the years, and added, "This is a great event in the history of Spearman."

"We thank God for Dr. Gibner

when he came," the mayor said. Then he turned toward Gibner and said, "Clay, the only thing I can see wrong with this deal--it sure messes up the carnival..."

He said the people of Spearman are proud of this institution and that "the city's proud."

Blodgett said, "When Clay moves into his new home, we'll move into his old home," referring to the city's purchase of the present bank building for a new city hall.

"Only we don't call it old, we think of it as a new home."

The mayor called construction of the new bank building a "great sign of progress. It says something for the community, and it says something about the family now controlling the bank. Congratulations, we wish you the best. May God bless you all."

Blackman introduced Gibner. Gibner said Guaranty State Bank, forerunner of First State Bank was built in a wooden structure in Old Hansford back in 1919. He said he first went to work for the bank as a boy for \$30 a month when Hugh James, the owner, got sick and asked him to take over. A few months later, Gibner recalled, he switched over to First National Bank, also in Old Hansford, when they offered him \$75 a month.

He remained with First National when both banks moved to Spearman at the time the railroad came into Spearman. When a group of local citizens bought the Guaranty bank, they hired Gibner to run it for them. The name had already been changed to Fidelity Bank of Commerce, but the new owner changed it again to the present First State Bank of Spearman, Gibner said. Later the bank bought out First National, he related.

Gibner said when the Guaranty bank was founded in Old Hansford, "our deposits totaled \$45,000. Today our bank deposits total \$43 to \$45 million."

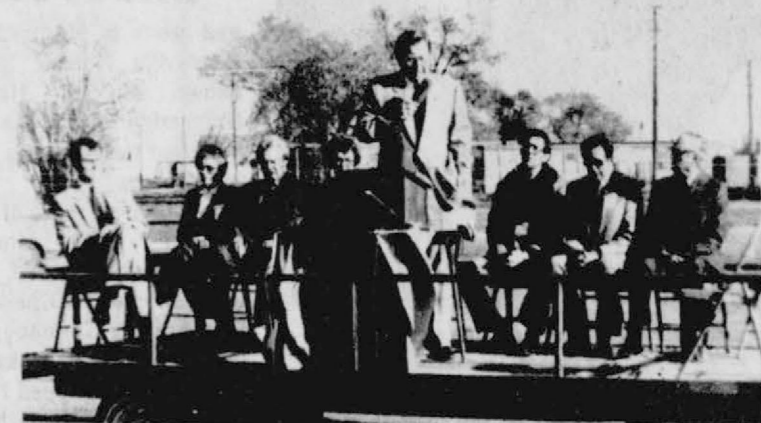
He told the crowd the bank had been a part of the growth of Spearman since the very beginning, and that the people in turn had helped the bank grow.

"He said he hopes the bank continues to serve the community."

Speaking of the new banking facility, he said, it will be "about twice the size of the present facility, and boy is it going to be pretty."

Gibner pointed out Dan Rothschild and Gary Knowles representing Lee Chick, the architect for the project, and construction superintendent Frank Stetson from Corner

Lynx, Lynxettes win

Giving the hometown fans a hint of their highly regarded prowess, the Spearman Lynx melted the Sunray Bobcats 71-43 in the Lynx homeopener Tuesday night, but it was the Lynxettes who gave local fans heart palpitations as they battled from behind to outlast the Bobkittens in overtime, 51-49.

For the Lynx, who return virtually the starting lineup from last season, the victory was the second one in as many starts. They dominated Darrouzett, 75-52 in a pickup game there Monday night. The win was also the second in as many nights for the Lynxettes.

They were equally devastating in Darrouzett, rolling to an 81-45 triumph, heartening to Spearman fans in that experts have tabbed the traditionally strong Lynxettes as inexperienced and being in a rebuilding year.

Led by the long range sharpshoot-

ing of All-District returnee Ross Donahue, the Lynx built a 24-7 first quarter lead and never trailed. By halftime, the Lynx had ballooned their advantage to 38-12, and at the three quarters mark, it was 52-35, Spearman. While Donahue led all scorers with 29 points on long jumpers and driving layups and "quarterbacked" the offense from point guard, it was by no means a one-player game.

Byron Sutterfield also sparkled at guard, playmaking, mid-range jumpers and driving layups, Mark Pearson hit well from the corner and on driving shots and Buddy Pool was effective in rebounding and from the post position was second in scoring for the Lynx with 12 points.

The Lynx two big men, Steve Burke and Billy Ray Haden alternated in the lineup to help dominate the

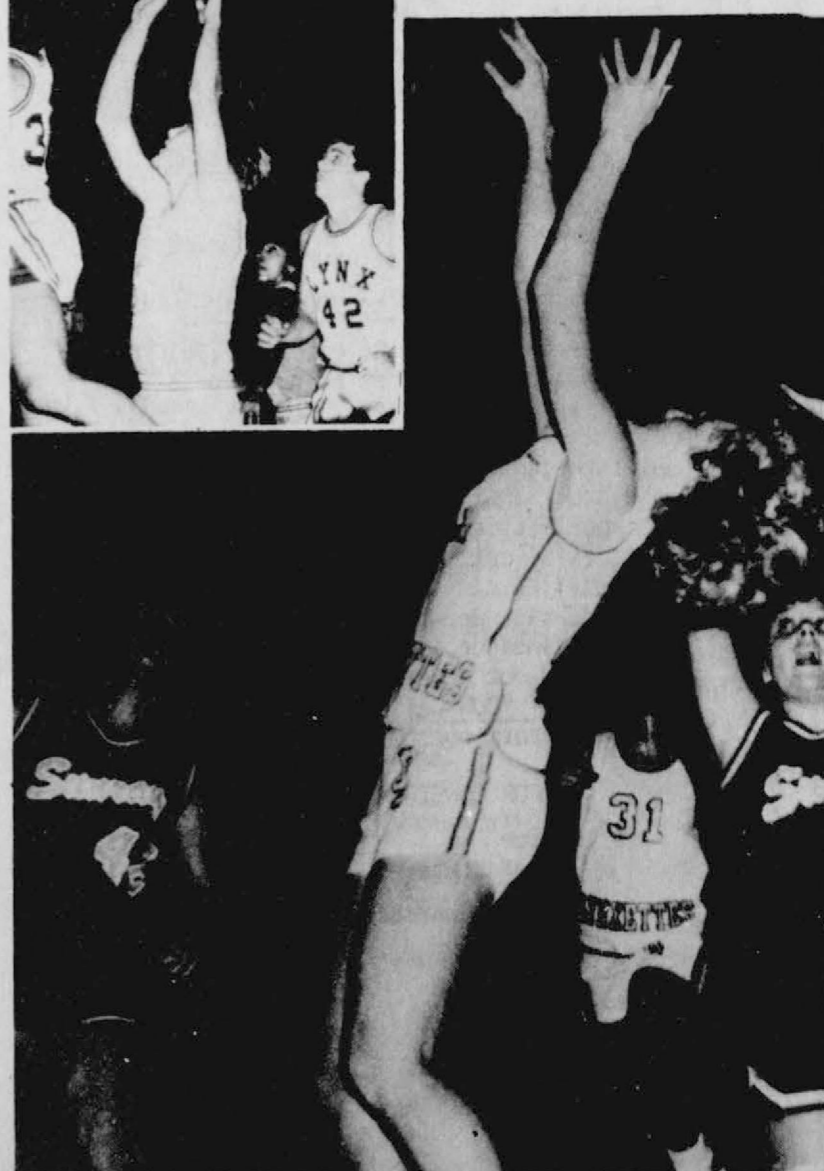

and went to Huntsville to attend Huntsville Normal Institute, now known as Sam Houston State University. Both of the girls became qualified teachers and began teaching careers.

After seven years of teaching, on October 8, 1913, Jewelle and Fred Brandt were married. Fred was a local merchant in Chappell Hill. His father, from Germany, owned and operated three mercantile stores, they were in Chappell Hill, Wallace, and Waller. As his father aged, the stores became too much for him to handle so Jewelle and Fred gathered the store goods and moved north.

Just shortly after they married, in late October, Jewelle and Fred

packed up and moved to the Panhandle to the very small, but nice town of Hansford. "At the time we arrived in Hansford, there were only two cars in the county that were known." One of those cars was Moad Maize's Ford coupe. Maize is the man that met the Brandts in Guymon and brought them to Hansford.

Fred joined Moad (P.M.) Maize in his mercantile store and in 1929 when Moad retired, the Brandts bought the store which is now the F.W. Brandt building on a corner of Main in Spearman.

According to Jewelle, "The railroad would not come down in the valley to Hansford, so the town and all that was there had to move to Spearman to the railroad." She claims that moving to Spearman was

quite a task but that everyone got there in good shape and it grew into a very nice town.

Jewelle and Fred raised three children. Mary Brandt Jackson was born while they lived in Hansford and W.C. Brandt and Jewelle Brandt Kenyon were born in Spearman. Fred died in 1962 at the age of 80.

She enjoyed her childhood and younger years in Chappell Hill, but Jewelle says, "I am glad the biggest part of my life has been spent here in the Panhandle."

Survivors include a daughter, Jewelle Kenyon of Portales, N.M.; two grandchildren and three-great grandchildren.

The family requests memorials be to the Stationmaster House Museum or to the First Baptist Church.

It remained close all the way and in the regulation play's final seconds, Sunray tied the score 46-46 and forced the overtime. The Lynxettes pulled away for the victory in overtime 51-49.
Ronda Gibson hit three field goals and seven free throws to pace the Lynxettes with 13 points and Nita Baker was right behind with two field goals and five free throws for 11 points. Carri Ann Guthrie scored 9 points on four baskets from the field and a free throw. Shelly Cook scored 8 points, Andrea Mires 5, Kelli Crawford 4, and Robbie Heinrich 3.
Kim Moore scored 12 points, Jamie Dowell and Bonnie Stewart 10 apiece for the Bobkittens.

During the holiday season, most adults and children yearn to touch base with home and homefolks. In today's mobile society however, a family reunion can be a strong support for reaching out to the family's past and gaining insights for the future, or it can be the beginning of disharmony.

Four generation families are now common in the U.S. Young parents and their children do not ordinarily live with the grandparents, but the various generations usually keep in touch. When total families get together in reunion - settings, large numbers are commonplace. The more people, the more expensive the event.

Mass kinfolk gatherings are fun but occasionally disappointing. To enjoy days of goodwill and personal growth, family reunions take planning. Food, lodging, special activities and events, entertainment items and time off from jobs are costly, especially if one family assumes an unequal share of the responsibilities.

Kin are very important in cultures when marriage is not mandated or the culture is accepting of singlehood. Kinfolks usually provide aid in situations of stress or deprivation. Belongingness and the sense of intergrity are enhanced by kin gatherings, family history and symbols of family continuity.

Many psychologists today are looking at the effects the family of origin has on self-concept. Family therapists are encouraging families under stress to tackle unresolved emotional issues with the families in which they were raised. Reunions give stressed family members an opportunity to view family situations firsthand.

You can turn a family reunion into a positive experience by first accepting that you ARE a product of your family, even if you decide to be totally different from them. Using assertiveness, openness in communication and humor in responding to favorite and not-so-favorite kin are techniques most adults can use effectively.

Attend reunions with some detachment -- allow time for privacy and pleasure for yourself. Most families love their relatives, but don't idolize them. An agenda-free, spontaneous family reunion facilitates goodwill and requires on one to move in a lock-step fashion.

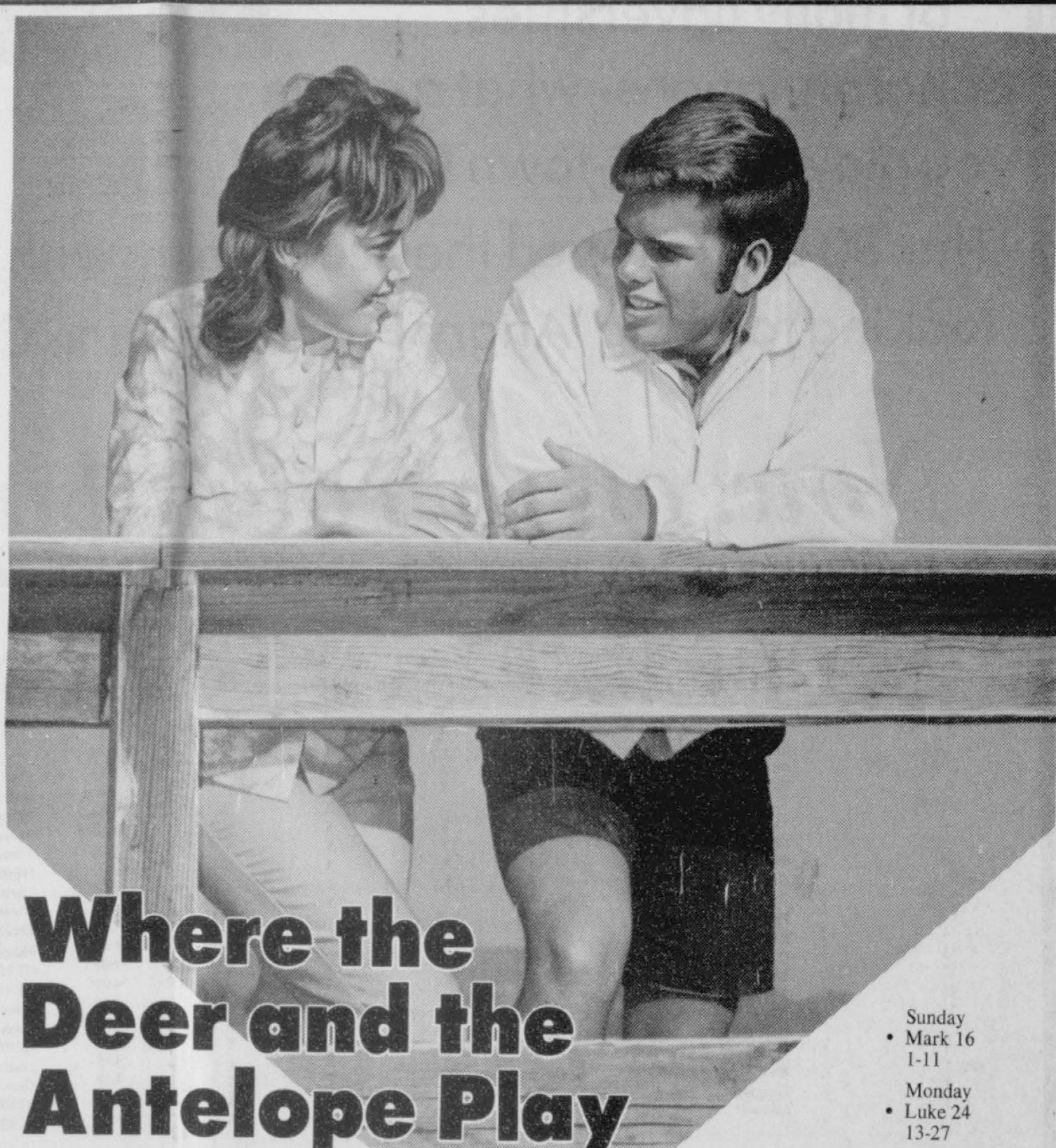

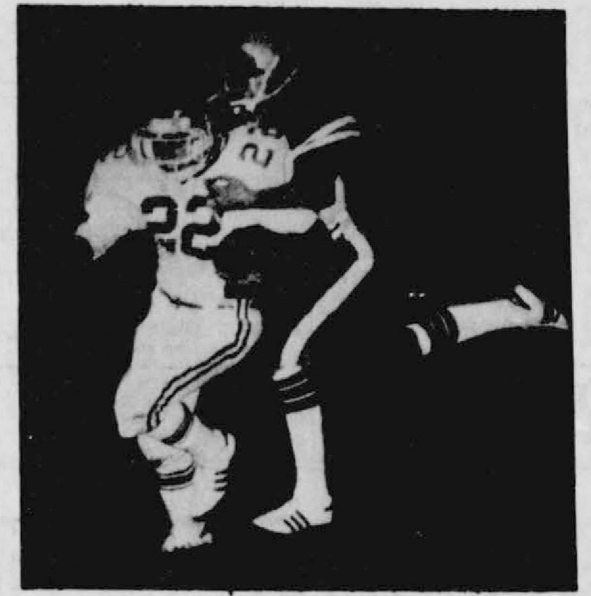
