AUSTIN, Oct. 24. (U.P.)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester has been informed by an investigating committee that one of the Mexican government's reasons for refusing to furnish additional contract labor to Texas farmers was "apparently based on an accumulation of old incidents."

Jester Names Banker To Prison Board

AUSTIN, Oct. 24. (U.P.)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester yesterday appointed B. A. Stufflebume, Grand Prairie banker and farm operator, to the state prison board and at the same time commended the attitude of other board members toward improving the Texas prison system.

The new appointee fills the unexpired term of the late Henry Womble of Caldwell. Describing the present administration as having a great opportunity to improve the penitentiary system, Jester said he was "very well pleased and encouraged" at the interest displayed by the nine-man board.

Commenting on continued reception of requests from civic and church groups to expand the prison rehabilitation program and improve prison conditions, the Governor said one group had suggested he appoint a woman to fill Womble's place.

He said he had already made his decision to name Stufflebume prior to receiving the suggestion. The 55-year-old Grand Prairie man operates one of the largest cotton and hybrid corn breeding farms in Texas. He is president of the First National Bank in Grand Prairie.

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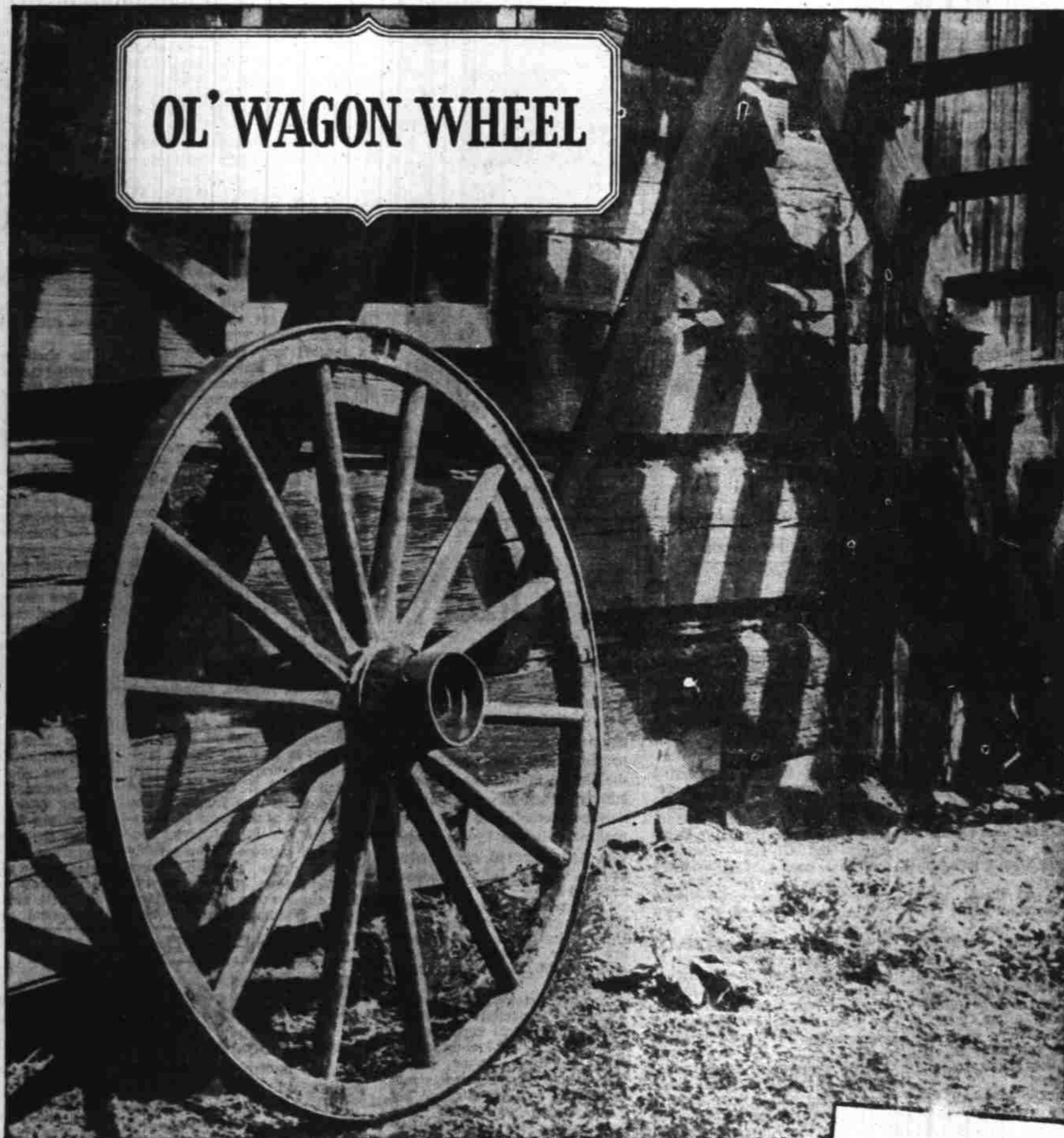

Fresh Soviet Attack On America

Soviet Russia has touched a new high in her aggression against democracy by boldly blazoning to the world a scheme whereby the communists figure that an economic crisis can be precipitated in the United States—an interesting corollary to the persistent predictions in the Red capital that America is headed for a great depression.

This fresh method of attack on the U. S. A. was detailed in a speech by Andrei Zhdanov—one of Bolshevism's top figures—at the recent conference in Poland among representatives of Russia and her satellite countries of eastern Europe.

threat from De Gaulle likely is what impelled Moscow to make public the Zhdanov effort to consolidate as much of Europe as possible against the "imperialistic camp" of which he declared the United States is "the principal leading force."

Spirit In Red Orbit

NEW YORK, (U.P.)—Dan De Luce, back from a long look behind iron curtain, finds American prestige still is high in European countries within the Soviet sphere.

De Luce, veteran Associated Press foreign correspondent, returned this week from a four-month tour through Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Yugoslavia and Greece—countries that have been part of his news beat since 1939.

"We hold the top cards, and if we play them properly there is no reason for alarm or despondency. We still represent in the minds of most people throughout the world the place where human freedom has the best chance to endure."

"The American citizen acts, thinks and moves about more freely than the citizen of any other country wherever he goes." Just as the American civilian soldier was our best ambassador during the war, De Luce believes now that our best diplomat in these countries is the peacetime American visitor.

in our limosines—as their controlled press would have them believe," he said.

De Luce said the Soviet campaign to convince the satellite people within her sphere that the United States was a power-hungry nation of warmongers was counterbalanced by their realization it was Russia herself who had enlarged her borders at the expense of European neighbors.

"We have more blood ties with these countries than the Soviet Union," he pointed out. "There are more Yugoslavs in San Pedro, Calif., than there are in Moscow."

De Luce's views are those of a trained, impartial observer, skilled in political reporting. He is a six-foot-three-inch sandy-haired writer known among his fellow correspondents for daring war exploits and his insistence on getting the facts first hand.

It may be that the Soviet Union, though committed in principle, will not in fact agree to a settlement which means the evacuation of Europe. If her purpose is the domination of Europe and of a large part of the world, she will never agree.

the Nazis still occupied by Red army. Verbal agreements like the Yalta declaration and the Atlantic Charter can be made the subject of endless tactical maneuvering. For agreements of this kind do not change the balance of power.

We shall in either case have clarified the real issue. Instead of seeking "to contain" the Soviet Union all over the Eurasian continent, we shall have the initiative and a definite and concrete objective: At the best we shall know the terms on which the main conflict can be settled; at the worst the Soviet Union will have shown its hand on an issue—the liberation of Europe from non-European armies—where there will be no doubts whatever that our cause is just, and that we are the champions of freedom.

to make Jeffersonian Democrats out of the peasants of eastern Europe, the tribal chieftains, the feudal lords, the pashas, and the warlords of the Middle East and Asia, but to settle the war and to restore the independence of the nations of Europe by removing the alien armies—all of them, our own included.

We shall have a diplomatic policy that it would be exceedingly difficult for the cleverest propagandist to misrepresent. For every one can understand such a policy. Practically every one will wish us to succeed in it. For alien armies are hateful, however well behaved. Just because they represent an alien power and are, therefore, a perpetual reminder that the people on whom they are quartered are not masters of their own destiny.

Allen armies are, however, never well behaved; invariably they become corrupted. Thus we may count confidently upon a mounting popular support if we make it our mission to emancipate the ancient and proud continent of Europe from the military control of non-European powers.

The evacuation of Europe can be accomplished only if we can negotiate, sign and ratify a treaty of peace for Germany and for Austria to which the Soviet government is a party. For the peace treaties about eastern Europe, which is between Germany and Russia, cannot become effective until there are German and Austrian treaties. The Red Army will remain in eastern Europe as long as it remains in Germany and in Austria.

We must turn then to the problem of Germany, and how that problem is defined if we adhere to the Truman doctrine and how, if we adopt the alternative policy for which I have been contending.

Railroaders Reminded Of Benefit Plan
Railroad workers claiming sickness benefits were urged here Thursday by F. L. Zolnek, representative of the Railroad Retirement board, to file applications promptly.
In order to avoid loss of benefits a claimant must mail his application not later than the seventh day after the first day of sickness claimed. If mailed later, Zolnek explained, it may not be received with the legal time limit and one or more days' benefits may be lost.
"For example," he said, "if a man claims benefits beginning Oct. 1, but notice of his sickness was not received until Oct. 15, the earliest day on which his registration period could begin is Oct. 6. As a result, he would lose five days' benefits."
He emphasized that a claimant should enclose his 1946 certificate of service months and wages, Form BA-6, with his application, expediting his claim. Amount of benefits which the claimant will receive for each day of illness is based on his 1946 railroad earnings.
Application blanks, which are pre-addressed and can be mailed without envelope, may be obtained at the board office located in Fort Worth, from local railroad offices, or local secretaries of the various unions. Additional information may be had by wiring the Board at rooms 412-414, U. S. Court House, Fort Worth.

ON HUGE SCALE
Texas Gas Industry Plans Expansion

HOUSTON, Oct. 24. (AP)—Texas' booming natural gas industry, which did not gain national supremacy until 1923 but now covers 47 per cent of the nation's production, is planning huge expansion programs to capitalize on the ever increasing demand for fuel in mid-western and northeastern areas.
Three significant moves in future expansion of Texas' exporting of natural gas have developed within the past two weeks:
1. The Tennessee Gas Transmission company, which constructed its own pipe line from Texas to West Virginia while it held the Big and Little Inch lines on a lease from the Federal government, asked the Federal Power commission for authorization of extensions and loops designed to bring the company's exporting capacity to 1,035,000,000 cubic feet daily.
2. The Texas Eastern Transmission company, a Houston corporation with headquarters at Shreveport, La., and purchaser of the government built Big and Little Inch lines, received F. P. C. approval for use of the lines for natural gas movement and announced plans to increase capacity from 265,000,000 cubic feet daily to 340,000,000 by next August.
3. Transcontinental Pipe Line company petitioned F. P. C. for permits to construct three lines costing \$450,000,000 to transport South Texas natural gas to Philadelphia, New York City and Brooklyn, with the initial line, planned for November 1950 completion, to have a daily capacity of 375,000,000.
The U. S. Bureau of mines has placed last year's Texas natural gas production at 1,779,000,000 cubic feet or 44 per cent of national production. It was estimated 446,830,000,000 (billion) cubic feet were exported from the state and 32,363,469,000 (billion) imported (mostly from Louisiana). The state's proven reserves as of December 31 last year were estimated at 86,362,459,000,000 (trillion) cubic feet, 53.8 per cent of the nation's total.

T&P Heads To Pause Here
Texas and Pacific Railway company directors, fresh from the first board meeting ever held in El Paso, will pause here for an hour today at 5:45 p. m.
At the El Paso meeting, directors approved purchase of 12 new diesel switch engines for use in Sweetwater, Longview, Shreveport and Texarkana at a cost estimated by W. G. Vollmer, president, at \$1,185,000.
The board also approved payment as of Dec. 31 of \$1.25 on preferred and \$1 per share on common stock.
Directors are travelling abroad a nine-car special train and will break their return trip to Dallas here.
