Dedicated to highway use

Council approves state fuel tax hike

At its regular meeting, Tuesday night, the Spearman city council faced a short, almost abrupt, agenda containing four action items and leading off with its recorded approval of a higher fuel tax within the state for highway maintenance and construction.

This was in the form of a resolution with a preamble of the appropriate "whereases" and a body of five sections. The preamble recounted the importance of good highways to the Texas Panhandle (therefore Spearman) because of the long distances from here to other population centers and shrinking means of alternate transportation with the loss of extensive rail service in the Panhandle. It stated for its premise the importance of the Texas Panhandle to the rest of the state because of oil, gas, grain, cattle and beef production and the need to move that production to the market places of the state and nation.

It cited pride in the Texas highway system but noted the handicap of increasing costs and increasing maintenance requirements. This led, in stock resolution form, to the main body of the instrument . . .

Section I expressed appreciation for what the agencies responsible have done for highways in the Panhandle in the past. Section II was the city council's request that the highway commission remain fully aware of the growth and importance of the Panhandle area and its dependence on good and importance of the Panhandle area and its dependence on good highway transportation the current need for a number of major improvements and rehabilitation programs.

Section III was the city council's approval-of-record and support of legislation next year to "obtain additional dedicated highway funds through an increase in the state fuel tax."

Section IV noted the version of the resolution in the minutes of the meeting was not "at length" but stated it would be filed for permanent record in the office of the city secretary. Section V placed the full resolution in force with city council approval-which was given at the meeting.

Also sought and given was an allowance for the personal car of the police chief. This is a customary procedure in smaller departments over the state where the chief is willing to use his personal car. There are many times when this leaves a regular police car in service allowing the chief to go about other business and other phases

of the activities of his office. It relieves all small departments of the expense of buying a "plain clothes" car.

Of course, this necessitates a radio for this vehicle so that the chief may be in touch with the department at all times. Purchase was approved of an eight-channel Motorola unit with a four-channel scanning ability, at a cost of \$2,059.

When questioned, City Manager Jim Murray said this item was not presently in the budget but the end of the budgetary year was so near that it could become a part of the next budget by the time it was ordered, received and installed. It was approved. (This unit will be the property of the department. The previous chief had his own personal unit which, of course, went with him when he left.)

Final item on the agenda was the status report of accounts receivable for H&S Emergency Medical Service. City Manager Murray explained that much of the delay in recouping payment for services lies with insurance companies. He cited one instance where a claim was filed with a major company last year and just paid this month.

Murray said the next largest reason for long-unpaid accounts was that a large body of persons owing bills had just moved off and left them. Of similar status were a number of bills owed by persons who still live and work here but just do not pay.

The law allows the city and its emergency service to sue to collect these bills but the law also demands that emergency service-if needed-be extended once again to these delinquent customers.

The meeting adjourned after this session of less than an hour but with every item fully and fairly considered.

The next regular council session will be Sept. 14. All these sessions-conducted in the council room at city hall-are open to the public.

The 17th annual Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA) will be broadcast in the Panhandle by KFDA-TV 10 September 5th and 6th.

Originating from Las Vegas, the TV spectacular is held to raise funds to support the Association's medical services and research programs. The entertainment marathon will be carried by a "Love Network" of some 200 TV stations in the continental U.S., Hawaii, Alaska and Puerto Rico. Ed McMahon will serve as Jerry Lewis's anchorman for the tenth straight year, backed up by Hollywood's Chad Everett.

Last year the 22½-hour super-show produced a record pledge total of over \$31 million for the national health agency's work, and was seen by an estimated 93 million Americans. The show's unduplicated total audience included more than 47% of the households with TV sets in the U.S.

Robert Considine, the show's producer, promises that this year's Telethon will be the most exciting in the show's history. Mr. Considine said, "Jerry's been preparing for the show since Telethon '81 went off the air. His enthusiasm and interest in this production are contagi-

ous. Knowing that the Telethon is so important for the thousands of people with muscular dystrophy and related neuromuscular diseases inspires everyone involved to make this the greatest show television viewers have ever seen."

KFDA will "cut away" from the network show approximately 15-20 minutes every hour to present firsthand reports of MDA activities in the Panhandle area supported by proceeds from the Telethon and other of the health agency's fund-raising events. The progress of the Spearman pledge center will be included in many of the KFDA local segments. Manned this year by Vicky Bullard and Firefighters, the people of Spearman can call 659-5577 throughout the 22½ hour super-show to make their pledges.

Pledge center volunteers are also planning a door-to-door drive for Labor Day. Children interested in helping Jerry's Kids should come by the center location at the Fire Department on Monday, September 6th, to pick up an official canister, Telethon badge, and instructions. Those wishing to drop off donations can bring them by the fish boat located at the Spearman Pledge Center.

Bond Suit Explained

Many people have been concerned about the legal notice published by the Hansford County Hospital District in the last two Thursday papers.

County attorney John Hutchison graciously consented to write the following explanation of the matter.

There have recently been two legal notices in this paper regarding a lawsuit being filed by the Hansford County Hospital District. This suit pertains to the bond issuance by the district to fund the new nursing facility. This procedure is necessary for this bond issuance.

The purpose of this suit is to validate the bond issuance by court action. Bond issues are sometimes very technical in their issuance. The issuance of political subdivision bonds in Texas must follow the statute to the letter of the law. The issuance must also be approved by the Texas Attorney General. The bonds will also be exam-

ined by bond attorneys who make opinions on the validity of the bond issuance. The marketability of the bonds will depend upon these opinions giving the bond issuance a "clean bill of health."

The Hansford County Hospital District is established by a special statute. Unlike cities, schools or counties which all use the same statutes for their bond issuance the Hospital District must depend on its own special legislation. This means the statute is untested. The bond attorney felt it advisable to utilize a special statute (the specific purpose of which is to have the District Judge approve the bond issuance. If any citizen of the District wished to question the validity of the issuance of the bond they would be required to do so at the present time, rather than in the future. This procedure avoids litigation occurring after the bonds have been sold.

Effective July 1, 1982, in accordance with an agreement between American Red Cross, Hansford Hospital and Coffee Memorial Blood Center, it was decided that the best way to supply blood to Hansford Hospital was through Coffee Memorial Blood Center.

Coffee Blood Center can meet any requirements of Hansford Hospital and some 20 other area hospitals within a 27-county, 100-mile radius area.

Even though the Red Cross had been supplying the hospital with blood, 80% of the blood used by the citizens of Hansford County had been supplied by the Coffee Memorial Blood Center to the area hospitals in Amarillo.

It appears to all those concerned that for better service of our blood needs that this change is in order. The American Red Cross has supplied our needs in the past and has done an outstanding job. We appreciate their efforts and cooperative spirit in this matter.

Coffee Memorial Blood Center will continue to have Blood Drives in Spearman and Gruver at specific times in the upcoming months.

The next Blood Drive in Spearman will be at the Sacred Heart Catholic Church's Parish Hall, 901 South Roland, from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. on August 30, 1982.

Since there is still no substitute for human blood, we urge those that have given blood in the past to continue to do so. If

you have not donated in the past, we challenge you to try it at least one time and experience the feeling of knowing that perhaps your donation helped someone else continue to live.

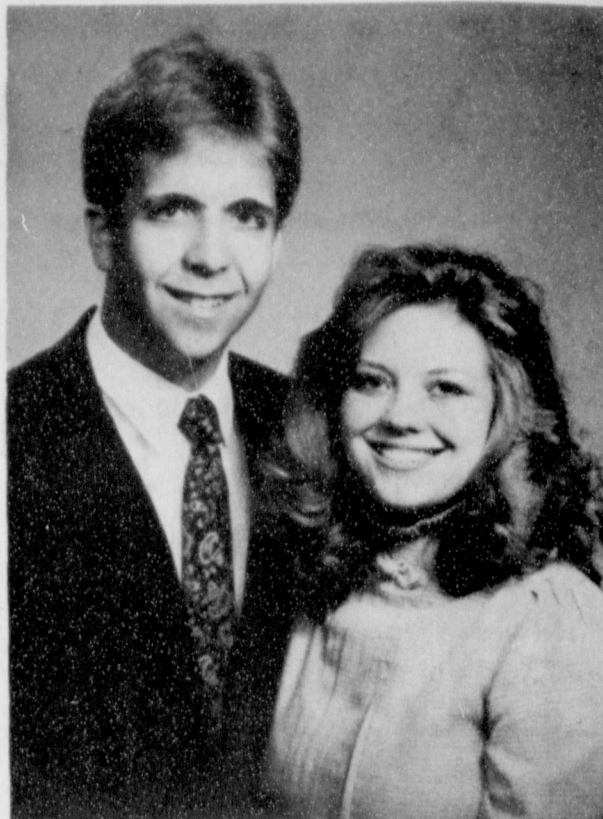

CHANGING ATTITUDES ABOUT DWI

Few things in this country have changed as much during the past few years as public attitudes on drunk drivers. It is a change we can all be thankful for. Most of that change, in my opinion, can be attributed to the organization of Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD), and the attendant publicity and editorial support they have received from our newspapers. They have succeeded, where others have failed, in drawing attention to the tragedy that we have claimed the lives of thousands of Texans.

It was not long ago, for instance, when some public officials who ought to lead by example were openly contemptuous of our laws against driving while drunk. Much of this problem started nine years ago when my opponent became Lt. Governor and helped pass the law reducing the legal drinking age from twenty-one to eighteen years of age. Now Mr.

Hobby, feeling the heat of irate parents and loved ones, and perhaps personal remorse, has said he favors tougher drunk driving laws—another switch from a previous position.

Political promises, however, are easily made. If a politician can't get excited about an issue of this magnitude in nine years, it seems unlikely that he would get excited and pursue corrective legislation in another four years.

So I hope the Mothers Against Drunk Drivers will stick to their guns, and I hope they continue getting support from the people of our state. Their efforts to put an end to this carnage on our highways has my support, and I hope it has yours.

The art exhibits and the sculpture by Richard Thompson will be on display. 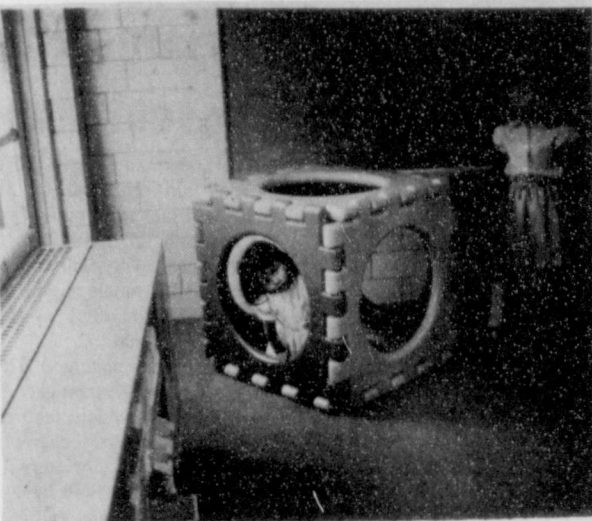

Doctor Talk

Harold B. Ligon, MD

Almost everybody, at one time or another, has had a case of the hiccups. (It's also called hiccoughs). In general, it's a disorder of respiration, defined as repeated involuntary diaphragmatic contractions, causing the glottis to close suddenly over the windpipe, producing the characteristic hiccup sound.

When the diaphragm (the muscle that separates the thorax from the abdomen) contracts in the normal manner, that's the act of inspiration, and air flows smoothly into the lungs. However, a sudden spasmodic contraction causes the glottis to slam down in valve-like action and temporarily close off respiration.

Most episodes of hiccups are transient in nature and brief in duration. However, whenever a family doctor sees someone in his office with hiccups, chances are that's a prolonged and persistent case that may need more intensive efforts, procedures, or even medications.

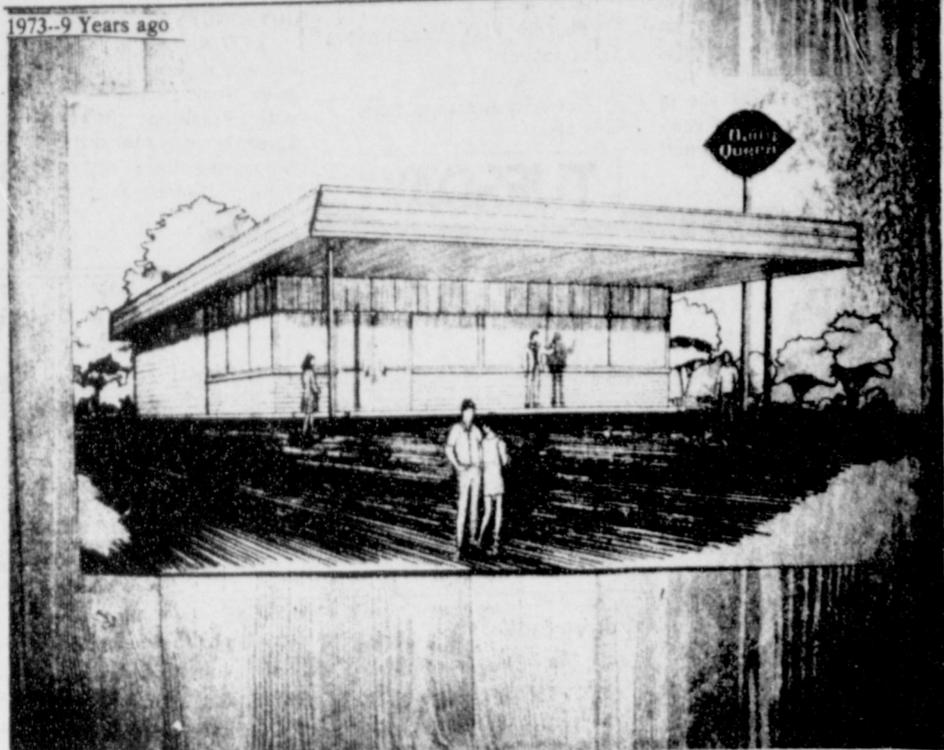

Final tabulations indicate Spearman school enrollment is off eight pupils over the last year's total of 1109. Official enrollment in high school is 370 pupils (up 32); Junior High has 359 (off 34) Elementary has 372 pupils (off 6). Junior High graduated 109 pupils from the 8th grade last May so this shifting of students into high school explains the drop in

the grades and the increase in High School. No break-down was available as yet for High school grades. Junior High Principal James Pendergraft shows 82 Fifth graders; 106 Sixth graders; 74 Seventh graders and 97 Eighth graders. Elementary Principal Allen Alford has five first grades with 99 pupils; five second grades with 87 pupils; four third grades with 104 pupils and four fourth grades with 82 pupils. Last year Spearman schools enrolled 1109 students. This year the second day of school showed 1101 students on the rolls.

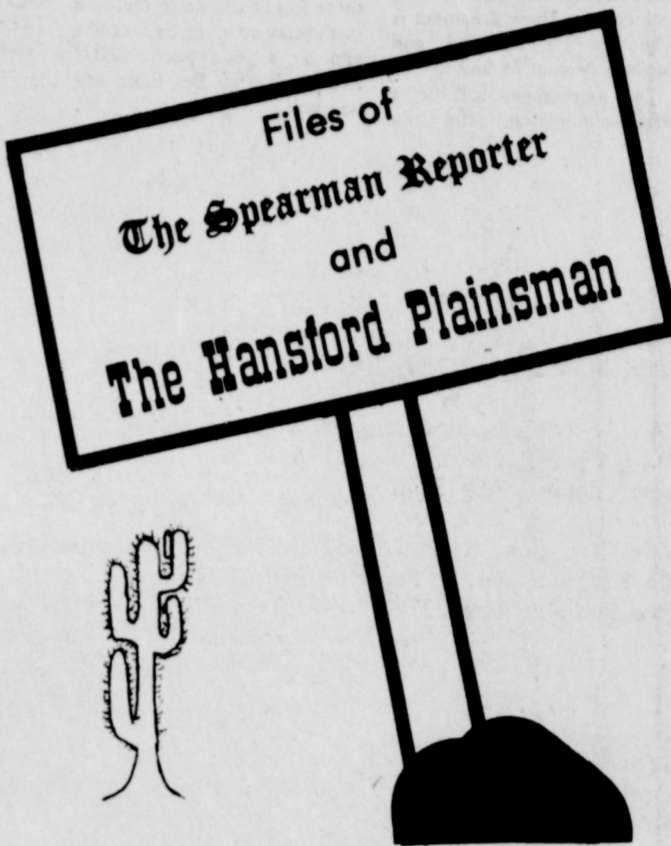
