

# Spearman Leaders at RYLA

On a first journey between the cities of Santa Fe and Taos, New Mexico, it is difficult to imagine one special spot in world of beauty as far as the eye can behold, but there it is...

**Camp Summer Life.**  
It is complete with assembly hall, dining room, lodge-type cottages, game courts, canoeing waters and a hundred quiet, shaded places to talk in small groups or enjoy solitary meditation.

Five days of every summer since 1976—it also boasts some 150 high school juniors and seniors from Rotary International District 573, together with the leaders, counselors and special speakers and seminar leaders who give these young men their strongest taste of freedom and free enterprise to date.

It is called, for these five days, Camp RYLA...Rotary International Youth Awards. At the end of the five days, it is recalled hundreds of times in the future lives of the young men who have experienced and apply the learning experiences there to life situations.

It is dominated by a mountain and Perryton Herald Editor Ron Filkins, who acted as one of the counselors this year, summed up the nature of the various learning experiences by noting that the young men at the camp this year who had never seen a mountain learned what it was by climbing it.

He described in much the same manner the first ride of some young men who had never been on a horse before who learned by being willing to and by following experienced guides who knew the best passages.

He summed up by noting that, at every turn, each day is filled with new experiences and ideas in an atmosphere of good examples of character building the establishing of values.

In the field of learning, those at the camp this summer heard from West Texas State University President Max Sherman and Bill Yung, of the same school who are in the business of dispensing learning.

They caught a dramatic glimpse of what freedom truly is from General Robinson Risner, retired from the military after 36 years and three wars. The general spent seven of those 36 years as a prisoner in Viet Nam after being shot down the

second time during that conflict.

Filkins said "freedom" was the best way to describe what the camp this year was all about.

Most Americans think the birth of our nation was THE freedom experience of the age but for many convicted of crimes, burdened with debt and unwanted in their native England, "transport" to Australia and being freed to pit one's self against the opportunities of that primitive land was also a dramatic experience of freedom.

—And it was in the atmosphere of Australia that Rotary International was born. Rotary International poses a prime example—because of that birth and heritage—of what a simple program for success can produce.

That formula includes the realization that opportunities always bring a like number of responsibilities and challenges. This these young men learn as they explore vocational opportunities and the training that leads to success in a given field. They also learn that no success can be guaranteed without

each end of the field; but different in that it is played with a ball five feet tall and weighing 25 pounds. Teams simply set out to push the huge sphere through their opponents' goal. All who played agreed it was some "hard-knocking" action.

Perhaps the bedrock of the success formula for Rotary International's vision of freedom and free enterprise is the absolute involvement with truth without equivocation or compromise. Rotary International has a four-way test: 1) Is it the truth? 2) Is it fair to all concerned? 3) Will it build goodwill and better friendships? 4) Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

One of the luminaries at Camp RYLA this summer was John R. Collard Jr., Spearman businessman, the epitome of free enterprise practice in his community and the next governor of Rotary District 573.

It was not all listening and learning. The three young men from Spearman, Kyle Brack, James Farmer and Scott Alford, had a host of options for recreation from the previous mentioned horse trails, court games and a new-to-this area—game called Push Ball.

Push Ball is similar to soccer in that there are team goals at

each end of the field; but different in that it is played with a ball five feet tall and weighing 25 pounds. Teams simply set out to push the huge sphere through their opponents' goal. All who played agreed it was some "hard-knocking" action.

By contrast, there was canoeing. Enjoyed in solitude in the early morning, the only sounds were the lap of the water, the soft gurgle of oar strokes and the song of birds.

Finally, mother, there was food for all this growing leadership. Not only were meals tasty and well-balanced nutritionally but, at no time in the five-day period was a menu repeated.

The words of John R. Collard, spoken on another occasion for describing the Camp RYLA project, are recalled here and found apt: "The only thing wrong with the camp is that the true success can never be totaled until the life of one of these leaders is over. Nevertheless, the success is apparent every day he practices RI's principles of freedom and free enterprise."

## City Debt Burden Short Term

The city of Spearman will be totally out of debt in nine years.

Ronnie Bullard is the new fire chief and fire marshal for the city of Spearman.

General Telephone was denied a renewal of its franchise to operate in the city.

Those were the "zingers" among other items on the agenda of the Spearman city council, Tuesday night, at its regular meeting. Proceedings took almost three times the time of most meetings because of a workshop session the budget for the forthcoming fiscal year.

Mayor Ralph Blodgett noted—with justifiable pride—that all obligations and indebtedness of the city would be paid off in nine years leaving Spearman absolutely debt-free and with a new municipal airport and fire station paid for.

Items discussed in the budget workshop session such as the need for a new fire truck, another patrol car and some other items, will not change this debt-free picture for that is the purpose of a budget: to provide the monies for such purchases.

Mayor Blodgett expressed the opinion that a "cushion" should be planned for the coming year in the budget for both the sewer and fire departments. There are always exigencies that arise in the operation of a sewer system and the cushion in the fire department budget would accrue to the purchase of the new firefighting unit.

On the subject of more space for various departments operating out of city hall, Mayor Blodgett was emphatic: "I think we are a long way—maybe never—from needing a new city hall if we can just utilize our space for some of our pressing needs such as a drive-up window for citizens paying utility bills, more office space, more space for the police department some other functional needs.

"I am not talking about some great architectural project... just utilization of the space."

While on the subject of city fiscal affairs, the council heard a report from Mayor Pro-tem Ray Ingle and a report on the status of the airport grant.

The city was represented at a meeting in Albuquerque, N.M. with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and discovered the grant, due in 1983 to reimburse the city for money spent on the new airport, might be forthcoming any time after Sept. 1 this year.

As with most government operations, this is a "stand-in-

line" deal and Spearman's original place was about 1983. Now, it develops that a number of cities ahead of Spearman have not raised their part of the matching funds necessary to obtain the grant while the city of Spearman is "up to snuff" on every requirement...which FAA officials said would advance the city considerably in position to receive the grants. On the strength of this assurance, the panel approved authorizing L.D. Burns, consulting engineer on the new airport, to proceed with plans and specifications.

With new housing a problem due to high interest rates and a resulting dearth of developers, the consulting financial firm of Kidder-Peabody and some other authorities in the field conducted a seminar attended by Mayor Pro-tem Ray Ingle.

There it was learned there is a "way to go." In fact some Panhandle counties have already gone that way individually. It involves the county commissioners and a source of financing at a lower rate of interest for housing. Ingle said Kidder-Peabody made two recommendations: that remaining counties in the Panhandle (cities if counties are not

interested in participating) organize as one entity to secure this funding and the resulting housing aid.

That multi-family housing units be concentrated on rather than single family dwellings.

Explanation was that the organization of Panhandle counties would provide a larger "nut" of bonds for sale making the likelihood of early purchase greater.

By the same token, bond purchasers as investors would rather have the multi-unit

dwellings as security because default by one family, one purchaser, would not hurt the project while default on a single family dwelling create an immediate problem.

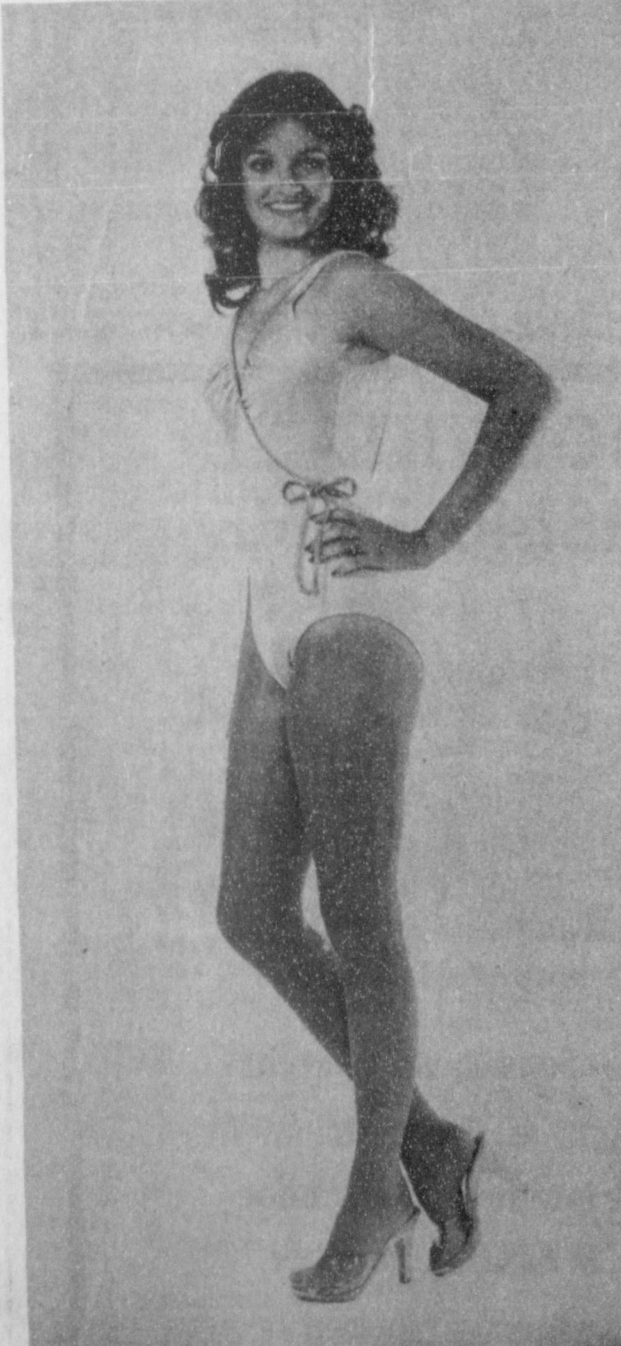
Ingle summed up his report with two encouraging assurances: the Hansford county commissioners are interested and have taken organizational steps to join whatever effort evolves and further, the assurance that no participating entity—city or county—would have to pay out any money or

assume any obligation. Repayment would be between the purchaser and the developer.

The action on the General Telephone franchise for operating in Spearman was noted as a possible token expression since the Texas Public Utilities Commission (PUC) would probably have the final say in the disposition of the service right. However, every member of the council was in agreement that denying the franchise was an expression of the city's feeling on the quality of service.

The council approved Ronnie Bullard for the post of fire chief-fire marshal after it was noted that Ronnie Antalek had accepted a full time position as fire chief-fire marshal with the city of Dimmitt and had, in fact, already moved to that city and on the job.

The remainder of the lengthy session—following the budget workshop session—was given over to routine reports and payment of bills.

## Gruver Man Dies In One Truck Crash

A tragic, apparently unavoidable accident five miles west of Spearman on Hwy 15 claimed the life of a Gruver man, Robert William Bates.

Bates was dead at the scene of the one-truck accident apparently from injuries received when the semi-trailer-tractor rig overturned at least twice.

The truck hit a calf in the road and Department of Public Safety Officer Max Gunn said preliminary investigation of the mishap indicated the calf was already dead when struck by the moving truck. Officer Gunn said a final report of the accident and a decision on the exact cause was awaiting an autopsy on the animal the vehicle struck.

Services for Robert William Bates will be conducted at 2:30 p.m., Sunday from the First Christian Church in Gruver.

## Panel Indicts 9 on 11 Counts

At the close of its most recent session, Aug. 10, the grand jury handed down 11 indictments against nine men with five of the bills sought by the Hansford County Sheriff's Department; four by the Gruver Police Department; one by the Police Department and one by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Sheriff's Department cases ending in indictments include Albert Ortega, Jr., 20 Perryton,

unauthorized use of a motor vehicle with bond fixed at \$3,000; William Allen, 19, Amarillo, unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, \$3,000; James Leslie Homberger, 33, Dallas, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, \$10,000; Ricardo Gutierrez, Stinnett, theft of services by deception, \$3,000 and Jessie Earl Bowen, 36, Hopkinsville, Ky., unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, \$3,000.

Indictments sought and

gained by the Gruver Police Department include Larry Bonham, 19, Gruver, two counts: burglary-entering and committing theft and entering with intent to commit theft with bond fixed at \$5,000 on each count; Barton Joe Stevens, 18, Gruver, Two counts: burglary-entering and committing theft and burglary-entering with intent to commit theft with bond set at \$5,000 on each count.

The Spearman Police Depart-

ment had charged Frank Salgado, 36, Spearman, with assault with a deadly weapon and bond was set at \$2,000.

The Department of Public Safety had charged Iva Rock Bogard, 45, Borger, with driving while intoxicated and bond was set at \$1,500.

No definite date has been set for the next session of the grand jury.

## Hansford Sheriff Named Director

Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin was one of four new directors named to the board of the Texas State Sheriff's Association for the 1981-82 term at the recent Association conclave at San Angelo.

Named at the same time were McLennan County Sheriff Jack Harwell, Waco; Leon County Sheriff R.G. Wilson, Centerville and Menard County Sheriff Billy Joe Haney, Menard.

While the position of director is an honor, it is not an honorary appointment. Directors of the Texas State Sheriff's Association are men who have distinguished themselves in the field of law enforcement and are named for the contributions to the field they can make to keep the Association the viable and valuable aid it is to the member sheriffs of the state.

According to all members of the Sheriff's Association—directors or otherwise—it is invaluable in bringing the men who have been elected to uphold the law by their fellow citizens closer together in a personal acquaintanceship. Accordingly, this makes for a quicker under-

standing of the sheriff and his problems when he calls on a fellow officer for aid in a particular case or emergency.

A grizzled veteran of the sherifing role in Texas observed:

"The 'Sossyshun, specially its meetin's, gives us wore-outs a chance to look over the crop of young fellers that keep comin' on in the sherifin' business with real style despite the fact that some onery tongues are tryin' to tarnish the whole younger generation.

"Texas allus manages to have a real crop of officers comin' on and I think the Sossyshun has had a real hand in encouragin' these boys.

"—And were you to use my name which you better not, some folks'd be surprised 'cause I wasn't allus an organization man. In my early duty, I was allus a 'best 'em, 'rest 'em and nest 'em... in jail, that is!"

With almost 200 to select from, one of the four named this year was the Hansford County Sheriff and that has made a lot of folks proud.

# Board Votes Increase In Cafeteria Prices

The Spearman I.S.D. voted in their meeting to increase the price of lunches in the schools. Breakfast prices will remain the same.

Elementary lunches will be 90 cents, grades 1-4. Grades 5-8 lunch will be 95 cents; and High school lunches will be \$1.00. Breakfast prices for all students will be 40 cents and 75 cents for faculty. Faculty lunches will be \$1.30 and all guest lunches will be \$2.00. An extra carton of milk will be 20 cents this year due to the Government doing away with the Special Milk Program, from which we received a reimbursement. Extra meat items will be 65 cents.

Lunch tickets may be purchased for grades 1-4 for 5 days at \$4.50; 10 days at \$9.00; 20 days at \$18.00. Grades 5-8 may purchase 5 day tickets for \$4.75; 10 day tickets for \$9.50; and 20 days at \$19.00. Tickets at High School will be 5 days at \$5.00; 10 days at \$10.00 and 20 days at \$20.00. Faculty tickets may be purchased for 5 days for \$6.50; 10 days for \$13.00 and 20 days for \$26.00. Tickets may also be purchased for the Breakfast program each morning on the dining room for 5 days for \$2.00; 10 days for \$4.00; and 20 days for \$8.00. Lunch tickets will be sold in the all-purpose room of the Elementary building on Wednesday morning, August 26, 1981, from 8:30 - 10:30.

Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the attached scale may be eligible for either free meals or meals at a reduced price of 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

To apply at any time during the year for free or reduced price meals for your children, complete the attached application and return to **JUDGE McCLELLAN'S OFFICE AT THE COUNTY COURTHOUSE**, any afternoon between the hours of 1:00 and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Within 10 days, the Judge will notify you and the cafeteria if and when you are eligible.

If, during the school year, there are changes in your family size or substantial changes in your income, you should report such changes to the school officials in order that appropriate adjustments can be made.

If you have applied for free or reduced price benefits in other school years, you will note some changes to the application form. The application now requires the name and social security number of all adult family members. Adults without social security numbers must indicate that they do not have one. Schools may verify the source and amount of income as well as household composition.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these

benefits. If you have foster children living with you and you wish to apply for such meals for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application.

All children are treated the same, regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, creed, color or national origin.

If you do not agree with the official's decision on your appli-

cation, you may wish to discuss it with the school. If you wish to review the decision further, you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the President of Board of Trustees, 403 E. 11th Street, Spearman, 79081, or phone 659-3233.

We hope that the changes in the application do not create confusion. If we can be of any further assistance, please do not hesitate to call us.

# Suspect Returned In Welding Theft

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department returned Lee Roy Cada from Dumas, Friday, where he was being held by Moore County authorities on a warrant alleging theft issued by Hansford County, May 1.

Cada is the prime suspect in the theft of a number of items of welding equipment taken from a location in the north part of the county early in the year.

Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin said the investigation was continuing into the theft of a tractor recently from a location nine miles south of Spearman on Hwy 207. A fence was cut to gain access to the tractor and the unit was evidently loaded on a low-boy trailer and hauled away.

The tractor taken belonged to Sonny Windom. It was a 1979 model 4640 John Deere, serial number 013225R. Value was set at \$45,000 on the missing unit.

Sheriff McFarlin sounded a warning to Hansford County farmers to take extra precautions with their tractors in the fields. There have been a rash of such thefts throughout the

Panhandle although this was the first such loss for Hansford County.

## Veteran's News

Some delays in marking the graves of veterans with government furnished monuments have been traced to the use of outdated application forms bearing Department of Defense or Department of the Army addresses, according to a Veterans Administration official.

Veterans Service Officers and cemetery and funeral directors are urged to use VA Form 40-1330, "Application for Headstone or Marker," when assisting the next-of-kin after the death of a veteran, said Donald L. Wardle, VA Monument Service director.

The correct address for the completed VA application is: Monument Service (42), Veterans Administration, 810 Vermont Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20420.

Although responsibility for the marker program was transferred to VA from the Army in 1973, many applications are still being sent to DOD or Army for processing.

Wardle said the resultant administrative delay can be reduced by discarding all DOD and Army monument applications and by mailing the proper form to the VA.

A supply of VA Form 40-1330 may be obtained from the nearest VA regional office or by writing Monument Service at the above address.
