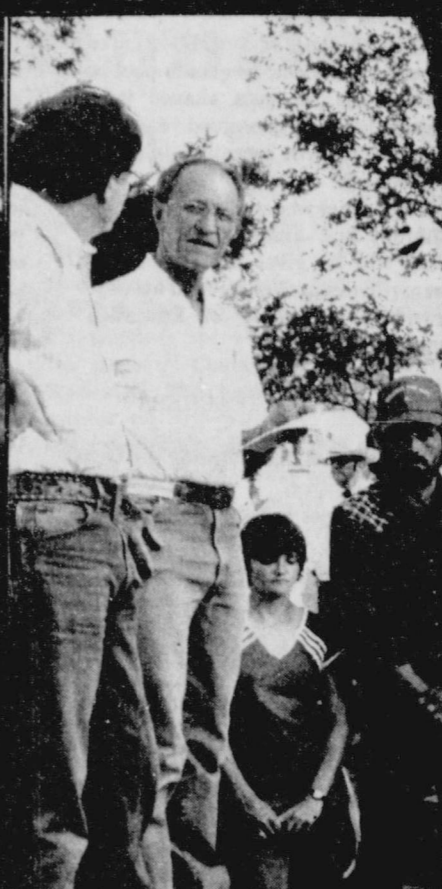

# Faye's Daze

It's too hot to think of anything to write about this week, but with school starting Tuesday, and everyone getting ready for back to school I decided to pilfer the following from Gruver's editor Joy Henderson's column:

### RULES FOR TEACHERS 1872

1. Teachers each day will fill lamps, clean chimneys.
2. Each teacher will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the day's session.
3. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of the pupils.
4. Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.
5. After ten hours in school, the teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
6. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
7. Every teacher should lay aside from

each pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.

8. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, intention, integrity and honest.

9. The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay, providing the Board of Education approves.

### RULES FOR TEACHERS 1915

1. You will not marry during the term of your contract.
2. You are not to keep company with men.
3. You must be home between the hours of 8:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. unless attending a school function.
4. You may not loiter downtown in ice cream stores.
5. You may not travel beyond the city

limits unless you have the permission of the chairman of the board.

6. You may not ride in a carriage or automobile with any man unless he is your father or brother.

7. You may not smoke cigarettes.

8. You may not dress in bright colors.

9. You may under no circumstances dye your hair.

10. You must wear at least two petticoats.

11. Your dresses must not be any shorter than two inches above the ankle.

12. To keep the school room neat and clean, you must sweep the floor at least once daily, scrub the floor at least once a week with hot, soapy water, clean the blackboards at least once a day, and start the fire at 7:00 a.m. so the room will be warm by 8:00 a.m.

# 1984 milo, corn yields . . . Hansford listed in top 5

Hansford County grain sorghum and corn growers, are the second best in Texas, according to an irrigated report on 1984 production that was compiled by Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The report was recently published by the state agency. A copy was received last week by Hansford County extension service office headed by Burt Williams.

Grain sorghum producers harvested a 1984 crop which was ranked the fifth largest in Texas — however, irrigated production was the highest in the state.

Corn growers had the ninth largest crop listed in the state wide report.

The year 1984 was a good year for all crops in Hansford County. The first fall freeze was earlier than normal but did not cause the widespread damage experienced in 1983.

The harvest by Hansford grain sorghum producers was the largest irrigated crop in the state's history.

The crop report lists Moore County as the No. 1 irrigated producer in 1984 with 65,000 acres.

Hansford County was the No. 2 producer with 65,000 acres also. Deaf Smith was No. 3 with 49,500 acres; Sherman County was No. 4 with 42,000 acres. Hansford County almost doubled Ochiltree who produced 37,500 acres in 1984.

Following Moore County in the irrigated milo statewide rankings are Hansford, 374.7 million lbs.; Deaf Smith, 303.8 million lbs.

The top corn producing counties are generally in the Panhandle. Castro County is listed first, 16.1 million bushels, followed by Parmer, Hale, Lamb, Dallam, Wharton, Swisher, and Hidalgo counties. In 10th place is Bailey County.
