



Dance exercise classes offered

Feeling the end-of-summer blahs? Ready for a change? Didn't shape up and lose weight like you wanted to this summer? Are you an exercise "drop-out"? If any or all of the above apply to you, join a dance-exercise class at the Y.M.C.A. and have fun while you whittle away the inches and burn

The class starts out with warmup stretches and movements to prepare your muscles for the aerobic portion of the class. This aerobic part is from 35 to 40 minutes of fat-burning, easy to learn, simple rhythmic dance movements that are so much easy to learn, simple rhythmic dence movements that are so fun you can't believe it's exercise! During this portion of the class, your working heart rate is carefully monitored by the instructor to make sure it's high enough to burn fat but not so high as to be harmful. This is very important! Safety, both for the heart and muscles, is the by-word of this class. Last is the cool-down to gradually bring the body to its normal state. 



1984 milo, corn yields.... Hansford listed in top 5

Hansford County grain sorghum and corn growers, are the second best in Texas, according to an irrigated report on 1984 production

that was compiled by Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The report was recently published by the state agency. A copy was received last week by Hansford County extension service office

headed by Burt Williams. Grain sorghum producers harvested a 1984 crop which was ranked the fifth largest in Texas -however, irrigated production was the highest in the state.

Corn growers had the ninth largest crop listed in the state wide report.

The year 1984 was a good year for all crops in Hansford County. The first fall freeze was earlier than normal but did not cause the widespread damage experienced in

The harvest by Hansford grain sorghum producers was the largest irrigated crop in the state's history.

The crop report lists Moore County as the No. 1 irrigated producer in 1984 with 65,000 acres.

Hansford County was the No. 2 producer with 65,000 acres also. Deaf Smith was No. 3 with 49,500 acres; Sherman County was No. 4 with 42,000 acres. Hansford County almost doubled Ochiltree who produced 37,500 acres in 1984.

Following Moore County in the irrigated Milo statewide rankings are Hansford, 374.7 million lbs.; Deaf Smith, 303.8 million lbs.

The top corn producing counties are generally in the Panhandle. Castro County is listed first, 16.1 million bushels, followed by Parmer, Hale, Lamb, Dallam, Wharton, Swisher, and Hidalgo counties. In 10th place is Bailey County.
