ANR reaches no decision on meetings or resolution

A.N.R. Pipeline Co., a subsidiary of Coastal Corp., has made no decision as yet about further meetings to discuss a hazardous waste disposal site or whether to withdraw its proposal for the

Dale Malzahn, head of environmental health and safety for A.N.R., said Monday he did not expect a decision about further meetings or a reaction on the Hansford County Commissioners' .esolution until after the holidays.

"I think there was a positive aspect gained from the meeting," said Malzahn. "Both sides benefited from the exchange of information. We know each other better and have set up a line of comm-

Malzahn explained the proposed disposal facility more fully. He said A.N.R. planned the project in four phases. One phase would be completed each year for four years. The entire project involves the cleanup of 16 sites.

During a period of about three months each year, four sites would be scheduled for removal of PCB-contaminated soil. Each site would be completed before another clean-up operation would begin.

After each site is cleaned, the PCB soil will be transported to the Edgar G. Hill station in Han-sford County and deposited in a three sided dis-posal pit. In between deposits from A.N.R. stations a layer of top soil, three or four inches thick, would be spread over the waste.

Malzahn affirmed there would be no danger of the soil blowing. "It will be like a rock," he stated.

Malzahn affirmed there would be no danger of the soil blowing. "It will be like a rock," he stated. When the waste is removed from all four sites, a plastic top would seal the disposal pit. "It wouldn't be feasible for each site to dispose of its own PCB waste," he explained. "Some sites have ground water only three or four inches deep and we would be unable to make certain there would be no leakage."

The waste disposal area in Hansford County will have a clay liner made up of soil from the dike area. Then a ½-inch plastic liner will be put on top of the clay to make it doubly safe.

"We can't be too technical as yet since the EPA has not even rendered a tentative decision," explained Malzahn. "They have to agree on specifications. According to EPA requirements, the clay liner might have been enough protection. The company wanted to made certain of protection and added the plastic liner."


Malzahn feels as if the company shouldn't be considered the heavy in this case. "We feel as if A.N.R. is a victim," he said.

In 1973, A.N.R. discovered the fire retardant lubrication used in the company's air compressors contained PCBs and discontinued its use.

Turner

PORT ARTHUR, Texas -- Russell Edward Turner has a tattoo of the "Grim Reaper" on his right shoulder. The tattoo was a grisly portent of the violent twist that Tur-ner's life has taken in the past year and a half.

Jefferson County law enforcement authorities say Turner, 33, is wanted on warrants charging him with the September 21, 1984, murder of Jewel Savoy, Jr., of Port Arthur.

Investigators say Turner apparently discovered Savoy with Turner's wife inside their Port Arthur residence and allegedly chased the victim down the street repeatedly stabling him. Savoy eventually the victim down the street, repeatedly stabbing him. Savoy eventually

died from more than two dozen stab wounds. Turner was arrested the same night and posted bond and was released from jail. But on April 29, 1985, a warrant was issued for Turner's arrest when he failed to appear for a court hearing.

Then on July 4, 1985, the fugitive's eight-year-old daughter
Angie Marie Turner disappeared. Investigators believe the youngster

is with her father. A spokesman for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department said

Turner is a known associate of the Bandido Motorcycle Gang and might be in the company of some of the gang members.

Officers have checked out a number of possible sightings of their elusive fugitive, including locations in Houston, Vidor, Port Arthur, Lafayette, Louisiana and Randalett, Oklahoma, but have come up repeat-

Turner, who was born in Dotesdale, England, to American parents,

is described as a white male, 6-1, 235 pounds, with brown hair and blue eyes. He has a number of tattoos in addition to the "Grim Reaper" on his right shoulder - a one-inch long cross on his left shoulder and a dollar sign about an inch long on the right palm near the meaty area below the thumb.

Acquaintances have told investigators that Turner is addicted to Mandrax, a synthetic sedative similar to Quaalude, and needs about one to two dozen tablets a day.

Turner is believed to be accompanied by his daughter, Angie Marie, a white female, with dark brown hair, brown eyes and a dark

Officials say Turner is known to carry weapons and should be considered armed and dangerous. He has worked in the past as a welder and mechanic.

This week Turner has been added to the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered by the Governor's Office for information leading to the fugitive's capture.

Anyone who might have information concerning Turner's whereabouts is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1,800,252,8477 or their local crime Stoppers Program.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Department of Public Safety and the 130 Crime Stoppers programs in the state.

In 1983 Malzahn said the company discovered there was PCB residue in the water run-off when the air coolers were drained. The residue drained into a retention pond at each site.

The company began a clean-up operation and continued it through 1985. The PCB residue from the clean-up operation was deposited in a commercial hazardous waste site.

"The company decided to be a leader by cleaning up all the sites," said Malzahn. "It could have become an issue and the company decided to eliminate it before it became a problem."

PCB waste needed to be eliminated from 30 sites. The company has cleaned 14, depositing the waste at commercial landfills. Last year the company ran into a problem. More and more of the landfills were closed and there was no place to deposit the

and took into consideration chemical treatment and incineration. However, neither solution seemed to meet our needs," explained Malzahn.

Company officials met with the EPA in June and the EPA asked for field testing. The proposal was submitted to the regional EPA office in Dallas in November. Now the company awaits the tentative decision.

"It is the law that the EPA hold a 30 day comment period after the tentative affirmation of the proposal," Malzahn said. "Then it will make a final decision about the waste site.

"The PCB issue has been blown all out of proportion," he added. "Environmental groups are backing off of it. The risk involved is not that great according to EPA standards.

CAPP (Citizens Against Poisonous Pollutants), an organization formed by residents of the Panhandles of Texas and Oklahoma, is asking concerned citizens to write to the USEPA. Jim Sales, 1201 Elm St., 28th Floor, Dallas, Tex. 75270.

The committee's prime concerns are high winds in the Panhandle, which could transport the PCBs to grazing or farm land, and unsafe road conditions that could cause problems with the transportation of toxic wastes.

ful centerpiece for your holiday dinners can also ruin your table cloth, if you don't know how to remove wax stains.

Simply washing and drying linens may permanently set any stains. But taking a few simple steps before washing can make linens look like new again.

Let the wax harden by putting the linen in the freezer or rubbing the wax with an ice cube. Then crumble the fabric and the wax should flake away.

If that doesn't work, scrape the wax from the fabric with a table knife, place the stained area between paper towels and press with

a warm iron. The softened wax should transfer to the towels. After ironing, put the fabric face down on a paper towel and sponge any remaining stain with a dry cleaning solvent or pre-wash spray. When the fabric is dry, launder so

If the wax from colored cancles leaves a dye stain, it can be removed by adding oxygen bleach to the wash cycle. When the stain is on a colored table cloth, make sure that the oxygen bleach is a brand that is safe for colored fabrics.

Texas Safety Belt Day

Governor Mark White today signed an Official Memorandum lesignating January 1, 1986, as 'Safety Belt Day in Texas' to encourage all Texans who have not gotten into the habit of buckling their seat belts to make it their New Year's resolution.

"The average person makes about 45,000 automobile trips in a lifetime. Statistically, the chances are one in three that each person will be involved in a serious of fatal crash," Governor White said. "The best preventive action that anyone can take to protect himself from death or serious injury in an automobile crash is to buckle up.

Approximately 46,000 highway fatalities occur per year across the nation. Statistics show that a person, has a 50 percent greater chance of being killed in a car crash and a much greater chance of serious injury if he is not wearing a safety belt.

The 69th Legilsature passed the seat belt law which mandates that all drivers and front-seat passengers wear safety belts. The law went into effect September 1, and grace period was allowed until December 1.

"We are already seeing a dramatic decrease in automobile fatalities and serious injuries since the seat belt law went into effect," the governor said. "I encourage all citizens to obey this law for their sake and the sake of their loved ones.'

Representatives of the Tarrant County Red Cross were present as Governor White signed the memorandum.




