Deputies Advance Training Finished World Hunger Answer Near

Hansford County Sheriff's Jeff Hawkins and Gary Evans recently completed advance training in specialized schools conducted at Austin.

This instruction, supplied by the Texas Department of Public Safety, is training beyond the rigorous certification qualifying attained by these men.

"We work at having an orderly community environment here," Sheriff McFarlin noted. "And our job is made easy by the high type of folks that make up our community. But any area has growing pains and a goodly number of transients and we feel this training gives our department a certain capability if the need arises."

Deputy Hawkins was schooled in the advanced science of criminal investigation. This particularly qualifies him for homicide investigation. --But that is not the entire criminal investigation "scene" as Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin pointed out.

Speaking of transients, the Sheriff said he felt Deputy Evans' advance training in the same DPS school at Austin, would get a greater "workout" because of the increasing number of people passing through area. Deputy Evans attended the burglary investigation school and while Hansford County has had no great wave of this type of crime, it represents the greatest incidence of any lawbreaking experienced.

"We are going to take advantage of every training opportunity," Sheriff McFarlin assured, "so long as doing so does not take one of our men away from the task of protecting our community at a critical time."

Allen and Joan Eubanks Missionary

Allen and Joan Eubank serve with the Church of Christ in Thailand through the Division of Overseas Ministries of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). Mr. Eubank has been teaching Evangelism and New Testament in Payap College, Chiang Mai, Thailand, for the

past nine years. During the last two of these years, he has been acting head of the Department of Philosophy and Religion and also head of the Graduate Department of Theology in Payap College. Joan has been caring for their four children, teaching voice in the college and leading the Seminary Choir. She has played an active role in founding a school for the deaf.

The Reverends Eubank were ordained in East Dallas Chris-

tian Church and went to Thailand nineteen years ago, in 1961. Mr. Eubank participated in the first elephant-back expedition to a remote tribal group along the Burma border. After language school in Bangkok, the Eubanks moved to the rural village of Sam Yek, 70 miles west of Bangkok, where they made evangelistic visits to the surrounding villages and taught

in the small Christian school there. When the Church grew, Mr. Eubank helped to construct the building and became the first pastor. They worked especially with the nearby Lao Song tribe where Joan began a handicraft project which still supports many villagers.

Upon their return to Thailand in May, 1981, Allen will become director of the newly founded Christian Communications Institute at Payap College which uses various media to present Christ's Gospel to Thailand through drama. Joan will contribute her dramatic and musical experience in these productions.

Allen was born in Hillsboro, Texas. He was graduated from Texas A&M University with the B.S. degree in geological engineering. After serving as a captain with the U.S. Army Engineers during the Korean war, he worked as a geologist with Standard Oil Company of

Texas for four years. He then attended Brite Divinity School, Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, Texas, where he received the B.D. degree. He received the S.T.M. degree from Yale Divinity School, New Haven, Connecticut, in 1966.

Joan Hovis Eubank was born in Abilene, Kansas. She attended the University of Houston and Texas Christian University. In addition to appearances on television, Broadway, and in major cities throughout the United States, she had leading

roles in musical productions in Belgium and England. She met Allen while she was singing with a USO troupe performing for the combat engineer company he commanded in Korea.

The Eubanks' four children are: David Allen, a Sophomore at Texas A&M, Ruthanne, a Freshman at TCU, Laurie Kit in the eleventh grade and Sue Wance in the fifth.



Spring is the beginning of the tornado season, in a sense, though these destructive whirling windstorms can occur at any time during the year.

They seldom expand to more than a mile or two in diameter, are often only a few hundred yards wide. They may bounce over the surface of the earth, touching down with devastating force every so many miles on a course several hundred miles long, or they may travel only a few miles.

The velocity of wind is always high in a tornado, possibly several hundred miles an hour. The tornado develops when a heavy air layer somehow winds up atop a light layer of air, in an occluded front area. As the heavier air breaks through, falling, somehow a circular motion of great force develops.

This occurs most frequently in the midwestern and western states, such as Kansas and Nebraska. Only in the central plains of Russia do tornadoes like those in the United States occur so regularly.

Tornadoes come at night or in daylight. In the day, the funnel-shaped cloud can be seen at some distance, travelling not too fast, usually, and one can often get into a storm cellar or lie flat in a low place in time to escape, if in their path.

Polish Border Changed Often

Pressure from outside influence such as the Soviet Union are not new to Poland, the Polish People's Republic. Its history is littered with invasions and assaults and the consequent redrawing of borders.

Poland first emerged as a state around the year 1000—a union of Slavic tribes. By 1492, after successful wars, treaties, and dynastic unions, an enlarged Poland counted the territories of Lithuania, Hungary, Prussia, Bohemia, and Pomerania in its sphere of influence.

But by 1667 war and civil strife—as well as expansionist neighbors—had eaten away at its borders. After three partitions, Poland was devoured by Russia, Prussia, and Austria and wiped off Europe's maps by 1795.

Poland was reborn in the early 1800s when Napoleon conquered Prussia and Austria; and after his defeat in 1815, it became the Russian-ruled Kingdom of Poland. Following World War I, Poland emerged as a parliamentary republic, remaining free until Sept. 1, 1939, when Nazi Germany invaded from the north, west, and south.

Soon afterward, Poland was overrun from the east—by the Soviet Union. Today it occupies almost the same territory it did a millennium ago, the population homogeneous and mostly Roman Catholic.

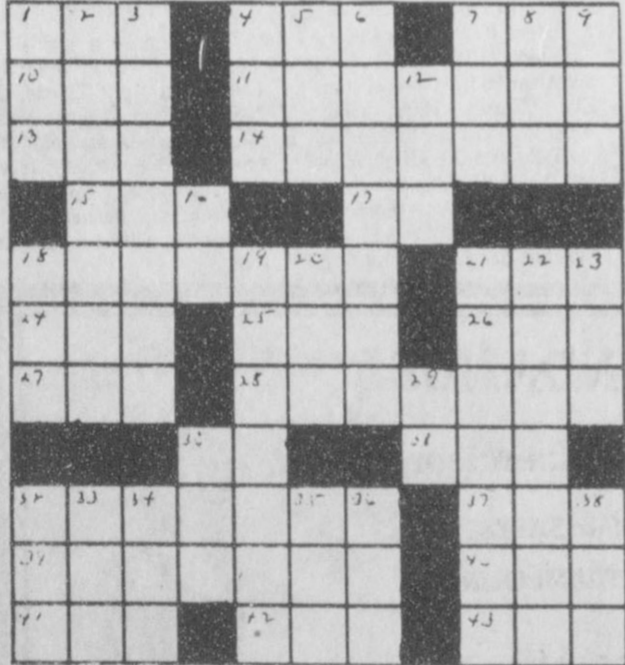

Deadline Set

April deadlines have been set for area farmers planning to participate in the Federal Crop Insurance program.

Protection is available on corn in Hansford, Dallam, Carson, Gray, Hartley, Moore and Sherman counties and applications must be filed by April 15.

Grain sorghum producers in Dallam, Carson, Hansford, Gray, Hartley, Hutchinson, Moore, Ochiltree, Sherman and Wheeler counties will be able to apply for protection until April 30, according to Brenda Karvas, district director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

Protection is also available on cotton in Wheeler County until April 30 and until April 24 in Gray County.

FCIC is a voluntary participation program administered by the United States Department of Agriculture. It is designed to protect a producer's annual crop investment from unavoidable hazards like drought, wind, hail and insects.

Information and applications are available from the FCIC office in Amarillo or from one of the local insurance agents now handling the program.

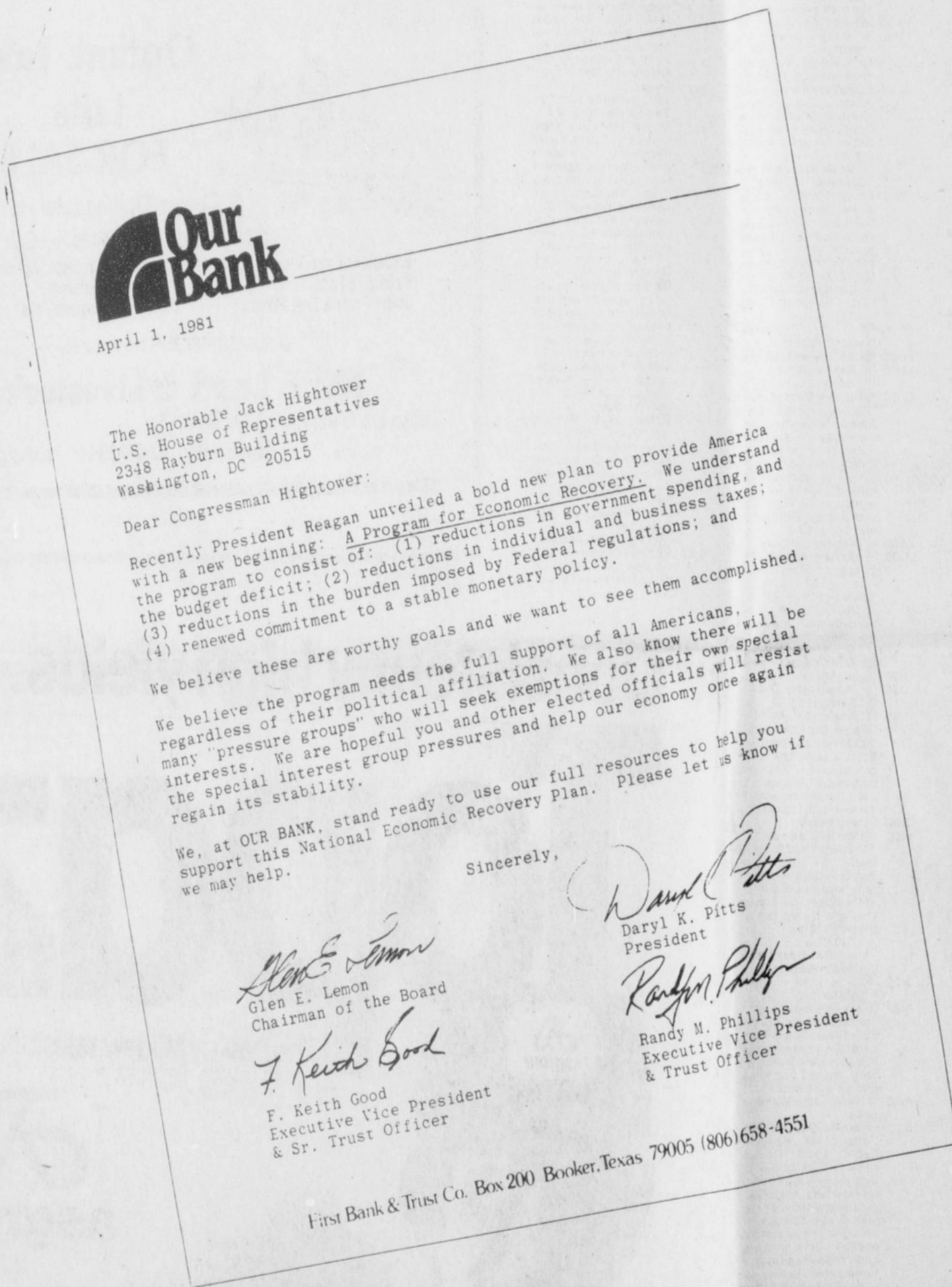
