School Budget Up, Taxes Down!

Those paying taxes in the Spearman I.S.D. will receive a 14% reduction in taxes for the 1977-78 school year even though the school budget has increased. The tax rate has been

reduced from 1.39 to 1.20. This situation is created by multiple factors. The first of these is the increase in assessed values of property within the district. This is values on new properties and increased prices on gas and not increased values on properties already existing.

The assessed value for the district in 1976-77 was \$90,232,790. For 1977-78 the projected assessed value is \$102,439,360. Local values (homes, farm, ranches, business, etc.) made up 40% of this total in 1976-77 and 36% in 1977-78. Utilities, pipeline plants, etc. made up 13% of the total roll in 1976-77 and 12% of the roll in 1977-78. The oil and gas industry production, working interest and royalty made up 47% of the roll in 1976-77 and is 52% of the roll in 1977-78.

The second factor involves state funds. State revenue for 1976-77 was \$397,268 which was 23% of the total budget. The estimated state revenue for 1977-78 is \$563,700 which will represent 31% of the total budget. This is, of course, a direct reflection from the education bill passed during the special session of legislature this past summer. The education bill was beneficial to the Spearman I.S.D. We are indebted to Rep. Bill Clayton and Governor Dolph Briscoe for the bill which was beneficial to the rural districts of Texas. Rep. Bob Close was also a staunch supporter of legislation that involved the schools of this area.

The budget for 1977-78 shows an increase of \$116,533 which is about 7%. The total 1977-78 budget is \$1,795,477.

The budget breakdown shows the payroll to represent 62% of the total budget, or \$1,121,428. This is an increase of \$75,428 or 7% over last year.

The second largest increase in the budget is in services. This means utilities. The increase for services is \$38,525 or 29% for a total of \$169,650. These two budget items represent \$114,000 of the \$116,000 budget increase for 1977-78.

We are all interested in the bottom line figure. The summary for the Spearman I.S.D. budget or tax picture shows a .19 cent tax rate decrease. This means that a piece of property on the tax roll for \$10,000 in 1976-77 paid \$159 in taxes. A piece of property with the same value in 1977-78 will receive a tax statement of \$120.

Spearman City Council Tuesday night, Sept. 13, during the regular meeting in City Hall delved into the small increased cost of natural gas to city users under Texas Railroad Commission Order on Docket No. 668, discussed implementing the city's junk car ordinance and the possible uses of Revenue Sharing Funds during Fiscal 1977-78.

City officials reported Wednesday, Sept. 14, that no set figures were immediately available as to the cost increase to the individual consumer.

The RRC Order outlines the rate the city is to pay High Plains Natural Gas Co. for gas and then pass through 90 percent of any increase over or above .4123 cents per thousand cubic feet (MCF) plus the cost of service allowance which is set at this time at .2576 cents per MCF.

The order is retroactive to July 19, 1976, and city officials

pointed out that no customer will be required to make a lump sum payment but that individual payments will be prorated to pay at the rate of five cents per MCF until the customer has reached a current billing status as far as the pass through and cost of service charges are concerned.

It was noted that under the previous RRC order the city had been paying .7603 cents per MCF but the new order authorizes an increase to 78 cents or a hike of .0197 cents per MCF.

In discussing Revenue Sharing, Mayor Ralph Blodgett opened the discussion and City Manager Mark Neff explained the criteria established for use of the funds. A representative of the Spearman Senior Citizens requested that if funds for the use of such purposes that they be put to good use.

Neff explained that funds are utilized in a summer recreation

program by the parks department, by the fire and other departments and for capital improvements.

Council took no action concerning a personnel policy and an affirmative action statement.

Dr. R.L. Kleeberger was appointed City Health Officer.

In reviewing the city's summer recreation and swimming pool report, it was noted that 325 individuals made up the 481 participants in the various summer recreation programs and that there were 75 students per session for the two sessions conducted at the swimming pool and that the program was considered a success.

Perry Washington opened discussion about the city's junk car ordinance. The city is enforcing the ordinance and junk vehicles, those that are inoperative, wrecked or otherwise unusable and parked on public street or on private

property not enclosed or concealed from public view, will be towed away by the city if provision for compliance with the code by private owners is not accomplished.

It was noted that if the city tows the car away, the vehicle will no longer be registered by the state.

Anyone with a vehicle they want towed away should contact the Spearman Police Department and make necessary arrangements.

Council also accepted the monthly fire, police, ambulance and municipal reports and paid bills.

In additional business, a special meeting of City Council will be held at 6:30 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 20, at City Hall for public discussion of a proposed budget for FY 1977-78 which begins Oct. 1. It was emphasized that the public is invited and coffee and doughnuts will be served.



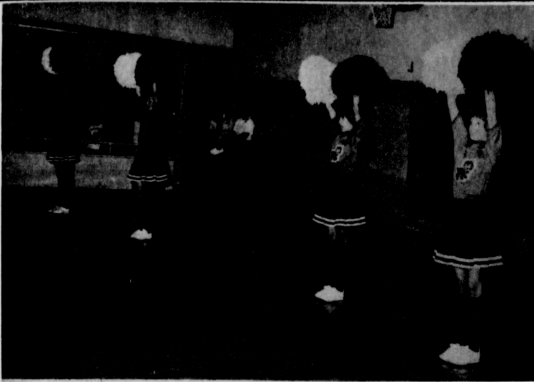

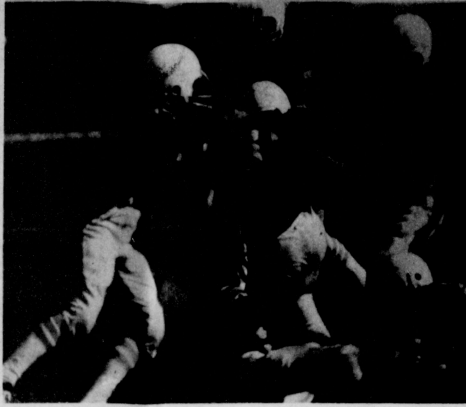

This past Thursday night turned out to be a little different from last Thursday concerning the "Big Little Lynx" teams. The 7th graders started the action off, not at all resembling the same team that took to the field a week ago. Head 7th grade Football Coach Jim Bob Brown seems to be a miracle worker, turning things around the way he did in just one week. The Little Lynx 7th graders were offensively strong and extraordinarily tough on defense.

While the offense piled up 93 yards rushing, the defense held a spunky Boys Ranch group to a mere 30 yards total offense—21 yards rushing, 9 yards passing. Darren Goodheart led the way in the rushing department, racking up 62 yards on 17 carries. Dennis Randall followed with 16 yards carrying the ball 5 times, and Ricky Torres made 3 offensive plunges totaling 6 yards.

The Lynx 7th graders' offensive hero, scoring all of Spearman's 14 points with two touchdown runs; the first a five yard leap from scrimmage within 19 seconds left in the first quarter, adding a two point conversion; and his second score came in the fourth quarter with 42 seconds left on the clock galloping 70 yards from scrimmage for paydirt. 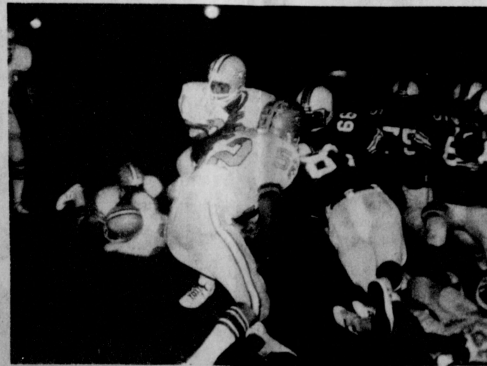
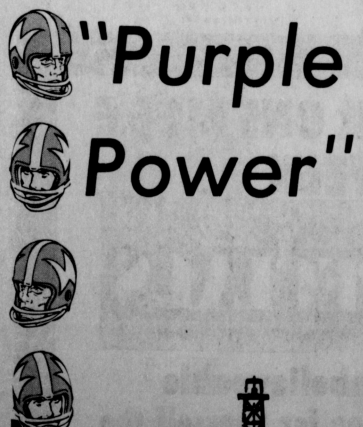
