Business discussed was the annual broom sale scheduled for the first Thursday in October - weather permitting.

Lion Don Townsen introduced Mrs. VanPetton, who is a representative of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center located in Amarillo, Texas.

Mrs. VanPetton showed a comprehensive slide show as she discussed the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center located in Amarillo, Texas.

The expanding Center, which opened in July of 1981, provides chemotherapy, radiation and surgery through the cooperation of the

American Cancer Society, the Texas Tech School of Medicine, Northwest Texas Hospital, High Plains Baptist Hospital and St. Anthony's Hospital, Mrs. VanPetton said. As a convenience, families of cancer patients may stay in the Ronald McDonald House located near the Cancer Center, she said.

She stressed the Cancer Center strives to make the treatment of cancer a team approach for the patient. At the Center each patient is assigned a physician and nurse to direct individual treatment, Mrs. VanPetton said, and members of a team may include a nutritionist, pharmacists, radiation technologists, therapists, social workers and pastoral counselors to assist the patient.

Mrs. VanPetton reminded the group that one out of three people will suffer from cancer. "Early detection and treatment are the best prevention," she said, "and the Sybil and Don Harrington Center offer such a convenient facility for those in the Texas Panhandle." Every donation is used to save lives.

Mrs. VanPetton answered questions and Boss Lion Gillaspie brought the meeting to a close.

A big thanks to Don Townsen, for bringing this outstanding program.

The week of July 15-20 TG&Y is having a company wide sales contest. The winner of each district wins \$1000.00. We at TG&Y have found a group of people who are in desperate need of help to raise money. This is the Panhandle area. Kidney patients auxiliary of the Dialysis Center of Amarillo. We plan to donate our prize money to this auxiliary because the people in the Panhandle area who are on dialysis will have the funds that the government provides them for medicine and travel to Amarillo 3 times a week in September. This will affect from 150 to 200 people in the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle and surrounding area of Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Some of these people will not be able to continue coming to Amarillo for dialysis as they will have to choose whether to continue treatment or feed their families and they will choose to feed their families. A person whose kidneys do not function properly has to be put on the dialysis machine which consists of going to Amarillo 3 times a week for treatment which means sitting in a chair for 4 hours three times a week having their blood running through a machine to clean the poison out of their systems so they may live. A person whose kidneys have failed will only be able to live 2 weeks without dialysis.

The family members of some of these patients have gotten together to form the Panhandle area Kidney Patients Auxiliary. This is a non-profit organization with all the work being volunteered. We hope that we will be able to raise funds to be used for our patients in our area so that they may continue to live.

We urge everyone to come out and help us help this group of people and have a great time and enjoy some great bargains so we can help some not so fortunate people live.

Commissioners amend 86 budget

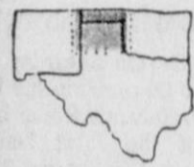
The Hansford County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday, July 8th in the Hansford County Courthouse.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and the bills were approved for payment.

The commissioners approved the firefighters contract. They also approved the communication telephone lines S.W. of town. A pipeline for Phillips Petroleum in the S.W. end of town was also approved by the commissioners. The contract for the Hansford Library was approved.

The commissioners discussed the liability and casualty insurance for the courthouse. It was decided to ask for bids. They discussed the hospitalization insurance, but took no action.

GOALS

1. Assist with emergency funding for transportation to/from the dialysis center and/or the transplant center.
2. Purchase medications for individuals.
3. Provide emergency lodging.
4. Provide bereavement cards, get-well cards and postage.
5. Conduct social activities for the dialysis and transplant patients and their families.

6. Provide medical-alert jewelry for each patient.
7. Provide educational brochures for new patients and for the lobby of the dialysis center.
8. Purchase video-cassette tapes for patient and staff training.
9. Printing of new patient manual.
10. Be available to meet direct patient needs as they occur.

SERVING KIDNEY DIALYSIS AND KIDNEY TRANSPLANT PATIENTS IN THE TEXAS PANHANDLE AND SURROUNDING AREA.

1. WHAT IS P.A.K.P.A.?

Panhandle-Area Kidney Patients Auxiliary is a non-profit charitable organization dedicated to providing direct patient services to the kidney dialysis and transplant patients of the Texas Panhandle and surrounding areas of New Mexico and Oklahoma who come to Amarillo for treatment.

2. WHO WILL BENEFIT FROM DONATIONS PROVIDED BY P.A.K.P.A.?

Currently there are approximately 150 to 200 individuals living in the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle and surrounding areas of Oklahoma and New Mexico. Those who are dialysis patients must travel to/from Amarillo three times per week for kidney dialysis treatments for the rest of their lives. Those who have had kidney transplants must make many trips to/from the transplant hospital in Dallas for routine and sometimes emergency care. Kidney dialysis patients who have their dialysis machines located in their homes must make at least one monthly trip to/from Amarillo for routine care and follow-up. Each of these individuals face financial hardships due to their illnesses and help is sometimes needed by them.

3. HOW IS P.A.K.P.A. ORGANIZED?

Panhandle-Area Kidney Patients Auxiliary is governed by a volunteer board of directors who live in various areas of the Texas Panhandle, thus giving the board a broad base of influence.

Approximately 95% of every dollar donated will be directed toward the provision of services to patients suffering from End-Stage Kidney Disease, while five cents will be used for operational expenses. There are no paid employees; this is a totally volunteer organization.

4. HOW CAN I HELP SUPPORT THE ACTIVITIES OF THIS ORGANIZATION?

Your generous support of P.A.K.P.A. is encouraged. Donations are being accepted from individuals, companies, corporations and civic groups. Many people prefer to make a memorial donation in lieu of flowers. Some folks are glad to find out about a charitable organization which directs its donations to direct patient service instead of to operational expenses which involve salaries and office upkeep.

WHEN KIDNEYS FAIL?

The kidneys, more commonly referred to as the "master chemists" of the body, are twin organs that perform life maintaining functions that include:

1. Adjusting the body's fluids
2. Balancing the chemicals in the body
3. Removing waste products from the body
4. Releasing hormones that regulate blood pressure and help the bone marrow to produce red blood cells.

End-Stage Renal Disease or chronic renal failure is the stage of kidney damage that requires dialysis or kidney transplantation. Dialysis treatments do not cure chronic renal failure, but allows those with chronic failure to maintain life.

WHAT ARE THE STATISTICS?

- 13 million Americans currently suffer from some type of kidney disease.
- Kidney disease currently kills approx. 70,000 Americans every year.
- 63,500 Americans are currently on dialysis
- 16,000 are awaiting kidney transplant.

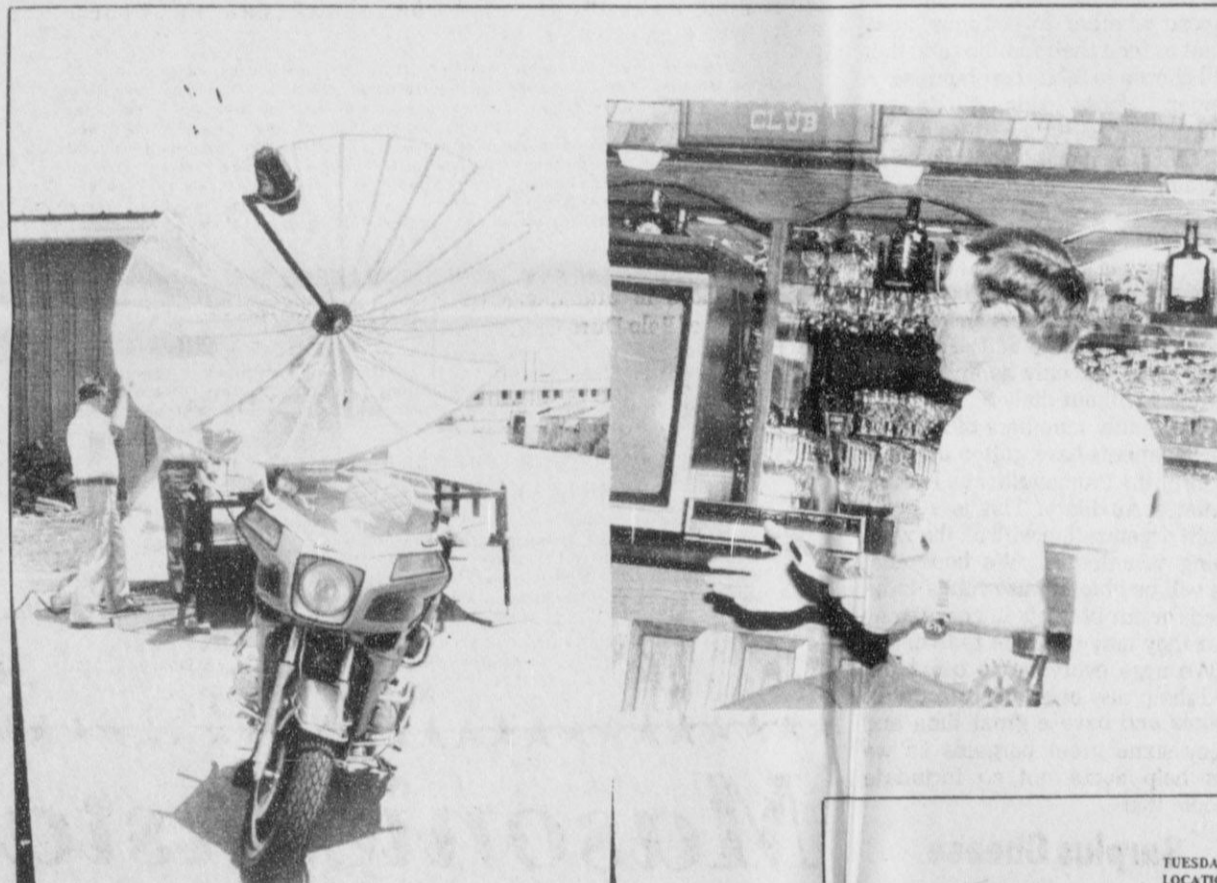
Congressman Boulter will have an opening statement, and then will answer questions from the

Governor Mark White will inaugurate 15 outstanding women into the second annual Texas Women's Hall of Fame on November 14, 1985, at the University of Texas Performing Arts Center during the celebration of "Women in Texas Today" week in Austin.

Individuals or groups may nominate women for the Hall of Fame who have contributed their talents and skills to make a significant impact on the state's development and growth in one of the following areas:

--Agriculture and Ranching: Individuals with expertise in the areas of farming and ranching.

--Arts: The Creative Arts -- artists, sculptors; The Performing Arts -- musicians, singers, actresses, dancers; The Literary Arts -- authors, writers, poets.

--Athletics: Persons who have excelled in amateur or professional sports or the Olympics.

--Business and Finance: Bankers, business owners, financiers, entrepreneurs.

--Civic Leadership: Leaders in the areas such as civil rights, civic involvement, advancement of the arts, philanthropy, historical preservation, and humanitarian causes.

--Communications: Persons involved in print or electronic media.

--Education: Separate awards will go to educators and administrators in higher education and in primary-secondary education.

--Health Professions: Doctors,

nurses, administrators.

--Legal: Attorneys, judges, law enforcement or criminal justice officials.

--Public Service: Elected/appointed officials, government service, human services.

--Science and Technology: Research scientists, inventors, engineers, environmentalists, architects.

--Volunteerism: Individuals active in volunteer causes with a statewide and local community impact.

Governor White, members of the Governor's Commission for Women, and a panel of public members will select winning nominees.

Individuals or groups may nominate candidates for the Texas Women's Hall of Fame by filling out a form available from the Governor's Commission for Women, P.O. Box 12428, Austin 78711. The deadline for the commission to accept nomination forms is Monday, September 16. The quality of a candidate's achievements -- not the number of nomination forms submitted -- will influence selection.

Texas communities are encouraged to plan celebrations honoring local Women's Hall of Fame nominees to coincide with "Women in Texas Today" week in November.

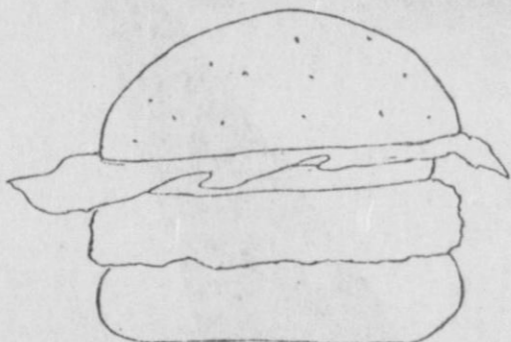

Reunion honored classes of '32-'35

Nostalgia was added to the All School Reunion when Master of Ceremonies Mike Schnell gave old news from past Spearman Reporters and ex-students at the general assembly on July 6.

The year of the dust storm was 1933, and the Spearman Reporter printed that 139 dust storms had struck Hansford County that year. The First State Bank of Spearman recorded \$170,000 in deposits, said Schnell.

At Pay Cleaners, a customer could purchase one suit and get another pair of suit pants for 1 dollar. And in that same year, Cook Hatchery advertised that fresh eggs could be custom hatched for 2 cents, said Schnell.

A 1934 Ford V-8 advertised for \$515. On Tuesday, Jan. 23, 1934, Fred Holt and 11 other team members of the Lynx football team received football sweaters. Mae West and Cary Grant starred in

"I'm no Angel" at the Lyric Theater in March of that year.

Twenty-five students graduated from Spearman High School on May 22, 1934. Vera Beth McClellan and Fern Gower gave a piano duet at the graduation ceremony.

Elmer Gunn coached the 1934-35 Lynx football team, and the assistant coach was John Morris. Members of the team were Sam Pattern (HB), Hershel Colev (HB), C.D. Haines (HB), A.J. Curtis (FB), W.C. Robertson (QB), Dick Vernon (QB), Richard Holton (End), Reuben Deering (End), Paul Robertson (End), Daily Easley (T), Oliver Leverton (T), Rodney Harmon (G), Oran Kelly (G), Elmon Jacobs (G), Willard Davis (C), Paul Buchanan (C) and Robert Nielson (C).

Schnell also said that wheat reached a new high peak in September of '34, selling for 93 cents a bushel. Oats sold at 50

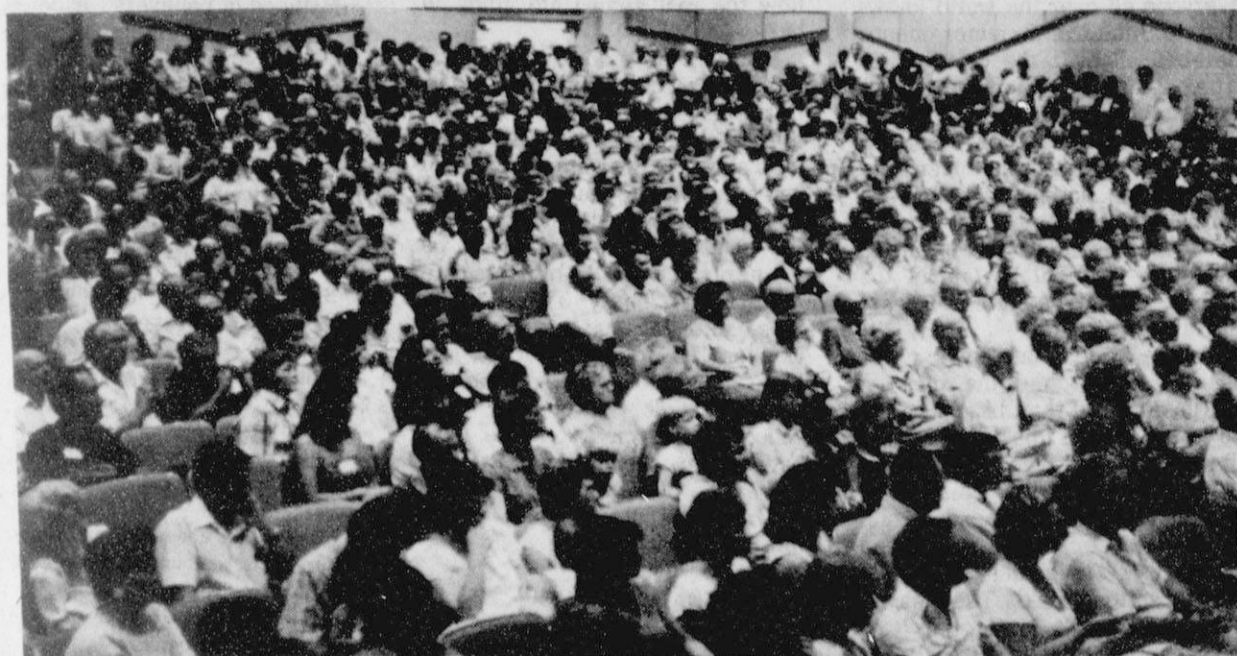
cents and barley at 65 cents a bushel.

In October of 1934, war was declared by Jimmie Jackson on the Bengal trilee, commonly known as the pole cat. Jimmie Jackson slayed seven up to the previous Thursday night. He declared the biggest one got away because Mrs. Jimmie didn't hold the lantern light correctly, Schnell said.

In the classified section of the Lynx News on Nov. 8, 1934 a black and tan coon dog was reported lost. A \$2.50 reward was offered by Warren McNabb.

In that same year, the Hansford County Relief Officials had 149 goats ready to issue to relief clients. Goats were issued as surplus commodities. Only requirements were to bring back the goat hides for tanning, said Schnell.
